We, your Hospital Board, beg to report as follows:

Dr. Frank W. Brandon, Associate Secretary of the General Hospital Board, was before us and reported that the ten hospitals of Southern Methodism were ministering to 25,000 patients annually but of all the hospitals of our church the Good Samaritan was making decidedly the best showing and progress.

Miss Johnson, Superintendent of the Good Samaritan Hospital, was before us and reported the following facts:

The personnel of the Hospital at the present time, including the student nurses and the employees of the Shriner Hospital, 114.

Training School September 1st, 60 nurses. Requirements: Four years High School, affiliated with some church, required to attend church once on Sunday, chapel every morning at 6:45. On duty at 7:00, off one-half day each week, off one-half of Sunday, three to four hours daily.

Have a house mother, instructress of nurses, superintendent of training school.

Cost per student per month, \$65.00.

Now turning our old X-ray rooms into a class room for the children to be furnished by the Business Men's Clubs of Lexington. Have Sunday services each Sunday morning by the women of the various churches and a musical program each Sunday afternoon by members of the various denominations.

Have a board of thirty-two women from the various denominations, who look after the clothes of our charity patients, seeing that they are even better clad when they go out than when they were admitted to the

hospital. They also look after our crippled children and on all holidays they see that they are supplied with the emblems of such days.

Many societies and organizations take an interest in furnishing entertainment for the children.

Mr. H. L. Ott, President of the Good Samaritan Hospital, reported on the construction work during the past year as follows:

We recommend the following Trustees, Mr. Alex Hargis, O. B. Crockett, James McClure and Dr. Carl Norfleet to be continued for four years. We recommend Geo. E. Tomlinson to take the place of W. C. Taylor.

We recommend the appointment of W. D. Welburn, Jr., as Conference Golden Cross Director to succeed O. B. Crockett, resigned.

Stone reported their work, having passed approved examinations, their characters were approved, and they were advanced to the Class of the Fourth Year.

Question 7, “Who else is in the Class of the Third Year?” was called. H. W. Whitaker, not having passed approved examination, his character being approved, was continued in the Class of the Third Year.

Address by Dr. Brandon—Dr. F. W. Brandon, Associate-Secretary of the General Hospital Board, addressed the Conference in the interest of our hospital work.

Adjournment—Announcements were made, the doxology was sung, and the benediction was pronounced by Dr. U. G. Foote.

FRIDAY—THIRD DAY.

Richmond, Ky., September 7, 1928.

The Conference convened at 8:30 a. m. with Bishop Darlington in the chair. The devotional service was conducted by Dr. Arthur Moore.

Minutes Approved—The minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

Introductions—Dr. T. L. Hulse, Editor of the Central Methodist, was introduced and made a statement in the interest of the paper.

Memoirs—On motion, the name of L. L. Pickett was referred to the Committee on Memoirs.

Passage of Character—Question 21, “Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration?” was called. The names of D. E. Bedinger, O. J. Chandler, and J. E. Roberts were called. Their characters being approved, their names were referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for the supernumerary relation. The characters of J. W. Hughes, W. F. Wyatt, and J. W. Simpson were approved and their names referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for the superannuate relation.

Remain on Trial—Question 3, “Who remain on trial?” was called. G. E. Graden reported his work, his character was approved, and having passed approved examinations, was advanced to the Class of the Second Year.

Full Connection—Question 6, “Who are admitted into full connection?” was called. J. E. Catron, G. B. Traynor, and S. R. Mann reported their work, their characters were approved, and, having passed approved examinations, they were advanced to the Class of the Third Year.

Question 4, “Who else is in the Class of the Second Year?” was called. P. E. Nelson, not being recommended by the Committee on Ad-

missions, C. M. Whitaker, not having passed approved examinations, were continued in the Class of the Second Year, their characters being approved. D. R. Klingler, having passed approved examinations but not having served the required time as pastor, was continued in the Class of the Second Year, his character having been approved. On motion, the presiding elder of C. M. Whitaker for next year was instructed to convey to him the desire of the Conference that he complete the Conference Course year by year according to the law of the Church.

Deacons Elected—Question 17, “What traveling preachers and what local preachers have been elected deacons?” was called. J. E. Catron, G. B. Traynor, and S. R. Mann were elected deacons as traveling preachers.

Church Extension—Dr. J. W. Johnson, of the Louisville Conference, was introduced and he addressed the Conference in the interest of Church Extension work.

Admission on Trial—Question 1, “Who are admitted on trial?” was called. W. F. Pettus, W. P. Bowen, C. L. Cooper, F. H. Strieby, W. J. Briggs, having been recommended by District Conferences, having passed approved examinations, and being recommended by the Committee on Admissions, were admitted on trial by vote of the Conference. Rosco Jenkins, whose educational training did not meet the requirements for admission, was admitted on trial by a two-thirds vote of the Conference.

Woman's Missionary Society—Mrs. J. C. Lewis, President of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Kentucky Conference, was introduced and spoke in the interest of the work of the Society.

Introductions—Dr. J. G. Hindman, pastor of the Centenary M. E. Church, of Lexington, Ky., was introduced. A. C. Graham, Superintendent of the Kentucky Anti-Saloon League, was introduced and addressed the Conference on the temperance issues of the day.

Bascom Monument—The report of the Bascom Monument Committee was read and adopted.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE BASCOM MONUMENT.

We, your Committee on the Bascom Monument, beg to report:

Acting with the Committee appointed by the Louisville Conference for this purpose, we have organized by electing Rev. J. H. Nicholson, Chairman, and Dr. John Frawick, Secretary and Treasurer of the Joint Committee. We have contracted with Woodson & Kratch, a firm of the city of Louisville, Ky., to erect a beautiful Barra Granite monument, at the grave of Bishop Bascom for the sum of \$2,000, work to be finished and the monument ready for dedication by November 1, 1928.

Introductions—R. N. Nollner, of Junaluska, N. C., and Mrs. L. L. Pickett, president of the Kentucky W. C. T. U., were introduced.

Adjournment—Announcements were made, the doxology was sung, and the benediction was pronounced by Dr. J. W. Johnson.

FOURTH DAY—SATURDAY.

Richmond, Ky., September 8, 1928.

The Conference met at 8:30 a. m. with Bishop Darlington in the chair. J. J. Davis, missionary to Africa, conducted the devotional service.

Minutes Approved—The minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

Elders Elected—Question 19 was resumed. J. H. Lewis and H. T. Bonny reported their work, having passed approved examinations their characters were passed. J. H. Lewis was elected elder. A. G. Stone, having completed the required course of study and having spent the required time as a traveling preacher, was elected elder.

Question 16, “Who else is in the Class of the Fourth Year?” was called. G. M. Rainey and Fred Sartin, not having passed approved examinations, reported their work, their characters were passed, and they were continued in the Class of the Fourth Year.

Orphans' Home Report—The report of the Orphans' Home Committee was read. E. S. Boswell, Superintendent of our Orphans' Home, spoke in behalf of the Home and its work. A collection, amounting to \$130.20, was taken. The report was adopted.

ORPHANS' HOME.

We, your Committee on Orphanage Work, beg to make the following report:

(1) We believe that there is a growing interest in orphanage work—not only throughout Southern Methodism generally—but in our own conference as well.

(2) We believe that the policy of our Home to give the children the very best opportunity possible for a school and church life is most commendable, and we hereby recommend that this conference lend its hearty support to the accomplishment of its purposes.

(3) That the Home is doing most excellent work was evidenced in the complete reports rendered to our committee by the President and Superintendent.

(4) We sadly deplore the fact that an organization so well qualified to do this part of the Master's work should be so hampered in its endeavors by such limited facilities. We therefore would recommend:

That this Kentucky Conference now in session religiously fix the earliest date possible and give a full year to a financial campaign for the extension of this noble cause.

We suggest that 1929 be set aside for this purpose if in the judgment of the Orphans' Home Board, after consultation with the presiding elders, the time is ripe for such action.

In keeping with the charter and by-laws of the Home we recommend that you confirm the election, by the Board at its last meeting, of S. O. Snyder, W. T. Baker, Dr. J. B. Lukins and Mr. Lee Lewis as three year members, their time having expired. This completes the Board with J. W. Ward, Rev. E. K. Arnold, J. F. Davis, and Edward E. Rowland as two year members; and R. E. McDowell, Frank Kimbel, G. W. B. Olmstead, and E. S. Boswell as one year members.

In this connection we would ask you to confirm the election, by the Board, of E. S. Boswell as Superintendent and Agent and Mrs. Jessie Ray Williams as Matron.

The health of the Home has been remarkably good and their standing in school work such that every child passed approved tests which enters the entire body in the next higher grade this year.

We note with pleasure an addition of \$400.00 to the endowment fund with more to follow at an early date.

We attach hereto the financial report of the President and Superintendent which we heartily recommend for your consideration.

Epworth League—The report of the Epworth League Board was read and adopted.

REPORT OF THE EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD.

The last year's work has been one of marked prosperity; first, in facts and figures; secondly, in the spirit of confidence, devotion and intelligent loyalty, manifested by our young people.

The facts indicate that an ever increasing number of our pastors find the League indispensable to the development of their churches, and a powerful agency for the development of Christian experience, and an opportunity for religious expression. The growth this year has been pronounced:

We rejoice to report a net gain for this year of 474 chapters and 4,684 members, making a total of 9,091 chapters and 268,931 members. There are now more than 300 Epworth League Unions. Forty-one assemblies were held this summer, with an attendance approximating 20,000 young people.

A total of nearly half a million dollars was raised by the League during the past year.

The "Era" and the "Junior" are both self-supporting and pay a dividend for our superannuates.

Special emphasis will be laid during the coming year upon:

Christian Stewardship covenant programs.

Corporate communion of all Leagues north and south December 2.

Young People's Revival, corresponding with "Win My Chum" week in the M. E. Church.

Participation in the Missionary Maintainance cultivation period.

A systematic effort to raise the League Special in full.
 Promotion of the "Book-a-Month" Club.
 Increase in the circulation of our literature.
 A large increase in the number of Leagues observing anniversary day.

Fostering a League chair in our summer schools for pastors.
 And an active campaign for increasing the number of Epworth League Unions.

The pastor is of vital importance. He is the most needed in the League Council for outlining and fostering the work of the League. The pastor who ignores his Epworth League will lose his young people. A live pastor can usually find enough young people in any town to promote this great interest of the church.

Pastors are ex-officio members of the League Assembly, and should attend, by their presence and sympathetic interest, help to shape the destiny of this great interest of the Church.

REPORT NUMBER 1 BOARD OF MISSIONS OF THE KENTUCKY CONFERENCE.

For the continued and sustained interest of the constituency of the Kentucky Conference in the cause of carrying the gospel to the regions beyond we desire to express our gratification and thankfulness to God.

We commend our Conference Missionary Secretary, the presiding elders, pastors and laymen who have brought again into the treasury of the Church an offering from every charge of the Kentucky Conference, save one, in response to the cultivation period for missions in January and February, as provided in the Discipline. While the amount raised this year is not as large as last year it does not indicate a lessening of interest or enthusiasm for this cause. In fact the Kentucky Conference is taking rank with the leading conferences of the connection in its sustained interest and offerings for missions.

We desire further to record our satisfaction at the fact that our General Board of Missions is free from indebtedness and that the secretaries and members of the Board are planning for an extensive and constructive plan of missionary advance around the world. Especial attention is being given to evangelism. This calls for emphasizing the supremacy and

uniqueness of Christ and the effectiveness of his gospel in the salvation of the world.

This purpose cannot be carried out unless we again heed the ringing challenge of the Great Commission, "Go ye into all the world." We must also recognize that today the greatest menace we have to confront in establishing the Kingdom of God is not the non-Christian religions. It is the growing materialistic emphasis of our secular civilization. Atheism, a denial of the divine authority of Christ, the preaching in certain quarters of the regeneration of the mind and soul through culture and material possessions are foes to be encountered and captured in the modern missionary movement. To this end we call upon our people everywhere to prayer.

In order to carry out the purpose of our great Church and our General and Conference Boards, in an effective way, we present the following recommendations for your approval:

First: We recommend that the first ten days of January, 1929, be designated as a period of intercessory prayer for the mission charges of the Kentucky Conference, for our missionaries and their work and for an outpouring of God's spirit upon us in revival power.

Second: That we enter heartily into all the plans for a conference-wide missionary cultivation period during January and February of next year and make every effort to raise our share of the million dollar fund for missions, which is the same as last year.

Third: We rejoice in the enlarged plan of missionary education which is being launched by the General Board and we pledge our co-operation in its promotion.

Fourth: We heartily endorse the Missionary Conference of four thousand delegates which is to be held in Memphis, Tennessee, December the 11th and 12th, under the auspices of the General Board of Missions. We recommend the appointment of Mrs. Virgie McClure as the director for the Kentucky Conference in securing the attendance of our quota of delegates to this Conference. We further request the appointment of fifty accredited delegates by the presiding elders before the adjournment of this Conference.

BOARD OF MISSIONS.

REPORT NO. 2.

We do not wish to strike a despondent note, still it is apparent that there is a slowing down of missionary interest both within the bounds of our own Conference and throughout the Church. And this at a time which is evidently crucial in the history of God's Kingdom.

The appropriations of your Board were made on an estimated income of \$6,000. Our Treasurer reports that actual receipts will fall short of this by about \$1,000. It is too late now to make any change in the appropriations, but it is evident that we cannot continue to pay out more than we receive and that, unless we do better next year, there must be such a cut in appropriations as will result in embarrassment to all of our mission charges and in closing some of them. Report Lay Activities—The report of the Board of Lay Activities was read and adopted.

LAY ACTIVITIES.

Our Board at its annual session had the best attendance in its history, and unusual interest in the lay work was manifest among the members.

The Board wants to express to the Conference its sincere thanks and appreciation for the opportunity of presenting its interests on the Conference floor during the session of the Conference, and for the courtesy of Bishop Darlington to our speakers.

We feel that lay activities suffered an inestimable loss in the death of Dr. Hull during the Conference year.

The Board wants to go on record as devoutly believing in the principle of Christian stewardship, and pledges its energies and talents in stewardship promotion. The calendar year 1929 has been set aside by the General Board of Lay Activities as "stewardship year." This action has had the approval of the College of Bishops and every general agency of the Church. We seek the co-operation of each Conference Board, the presiding elders and pastors in an intensive cultivation of the spirit of stewardship in our Conference. We are planning to disseminate as much stewardship literature among our people as our means will permit, and we need your co-operation in order that the purpose of the distribution may be effectively obtained. The problem that most seriously confronts us in this matter is getting our people earnestly to read the literature that we place in their hands. We regret the lack of interest that has often been manifest in the past in the distribution and use of our literature, and bespeak a more earnest effort on the part of those concerned with its distribution and the final goal of attainment.

The Board shall seek to increase the number of tithers in our Conference, as a final effective solution of all our problems of finance.

The experience of this year, and of preceding years, and especially the agonies of the past few weeks as they relate themselves to the collection of Conference claims, seem to make it imperative that we seek to adopt a more adequate program for the collection of benevolences. We recommend: first, a closer union of effort between our lay leaders of various rank on the one hand and the presiding elders and pastors on the other; second, an every-member canvass preceded by a period of spiritual cultivation; third, a more equitable readjustment of Conference claims.

In securing subscriptions to the Methodist Layman we have been comparatively successful. In the number of subscriptions gotten in seven months we stand fifth in the thirty-eight Conferences, though numerically we are one of the smallest. But when we consider the value of this paper in the promotion of lay work, the securing of 200 subscribers in this length of time is a small accomplishment. We recommend that a layman agent be appointed in each charge and that both lay leaders and pastors seek to largely increase the circulation of this paper among our men.

In the matter of promoting the organization of Wesley Brotherhoods the lay work of the Conference has had its largest success. This success has been mainly due to the efforts of Associate Secretary Fred T. Barnett of the General Board. Mr. Barnett made two visits to our Conference, speaking in a number of churches in the interest of the Brotherhood. When he began his first itinerary there were four Brotherhoods in the Conference, now there are fifteen. These organizations are making their influence felt in their respective churches for the promotion of the Kingdom.

At present there are in the Conference a number of churches that are ripe for the organization of Brotherhoods. The Board purposes to have thirty Brotherhoods by the meeting of the next Annual Conference.

You will find herewith attached the financial statement of our treasurer.

We nominate Professor W. S. Lester for Conference Lay Leader and recommend his re-election.

Christian Literature—The report of the Board of Christian Literature was read and adopted.

CHRISTIAN LITERATURE.

We, your Board of Christian Literature, beg leave to submit the following report:

1. We believe that earnest, careful, persistent distribution of Christian Literature will aid materially in creating a sensitive conscience in our Church on all vital questions that confront it. Distribute tracts on Stewardship systematically and continuously and watch the support of the Kingdom increase. No man can think or feel or have convictions beyond the limits of his knowledge. Information must come before salvation, and knowledge before growth in grace. People read and they will read our Church publications when the pastors become aroused as the conditions now demand.

2. "Ask and it shall be given you." The Department of Tracts of our Publishing House has over forty tracts for free distribution, or that can be secured at a nominal price. Distribute these in your pastoral visitation and watch the fruit grow. Therefore we urge all of our pastors to avail themselves of this opportunity to inform their people.

3. We would urge pastors and laymen to buy their books from our Publishing House, in order that the profits, which go to the superannuates, may be materially increased. We rejoice in the splendid increase in the volume of business which was made during the year; and we urge your continued support.

4. We heartily recommend the placing of the Conference Organ in every home possible. Also, we urge the obtaining of subscriptions for the Christian Advocate and the Quarterly Review. In content and appearance

these papers cannot be surpassed anywhere. We feel that the danger of a creedless, universal Church should be guarded against by indoctrinating our people with our own teachings, through our official organs.

5. We recommend for your adoption, (1) the slogan, "The Central Methodist in every home;" (2) the continuance of the quota plan, "a minimum of a thousand subscribers to every district; (3) that the same assessment of \$1300 be asked for the Central Methodist for next year; (4) we also request the election of the same Publishing Commission, namely, O. B. Crockett, W. V. Cropper, and Mr. L. G. Smith.

Board of Finance—The report of the Board of Finance was read. The report of the Treasurer of the Board of Finance was read. Both reports were adopted.

BOARD OF FINANCE.

The closing of the fiscal year of the General Board in March, as a matter of course, cannot give account of the added payments made at this session. Therefore, this supplementary record:

Tabulation of receipts shows the sum of \$16,258; the total payments by this Conference to date equal \$88,495. As the original apportionment is \$182,617, the deficit already past due, is \$94,122; a payment of 484 per cent. having been paid to this date.

We should ever bear in mind that one-half of every dollar raised by this Conference is set aside as a permanent endowment for this body. Hence, in meeting our quotas in full, we are surely helping ourselves.

Agreeable to the wishes of the General Board, we recommend the continuance of Dr. W. L. Clark as Conference Director for another year, and on like terms as the past year. The energetic efforts of Brother Clark are duly recognized, and gratitude hereby expressed for his help in behalf of this most worthy interest of the Church.

Attention is directed to the consolidated report, originating with your Conference Board, showing at a glance the number of claimants on the funds of the Church, and the amounts received by them. While the payments may still be inadequate, doubtless are so, there has been much improvement in recent years. When shall we arise in our strength and fully meet this sacred obligation to those who have wrought in the quarries of the past, and who, because of the infirmities of age, must abide the "waiting call" of the Great Shepherd of souls?

Superannuate Endowment—W. L. Clark addressed the Conference in the interest of Superannuate Endowment.

Arnold in the Chair—On the request of Bishop Darlington, Dr. W. E. Arnold took the chair.

Report of the Board of Education—The report of the Board of Education was read and adopted.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Since our last report to this body, we have had the misfortune to lose, by death, our former college president, Dr. David C. Hull, whose loss has been keenly felt.

The enrollment in the Kentucky Wesleyan College for the past year was 377, and there were fifty-nine who graduated from the institution at the last commencement.

This past year we had the distinction of having a larger number of students enrolled than any other denominational college in the state. For these achievements we have cause to be grateful, yet we want to look forward to larger things.

We believe the college is especially fortunate in securing Dr. C. M. Dannelly of Montgomery, Alabama, as president. Dr. Dannelly has been granted a year's leave of absence to finish his work for the Ph. D. degree.

It is with great pleasure we state that Rev. Walter V. Cropper, of our own Conference, has been chosen as vice-president and business manager of our college. He is to have full charge during the coming college year.

Brother Cropper is proving himself a master of his new task, and with the co-operation of the Conference, we may predict a most successful year in our college work.

The financial statement is about as last year, as follows: Property valuation, \$345,000; net endowment, \$111,056.93; indebtedness, \$65,000. Gymnasium and athletic field are not included in these figures, the valuation being about \$125,000.

At the first meeting of our Board for this Conference session, we had with us Dr. J. M. Culbreth, secretary of Religious Education, who brought to our attention some recommendations from the General Board of Education, which he wanted us to adopt.

We heartily endorse and sanction the plans of the Joint Board for securing a more adequate financial support of our educational program. We call attention particularly to the proposal to observe Christian Education Week, November 11-18, and pledge to its observance our loyal co-operation and energetic endeavor. It is clearly evident that our college cannot continue to serve to the largest advantage the increasing numbers of our Methodist young people unless we provide a more certain and substantial increase.

We desire to put ourselves on record as favoring most earnestly the new law which requires two years of college work for admission into the Conference, and urge that care be used in making exceptional cases, as provided for in the law.

We endorse the action of the General Board in requesting the next General Conference to make an assessment of \$50,000 on the entire Church for a Loan Fund to be used for ministerial students, who give promise of usefulness.

We endorse the action of the Joint Board of Education, in a meeting at Louisville, August 21, 1928, changing the number of the Board of Managers of our three colleges from five to seven, in order to have two members at the seat of the college.

We ask that the Commission on Budget place an assessment of \$12,000 on the Conference for Education, and \$800 for Ministerial Aid Fund.

We recommend that the chairman of our Board be appointed as a delegate to the Southern Methodist Association to be held in Chattanooga next January.

We recommend the following to make provision for student pastor at the University of Kentucky: O. B. Crockett, Roy H. Kleiser, and Bart N. Peak.

The chairman of the Board of Education, of the Epworth League Board and of the Sunday School Board, at the request of the General Board of Education have appointed Howard W. Whittaker as the fourth member of a committee to act as a committee for the Kentucky Conference to co-operate with the General Board in planning for a great educational meeting of entire Church at Junaluska next July. Rev. H. W. Whittaker to be director of the work in our Conference.

We recommend the following persons, J. R. Savage, J. P. Strother and H. A. Power, to fill expired terms on the Joint Board of Education.

BOARD OF TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE.

As citizens of the United States we are deeply interested in the work of temperance and prohibition. We, therefore, wish to congratulate the Anti-Saloon League of Kentucky and the Woman's Christian Temperance Union on their splendid work in this field; and

Whereas, the eighteenth amendment was incorporated in the Constitution by the process of law and the National Prohibition Act, generally known as the Volstead Act, was adopted by Congress as its enforcement code; both having been sustained by no less than forty decisions of the Supreme Court, and

Whereas, the office of President of the United States carries with it the influence of national leadership in addition to large appointive power; and a veto power equal to the vote of sixteen men in the Senate of the United States and of sixty-three members of the House, we, the Kentucky Conference, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, go on record as being absolutely opposed to any tampering with the Eighteenth Amendment or weakening modification of the Volstead Act, and do hereby resolve to urge all people to vote only for such candidates for the offices of President and Vice-President as are known to be in hearty accord with the Eighteenth Amendment and the Volstead Act; and

Whereas, gambling is a national curse and a disgrace to any people; therefore, be it

Resolved, That we work for better enforcement of the anti-gambling laws now on our Kentucky statutes; and,

Whereas, the amendment of our State law allowing race track gambling, or the pari-mutual system has proved itself an enemy to society, therefore be it

Resolved, That we continue the crusade against this evil.

We rejoice to know that the International Reform Federation, of Washington, D. C., is planning a Nation-wide campaign against race track gambling, and we pledge it our hearty cooperation.

We wish to nominate as trustees of the Anti-Saloon League, G. W. Young, W. S. Maxwell, E. K. Arnold, Madison Combs, and Virgil L. Moore.

COMMITTEE ON CHARTER.

Your Committee to whom was referred the consideration of the Charter of the Kentucky Annual Conference reports as follows:

The charter was granted by act of Legislature in 1861 for religious, educational, and charitable purposes.

Sec. 883, Art. 8, Act of March 22, 1892, entitled "Religious, Charitable, and Educational Institutions" provides that such corporations shall not be subject to any of the laws relating to corporations having a capital stock, or organized for pecuniary profits, except that requiring an agent

on whom process may be executed, but shall at all times be subject to visitation by the Legislature. We therefore submit herewith the required form:

To the Secretary of State,
Frankfort, Kentucky:

Notice is hereby given that the place of business for the Kentucky Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, a corporation of the State of Kentucky, in the bounds of the said Conference, are held annually at the places named at previous sessions of the Annual Conference. For this year it is being held at Richmond, Madison County, Kentucky, and that Rev. W. V. Cropper, of Winchester, Kentucky, and W. W. Ball, of Maysville, Kentucky, are our agents thereat, upon whom process may be served in any suit that may be brought against our Conference within the State of Kentucky. Had no former agent.

Sec. 574, Kentucky Statutes, General Laws of Incorporation provides that corporations existing before the adoption of the new Constitution may amend the articles of incorporation after filing with the Secretary of State acceptance of the provisions of the Constitution. We deem it advisable to do this in view of future amendments although our corporation may be excepted under Sec. 883, quoted above. We therefore submit herewith the required form of acceptance of provisions of the Constitution:

To the Secretary of State,

The Kentucky Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, Incorporated, met in its annual session at Richmond, Madison County, Kentucky, on the 10th day of September, 1928, at 9 a. m., in legal session, at which the following resolution was passed, and the Secretary was instructed to mail to the Secretary of State a copy thereof to be placed on file in his or her office.

"Resolved, That whereas the charter of the Kentucky Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, having been granted and approved on December 23, 1861, and before the adoption of the present constitution of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, and therein section 190 says: 'No corporation in existence at the time of the adoption of this Constitution shall have the benefit of further legislation without first filing in the office of the Secretary of State an acceptance of the provisions of the Constitution,' which provisions are hereby now accepted."

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

Your Sunday School Board submits the following report:

We are pleased with the success that has attended the labors of our Conference workers, and, also the evident growth of interest and enlargement of program on the part of many schools.

The following is a brief summary of the work of our Conference Superintendent, Mr. D. V. Snapp:

In addition to a large amount of office work he has held six Standard Training Schools in which 352 officers and teachers were enrolled, 253 credits given and 53 schools represented. Many addresses were delivered in all parts of the Conference as well as in institutes and conferences. A Blue Grass Sunday School Federation was organized, made up of fourteen churches in Lexington and surrounding towns. Sunday School institutes were held in each presiding elder's district. On the basis of this record of industry and achievement your Board has employed Mr. Snapp for the ensuing Conference year and respectfully requests the confirmation of this election.

The labors of our Extension Secretary, Mr. F. T. Fowler, have been blessed with gratifying results. Brother Fowler reports a fine increase of interest in teacher training work in our rural Sunday Schools and this interest has registered in more Cokesbury schools being held this year and many more requests for such schools. 71 charges were visited in the five districts; 56 Programs of Work were placed; 60 conferences with officers and teachers were held in which there was a careful review of their standard of work and a careful check-up on the various points of the standard. The diligence and industry of Brother Fowler may be judged from the fact that he traveled nearly 14,000 miles and spent 256 days in this active travel.

Your Board reports its reluctant acceptance of Brother Fowler's resignation and most heartily commends him to the Louisville Conference where he has accepted work for the ensuing year.

Only 160 schools participated in the missionary offerings and the total amount raised has been reported by Miss Ruth Woodward, Treasurer, as amounting to \$5,711.63. (See itemized figures in Treasurer's report in Conference Minutes.)

We call attention to the new graded lessons recently revised covering the elementary grades and advise their use beginning October 1.

We recommend that our Sunday Schools participate in the observance of education week and devote the offering to Sunday, November 18, to this cause.

We ask for the same appropriation as last year, namely, \$3,500.00.

"Children's Week," first initiated by the Department of Elementary Work, has led to the point at which it seems desirable that the attention of adults, and of parents in particular, be drawn to the place of youth as well as of childhood in the program of the church, of the home, and of the community, and in view of this the change has been made for calling this "Childhood and Youth Week." The observance of this week

comes in the fall and our workers are urged to make the most of this occasion.

Your Board co-operating with the General Sunday School Board has elected Rev. Virgil L. Moore as Extension Secretary in the Kentucky Conference and respectfully requests our presiding Bishop to appoint Brother Moore to this position. Since we are solely dependent upon the fourth Sunday missionary offerings for the support of this program we earnestly request our pastors to assist in seeing that Missionary Sunday is properly observed and that the offering is promptly remitted to our Missionary Secretary, Miss Ruth Woodward, Paris, Kentucky.

We clearly recognize that all our Sunday School work must be done along the paths that lead to God through a vital religious experience, and strongly urge that those selected to work in our Sunday Schools be both apt to teach and to lead in spiritual things. For the mental and spiritual growth of our workers we urge a wide use of our training courses. The popularity and worth of these courses throughout our church is attested by the 70,000 credits issued last year.

Joint Board of Education—The report of the Joint Board of Education was read; W. V. Cropper made a statement concerning our educational interest; the report was adopted.

REPORT OF THE JOINT BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Your Joint Board of Education takes pleasure in reporting a year of progress in the three schools under its control. Although obliged to face the responsibility of changing the administrative head of two of these schools, and though handicapped at Kentucky Wesleyan College by the serious illness of its president for a large part of the school year, the schools have had a year of encouraging progress. Approximately 700 students have been enrolled in the three schools administered by this Board.

After the death of the able president of Kentucky Wesleyan College, Dr. David Carlisle Hull, the Board of Managers appointed a committee to investigate prospects for his successor and to recommend to the Joint Board a suitable man to head this institution. After prolonged and careful search the committee recommended and the Board elected Dr. Clarence M. Dannelly, of Alabama, as president of the institution with the under-

standing that he is to have a year's leave of absence. We feel that we were particularly fortunate in securing the services of Dr. Dannelly. He is a young man of extraordinary ability and training. He has had conspicuous success in every enterprise with which he has been connected in the past.

The Board feels further that we were especially fortunate in securing Walter V. Cropper, of our own Kentucky Conference, as Vice-President and Business Manager of the institution. Bro. Cropper has demonstrated his efficient leadership in the years of his membership in our Conference and it is with implicit confidence on the part of the Board that he has been placed in this important work. Bro. Cropper will be the executive head of the institution for the coming school year and we bespeak for him the active support of all our pastors and people.

Prior to the close of the school year of 1927-28 Dr. E. F. Goodson tendered his resignation to the Joint Board as President of Logan College. A committee was appointed to recommend a successor to Dr. Goodson. After careful investigation they recommended and the Board elected Dr. E. R. Naylor, of Virginia, to this place. Dr. Naylor is a man of proven ability in school work and has already demonstrated his energy and enthusiasm in the way he has taken hold of the situation at Logan. We bespeak for him likewise the hearty cooperation of all our Methodist people in Kentucky.

Dr. R. V. Bennett continues as President of our Lindsey-Wilson School at Columbia. The splendid work that he has been doing through this school that is so strategically located will continue, and our people, we trust, will continue to give to it an ever increasing loyalty and support.

We recommend that the week of November 11-18 be designated in the two Conferences as Christian Education Week, except in the case of circuits, in which the entire month of November shall be set aside as a time for special emphasis and cultivation in the matter of our church educational work. We respectfully recommend that all our people enter heartily into this special period of cultivation and that they observe carefully the plan that shall later be outlined to them by the Campaign Committee and the Conference Directors. Nothing is more important to the immediate needs of our school work in Kentucky than the careful and systematic observance of this Christian Education Week.

We recommend that the Conference authorize the Board to continue the formulation and completion of plans for the raising of adequate endowments for our three schools at the earliest possible moment that this project can be inaugurated.

The most serious problem facing us in this matter of education in the two Conferences is the matter of financial support. We may as well face the question squarely that we must either give material and substantial support to these schools in the way of endowment funds or make our plans at an early date to retire from the educational field in Kentucky.

We report that the school properties have all been considerably improved during the summer and that a central heating plant at Kentucky Wesleyan College has been erected during the past year at a cost of approximately \$30,000.00. We gratefully acknowledge the valuable assistance in this project by Bishop U. V. W. Darlington and others, who enabled us to build this very needed plant without incurring any debt.

Along with Dr. Smoot were Prof. P. M. Boyd, of Tarpon Springs, Florida, a splendid Gospel song leader and soloist; Dr. Thos. Carter, of Nashville, and a number of other speakers of wide reputation were on the program.

Mr. Frank H. Gregg, director, showed wonderful executive ability and leadership.

The cottages, dining hall, chapel and tabernacle have taken on new appearance this year since electric lights have been installed. Shower baths have also been added.

We recommend that by the adoption of this report that we again endorse the general plan to make Kavanaugh a center of religious activity for Kentucky Methodism.

REPORT OF SABBATH DAY OBSERVANCE COMMITTEE.

We, your Committee on Sabbath Day Observance, beg leave to make the following report:

1st. We have before us a communication of the Lord's Day Alliance of the United States operating in Kentucky and have had with us the field secretary, Rev. H. P. Hoskins, who was heard in the Conference session on Friday morning. We wish to call attention to the following phases of alliance work in Kentucky:

1. The cause has been presented in some 250 churches in Kentucky.
2. The Alliance was instrumental in the defeat of the Turner bill of our 1928 session of the Kentucky Legislature.

3. The Alliance has had a large part in making so effective the Sunday closing law of this state that in only five cities, namely, Louisville, Covington, Lexington, Paducah, and Newport is there open violation.

2nd. We recommend the appointment of Rev. W. V. Cropper and Mr. David Davies, as our representatives to serve on the State Board of Managers of the Lord's Day Alliance.

3rd. We hereby request the Lord's Day Alliance of Kentucky in conjunction with other organizations for moral uplift to work out plans for making our present laws effective and creating a spirit of respect for the Lord's Day. We recommend the opening of our pulpits to representatives of the Alliance.

MEMOIRS

MRS. GEORGE WELLINGTON YOUNG.

Mrs. George W. Young was the daughter of John and Catherine Duffy Groves, one of the first and finest families of West Virginia. She was born at Kesslers Cross Lanes in Nicholas County, West Virginia, December the 13, 1848.

On November the 8, 1871, she was married to Reverend George Wellington Young, then a member of the Western Virginia Conference, now a member of the Kentucky Conference. Together they served Louisa, Catlettsburg, and First Church, Charleston, in the Western Virginia Conference; and Newport, Millersburg, Cynthiana and Richmond in the Kentucky Conference.

I said "together they served" these charges, and they did. Sister Young gave herself to the service of the Church with an abandon and a devotion equal to that of her consecrated husband. His work became her work. His interests were hers. When she gave herself to her husband she gave her life to his Church and his Christ, and for fifty-six years, as a wife of a minister of the Gospel, she thought not of her own interests but of his; she labored, not for herself, but for others.

Before Dr. Young had finished his quadrennium at Richmond, he was elected one of the National Superintendents of the Anti-Saloon League of America. In this position he was away from home the greater part of the last twenty-five years, making a valiant and successful fight for a dry nation. This laid heavy responsibilities upon Mrs. Young, but she accepted them gladly, feeling that, in so doing, she was best helping her husband in his great work. And when "the books are opened" I think we shall discover that the success of her distinguished husband was due, in no small measure, to the faithful and unselfish service she rendered.

As her pastor and neighbor for five years, I was impressed many times with her devotion to the task of her husband. More than once, when Dr. Young was away, I found her so ill that I suggested we call him home. She always replied, "His work is too important, you must not do that."

The predominating element in the life of Mrs. Young was love. She loved the truth. She hated sham, deceit and camouflage. She loved her friends. I enjoyed the honor and privilege of her friendship, and no mother could have been more thoughtful and considerate. I shall never forget her many kindnesses to me. When she went away, I lost one of the dearest and most helpful friends of my ministry.

She loves her home. To it she gave her best. There was that rare, indescribable atmosphere about it, that only the real home-maker can create.

She loved her Church. As a Sunday School teacher; visiting the sick; caring for the poor; in every way possible she served her Church, until

the weight of the years made it necessary for her to relinquish her much loved work, but her interest was unabated.

She loved God. She was not effusive. She did not parade her piety. She talked very little about her religious experience. These things were too sacred and precious for flippant and frequent conversation, but when you knew her well, you found that her religious experience was rich and deep.

"She lived for love; no thought of fame or fashion
E'er moved her hand in aid of one in need.
Naught but her low-bending sweet compassion
Prompted the tender and uplifting deed.
And when she died, like strains of music ceasing,
Her absence caused a void in many a heart."

Besides her husband, our friend is survived by one daughter, Miss Frances Young of Louisville, Kentucky, and no mother was ever blessed with a more thoughtful, helpful and devoted daughter.

May "The God of all Comfort" comfort the hearts of the husband and daughter until they meet her again in that country where "sickness and sorrow, pain and death are felt and feared no more."

Sister Young was a sufferer for a long time before her translation, but she bore the afflictions of her declining years with beautiful Christian fortitude, and was ready when, on the afternoon of November 5, 1927, the angels came to invite her into the presence of the King.

She fought a good fight, she kept the faith, she has finished her course. And, with those she loved long since and lost awhile, has found the blessed rest and companionships of heaven.



REV. GEORGE FROH.



Rev. George Froh was born in Mechlenburg, Germany, March 11, 1841. He came to this country at about the age of thirteen. After living a few years in Michigan he came to Oldham County, Ky. At the close of the Civil War he returned to LaGrange. As an itinerant Methodist minister he served the people of Oldham County ten years, six on Beard Circuit (name changed to Oldham Circuit the last year), and four at LaGrange. On retirement from the active ministry he went to LaGrange, bought a home, and lived there until his death on July 21, 1928. There we laid to rest his mortal body in the "Valley of Rest." He was more or less continuously identified with LaGrange for sixty years. He pos-

sessed a strong constitution and attained the good age of eighty-seven years, retaining a remarkable activity until within a year of his death.

Courage was a dominating factor in the life of this good man, as is evidenced in many circumstances and periods of his life. Few of us know the terrors of the ocean on a sailing vessel in a storm. But when he came to this country as a boy on an old sailing ship which was tossed for nearly seven weeks in continuous storm he would climb the mast and stay there all day and part of the night watching the wind and waves. He said "God was on the sea and in the storm as well as on the land and in the sunshine."

Courage was shown in his early efforts to add to his education by utilizing evenings in study. Courage was expressed when at his country's call he joined the Union forces in the War between the States and proved himself a brave soldier for three years and forty days in the service of his country.

Courage was expressed when in answer to the call of God he entered Kentucky Wesleyan College in preparation for the ministry. One year was spent, we learn, canvassing in Kentucky for the American Bible Society. Courage was supremely revealed in his forty years of itinerant ministry in the Kentucky Conference, during which time he served at Hunter's Bottom (or Milton), Port Royal, Falmouth, Warsaw, Alexandria, Petersburg, Beard, New Castle, Taylorsville, LaGrange, Grassy Lick and Mt. Zion, Washington, Morehead and Beard (second time), later named Oldham Circuit. He was a strong preacher and faithful pastor.

Courage was evidenced during his itinerant ministry as he stood foursquare to all the winds that blew, not as a "reed shaken with the wind," but strong in his convictions as he encountered antagonisms of those of differing theological opinions. He defied with Christian heroism the common fault of human nature by which we measure others in

our own measure frequently small and un-Christ-like. He embodied noble principles, admirable characteristics, and endeared himself to many.

He was converted one morning while working in the garden. All nature was aglow with the presence of God, and a sense of unspeakable happiness and peace took possession of his soul. It marked the moment of his conscious knowledge of acceptance with God through faith in Christ to which the Holy Spirit glowingly attested. He united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, at Carrollton, Ky., during the pastorate of Rev. Peter Kavanaugh, a nephew of Bishop Kavanaugh.

One of his earliest pastors saw in young Froh an ideal boy, mentally gifted and full of promise. At the time of confirmation in the Lutheran Church he put his hand upon the young boy's head and prayed God to make him a minister after his own heart. The prayer was answered in his latter call and consecration and service.

George Froh was admitted on trial in the Louisville Conference in 1870 and appointed to the Louisville City Mission and transferred to the Kentucky Conference the following year, 1871. For twelve consecutive years he faithfully served on the Committee on Conference Relations in the Kentucky Conference, a difficult and unwelcome place to fill because of the delicate duties involved in years gone by.

His home life was simple and beautiful. His pension from the government, the stipend from the Church, and his own thrift and economy enabled him to spend his last days in comparative ease. A contrast may be struck to stimulate our interest in superannuate endowment when we observe that Brother Froh last year received from his country's treasury \$1,080 for less than four years of service and \$365.20 from his Church's treasury for forty years of service. The latter has been largely increased in recent years, else the contrast would be more glaring.

Brother Froh married Miss Mary Elizabeth Collier, of Carrollton, Ky., who survives him with two daughters (Mrs. J. C. Burton, of Louisville, Ky., and Miss Carrie Froh, of LaGrange, Ky.), a son (Ira Froh, of Louisville, Ky.), five grandchildren, and four great-grandchildren.

Brother Froh slipped his earthly moorings early on the morning of July 21. Funeral services were held at the home, conducted by the writer, assisted by Brothers W. R. Johnson, W. B. Garriott, and G. W. Boswell. At the time of his death Brother Froh was chaplain of the George H. Thomas Post, G. A. R. At the grave the G. A. R. burial service was read and a fitting tribute was paid. The casket was covered with the flag.

L. L. PICKETT.

Rev. L. L. Pickett, of Wilmore, Kentucky, who passed to his reward from Middlesboro, Kentucky, May 9, 1928, was born in Mississippi. He was converted in young manhood and began at once to preach. His gifts and zeal gave him unusual success, and he soon became distinguished as a soul winner. To the end of life this work lay nearest to his heart. He said to the writer, "Though thousands have been converted under my ministry, it seems that it should have been tens of thousands, when I consider the vast multitudes to whom I have preached." He was the author

of thirty-one books, some of them large volumes, many of them booklets. He was a composer of music, writing both the music and the song, in many cases. Of these publications there were quite a number. He published thirteen song books. Of "Tears and Triumphs" Nos. 1, 2 and 3, a million copies were sold. He was an ardent teacher of Bible holiness, and taught sanctification as a sacred blessing, subsequent to regeneration and received by faith attended by the witness of the Holy Spirit. He wrote largely for the press and was the publisher editor of general periodicals. In the cause of temperance and prohibition he gave the strength of his manhood. In promoting these he had few equals. His contribution to prohibition in Kentucky can never be estimated. During a temperance campaign he bought a tent and employed a quartet of Asbury College students and campaigned the state for three months. To support this work he mortgaged his home and it required the rest of his life to pay off the mortgage. He kept a book store in Louisville for a number years to circulate temperance and holiness literature, and at a loss. He was a debater of great power and was always ready to meet an antagonist in the field of controversy. But his fort was evangelism. Few evangelists have had greater success. He was a great defender of the doctrine of the second coming of Christ and wrote several books and many articles in the religious papers on the subject. He also advocated it much in his sermons. The last years of his life, though bent with disease, he traveled over a number of states every year lecturing and preaching. The writer knew him intimately, and has never known a man more dead to the world and alive to God than L. L. Pickett.

Brother Pickett was twice candidate for governor of Kentucky on the Prohibition ticket, and for vice governor on the American ticket.

BISHOP JAMES E. DICKEY.

At 11:55 p. m., April 17, 1928, Bishop James Edward Dickey died at the Norton Infirmary, Louisville, where he had been a patient since April 10, at which time he submitted to an operation for appendicitis. His condition was considered critical from the first, but was pronounced satisfactory until a few hours before his death, when a turn for the worse robbed his friends of hope.

He was born at Jeffersonville, Ga., in 1864, where he grew to young manhood. He was educated at Emory College, at Oxford, Ga., and soon after his graduation was admitted on trial into the North Georgia Conference and was appointed as professor at Emory College. This was followed by a pastorate of three years at Grace Church, Atlanta, Ga., after which he was elected president of Emory College, which position he filled until 1915.

After he had resigned his position as president of Emory, he was appointed pastor of First Church, Atlanta, Ga., where he labored with great acceptability and success for five years. He was then appointed to Griffith, Ga., and was in the midst of a great pastorate there when the

General Conference of 1922, which met at Hot Springs, Ark., elevated him to the episcopacy.

Bishop Dickey was a man of unusual ability. Nature had done much for him in giving him a striking physical appearance and endowing him with marked intellectual strength. He was at home in the pulpit and charmed his hearers with the clarity of his thought and the force and beauty of his utterance. From his southern forebears he had inherited that style of earnest, enthusiastic delivery which has made the South famous for its great orators and in his most animated moments he could rise to heights of great eloquence.

His Church was not unmindful of his gifts and kept him in positions of large responsibilities where his sound judgment and capacity for service might contribute to her success. In 1910 he was elected by the General Conference to the position of General Secretary of Education, but feeling that duty held him to the work of the pulpit, he declined. In 1911 he represented the Church in the fourth Ecumenical Conference which met in Toronto, Canada, and again in 1921 he was chosen as delegate to the fifth Ecumenical Conference which met in London, England. In all these positions he served his Church with distinction and credit.

At the General Conference in 1926 he was appointed to preside over the Episcopal District comprising Western Virginia, Kentucky, Louisville and Illinois Conferences, and soon thereafter moved to Louisville, where he made his home until his lamented death. He was welcomed by the Methodists of this district with a warmth and sincerity that won his heart at once and he gave himself freely to the task of promoting all the enterprises of the kingdom in this field.

No man has served us as a bishop who won the confidence of the preachers and people more fully than did he.

Those who heard him in the series of pre-Easter sermons which he preached at the Rialto Theater in Louisville, will remain long under the spell of his fervor and eloquence. He preached under great physical strain, but his mind was aglow with the fire of the Spirit and the souls of his hearers were fed. Those who heard the peroration of his last sermon will not soon forget the light that was on his face as by faith he anticipated a life of eternal fellowship with his risen Lord. Upon that eternal fellowship he has entered.

DR. DAVID C. HULL.

After a serious illness of several months Dr. David Carlisle Hull, President of Kentucky Wesleyan College, Winchester, Ky., died at his home in that city on April 3, 1928.

Dr. Hull was a native of Mississippi, having come to Kentucky in 1924 to take charge of Kentucky Wesleyan, to the presidency of which he had been elected. He brought to the school a large fund of enthusiasm for Christian education, with a mind well furnished by experience and training for the work to which he had been called. His ability was at once recognized by the Methodist leaders in Kentucky and the school

entered upon a period of growth and successful operation greater than it had known before. No man has touched the educational life of this state whose ability as an educator was more immediately recognized, or who won the confidence of the leaders in education more completely than did Dr. Hull.

Kentucky Methodists can ill afford to give up such a man just at this time. His place will be hard to fill. He was one of the men to whose wise counsel all deferred and whose leadership all were glad to follow. He was rapidly gaining recognition for that great institution, and if his administration could have been continued, it would soon have been the leading institution of its kind in the State. But while "God buries his workmen, he carries on his work."

Let us hope, therefore, that the man upon whose shoulders the mantle of this faithful leader falls will be able to carry to completion the task which gave such great promise under his leadership.

His body was taken back to his native state for interment, where in peace he awaits the coming of the master whom he so faithfully served.

Dr. Hull was a man of deep religious experience, of highest moral character, an educator equal to any in our State, masterful yet tactful in administration.

A man equal to any situation in which he was placed. Before coming to Kentucky Dr. Hull was engaged in educational work in his native state, having been president of Millsaps College, and a state institution.
