FIRST DAY—WEDNESDAY.

September 12, 1883.

The Fifty-Seventh Session of the Kentucky Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church met in the M. E. Church, Barbourville, Ky., Wednesday, September 12th, 1883, at 9 o'clock, A. M. In the absence of the President, Rev. C. J. Howes, Secretary of the last Conference, called the Conference to order, and on motion Rev. John G. Bruce was made temporary chairman, and he read part of the 76th psalm, and from the seventh to the last verse of the 6th chapter of Galatians, and the 798th hymn. After singing the Conference was led in prayer by Rev. J. D. Walsh. The sacrament of the Lord's Supper was then administered by the Chairman, assisted by the Presiding Elders, to all the ministers present, and a large number of laymen. During this service Bishop Randolph S. Foster, D.D., arrived, and at the conclusion of the service took the chair.

On motion, Rev. C. J. Howes was elected Secretary, and by permission of the Conference he nominated the following assistants, who were elected: First Assistant, T. F. Garrett; Recording Secretary, S. G. Pollard; Financial Secretaries, A. Boreing and H. W. Bailey; Statistical Secretaries, Geo. S. Easton and J. H. Armacost.

The bar of the Conference was fixed at the center of the second windows.

On motion the Presiding Elders were made a committee to nominate the Standing Committees.

The Conference fixed 8.30, A. M., as the hour for opening, thirty minutes of which to be spent in devotional exercises, and the time for closing 12, M.

Revs. J. M. Ried, Missionary Secretary; I. A. Pearce, pastor of Trinity Church, Louisville; W. B. Godby, of the M. E. Church South; John A. Martin and Wm. V. Elliott, of the Virginia Conference, and

Geo. B. Johnson, of the Methodist Book Concern, were introduced to the Conference.

Rev. J. M. Ried, D.D., Missionary Secretary, addressed the Conference.

The Conference then proceeded to fix the place for holding the next session. Catlettsburg, Ky., Union Church, Covington, Ky., Augusta, Ky., and Vanceburg, Ky., were nominated. Augusta was withdrawn and Catlettsburg fixed as the place.

- D. Stevenson presented a receipt from J. D. Hearne, Treasurer of the Board of Education, for \$58, educational funds, collected last year, and also the obligation of Mrs. Averilla Frank for one thousand dollars, payable six months after her death.
- D. Stevenson, agent of the Educational Fund, made his report, which was received, (See report.)
- Rev. J. D. Walsh reported \$28 in his hands, money received from the sale of a church in the bounds of the Concord circuit, and on motion he was directed to pay it over to the Treasurer of the Conference Board of Trustees.

The Bishop announced the transfer of Rev. I. A. Pearce, an Elder from the Pittsburgh Conference, and of W. C. Bellomy, from the Virginia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, to this Conference.

On motion G. D. Watson was substituted for J. D. Walsh on Committee to Examine the Class of the First Year.

The Bishop added Edgar B. Hill to the Committee to Examine Candidates for Local Deacons and Elders' Orders.

On motion the Conference adjourned, with the benediction by Rev. J. M. Ried, D.D.

SECOND DAY-THURSDAY.

September 13, 1883.

The Conference met at 8:30, A. M. Thirty minutes were devoted to religious exercises. At 9, A. M., Bishop Foster took the chair.

The minutes of the previous session were read, corrected and approved.

The Bishop announced the transfer of Edward T. Curnick, an elder from the Indiana Conference, and his name was placed upon the roll.

On motion the election of a delegate to the General Conference was made the order of the day for Friday morning at 10 o'clock.

The 20th question was taken up, Was the character of each preacher examined? The name of E. L. Shepard, Presiding Elder of the Ashland District, was called, his character passed, and he reported the condition of his district.

It was ordered that the report of the preachers embrace the items of missionary and conference claimant collections, and that they be further required to state whether they had taken all the other collections.

The names of S. E. Steele, G. W. Rich, A. R. Crislip, were called, and their characters passed.

The names of R. D. Lashbrook, S. K. Ramey and J. P. Grinstead, were called, they reported, and their characters were passed.

Rev. W. H. Childres, Presiding Elder of the Barbourville District, was called, his character passed, and he reported the condition of his district.

The characters of H. Newman, W. C. S. Ingram, J. C. Gill, B. F. Whiteman, were passed.

C. J. Howes presented a memorial from Union M. E. Church, Covington, Ky., which, after being read, was referred to the Committee on the State of the Work, and the consideration of the Committee's report made the order of the day for Saturday morning at 10 o'clock.

The name of Rev. J. D. Walsh, Presiding Elder of the Covington and Maysville District, was called, his character passed, and he reported his district.

The characters of J. R. Eads, E. L. Sanders, G. D. Watson, M. D. Murphy, C. J. Howes, S. G. Pollard, Bidwell Lane, E. C. Pollard, W. A. Phillips, A. Boreing, T. Hanford, H. C. Northcott and D. Stevenson, were passed.

The character of Rev. J. H. Lennin, Presiding Elder of the Greenville District, was passed, and he reported his district.

The names of E. Barnes, Wm. Powis, E. D. Elliott, J. D. Belt,

E. A. Davis and M. L. Centers, were called, and their characters passed.

Rev. J. S. Taylor, Presiding Elder of the Lexington District, whose character passed, reported the condition of his district.

The names of V. T. Willis, H. J. Perry, W. B. Barnett, E. B. Hill, J. M. Cook, Wm. Macafee, J. G. Bruce, S. W. Shelton, H. W. Bailey and A. J. Jutkins, were called, and their characters passed.

The name of Rev. F. Grider, Presiding Elder of the Louisville District, being called, his character passed, and he reported the condition of his district.

The characters of J. M. Oliver, T. F. Garrett, G. P. Jeffries, G. N. Jolly, were passed.

The name of C. C. Emerson was called, and his case referred to the Committee on Conference Relations.

The 18th question was taken up, Who are the Supernumerary Preachers?

The names of J. W. Zimmerman and H. J. Ramey were called, and their cases referred to the Committee on Conference Relations.

The 19th question was taken up, Who are the Superannuated Preachers?

The relations of A. B. College, Z. M. Taylor, J. S. Cox, A. H. Triplett, Wm. Wyatt, W. B. Edmonds, R. G. Gardiner, Jedediah Foster, were continued.

The name of John Godby was called, and his case referred to the Committee on Conference Relations.

On motion, R. G. Gardiner was placed on the list of conference claimants.

The Bishop presented a communication from S. Hunt, Treasurer, and W. P. Stowe, Assistant Treasurer, of the Episcopal Fund, in which the apportionment to this Conference for this fund was fixed at \$375.00, and on motion it was referred to the Presiding Elders for apportionment to the districts.

The Bishop presented a communication from Wm. L. Harris, Secretary of the Board of Bishops, in which it appears that the amount

apportioned to this Conference to defray the expenses of the next general conference, and the expenses of delegates appointed by the last general conference to corresponding bodies, is \$150.00, and on motion the matter was referred to the Presiding Elders for apportionment to the several districts.

The Bishop announced that the Conference was authorized to draw on the Chartered Fund for \$25, and the draft was ordered, and on motion it was directed to be paid to the Board of Stewards.

The Bishop announced that this Conference was entitled to eightynine dollars as its share of dividends arising from the Methodist Book Concerns. The draft was ordered and the amount directed to be paid to the Board of Stewards.

The 3rd question was asked, Who remain on trial?

The name of Rev. J. K. Creighton was called, his character passed, and, after representation by his examiners and the Presiding Elder, he was advanced in his studies, and continued on trial, with directions to bring up rhetoric.

The characters of G. R. Frenger, W. I. Taylor, D. F. Kerr, J. H. Armacost, Joseph S. Marriott, Geo. W. Moore and Geo. S. Easton, were passed, and, after representations by their examiners and Elders, they were advanced in their studies and continued on trial.

The character of Philip W. Lockard was passed, and he was discontinued at his own request.

The name of Daniel McDaniel was called, his character passed. After representations by his Presiding Elder, he was remanded to the class of the first year.

The character of Pulaski H. Ebright was passed, and, after representation by his examiners and Presiding Elder, he was continued and advanced in his studies, with directions to bring up ancient history.

The receipts of A. H. Triplett, Wm. Wyatt, Nancy Turner, Fannie Cisney, A. B. College, J. B. Rankin, M. P. Thompson, for funds appropriated to them as Conference claimants at the last session of this Conference, were filed.

On motion, adjourned, with benediction.

THIRD DAY—FRIDAY.

September 14, 1883.

The Conference met at 8:30, A. M. The devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. G. D. Watson. At 9, A. M., Bishop Foster took the chair.

The minutes of the previous session were read, corrected and approved.

The name of I. A. Pearce was called, and his character passed.

The character of James H. Herron was passed, and, after representations by his examiners and Presiding Elder, he was continued on trial and advanced in his studies.

Rev. Geo. S. Savage, D.D., agent of the American Bible Society for Kentucky and Tennessee, was introduced and addressed the Conference.

Geo. B. Johnson, of the Methodist Book Concern, addressed the Conference in the interest of our publishing house.

The receipts of Mrs. I. F. Harrison and Matilda G. Davis, for funds appropriated to them as Conference claimants at the last session, were filed.

On motion of D. Stevenson, H. K. Milward was added to the Board of Education, to take the place of W. H. Parker, whose time expires.

The 5th question was taken up, Who are admitted into full connection?

The candidates for admission, Wm. G. Bradford and J. L. Hawk, were called by the Bishop, who delivered an address and propounded to them the Desciplinary Questions, and, after representations by their examiners and Presiding Elders, W. G. Bradford was admitted and elected to deacon's orders, and J. L. Hawk was continued on trial and directed to bring up all the studies except Harman's Introduction.

The order of the day, viz.: the election of a delegate to the Gen-

eral Conference, was taken up. H. W. Bailey, W. B. Barnett and E. B. Hill, were appointed tellers, and T. F. Garrett secretary.

On motion it was ordered that a majority of all the votes cast be requisite to an election.

The ballot was then cast, and C. J. Howes, having received a majority of all the votes, was declared elected.

On the second ballot for alternate, E. L. Shepard received a majority of the votes cast, and was declared elected.

Rev. R. S. Rust, D.D., Corresponding Secretary of the Freedman's Aid Society, was introduced to the Conference.

On motion a special session was ordered for this afternoon at 2 o'clock for the reception of the Lay Electoral Conference, and the Bishop was requested to address that body.

On motion the Conference adjourned, with the benediction by D. Stevenson.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON.

The Conference met at 2, P. M., and was called to order by Bishop Foster. H. J. Perry conducted the devotional exercises.

The 10th question was taken up, What local preachers have been elected deacons?

The recommendation of Rev. Thomas W. Williamson, of the Ashland District, was presented, and pending its consideration the Lay Electoral Conference, headed by Col. Lily and Amos Shinkle, entered, and the Conference arose to receive them. Addresses were delivered by Bishop Foster for the Conference, and Col. Lily for the Electoral Conference, after which C. J. Howes was called and made a few remarks.

On motion of J. S. Taylor, the relation of John Godby, a superannuated preacher, was continued, and he was placed on the list of claimants.

Rev. Wm. A. Phillips was appointed Railroad Secretary.

The Conference adjourned with doxology and benediction.

FOURTH DAY—SATURDAY.

September 15, 1883.

The Conference met at 8:30, A. M. Thirty minutes were devoted to religious exercises. At 9, A. M., Bishop Foster took the chair.

The minutes of the previous sessions were read and approved.

The 10th question was resumed. Thomas W. Williamson, James H. Armacost, Geo. S. Easton, Pulaski H. Ebright, who were properly recommended after representation by the committee and their respective Presiding Elders, were elected to deacon's orders.

The 16th question was taken up, What local deacons have been elected elders?

John M. Burnett, Thomas McNamara, Cornelius Foster, Elijah W. Baker, who were duly recommended after representation by the committee and their respective Presiding Elders, were elected to elder's orders.

The 14th question was taken up, What traveling deacons have been elected elders?

The names of S. F. Kelly and R. T. Stevenson were called, their characters passed, and after representations by the committee and their Presiding Elders, they were elected to elder's orders.

I. G. Zeigler was granted a location at his own request.

The character of J. H. Ford was passed, and he was remanded to the fourth year's course.

The Committee on Temperance made their report, which was adopted. (See report.)

C. J. Howes stated that there had come to his hands, from G. W. Rich, former pastor of Greenup Circuit, the sum of five dollars, three dollars of which was for the missionary society, one dollar for Conference claimants, and one for Episcopal fund, which the said Rich had collected for these purposes on said charge; and the reports having been

closed, the Secretary was directed to report it to the credit of Greenup charge next year.

Rev. J. D. Walsh stated that eight dollars had come to his hands from the Tollesboro Circuit for benevolence, and the reports having been closed before it was received, he was directed to retain it, and report it to the credit of the charge next year.

The Stewards made their report, which was adopted. (See report.)

The Committee on Conference Relations reported. The case of J. W. Zimmerman was considered, and on motion he was made effective.

 - Rev. J. H. Amis, of the Holston Conference, was introduced.

The order of the day was taken up, viz.: The consideration of the report of the Committee on the State of the Work.

The committee made their report, which was adopted. (See report.)

The Board of Trustees offered a report, which, after consideration, was rejected.

The Treasurer of the Board of Trustees made his report, which was approved. (See report.)

The Committee on Freedman's Aid Society made their report, which, after being amended by making a part of the centennial circular a part of the report, was adopted.

- E. L. Shepherd presented a paper relating to the building of a seminary at some central point in the State, which was referred to the Committee on Education.
- T. Hanford made his report as Visitor to Augusta Collegiate Institute, which was received. (See report.)

The Board of Education made their report, which was adopted. (See report.)

The following preamble and resolution was presented by H. W. Bailey and J. D. Walsh:

WHEREAS, There is a colony of Swedes in Laurel County, of about five hundred, who are Protestants, yet without a preacher; and

WHEREAS, Methodism is likely to succeed among them; therefore

Resolved, That we request Bishop R. S. Foster to secure and appoint a suitable man to the above colony, and if the minister be a member of any other conference to transfer him to ours.

On motion, the Financial Secretaries were directed to turn over the moneys now in their hands, collected for the Women's Foreign Missionary Society, to Mrs. Cleora B. Savage. taking her receipt for the same.

The Auditing Committee made their report, which was adopted. (See report.)

C. J. Howes filed his report as Secretary of the Conference, which was approved. (See report.)

The Committee on Books and Periodicals presented their report, which was adopted. (See report.)

On motion, it was ordered that when the Conference adjourn it adjourn to meet at 3 o'clock this afternoon.

The Secretary and Treasurer of the Preachers' Relief Association made their reports, which were approved.

The Secretary called the roll of the Conference, to receive subscriptions for the publication of the minutes.

On motion, adjourned, with the benediction.

SATURDAY AFTERNOON.

The Conference met at 3, P. M. R. T. Stevenson conducted the devotional exercises.

The minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

The Bishop announced the transfer of F. M. Hays from the Illinois Conference.

The 2d question was taken up, Who are admitted on trial?

The recommendations of Thos. W. Williamson, Wm. E. Cook and Jos. H. Garden, were presented, and after representations by the examiners and their respective Presiding Elders, they were admitted.

Rev. H. J. Perry, in a few very touching remarks, asked for a superannuated relation, which was granted, and, on motion, he was placed on the claimants' list.

E. L. Shepard presented the following, which was adopted:

Resolved, That we present this as a very feeble expression of the high estimation we have of brother Perry's past Christian character. We esteem him as a father and a laborer beloved. We remember thankfully his labors, and as an expression of our feelings, present him a gift, which we tender him at this time.

The Conference then presented him with \$100.

Upon the call of the name of W. L. Furniss it was announced that he had died during the year.

The Bishop announced the transfer of Wm. A. Phillips to the Rock River Conference.

S. E. Steele was granted a location, at his own request.

On motion, Rev. J. D. Belt was granted a location, at his request.

The Presiding Elders were appointed a committee to nominate Triers of Appeals.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to pay the account of R. T. Stevenson, former Secretary, amounting to seven dollars and thirty-five cents.

The Committee on Education made their report, which was, afterconsideration, adopted.

Dr. Stevenson, President of Augusta Collegiate Institute, addressed the Conference.

The Committee on Sunday Schools made their report, which was adopted. (See report.)

On motion, the educational collections were ordered to be equally divided between four students now preparing for the ministry, viz.: John College, Harry Graham, attending Augusta Collegiate Institute; T. P. Walter, attending Asbury University; and L. P. Hanks, attending Ayres Academy.

On motion, it was ordered that when we adjourn to meet at 7.30, P. M.

The Conference adjourned, with the benediction by the Bishop.

SATURDAY EVENING.

The Conference met at 7.30, P. M. Rev. J. G. Bruce, by the appointment of the Bishop, took the chair. The devotional exercises were conducted by Thomas Hanford.

The minutes of the previous session were read, corrected and approved.

On motion, the Conference adjourned, to give place to a meeting of the Conference Educational Society. After the business of the Educational Society the Conference was called to order.

On motion, M. D. Murphy was granted a supernumerary relation, at his own request.

The Committee on Bible Cause made their report, which was adopted.

The Financial Secretaries made their report, which was received and approved.

The Bishop entered and took the chair.

The Statistical Secretaries made their report, which was received and approved.

On motion, it was ordered that the memoirs be read to-morrow

evening, and Revs. J. G. Bruce and E. L. Shepard were designated to deliver addresses on that occasion.

The Bishop designated Rev. John G. Bruce to preach a sermon on the organization of Methodism at the next session of this Conference, and Dr. Stevenson was designated as alternate.

A collection was taken up for the sexton, amounting to \$7 50, and was paid over to him.

Bidwell Lane stated that since the Stewards made their report there had come to his hands the sum of eighty-nine dollars, and, on motion, so much as was necessary to make the collection taken for H. J. Perry amount to one hundred dollars was appropriated to him, and the Board of Stewards directed to retain the balance, to be used by them at their discretion in behalf of claimants and to report to the next session of this Conference.

W. B. Barnett presented the following resolution, which was, on motion, laid on the table:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Conference that one more year should be added to the pastoral term, making it four years, and that we hereby instruct our delegates-elect to the next General Conference to use their influence to secure such end.

Rev. Bidwell Lane was appointed to preach the missionary sermon at next session, and G. D. Watson as alternate.

The Committee on Missions presented their report, which was adopted. (See report.)

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Conference request the Bishop to appoint brother G. D. Watson Conference Missionary, with his quarterly conference relations at Grace Church, Newport, and that when he works within the

bounds of the Conference he shall work with the knowledge and under the direction of the Presiding Elder in whose district he labors.

WM. MACAFEE, T. HANFORD.

On motion, the Bishop was requested to appoint R. T. Stevenson assistant agent of the Educational Fund.

The following paper was presented and adopted:

WHEREAS, The Lay Electoral Conference, at its recent session in this town, desired this Conference to unite with it in a request to the next session of the General Conference to provide for the admission of laymen into the annual Conference; therefore

Resolved, That we instruct our delegate to use his influence to effect such legislation as will secure said end.

J. D. Walsh, B. Lane.

On motion, the Bishop was requested to appoint A. J. Jutkins Secretary of the National Prohibition Home Protection Society.

On motion, the following Board of Church Extension was elected: B. Lane, President; J. D. Walsh, Vice-President; Amos Shinkle, Secretary and Treasurer; S. G. Pollard, E. T. Curnick, J. D. Hearne, J. D. Shutt, G. W. Hamilton and the Presiding Elders, ex-officio, members.

On motion, it was ordered that when we adjourn we adjourn sine die, subject to the reading of the memoirs and appointments Sunday evening.

On motion, the Bishop was requested to appoint Rev. D. Stevenson, D.D., president of Augusta Collegiate Institute, and W. I. Taylor principal of Ayers Academy, and the appointments were made.

The minutes were read and approved, and the Conference adjourned.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

The Committee on Education submit the following report:

We are gratified to learn from the report of the Visiting Committee, the statement of the President and others, that Augusta Collegiate Institute did a good work last year, that the closing exercises were of a decidedly interesting character, and that the opening for the present collegiate year has been more encouraging than at any time since the school was placed under the patronage of the Conference.

We would earnestly ask all the preachers, members, and friends of our

Church, to do all they can to increase the patronage of this school, since thereby it will be made the means of great usefulness. We would call attention to the fact that it is the only school of ample buildings, of large grounds, and collegiate grade under the patronage of our Conference, and that its prosperity will directly tend to make prosperous the Methodist Episcopal Church in Kentucky. Even now five of its young men are studying for the ministry.

Further, your Committee learn with pleasure that Ayres' Acadamy has

had a prosperous year. Its location is good, being on the edge of the Blue-Grass region and the mountains, and we heartily commend it to the patron-

age of the members and friends of the Church.

We would further call attention to what appears to us to be a lack of the spirit of education among us. Education must keep pace with the building of houses of worship, otherwise but a few years will elapse before the congregations gathered will be scattered, and the houses built become dilapidated and desolate. We believe that each preacher should not only preach on the subject of education, as the Discipline directs, but also emphasize the importance of our people educating their sons and daughters in the most thorough manner possible.

In compliance with the suggestion of the Bishops, we recommend the appointment by the Conference of a minister to preach a sermon at the next session of the Conference on the subject of "The Organization of the

Church.'

We would also recommend that special collections be taken up in all our charges for the Educational Fund of the Conference, and that the importance of these collections be emphasized by special preparation for the same, and by sermons on the subject of education.

The Committee consider the resolution of Rev. E. L. Shepherd, to establish another institution of learning, entirely impracticable under the present state of the work.

This great end can only be attained by the suppression of the manufacture and traffic in all kinds of intoxicants as beverages, by constitutional amendments and legislative enactments.

It was the expressed opinion of Chief-Justices Tany, McClain and other eminent jurists, that the people had a right to prevent the making and traffic in intoxicating liquors as beverages, when they deemed it necessary

for the general good and safety to do so.

Therefore, we suggest to the good people of the State to petition the ensuing Legislature to pass an act giving them the privilege of expressing their opinion, or deciding through the ballot-box, whether intemperance, and its horrible effects of crime, misery and death incident thereto, shall be handed down to our children's children.

We, as ministers, will continue our hearty co-operation with the friends his noble cause.

We realize more and more the need of a reading, intelligent, well-informed people, who, grasping in thought, somewhat adequately, the great mission and enterprises of the Church, will be stimulated to hearty and

liberal help in the work of the world's evangelization.

No people will do, in good earnest, what they do not see and feel the importance and necessity of doing. Situated as we are, with a wide and difficult field, we realize the need of such help as these papers can furnish, believing, as we do, that, if generally read by our people, every interest dear to us, and pertaining to the Kingdom of God, would be advanced.

We feel, also, the need of such public notice of the interests of our work; of the struggle of Methodism in this South-western territory, as will secure us the sympathy, prayers, and substantial aid of the great Methodist family throughout the land. We claim the right to be heard—to speak through these mediums to the hundreds who are constantly moving from the East and North to the homes within our territory, and who, in the absence of definite and reliable information as to the real status of our Church, tend to drift into other bodies. We present the following for your action:

WHEREAS, Far too few of our Church papers are taken by our local

preachers and entire lay membership; and

Whereas, It is our conviction that every interest of the Church will be advanced in ratio to the information and intelligence of our membership; therefore

Resolved, 1st, That we will, more diligently than ever, press upon our people the importance of taking and reading our Church papers, and of furnishing their libraries with books coming from our publishing houses.

2nd, That, so far as possible, we will take and read the Quarterly Review. 3rd. That we recognize the wisdom of the General Conference in directing that credit shall be refused to preachers whose accounts are not settled B. LANE, Chairman, within twelve months.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FREEDMEN'S AID SOCIETY.

The growth of a nation emerging from a state of ignorance and infant helplessness up into a Christian civilization is at once a source of anxiety, a source of hope, and a stimulus to benevolent activity for every Christian philanthropist. When seas divide us from the people before whom the day appears with beckoning hand, they are not therefore shut out from our sympathies. How much then is our interest multiplied when we find such a child of Providence in our midst, and domiciled about our national fireside. The appeal for help which is now made by the weaker race to the stronger, surely, no Christian patriot can long resist.

Instead of our responsibility toward our negro ward growing less it is annually increasing. And as he who responds to one pressing call will soon hear another no less imperative, so our Church has heard, and is trying to heed the call which of late years has come up from the illiterate whites in the South; and now the Freedman's Aid Society is working in the recognition of a larger responsibility which includes the white as well as the

colored child.

It gives your committee pleasure to note that the society has ordered for the coming year an appropriation for the work in hand of \$125,000, an advance over last year of nearly \$25,000. This increased appropriation is to "render such aid to schools for the whites as could be done without embarrassment to the schools of the freedmen."

How shall this money be raised? The call is a call of faith. In their suggestions touching the observance of our approaching centennial the Bishops say: "We commend to the liberality of the Church, first, the Board of Education; second, the Freedmen's Aid Society." Then follows the men-

tion of various local objects.

Your committee would urge on the part of every pastor prompt and earnest attention to this matter, and conclude with expressing the hope that the faith which is exhibited in this call for larger collections may have full justification throughout our Church.

The following was incorporated by the Conference as part of the report:

To the Bishop and Members of the Kentucky Conference:

Dear Fathers and Brethren—The year 1884 completes the first century of American Methodism. In order to recognize duly this important fact, the General Conference of 1880 recommended that the centennial of the Church be celebrated, and directed "that the matter be referred to the Bishops to devise a plan for the centennial year, and report to the Church as early as convenient." In accordance with these instructions, the Bishops submitted for the proposed celebration of its organization the following:

The chief object of connectional offerings should be the cause of education. The future of the Church will, under God's blessing, largely depend on the culture given to the youth. We commend to the liberality of the Church, first, the Board of Education; second, the Freedmen's Aid Society; third, the Theological Schools, and, fourth, such seminaries, colleges, and universities as shall be selected by the several annual conferences.

Through its constitution, as interpreted by the last General Conference, the Freedmen's Aid Society is responsible for our whole educational work in the Southern States, which now include nearly one-fourth of our entire membership. These States have a population of 18,500,000 (about one-third of the nation), and of this number 6,500,000 are of African descent, being

twelve-thirteenths of the entire colored population. Nearly eighty per cent. of these can not write, and a vast number of them are without the Gospel, and a large majority have not as yet been reached with educational ad-

vantages.

Of the twelve millions and more of white people in the South, multitudes are as needy in these respects as the negroes. Our over four hundred thousand communicants in the Southern Conferences are about equally divided between these races, and represent nearly two millions of people, a large proportion of them ignorant and needy, who look to us for Christian guidance and culture. Every impulse of patriotism, philanthropy, and Christianity urged our Zion to enter the South as God opened the way.

Our Society can not furnish schools for the vast number of illiterate youth in the South; it can only aid in the establishment of a few institutions of learning of a high grade for the preparation of preachers, teachers, and physicians, who, as leaders and educators, can give tone to public sentiment and aid in the dissemination of intelligence and religious truth. Our Church has never faced a graver responsibility than this, and only by a greatly en-

larged outpouring of money can she meet this manifest call of God.

The society has expended \$350,000 in permanent school property. yet every term hundreds of students are turned away from our schools for the want of accommodations. Our greatest need is new buildings at several important centers. One of these is New Orleans, where for years our school has suffered because of this want. In that commercial metropolis of the South, where Catholicism is so strongly intrenched, we have a Church membership and following of fully fifteen thousand, and within easy reach of this school are more than half a million negroes. Another point is Chattanooga, where, following the recommendation of the patronizing Conferences, we have located our university for the central South. The citizens have pledged \$15,000 towards the enterprise, and an eligible site has been purchased. With such a building as we need we could have an institution of commanding influence and largely self-supporting. Marshall, Austin, and Houston, Texas, and Orangeburg, South Carolina, and Nashville, Tennessee, are other points at which buildings must be had or the work will suffer We ought to have at least \$100,000 for new buildings during 1884.

Our next great need is endowments for professorships. Twenty thousand dollars will endow a chair. The salary of the President of each of our colleges should be secured by endowment. We also appeal for aid in educating young men and women. One thousand dollars will endow a perpetual scholarship, by which the donor could every year aid a worthy but poor

young man or woman in obtaining an education.

Dear brethren, in view of the vastness of this work, and of the responsibility of the whole Church to prepare preachers and teachers to aid in elevating and saving these illiterate masses, we appeal to you for your hearty co-operation. We appeal to the Church for a centennial offering of at least \$250,000 in 1884. This would enable us to put one hundred thousand dollars into buildings, another hundred thousand into the endowment of professorships, and still enable us to support our schools without embarrassment.

We respectfully suggest—

- 1. That you heartily endorse, by special mention, our Southern educational work in your centennial appeal to the people, and urge our wealthy friends to remember this work in their centennial offerings.
- 2. We specially request every pastor, as early in the year as practicable, to deliver an address or sermon upon this subject, at which time the regular annual collection may be taken. Is it asking too much to request every pastor throughout our wide-spread connection to give at least one prominent service on the Sabbath to this cause, and that every congregation should be asked for a collection and every member for a donation?

3. In addition to our regular collections in the congregations, our hope is largely in securing individual donations. Persons making donations can name the fund or the particular school to which they desire to contribute. We ask the pastors to call the attention of the benevolent and wealthy to this work, its large possibilities, and its pressing demands. Impress them with the fact that the centennial gifts to this cause will strengthen and establish the permanent agencies for the education and evangelization of those who have a peculiar claim upon the Church as well as the nation.

# IN MEMORIAM.

#### REV. WILLIAM L. FURNISS.

William L. Furniss was born in Louisville, Ky., in the year 1813, and was converted and joined the Methodist Church early in life, and for many years was an active, energetic and consistent member of the Church. Church, and continued to travel such circuits as were given him, and without a murmer, until 1873, when he was granted a supernumerary relation; in which relation he continued until his death, which occurred at his home in Grayson County, Ky., March 28th, 1883. He had lived a blameless life; was a man of sterling integrity, full of faith and the Holy Ghost. His end was peace.
