Hospital Board Report—The report of the Hospital Board was read. Rev. F. W. Brandon, Assistant Secretary of the General Hospital Board, was introduced and spoke in interest of hospital work. The report was adopted.

We, your Hospital Board, wish to make the following report:

During the quadrennium or since our appointment, we have secured more than three hundred thousand (\$300,000.00) dollars worth of property, including a very large lot in the heart of the city of Lexington, with buildings and equipment and we are now running a splendid hospital with 125 beds, and are working up to almost the self-supporting capacity. We are full almost all the time. Since last Conference, we have received gifts amounting to more than \$55,000.00, and we are now erecting a new building at the cost of \$53,000.00. The Shriners are

finishing the first unit of an annex to us with fifty or sixty bed capacity for the purpose of treating cripple children, and we have a contract with them for board and other necessary service at a flat rate of \$3.00 per day with a guarantee of twenty-five per day. The hospital is on a firm basis and will do a great service to all in the years to come. We are planning to put in action a movement to erect a new building with about 60 more beds, a new operating equipment and other necessary improvements, and recommend that the Kentucky Conference agree to raise within a reasonable time the sum of \$150,000.00 by private solicitation and we are asking the city of Lexington and Fayette County to raise the sum of \$150,000.00.

When all this is done, we will have one of the truly great plants of all the South, and certainly one of the best hospitals of our great church. We wish to recommend to the General Board, for election as directors, the following: Alfred Combs, G. W. Banks, G. W. Vaughn, J. C. Fitch, W. E. Darragh, Wm. Dunn, Jas. McClure, Alex Hargis, W. C. Taylor, W. E. Arnold, Geo. B. Williams, Carl Norfleet, H. L. Ott, J. T. Carmon, W. P. Fryman, and L. W. Rue.

We are sure that we can do no greater work than that of building and maintaining a great hospital in a large center like that of Lexington, and surrounding country, with the large population near us and we are asking for the warmest sympathy and best co-operation from the whole of our people and we believe that this will be had.

Hospital service bids fair to be the next great field of activity in our Church, and it should be for we have delayed all too long the work of ministration to the bodies of men, and allowed other churches to outstrip us when we might have been in the forefront instead of bringing up the rear.

We recommend that the Golden Cross be emphasized in every congregation at the appointed time as the book of discipline requires and that every pastor be urged to give attention to the importance of the work and that G. W. Banks, without salary, be appointed as Golden Cross Commissioner for the ensuing year.

Frank W. Brandon, Associate Secretary of the General Hospital Board, was before your Board and brought cheering reports from the hospital field. We rejoice in the great and growing work of our hospitals at St. Louis, Atlanta, Montgomery, Houston, Hattiesburg, Memphis, Ft. Worth, and Dallas, and especially the new enterprise of the whole church, the Tuberculosis Hospital at Tuscan, Arizona.

lege, Rev. Harry Short, and Rev. J. W. Johnson, of the Louisville Conference, Dr. Allen, a representative of the General Board of Church Extension, Rev. J. B. Adams, Centenary Secretary, and Rev. Ed. F. Cook, Representative of the General Sunday School, were introduced.

Mission Report—Report No. 1 of the Board of Missions was read. Rev. W. G. Cram, Missionary Secretary, was introduced and delivered a missionary address. A motion was made to amend the report by striking out the last paragraph relating to the appointment of a full time Conference Missionary Secretary. After discussion, the amendment was adopted. The report as amended was adopted.

The Board of Missions desires to submit the following report:

The General Conference has declared that "during the months of January and February a special missionary cultivation campaign shall be conducted throughout the whole Church in every congregation, during which each member of the Church shall be given an opportunity to make a freewill offering for maintaining the general work of the board, which freewill offering shall be over and above the missionary assessments for the year and shall not include the income from Sunday Schools and Epworth Leagues; provided, that all moneys so raised shall be directed to the Board of Missions section of general work.

As to the method of carrying out this campaign of cultivation and taking the freewill offering from our people, the General Conference declared that "the Missionary Committee shall conduct an every member canvass in every congregation to secure a freewill offering for missions," and, further, "that the goal, in this special appeal, shall be to secure at least one million dollars over and above the income from assessments, Sunday Schools and Epworth Leagues, for maintenance each year during the quadrennium." Since this is now the law of our church, the utmost co-operation becomes a duty, but we do not regard our work of extending the Kingdom entirely in this light. It is also a high privi-lege and an opportunity in which we rejoice. The world calls for Christ as never before. The world needs Christ as never before. In no moment of history has more critical consequences hinged upon our giving Christ to the nations. In every land on earth the leaven of Bolshevistic atheism is working; it is being assiduously propagated by powerful proponents. The issue is not now between our religion and a heathen religion, a higher and a lower faith. It is between Christ and anti-Christ, between God and an absolute atheism and all that atheism means to the world and the future.

No discriminating Christian can look out over the world today without being stirred by the call which this dread situation brings to him. To falter now would not only be disloyalty—not only sin—but it would mean certain disaster to the whole structure of society.

RESOLVED, therefore, That this Annual Conference hereby pledge its hearty and energetic support to the plan outlined by the General Conference and that we enter heartily into every feature of the campaign of missionary cultivation during the months of January and February.

RESOLVED, That we accept, and will endeavor to raise by means of an every member canvass for a freewill offering, our share of the million dollars asked by the General Conference for missions.

Winchester, Ky., September 3, 1926.

The Conference assembled at 9:00 a.m. Bishop Dickey was in the chair. "Down at the Cross Where My Saviour Died" was sung. C. C. Fisher read the sixth chapter of Matthew and offered prayer.

Elders Elected—Question 19, "What traveling preachers and what local preachers have been elected elders?" was called. The following traveling preachers were elected elders: Adolphus Gilliam, J. B. Hahn, T. W. Beeler, W. S. Mitchell, J. W. Parish, Enos Waggoner, V. L. Moore, and E. S. DeSpain. The examination of C. R. Thomas was approved and his character was passed. No local preachers were elected elders.

Question 16—"Who else in the Class of the Fourth Year?" was called. W. P. Hopkins, not having passed an approved examination, his character was passed, and he was continued in the Class of the Fourth Year. Andrew Johnson, having passed an approved examination, being an elder, was advanced to the Class of the Fourth Year, his character having been passed.

Communications—A communication from the Board of Missions was received and referred to the Conference Board of Missions.

Introduction—Rev. A. R. Kasey, of the Louisville Conference, was introduced.

Sunday School Report—The report of the Sunday School Board was read. Rev. Ed. F. Cook, a representative of the General Sunday School Board, spoke in the interest of the work of the Sunday School Board. A motion was made to amend the report by striking out reference to the employment of a Conference Sunday School Extension Secretary. After discussion the amendment was adopted. The report as amended was adopted.

We, your Sunday School Board of the Kentucky Conference, beg leave to report as follows:

We are greatly encouraged by the fact that the past year has been marked by progress. Never before have the pastors and churches given such co-operation in the work. And our faithful Conference Superintendent, Mr. D. V. Snapp, and our office secretary, Miss Ruth D. Woodward, have worked unceasingly at their task. Mr. Snapp has traveled 9,248 miles beside office work and schools taught.

We gather from Mr. Snapp's report to the Board the following items which we submit for your careful consideration:

The Standard Training Schools at Covington and Lexington had a total enrollment of 171, and there were 105 credits issued. Beside these, fifteen one-week schools have been held in town and country churches with an enrollment of 276 and 105 credits given. During the year three

Gold Seal diplomas have been given, 14 Blue Seal diplomas, and 20 incomplete diplomas.

Out of 264 schools in our Conference 143 reported offerings for Sunday School Day with a total offering of \$1,425.84.

Early in the year we purchased a Multigraph machine which has enabled the office force to do their own printing at a great saving. Because of this we are enabled to report the total cost of our work less than the preceding year.

A notable feature of the work of the year has been our program in missionary education, the value of which has been greatly enhanced since we have had a definite special through which to express our growing missionary interests—the mission work in Europe. As a result of the increased missionary interest throughout the Conference we were the third Conference in the entire connection to pay out in full the Sunday School Centenary pledge.

This was accomplished last March since which time we have adopted the Dual Extension Plan offered by our General Sunday School Board, and provided for by action of our last General Conference, which permits us to use as much as one-half of the fourth Sunday missionary offerings for the employment of a Sunday School Extension Secretary to work in our rural churches, and in unchurched areas. This Dual Special provides for a Sunday School Extension Secretary in missionary areas within the Conference and the promotion of our mission work in Europe. This gives us a full rounded program of education in home and foreign missions.

We call your attention to the fact that your Board is conducting its work on as thorough a plan as that of any Board in our connection while at the same time our budget is less. Our expenditures have not at any time reached as much as \$4,000.00.

It is the very strong desire of your Board to promote the Sunday School work on the deepest spiritual lines recognizing the fact that its sole object is to produce a membership loyal to Christ and His church. Our sole object in trying to improve methods of work is to be workers with God in bringing into the lives of our people the Gospel which is: "The power of God unto salvation to everyone that believeth."

Your Board has re-employed Mr. Dennis V. Snapp as Conference Superintendent and we bespeak for him in the new year such hearty cooperation as has been extended in the year just gone.

The Board makes the following recommendations:

That we give special attention to the work of the Elementary Superintendent, Mrs. G. W. Banks, a volunteer worker, who emphasizes Children's Week and training work.

We further recommend that the improvement in the observance of Sunday School Day be made yet more unanimous the ensuing year.

We request the same assessment as was made last year.

In view of the fact that the Sunday Schools of the Conference have cleared up the Centenary and have greatly enlarged their missionary giving through a sound process of missionary education and in view of the General Conference action authorizing the Dual Extension Plan, your Board has recently employed Mr. F. T. Fowler to work in our rural and other missionary areas. He is an experienced worker in this field having had several years of unusual success in the Little Rock Conference.

Winchester, Ky., September 4, 1926.

The Conference assembled at 9:00 a.m. Bishop Dickey was in the chair. The Conference sang: "Jesus I My Cross Have Taken." W. R. Johnson prayed.

Minutes Approved—The minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

Admission Into Full Connection—The class for admission into full connection: J. G. Root, R. F. Ockerman, K. O. Potts, R. D. Huston, R. L. Harney, J. O. Benson, A. G. Stone, C. A. Sweazy, and J. H. Lewis were called before the Conference, suitably addressed by the Bishop, the vows were administered, and they were admitted into full connection by vote of the Conference.

Lord's Day Alliance—H. C. Hoskins, representative of the Lord's Day Alliance, was introduced and made a brief address in the interest of Sabbath Observance.

Question 5—"Who are discontinued?" was called. No one was discontinued.

Readmission—Question 3, "Who are readmitted?" was called. L. E. Williams, having been recommended by a District Conference and by the Committee on Admissions, was readmitted by vote of the Conference.

Conference Relations—On motion the name of C. C. Fisher was referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for the supernumerary relation.

Received From Other Churches—Question 10, "Who are received from other churches as traveling preachers?" was called. The credentials of Van Talmage Crawford, an elder in the Christian Church, were presented, he was recommended by the Committee on Admissions, and was received by vote of the Conference.

Question 11—"Who are located?" was called. No one was located.

Withdrawn—Question 12, "Who have withdrawn?" was called. J. A. McClintock and John Paul have withdrawn.

Preachers Died—Question 14, "What preachers have died during the year?" was called. Answer, J. D. Redd, E. J. Terrill, and J. M. Baker.

Place of Next Session—Question 42, "Where shall the next session of the Conference be held?" was called. Invitations from London and Richmond were received. London's invitation was accepted.

Orphans' Home Report—The report of the Orphans' Home Committee was read. E. S. Boswell, Superintendent of the Home, addressed the Conference in the interest of the Home. An offering of \$132.40 was taken. The report was adopted.

From the reports of the Superintendent and President and from other

data gathered from various sources, your Committee on Orphanage Work truly believe that our Home has done perhaps the best year's work in its history. Much sacrifice has been made in the way of economy, but all bills have been paid without drawing on any endowment or surplus funds.

In keeping with the charter and by-laws of the institution, we ask you to confirm the election, by the board, of R. E. McDowell, Frank Kimbel, G. W. B. Olmstead, and E. S. Boswell as three year members, their time having expired. This completes the board with S. O. Snyder, W. T. Baker, Dr. J. B. Lukins, and Mr. Lee Lewis, as two year members, and J. W. Ward, Rev. W. E. Arnold, J. F. Davis, and Edw. E. Rowland as one year members.

In this connection, we would also ask that you confirm the election of E. S. Boswell as Superintendent and Agent, and Mrs. Jessie R. Williams as Matron.

We have many other very encouraging things we might report, but feeling keenly the necessity for a great forward movement that will insure for us a new plant, which will more than double the present capacity and perhaps treble our influence for good, we prefer to give our efforts in that direction. The best argument we can make for this move is that more than twenty-five children have been turned away from our doors this year; therefore,

Whereas, both the Kentucky and Louisville Conferences, at their annual session one year ago, adopted a resolution pledging themselves to co-operate heartily with the Orphans' Home Board, in a forward movement to raise sufficient funds for a new building or other necessities: Such forward movement to be made when in the judgment of that beard and the Presiding Elders the time was ripe for such action; and

Whereas, the Presiding Elders have almost unanimously declared themselves in favor of such movement in the year 1927.

Now we the Kentucky Conference in session in Winchester, reaffirms cur position of one year ago, and pledge ourselves to give our heartiest support to make this plan a great success, and to do this at a time in 1927, selected by the Orphans' Home Board and the Presiding Elders of the two Conferences. While perfectly willing to leave the time and plan to the Orphans' Home Board and Presiding Elders, yet we would suggest a date as near the first of June, 1927, as possible.

We recommend also that our Presiding Elders with Dr. W. E. Arnold, who is a member of the Orphans' Home Board, be chosen as our representative to meet a like body from the Louisville Conference if needed to complete plans as anticipated, and request that they co-operate heartily to make this a great success.

We would ask our Presiding Elders as far as practical to hold their District Conferences before the date selected for this movement, so that due publicity may be given to it.

We append hereto a complete financial report of the President and Superintendent as part of our report.

Temperance and Social Service—The report of the Board of Temperance and Social Service was read. Rev. G. W. Young, representative of the National Anti-Saloon League, was introduced and made a brief address. The report was adopted.

We are deeply interested as citizens of Kentucky, and United States, in the work of temperance and prohibition. We desire therefore to heartily congratulate the Anti-Saloon League of Kentucky on the splendid work done under the efficient leadership of Superintendent A. C. Graham, and staff, and we assure them that we shall continue to give to the organization our loyal support.

We find great cause for rejoicing in the work of W. O. Mays, Prohibition Director of Kentucky and Tennessee, which shows 50 per cent more work with 47 per cent less men, and \$55,001.20 less than the operating cost of the same territory for the first six months of the year 1925. That the department has caused fines and seizures to be collected which have more than paid the expenses of the department. Divertible alcohol has been cut 60 per cent. And the Department of Justice reports that the Eleven Administrative District leads all other districts in the United States with the possible exception of Southern New York, in cases handled and convictions.

It is with pleasure we note that of the eleven candidates for Congress from Kentucky, ten of them are pledged to vote dry.

ANTI-RACE TRACK GAMBLING.

We wish to heartily endorse the efforts of all forces which seek to drive from Kentucky that enemy of morality and true citizenship, racetrack gambling. In this connection we desire again to call the attention of our citizens to the proper use of the ballot in this connection, and to urge that in all elections, regardless of party affiliation, that our voters see to it that men are sent to Frankfort, who will vote right on this question.

INTER-RACIAL RELATIONS.

On this always pressing question we may and ought to speak with great emphasis against lynching, mob-violence, and organized terrorism, against these almost helpless people among us—among us not from choice or thought of their own—our colored population. We must give them a fair chance for an education, good homing conditions, and unhindered opportunities to earn a livelihood by labor of hand and brain. In our attitude toward them, as in their attitude toward us, we must discriminate between the criminal elements in both races as distinguished from the body of the people.

INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS.

On these delicate and most complex questions between labor and capital we must always keep an open and sympathetic mind, with just and fair speech. We may not undertake to decide between them, not because we are partial or afraid, but because we are not in a position, usually, to know all the issues involved; but we can and must preach a gospel of tolerance, Christian forbearance, unselfishness, and fair dealing between man and man.

HOME AND FAMILY.

Realizing that divorce evils are reaching alarming proportions, we recommend that our people be exhorted to be on their guard against the forces of family disintegration, some of which are:

First. Hasty marriage, based on the undue excitement of the erratic emotions of young people rather than upon the real and lasting affections.

Second. Hasty divorce based upon imaginary slights, unreasonable jealousies and so-called "incompatibility of temperament," a device invented by divorce lawyers to hide a multitude of sins, and

Third. Extravagant tastes and habits that soon run the family into debt and create an economic excuse for breaking up the home. We believe that every child should have the right to be well-born, to wholesome surroundings in the home, to sufficient food, to good education, proper training for life and service, and the opportunity for proper recreation.

THE MOVING PICTURE.

In the hands of unscrupulous combination of capital, the moving picture is a menace to the morals of the world. We may well warn our people against the promiscuous and constant patronage of the movies.

We wish to nominate as trustees of the Anti-Saloon League of Kentucky, G. W. Young, W. E. Arnold, and B. C. Horton.

We recommend that Dr. G. W. Young be appointed to the National Anti-Saloon League.

Epworth League—The report of the Epworth League Board was read. On motion the report was adopted, allowing the Secretary the privilege of editing the report, if desirable.

Dear Fathers and Brethren:

The past year has been most successful in all departments of League work.

The young people's revival in September yielded many fruits, and

many young people gave their lives to Christ.

This is a permanent Calendar event, and unless the pastor's plan provides for another date, we suggest that special encouragement be given the young epople so that they may hold a Young People's Revival September 19 to 26. Suggestions will be found in the September Era, and in the paper bound book "The Spiritual Life."

YOUNG PEOPLE'S CONVENTION.

The greatest demonstration of spiritual vitality among the young people of the church was manifest last December-January when, following plans instituted by the League Presidents' meeting 4,000 young people gathered in Memphis for definite religious expression. The results are shown in the report of the convention, together with the addresses and Bishop Candler's great sermon on "The Church" which may be purchased for \$1.00.

THE GENERAL CONFERENCE.

The General Conference again endorsed the work of the Epworth League, and the Central Office force remains about the same. Dr. F. S. Parker is again General Secretary, and Rev. R. E. Nollner, Assistant, in charge of the Social Service Department, and League Unions. Dr. Parker himself will direct the First Department work. E. O. Harbin will continue in the Third Department, and Dr. Mumpower, who was long in our South African mission, will conduct the Fourth Department work. With him will be associated Miss Ina C. Brown, the noted author of "The Teaching of Jesus on the Use of Money." B. Frank Pim continues in the Intermediate League work, and Miss Lelia Beth Roberts in charge of the Junior League work.

GENERAL CONFERENCE LEGISLATION.

1. Anniversary Day has been changed to the fourth Sunday in March.

2. The Conference Epworth League will hereafter retain three-fourths of the Anniversary Day offerings, sending one-fourth to the Central Office, as heretofore. The Board will communicate with pastors and League presidents regarding that important date, and we are urging that it be observed, not in the interest of the League, nor even of our missionary work

in the "dark continent," but for the sake of Jesus Christ and the young life in our own churches.

3. The Treasurer of the Conference Board, instead of the Secretary, will hereafter be a member of the Conference Epworth League Cabinet.

CONNECTIONAL ASSEMBLIES.

The graduate schools for training leaders, at Lake Junaluska and Mt. Sequoyah are well attended. The presidents' meeting performs important advisory functions in shaping the policies of the League work. This meeting, held annually, is composed of the League Board presidents, League Conference presidents, and presidents of League Unions.

MISSIONARY AND OTHER GIFTS.

Last year the Leagues of our church raised \$415,793.

Of this \$66,989 were for the Belgian Congo Mission work and \$39,930 for other missions.

Besides the \$1,500 pledge of the Kentucky Conference Epworth League to Africa, we maintain a Kindergarten at Jenkins at a cost of \$750 annually.

We are asking for the same assessment as heretofore, for Epworth League work; the Board retaining one-fifth, and giving the League Conference four-fifths of the amount raised.

We are in desperate need of a part time field secretary who can be used to great advantage in organizing Leagues; and as soon as possible this will be enterprised.

JUNIOR LEAGUE.

The Junior League and Junior Missionary Society are to be correlated, the former retaining the larger program of worship and activity, the latter having charge of Missionary instruction and giving.

LITERATURE.

The Epworth Era has attained a circulation of over 40,000 copies, pays the salaries of the General Secretary and his Assistant, and earns a dividend for our superannuates. The Junior and Intermediate Quarterlies furnish materials for Junior and Intermediate Leagues.

We specially recommend the following League Books: "The Spiritual Life," by Dr. F. S. Parker; "What We Believe," by Dr. F. N. Parker; "Story of the Old Testament," by Frank Seay; "The Choice of a Career," by Evans and Brown, and "Jesus Teaching on the Use of Money," by Brown.

KENTUCKY CONFERENCE EPWORTH LEAGUE.

The League Conference is nearly as large in attendance as our Annual Conference. There are usually from fifteen to twenty Life Service consecrations during the summer assembly, besides 30 to 35 hardtime consecrations for work in the home churches. Our pastors are urged to attend the League assembly, and to have their Leagues or churches represented.

TREASURER'S REPORT.

The Treasurer's Report shows total receipts for the year \$1,070.97. Expenses of the Board as per itemized statement, \$269.53. Turned over to League Conference Treasurer \$480.65. Due League Conference Treasurer from funds in hand \$240.00. Balance in the Treasury \$80.79.

General Evangelist.

Resolved, That the Executive Committee of the Kentucky Conference Sunday School Board be and they are hereby authorized and empowered to terminate the official relation of the Kentucky Conference, M. E. Church, South, whenever in their godly judgment such action becomes necessary or expedient.

Kavanaugh Bible Conference—The report of the Kavanaugh Board was read and adopted.

Your committee with pleasure reports that the program of the Assembly this year was eminently successful. Sixteen speakers of national and international reputation gave a series of lectures and sermons of the highest order, and all attending were deeply interested, profoundly instructed, and spiritually edified.

The attendance was larger than last year. The increased attend-

ance of preachers was indeed gratifying.

The Assembly was amply financed and in addition there will doubtless be enough collected from outstanding subscriptions to meet expenses until the next Assembly.

There was an unusual demand for lots. A new plot of the grounds was made and doubtless a number of new cottages will be erected soon.

The membership of the Kavanaugh Club has been largely increased in both the Louisville and Kentucky Conferences, although the goal of membership as a means of financing the Assembly has not been reached.

We repeat what has been previously said that we recognize the need of a great summer assembly for Kentucky Methodism, comparable with the other assemblies of our church, which are too far away for our people to attend in large numbers.

Rev. H. W. Bromley, D.D. our director, deserves our highest praise and deepest gratitude for his vision of Kavanaugh as one of the great assemblies of the South, and for his zeal, and efforts, and sacrifice, in the endeavor to place Kavanaugh in this class.

The members of the Board of Trustees, who have labored with him in the several departments of the Board's activities to bring about these results, should share fully in our grateful appreciation, together with all who have liberally contributed to make these results possible.

We recommend that by the adoption of this report we again endorse the general plan to make Kavanaugh a center of religious activity for Kentucky Methodism.

In obedience to orders from the two Conferences representatives elected by each Conference met at Kentucky Wesleyan College, Winchester, Ky., May 31, 1926, and organized the Joint Board of Education of the Kentucky and Louisville Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, thus merging the former incorporated Boards of Education of the two Conferences.

This merger brings under the control of the new organization educational institutions as follows:

KENTUCKY WESLEYAN.

Kentucky Wesleyan is an A grade four-year college. This school has always taken the duty of Christian education seriously, and has striven to maintain the highest standards in education, religion and morals.

Continuing the consistent progress of past years, Kentucky Wesleyan may reasonably be said to have entered a new era of development, and what is said of it is equally applicable to Logan and Lindsey Wilson.

Dr. D. C. Hull was elected to the presidency of Kentucky Wesleyan last year, and in a brief time came to be recognized in educational circles of the State as an educator of marked ability. Under Dr. Hull's administration the College has had its largest enrollment and in every way one of the most successful years of its history. Large additions have been made to the property, so that it compares favorably with the best in the South. The more recent additions have been two dormitories, one for men and one for women, and a spacious gymnasium, the gift of the citizens of Winchester and Clark county, and hardly equaled in the State. Emergency rooming quarters have been provided for students by the purchase of property surrounding the campus. The immediate pressing need is a new dormitory, as attendance is limited by dormitory accommodations.

Logan deserves our most generous support, for its success will mean much to the future womanhood of our Church and State.

LINDSEY WILSON.

Lindsey Wilson is the youngest of our schools and is strategically located for the educational service it was established to render. But we would disabuse anybody's mind of a possible false impression that because its work partakes of a missionary character it is therefore something of an inferior type. As in case of our other schools, the standards of Lindsey Wilson are fixed by the State, and honest effort is made to maintain those standards. Located just on a line between the mountain and blue grass region, Lindsey Wilson stands ready to receive ambitious youth from the hill country and give them better equipment as they fare forth into the world of business and the professions in the centers of population. But many come here for training and return to spend their lives in their native hills, and thus Lindsey Wilson has made a rich contribution to all the surrounding territory.

As with our other schools, Lindsey Wilson is undergoing large physical improvement. We are installing a steam heating plant for the Administration Building, the dormitories are in course of renovation and repair, a laboratory has been provided to meet the requirements of the State and a business department has been added. The school will open its fall term with the best equipment in its history.

Brother R. V. Bennett continues to give heroic service to the cause of Christian Education as President of Lindsey Wilson, and he has the enthusiastic commendation of all who know his ability and the living sacrifice he is making of himself for this cause that he so dearly loves.

GENERAL STATEMENT.

Your Board of Education lays no claim to infallibility and confesses to many mistakes, but we do claim the poor need of confidence in the integrity of our purpose and the best ability of which we are capable in an unselfish effort to do the best possible with the trust you have committed to us.

We feel that through all the years Kentucky Methodism has failed to develop that enthusiasm for higher Christian Education necessary to suc-

cess in this our opportunity for great contribution to the Kingdom of Christ. Our schools have had a hand to mouth existence, and in the past it has been possible to conduct them on that plan with some degree of success. But that day is gone, and if Kentucky Methodism intends to continue work in the field of Christian Education, we had as well make up our minds that larger support must be given. States and associations of colleges now fix standards, and unless a school can meet the requirements it had as well close its doors. In fact it is only a matter of time when it will do so for a lack of patronage. The young people of today are awake. They demand the best, and it would be sin for us to ask them to accept anything less even if they would do so out of loyalty to a church indifferent to their needs.

Our schools need further equipment, and must have larger endowment; \$135,000.00 of pledges to the Education Movement in the Louisville Conference is unpaid. In the Kentucky Conference \$128,778.92.

In the immediate future Logan College should have an additional endowment of \$100,000.00, and Lindsey Wilson should have the same amount, and Kentucky Wesleyan should have an additional \$200,000.00, and these amounts should be increased till Logan and Lindsey Wilson have \$200,-000.00 each and Kentucky Wesleyan \$500,000.00.

We respectfully request that a Secretary-Treasurer be appointed for the two Conferences, whose duty it shall be to complete the collection of Education subscriptions at the earliest possible date, and to solicit funds for the endowment of the schools as suggested above. We want here to record our high commendation of the capable and valuable service rendered

the two Conferences by Dr. Arnold in this capacity.

We have come upon a time when the contrary winds of doubt and error are beating fiercely upon the young life of our land. We know not what the future holds, but we have a conviction that its fate will be largely determined by the character of education given the youth of today. Every member of your Board and President of your schools is grounded in Methodist doctrine and the President of each school is a Methodist preacher whose loyalty to the faith is unimpeachable, and resolute stand taken by them when occasion has arisen is an earnest of what you may expect in the future.

We request that the first Sunday in November be designated as Education Sunday, and as many Sundays following as may be necessary for

Your Board of Education would submit the following report: At our meeting held during the present session, we had with us Rev. H. H. Sherman, D.D., Associate Secretary of the General Board of Education, who placed in our hands the annual communication from the General Board, and gave us valuable information as to our general educational work. It is gratifying to know that the Christian Education Movement has been a great success, not only in the collection of nearly eight million dollars from pledges made to this cause, but also in the awakening of a new interest in the cause of Christian Education, and in stimulating new and large investments in educational enterprises. The fact that the property value of our educational institutions has more than doubled since the Christian Education Movement was inaugurated, and that the attendance on our schools has increased more than 50 per cent, is evidence of the great awakening that has come to our Church during the last five years.

In the Kentucky Conference, the Christian Education Movement has been as great a success as it has been elsewhere. Of the \$345,000.00 pledge to the movement, \$216,000.00 or 63 per cent, have been collected. and our share of this money has enabled Kentucky Wesleyan College to add to its endowment, to double its capacity to care for students, and to place the College among the leading high-grade institutions of the State. Besides this, the new interest awakened has lead to the consummation of a movement which promises more for Kentucky Methodism than anything that has occurred in this generation. We refer to the merger of educational interests with those of the Louisville Conference. Acting upon the authority given them by your session in 1924, your Board has taken all the steps necessary to meet the legal requirements in consolidating the two Boards, and to place the three institutions of the two Conferences under the management of a Joint Board, consisting of eight members from each Conference. This builds our Methodist schools into an educational system, correlating them in such way as to eliminate all rivalry and to secure unity and co-operation instead. This Joint Board is carefully working out a great educational program which will challenge the Methodist people to the very best endeavor of which they are capable. and will give opportunity to put their educational work in the very front rank among the educational forces of the State. One strong, wellequipped and well-endowed college, and two junior colleges of the very highest grade, with at least a million dollars behind them and a thousand students within their halls, will be the slogan for the next five years.

The General Conference at its recent session directed the Annual Conferences to set apart two months within the period from August 1 to December 31, 1926, in which an intensive, co-operative effort shall be made by the Bishop, Presiding Elders, pastors, and members of the Church to complete the work of the Christian Education Movement. Your Board asks that you designate the months of November and December as the time for this intensive effort. They also ask that the Bishop appoint W. E. Arnold as Secretary-Treasurer of the Christian Education Movement for the coming year.

The recent General Conference further directed "that responsibility for the organization and conduct of the pastors' schools shall be transferred from the Board of Missions to the Board of Education, and these schools shall be promoted under the Board in co-operation with the other agencies now at work in the field." Your Board believes that these schools provide an opportunity to our pastors to better equip themselves for the work of the ministry and should be continued. They ask that D. C. Hull be appointed to represent our Board of Education in providing for the Pastors' School to be held at Kentucky Wesleyan College during the summer of 1927, in conjunction with the Louisville and Illinois Conferences. This representative of the Board of Education, acting with representatives of the Boards of Education of the co-operating Conference and with representatives of Boards of Missions and the Sunday School Boards, shall constitute a Board of Managers for the Pastors' School.

It is further recommended that the Chairman of the incoming Board of Education be appointed to attend the meeting of the Southern Methodist Educational Association next February.

With Kentucky Wesleyan College, the past year has been the greatest year in its history. It has not been long since the Kentucky Conference Minutes reported that there were, in both college and academy, 100 students. Last year 356 students were enrolled in classes doing purely college work. Our attendance is limited only by the capacity of our dormitories and class rooms. Five hundred students could be easily matriculated during the coming year if we could provide accommodations for them. The necessity for additional dormitory space in the near future, is imperative. Our new President, Dr. David Carlisle Hull, has quickly fitted himself into his place, and with great wisdom and discretion is successfully guiding the affairs of the College. Already he has impressed himself upon the State as one of its ablest educators. He is the very man we need, and we pledge to him our heartiest co-operation and support.

The educational statistics are as follows: Number of institutions, 1; number of teachers, 26; number of students, 356; value of school property, \$345,000.00; endowment, \$111,056.03; indebtedness, \$65,000.00. These figures take no account of the new gymnasium and athletic field, worth at least \$100,000.00, because these enterprises are not yet complete and the committee having the work in hand have not yet rendered an account of the receipts and costs of these enterprises. It should be noted, however, that in the \$65,000.00 indebtedness mentioned above, is included \$26,000.00, which your Board put into the financing of the gymnasium building. We acknowledge with deep gratitude the generosity of the faculty and student body of Kentucky Wesleyan College and of the people of Winchester and Clark County in making possible this splendid gymnasium and athletic field.

The work done by Rev. A. R. Perkins as student pastor at the University of Kentucky, is worthy of our special commendation. We are greatly pleased that the Conference has provided for a continuance of this work, and we request the re-appointment of Bro. Perkins to the same work during the coming year. We further request that the same committee which has had the supervision of the work the past year, be continued until such time as the new Board of Education may see fit to put a new committee in charge of this work.

American Bible Society—The report of the American Bible Society Board was read and adopted.

The American Bible Society Committee submit the following report:

The American Bible Society reports the unprecedented number of 9,069,120 volumes of Scriptures in more than 150 languages and dialects as the total issues for its 110th year of service, 1925. This represents an increase of nearly two and one-half million volumes over 1924. This increase over the past year in the home field amounted to 738,855 volumes,

while the foreign field reported issues of 1,677,966 volumes more than in 1924

Concerning the total circulations in China the agency secretary writes: "Circulation figures that break all previous records are reported not only by the American Bible Society, but by those working so intimately with us, the British and the Foreign and National Bible Society of Scotland. It is notable that in this year when the organized opposition to Christianity has been more widespread than at any time since the beginning of the centuries, the circulation of Scriptures by the three Bibles societies has for the first time exceeded ten million copies, and has crossed the eleven million line."

After several years of violent opposition to the Bible, the Soviet government in Russia has given permission to Russian Christian groups to print Russian Scriptures on the government presses in Leningrad and Moscow, and the American Bible Society provided between \$10,000 and \$15,000 for the purpose of making new electrotype plates from which to print these much needed Scriptures. A committee is now busy arranging for the inauguration of this work which will make the Scriptures available for all Christians in Russia.

The "Penny portions" of the Scriptures have proved so popular that the society decided to issue the complete New Testament in eleven separate volumes, each of which sells for one cent.

A five-cent New Testament has been issued. This meets a crying need for a New Testament for wide distribution by missions and individuals.

The report for the year shows a satisfactory gain in the United States in the issues of the whole Bibles, most of which go to churches, Sunday Schools and mission stations for use in classes and study groups.

The churches, as a whole, are interested in the American Bible Society program, twenty-six denominations definitely co-operate through some form of financial support.

Education Report Printed—A motion was made requesting the printing of the report of the Joint Board of Education in the Central Methodist.

Report of W. E. Arnold—W. E. Arnold, Secretary and Treasurer of the Christian Education Movement, read his report and it was received and filed.

To the Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South: The pledges to the Christian Education Movement in the Kentucky Conference totaled \$345,364.08. On these pledges Rev. O. B. Crockett, who was Secretary-Treasurer to August 25, 1922, collected the sum of \$75,730.57. From August 25, 1922, to August 25, 1926, I have collected the sum of \$140,855.19, making the total collected \$216,585.16, or 63 per cent of the amount pledged. This leaves a balance yet unpaid of \$128,778.92. During the fiscal year ending August 25, 1926, I have collected \$29,622.48. Knowing the list of subscriptions as I do, I am convinced that from 40 to 50 per cent of this unpaid balance can yet be collected.

During the year the salary of the Secretary-Treasurer and all office expense have been \$2,862.99, which is a little less than 10 per cent of the amount collected. My books are all open to inspection, and an itemized statement can be made at any time.

In the judgment of your Secretary-Treasurer a thorough and strenucus campaign should be made to collect the amounts yet unpaid, or to make satisfactory adjustment with the pledgers before January 1, 1927. Plans have been formulated by which this work may be done. The pledges to the Christian Education Movement were made and accepted by the Board of Education in good faith. They are sacred promises to the Church of God. They are as binding upon the individual as any other obligation can be. With the earnest co-operation of members of the Conference, the effort to close up the business will be successful beyond all expectation.

GEORGE HISLE BEQUEST TO EL BETHEL CHURCH.

Winchester, Ky., September 1, 1926.

To the Legal Conference of the Kentucky Conference, M. E. Church, South: Dear Brethren:

When the Kentucky Conference met in Mt. Sterling in 1924, it was reported that George Hisle, long time a member of El Bethel church, Mt. Zion circuit, Lexington District, had died, leaving a bequest of one thousand dollars to said El Bethel church. "On motion W. E. Arnold was apart." pointed to represent the Legal Conference with reference to this bequest."

On investigation I found that the bequest of one thousand dollars had been left to the Peoples State Bank and Trust Company, of Winchester, Ky., in trust, the money to be invested, and the interest earned to be paid to the stewards of El Bethel church, to be applied by them to the payment of the salary of the pastor of El Bethel church. In case El Bethel church should, at any time, cease to exist, this interest to be paid to the Methodist Orphans' Home at Louisville, Ky.

I found further that, though nearly two years had elapsed since the death of Bro. Hisle, this money was still in the hands of the administrator of the estate, and that it was not invested so as to earn anything for the pastor of said church. Upon representations to the said Peoples State Bank and Trust Company, that the Kentucky Conference was an incorporated body, and that the Legal Conference was perfectly competent to hold and administer trusts of this kind, said Peoples State Bank and Trust company declined to qualify as trustee of this bequest.

But as the Legal Conference would not be in session for nearly nine months; and in view of the fact that I was President of same and had been instructed to represent the Conference in looking after this bequest; and in order to get the money invested and earning interest as soon as possible, I myself qualified as Trustee of the said George Hisle fund. The one thousand dollars was invested as soon as paid into my hands, and I have collected and paid to the stewards of El Bethel church interest to the amount of \$44.08. The money is invested in a bond, secured by first mortgage on real estate, and bearing interest at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum.

My sole purpose in qualifying as trustee of this fund was to get the money invested as soon as possible, and I had no thought of continuing to hold the trust longer than the present session of our Legal Conference. I therefore desire to resign as trustee of the said George Hisle Fund, and turn over the trust to the Legal Conference. I ask that the Legal Conference do now accept the trust, and instruct its Treasurer to take any and all legal steps necessary to satisfy the court and to administer the trust according to the terms of the will. A copy of that part of the will creating this fund and setting forth the terms thereof, is attached herewith. Respectfully submitted,

Sabbath Observance—The report of the Committee on Sabbath Observance was read and adopted.

Your Committee, as briefly and concisely as a very important subject demands, would hereby and hereon offer a few pertinent and positive reflections:

First. There is an admittedly lack of concern or Christian conscience on this momentous matter. There is a deadly indifference throughout the church and nation, and very rapidly the primary principle underlying the base of our civilization, is being emasculated and destroyed.

By unanimous consent we agree to the statement that elaborate and untempered expressions either impress our pulpit, promise

but slight remedy for a malignant growth upon our body politic.

Third. We must repeatedly recall the words of the wisest Teacher, who said, "The Sabbath was made for man, and not man for the Sabbath. Hence, man is somehow interwoven into the needs of the Holy Day. Man must give place in his life for the benign force and effect of that divine "Remember the Sabbath Day to keep it holy."

And in this observance we shall find strength and grace for all other

days of our living.

Therefore, be it resolved:

First. We pledge ourselves, both clergy and laity, to be careful in

example to set forth the sanctity of the Sabbath.

Second. That we shall prayerfully and carefully give such words of instruction to the people as will create a positive conviction of conscience in holding fast the faith as once delivered by our Lord; avoiding the appearance of all evil as offending against the holy commandment.

Third. Despite the fact that much good literature is to find distribution and that Scriptural teachings are in no wise to be neglected or omitted, a vital and important factor must not be overlooked—"Example is better than precept," and "Doing the thing is more impressive and effective than saying it."

The Lord's Day Alliance, whose chief mission is to build up the conscience of all Christians relative to a more consecrated and determined recognition of the sacred Day, has our most hearty support.

REPORT OF BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES, KENTUCKY CONFERENCE, SEPTEMBER 4, 1926.

To the President and Members of the Kentucky Annual Conference:

Dear Brethren: Your Conference Board of Lay Activities begs leave to submit its report as follows:

We are glad to report that real progress has been made during the year in the organization of Wesley Brotherhoods and Stewardship Committees in the local churches. We deeply appreciate the growing interest on the part of our Presiding Elders and pastors in the enlarged and developing program of lay activities.

DUTIES UNDER NEW CONSTITUTION.

We note that under the new constitution adopted by the General Conference at Memphis in May, the Conference Board of Lay Activities has three definite and well-defined duties—the promotion of Christian stewardship, the Wesley Brotherhood, and full payment of the benevolences.

(1) CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP.

We recognize that leadership in this important field entails upon us a most solemn and serious responsibility. We must, first of all, be Christian stewards ourselves. The Conference, district, associate district,

charge, and Church leaders should set a worthy example in this regard. Then we must be organizers and propogandists. We must "study to show ourselves approved unto God, workmen that need not to be ashamed." We realize that as go the leaders and officials of our Methodism, so will our Methodism go. Our primary and immediate stewardship objectives, therefore, are the organization of the Christian Stewardship Committee in each local Church and the training of this committee and the other church officials in stewardship principles and practice.

(2) THE WESLEY BROTHERHOOD.

Under the recent legislation, the Wesley Brotherhood is the duly authorized organization of the men of our Church for the promotion of "Fellowship, personal evangelism and all phases of men's work." The growth of this organization the past eighteen months indicates that it has passed the experimental stage. We are fully persuaded that the Brotherhood Movement is a coming and providential movement in Christendom, and that in the Wesley Brotherhood the M. E. Church, South, has an opportunity for marshalling men and promoting brotherhood that is second to no denomination in the world. We would call upon all of our ministers and laymen alike to give the most loval and hearty support to the Brotherhood Movement and the organization provided by the General Conference for our participation in this movement, namely, the Wesley Brotherhood. The month of December has been designated by the General Board of Lay Activities as Brotherhood month for the entire Church. We would respectfully request our pastors to preach at least one sermon on Brotherhood during Brotherhood month and urge charge and Church leaders to seize the opportunity afforded during this month to promote the organization of Brotherhoods in their local churches.

(3) THE BENEVOLENCES.

According to the provisions of the new legislation, the General Board of Lay Activities is charged with the promotion of an annual everymember canvass throughout the Church in behalf of all the benevolent claims, in which effort it shall have the co-operation of all the general agencies of the Church, and, to quote from the new constitution, "The Conference Board, together with the Bishop in charge, shall be responsible for promoting this canvass in the Annual Conference and shall have the co-operation of the other Conference Boards." In harmony with these provisions your Conference Board of Lay Activities, after due consideration and conference with the presidents of the other Conference Boards, make the following recommendations looking toward the full payment of all benevolent assessments the coming Conference year:

1. That following the example of the General Conference we make no material increase in assessments, but adopt the slogan "An enlarged income for the benevolences not by increasing the assessments, by paying them in full."

2. That as soon as convenient after the session of the Annual Conference a meeting of the Bishop, Presiding Elders, Conference Board of Lay Activities, the presidents of the other Conference Boards participating in the benevolences, and the Chairman of the Commission on Budget, be held to make definite plans for promoting the full payment of the benevolent assessments.

3. That the every-member canvass to secure the benevolences in cash and subscription be made as early in the year as practicable, the definite date to be fixed by the leaders at the above-mentioned meeting.

CO-OPERATION WITH THE SPECIAL MOVEMENTS OF THE CHURCH.

Your Conference Board of Lay Activities desires to express its

genuine interest in, and pledge its co-operation in behalf of, the special effort to secure funds to meet the needs of our expanding missionary program, the completion of the Christian Education Movement, and the raising of the remainder of the Superannuate Endowment Fund.

THE METHODIST LAYMAN.

By the action of the General Conference the Methodist layman is now recognized as the official organ of the General Board of Lay Activities and the Wesley Brotherhood, and the Conference, district, circuit, and Church lay leaders are made responsible for its circulation in the Conference, district, circuit, and local Church respectively.

CONFERENCE LAY LEADER.

We nominate W. W. Ball, of Maysville, Ky., for Conference Lay Leader and recommend his election.

Resolution—The following resolution offered by J. J. Dickey was adopted:

Whereas, bribery in elections has become a National menace of such magnitude that the Senate of the United States has appointed a committee to investigate recent elections in several states where it is reported that millions have been expended; and

Whereas, an election is to be held next November in Kentucky for choosing a United States Senator and several members of the National House of Representatives; therefore,

Resolved, That the members of the Kentucky Annual Conference of the M. E. Church, South, in session in Winchester, Ky., do earnestly request the candidates for these offices to instruct their campaign managers to conduct their respective campaign strictly according to the election laws of Kentucky. We ask this under a deep sense of our own responsibility, as citizens of this great Commonwealth to maintain our free institutions, intact, received as a rich legacy from our fathers, and aware of the fact, that the corruption of the ballot means the final downfall of our government and the loss of our liberties.

The Secretary of the Conference is hereby instructed to furnish to each candidate a copy of this resolution.

Christian Literature—The report of the Board of Christian Literature was read and adopted.

We, your Committee on Christian Literature, beg leave to submit the following report:

1. We rejoice to note the splendid showing made by our Publishing House for the past year and wish to assure them of our continued support and to this end we wish again to urge our preachers and laymen to buy any and all books they may need through our Publishing House as part of all proceeds are returned to us in the support of our retired veterans of the Cross. We would again urge the preachers and laymen to subscribe for our Church papers. We note with regret that the Christian Advocate continues its losses, having lost in the quadrennium just closing \$76,936.20. My brethren, this should shame us when we have beyond question one of

the greatest general or official organ of any Protestant denomination in the world.

2. We wish our pastors would see to it that our Sunday Schools use our own literature as we believe we have the most able and orthodox of

any Sunday School papers or magazines that are published.

3. We are proud indeed of our Conference organ and glad to hear from the Publishing Commission that it will be still better. We are especially proud of the mechanical appearance of the paper and so day by day in every way it will get better and better. Watch it grow. But to do this there must be a united effort on the part of every preacher and layman, so we recommend (1) the continued use of the Budget Plan. The Central Methodist in every Methodist home; (2) the continuance of the "Quota Plan" a minimum of a thousand subscribers to each district; (3) that the same assessment of \$1,300.00 be asked for the Central Methodist from this Conference for next year; (4) that we recommend that Rev. O. B. Crockett, Rev. W. V. Cropper and Mr. L. G. Smith be elected as the Publishing Commission of the Central Methodist from this Conference for the next year.

MEMOIRS

REV. E. J. TERRILL.

Rev. Elijah J. Terrill was born in Garrard County, Ky., May 27, 1855. He departed this life, Wednesday, April 14, 1926, being at the time of his death almost seventy-one years of age.

Brother Terrill came into this world with a feeble body, and, according to his own testimony, for almost fifty years he lived by the grace of God. He was powerfully converted and gloriously sanctified when a young man, and called to preach. He joined the Kentucky Conference in 1886. He took joyfully his appointments and disappointments and honestly filled his place as a humble Methodist preacher. He firmly believed the doctrines of his Church, and when necessary, he was ever ready to defend the same. Most of his preaching was of the evangelistic type. He had a passion for souls and was ever anxious to win men to Jesus Christ.

Brother Terrill was blessed with a good mind. He loved good books, and when unable to buy them he borrowed from his friends, marked and used their contents to a good purpose—a worthy example to all young preachers.

He was a worthy namesake of Elijah. Thus, like the man of Bible fame he was a man of undaunted faith. In spite of disadvantages and earthly discouragements he showed to the world again that man is not a creature of circumstances, but that in spite of physical disadvantages a man may count in this life for good and for God.

Many months before his death he made definite arrangements for his funeral, place of burial, price of coffin, cost of marker and the distribution of all his earthly possessions and wrote with his own hand the following testimony: "I want my friends to state I believed in the two distinct works of grace, regeneration and entire sanctification. I was divinely healed. I lived on the mercy of God for almost half a century. If I ever backslid one hour, I don't know it. At the close of my earthly career my life is hid with Christ in God, and my trust is entirely in the atonement."


Brother Terrill was a great believer in prayer, a man of great faith and deep convictions, a safe and good expounder of the word of God and had he been blest with a good body, he had sufficient ability to have ministered acceptably to our strong churches with a mighty gospel.

He leaves behind a wife, four stalwart sons, a sister, a brother and a host of friends. REV. J. D. REDD.



On the 21st day of August, 1862, there was born to Alexander and Mary Beverly Redd, in Harrison County, Ky., a son whose name, Jefferson Davis, indicated evidently their Southern sympathies in those trying days of the civil war.

The Redd home, now owned and occupied by Dr. Alexander Redd and his family, was a Methodist home of the most devout type.

The following graphic picture of J. D. Redd's childhood is from the pen of his elder brother, Dr. Alexander Redd, "We did not spend our childhood together for my childhood was past 'ere his began. I remember some things in his childhood that seemed unique. From an infant he was a little early riser. When I would rise before day, and come down into the family room as was the custom on the farm I

would find him dressed and seated in his little arm chair before the fire. His mother dressed him like a little man. His small frock coat and trousers, which he stuffed in his red top boots, gave him the appearance of a veritable Tom Thumb."

It was during his student days at Kentucky Wesleyan College that he was converted. This important event occurred in the early morning of March 12, 1882. And was God's answer after three weeks of penitent prayer, and waiting at the church altars during revival services. The witness came as he was bathing his face, thus changing, as it were, that bodily cleansing into a veritable sacrament.

Eleven years later, in the parsonage at Bethel, Ky., he received the enduement of the Holy Spirit, or "Perfect Love."

He united with the Kentucky Conference in 1884, and during his active ministry of forty-one years he served such charges as London, Carrollton, Williamstown, Millersburg, Harrodsburg and LaGrange. And was presiding elder of the Maysville District for four years.

As both presiding elder and pastor he was diligent and aggressive in promoting all the varied interests of the church.

He placed emphasis on evangelism, and was successful in revival work, yet he valued also the other important interests of the church a minister should promote. We cite one instance of his appreciation of the value of an adequate church building. While pastor at London he led the congregation in building a handsome new church—adding materially to the funds by personally soliciting money in various parts of Kentucky.

He was married to Miss Pelagia A. Mulligan, June 26, 1888. Four children were born to them. The second born, Alexander Earl, died in infancy. Three survive: Herman Redd, Huntington, W. Va.; Mrs. E. B. Driskell, Worthville, Ky., and Mrs. Lewis Frederick, Lexington, Ky.

Deeply devoted to his wife and children he was rewarded with their loyal respect and love. During a visit at his bedside the writer was privileged to read the ritual after which he sat up in the bed and christened the baby daughter of his elder daughter, Mrs. Driskell. She desiring his ministry in that sacred service.

The following characteristics were clearly marked in his personality: First, he was pre-eminently unselfish.

He gave constantly of his time, strength, sympathy and service to others. "The most unselfish man I ever knew," is the tribute Rev. A. P. Jones telegraphed from Florida. And Dr. C. C. Fisher in his funeral tribute confirmed this statement of Brother Jones.

Other qualities in his personality should be given were we to account fully for the unusually large number of warm friends, both young and old, who were drawn to him with such special devotion.

The writer was privileged to read letters written to him during his illness, and to his family after his decease, from various parts of the United States acknowledging the debt of the writers to him and declaring their love. Some he had led to Christ, others he had inspired to nobler living, and yet others he had, as a Shepherd, led into green pastures and besides still water.

Second, he had an intense nature, what he did he did with all his might. Whether he prayed, preached, built churches, or fought the Liquor Traffic there was ever the dynamic of deep earnestness and tireless energy. He was like a lamp that shines because it burns. Perhaps he was at his best at a throne of grace. It has been said of Bishop Francis Asbury that he was an effective preacher, but excelled in prayer. And no one, who ever heard J. D. Redd pray can forget the eloquence, born of earnestness, with which he pleaded for the Divine favor and blessing.

Third. He did not, as some have done, substitute a social Gospel for the Gospel to the individual, yet in addition to calling individual sinners to repentance he also attacked the social evil of his day, and was active in other reforms beside Prohibition.

His activity and ability in fighting for Prohibition is indicated by the fact that he was once the nominee of the Prohibition party for Governor of Kentucky. And was sent at various times as delegate to National and International conventions.

Col. Geo. W. Bain, who was his co-worker in Temperance promotion, has this to say in a letter to Mrs. Redd: "A truer, braver heart never beat in the breast of any of my friends. He stood foursquare to every wind that blows. I knew where to find Jeff. Redd on every moral question."


He quietly fell asleep in the late evening of May 21, 1926, in the home of his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Frederick, Lexington, Ky. His last days were characterized by great physical pain, yet his faith and patience shown like light that transfigures darkness. And his courtesy and appreciation shown to his family, and friends, who ministered to him, was not short of Christ-like.

The funeral services were held in First Church, Lexington. The pastor, Dr. G. R. Combs, having charge. Dr. C. C. Fisher made the principal address. J. W. Hughes, R. B. Baird, J. R. Savage, W. E. Arnold, R. H. Kleiser, and the writer also taking part in the service.

In the congregation were a large number of his fellowpastors in the Kentucky Conference. And a remarkable number of his friends and former parishioners from the various parts of Kentucky where he had ministered.

James M. Baker was born February 17, 1870, at Gratz, Owen County, Kentucky, and passed away at his home at Hughes Chapel, Boone County, June 26, 1926. His early life was spent in Carroll and Trimble Counties. His father, Wilburn B. Baker, and mother, Rachel Baker, moved with their family to Tyrone, Anderson County, when the subject of this sketch was a lad about twelve years old. Here he completed the common course, after which he attended school at Lawrenceburg under Professor J. B. Willis. He walked to and fro, a distance of four miles, daily to this school, having from childhood an ambition to secure an education. He was always bright and studious. He attended State College, completed the commercial course and received a Teacher's

Life Certificate from that institution and another by examination by the State Board of Education.

His life was always a busy one from the beginning to its very close. He was married February 20, 1896, to Miss Agnes Tolls, of Anderson County, and to them two children were born, Myrtie Lee, who is now Mrs. Floyd Watts, of Harrodsburg, Ky., and Hubert, who also is married and lives in Boone County.

He is also survived by two small grand-children, little J. M. Baker and Anne Baker Watts; two sisters, Mrs. H. B. Roberts and Mrs. D. R. Hillard; one brother, E. H. Baker, and one half-brother, J. E. York.

For twenty-one years Brother Baker was a successful school teacher, spending most of his life at Tyrone, where he taught school. He was postmaster there for twelve years and was a leader in every way of that town and community. From there he moved to Salvisa where he lived nine years and was cashier of the Farmers Bank during the time.

Through all these years he was known as a local preacher, deacon and elder in our Church, having been converted when a young man at Salvisa, where he was then teaching school, in a great revival held there by W. W. Green, A. P. Jones, B. F. Cosby and others, Dr. Vaughn, perhaps. He had, however, been preaching a few years prior to this time. He was a splendid preacher, a man of real worth and ability and served as supply for a number of years with acceptability Lawrenceburg, Salt River, Mortonsville and other churches. Had he joined the Conference twenty-five years ago and given himself exclusively to the work of the ministry, I haven't a doubt but that he would have gone to some of cur very strong churches. However, two years ago this fall, he knocked at the door of the Conference for admission, and notwithstanding his age and because of the faithful service he had rendered the church through all these years, while he earned his own living from without the church, he was admitted on trial without any difficulty whatsoever. In less than two years he had already completed three years of the Conference course of study.

Five years ago next fall he was sent as supply to Hughes Chapel and Big Bone, where he finished his life work among people who loved him. It has been said that he was everybody's man. The writer was assisting him in a meeting, which was the second one we had assisted him in at Hughes Chapel. He had taken his part in every service from Monday night, through the service Friday night, and got up Saturday morning as usual. After going a mile to attend to some business, he was taken with a peculiar shortness of breath. He returned home at once, went straight to bed and was gone at 8:30 a. m. It was a heavy shock to us all. The people did everything that kind hands and sympathetic hearts could do for the bereaved family.

The funeral was conducted Sunday afternoon at the church there by Rev. J. L. Clark, his Presiding Elder, and several other pastors of the district who were present, in the presence of a large crowd from all the countryside round about.

Leaving early Monday morning, we carried his remains back to Anderson County, followed by a large number of his friends, and at 1:30 p. m., we conducted his funeral at Hebron, a Cumberland Presbyterian Church, where he once served as pastor for a short while. We were there assisted by Rev. C. H. Greer, Presiding Elder, Lexington District; Rev. Robert Jordan, of Lawrenceburg, and Rev. P. C. Long, of Salvisa. A number of other ministers were present.

His friends loved him, and they came from the surrounding counties to pay their last respects. His body was laid peacefully to rest before the largest crowd ever seen at that church.

In his going, this feeble writer has sustained a severe personal loss. Under God, he helped me to get my feet on the rock in December, 1896, where they have stood through the years, and our friendship was never broken until that morning in June, when I stood by his bed and bending over him, saw him go out.

Thank God for a man like this, and his faithful wife and children know where they shall find him.

Fourteen years ago she was married to Rev. L. T. Allison, of the Kentucky Conference, to whom she proved to be a helpmeet indeed. She encouraged him, assisted him and gave him the best counsel. With him she studied the Conference Course and read the Bible with painstaking care.

She loved the Church, its institutions and its doctrines. She gave her time and strength to its cause and bowed in deep devotion at its altars. Religion meant to her a deep experience and a willing service.

She gave several years to teaching in the public schools, for which she was well qualified, holding a life certificate. She was elected principal of the Gratz Graded School for the present term and taught a few days when failing health made it necessary for her to resign. She saw the end approaching and spoke of it as a journey for which she had made all things ready. She selected the songs and Scripture for the funeral occasion and chose the writer of these lines to conduct the service.

The end came peacefully on January 23, 1926. The service she requested was conducted at the Gratz church of which her husband is the pastor, after which he and their one child and other relatives and friends accompanied the remains to Mt.
