Elected Elders—Question No. 19, "What traveling preachers and what local preachers have been elected elders?" was called. The names of J. T. Edwards, Onie Kays, F. M. Baldwin and R. M. Baldwin, traveling preachers, were called, they reported their work, their characters were approved and having passed approved examination were elected elders.

Kentucky Wesleyan College—Bishop Darlington made a statement concerning Kentucky Wesleyan College. Report No. 1 from the Board of Christian Education was read. Dr. W. F. Quillian, H. C. Morrison and P. S. Powell addressed the Conference in the interest of the college. The report was adopted.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION, NO. 1

Lindsey Wilson Junior College and Kentucky Wesleyan College both had successful sessions the past year. The former had an enrollment of 194 students exclusive of summer school and the latter enrolled 219 regular students and 135 part time and summer students making a total of 354 persons in training there. The auditors' report shows that Lindsey Wilson Junior College received \$2,000.00 more than was paid out for running expenses and that the debt on Kentucky Wesleyan was reduced by the amount of \$7,394.20.

During the year the Southern Association of Colleges served notice that they will discontinue their list of approved colleges at the close of the 1938-1939 school year which would make it very difficult, if not impossible, for us to carry on. It thus becomes imperative that we liquidate our debt with all possible speed and get ready for membership in the Southern Association. Looking to the end the Joint Board of Education under the leadership of Bishop U. V. W. Darlington began at once to study plans by which the necessary funds could be raised. In the midst of this preparation at a meeting of the Joint Board of Education held on July 1, 1937, Dr. R. V. Bennett, who had with great sacrificial devotion so successfully directed the affairs of Kentucky Wesleyan through the five years of depression, of-fered his resignation. After due consideration on the Board, with deep regret, accepted the resignation and Dr. Paul Shell Powell, for the past four years pastor at Bowling Green, Kentucky, was elected to the presidency and entered upon his duties at once. Several members of the Kentucky Wesleyan faculty had resigned and these positions were filled at once with men and women of scholarship, experience in teaching and Christian character all of which makes good promise for success in the coming year.

Prospects for a large student body are very fine in both institutions and

everything is hopeful from a campus standpoint.

Your Joint Board of Education decided to make the payment of our debt the first objective and since his election President Powell and Bishop Darlington have given themselves without stint to the work of beginning the fund for this purpose. It was decided to take pledges on condition that none of them are to become due until the entire debt has been covered by good subscriptions.

Prof. S. W. Grise, a man with considerable administrative experience, has been elected dean and much of the campus administration will be left to him while Dr. Powell and Bishop Darlington give themselves. to direct-

ing the campaign to raise funds.

The most important change in the Lindsey Wilson faculty was the resignation of Mrs. Bessie B. Ivey, Critic Teacher, to accept the chair of Elementary Education and teacher of Freshman English at Kentucky Wesleyan. Miss Catharine McAlonan has been elected to take her place as Critic Teacher.

We present the following educational statistics for the two institutions.

Lindsey Wilson: Institutions, 1; teachers, 9 full time and 4 part time; students enrolled, 194; value of property, \$127,741.54; endowment, \$3,766.79; indebtedness, \$15,326.51.

Kentucky Wesleyan: Teachers, 15; students enrolled, 354; value of property, \$476,922.94; amount of endowment, \$67,209.98; amount of indebt-

edness, \$137,738.80.

We recommend that Bishop U. V. W. Darlington and President Paul Shell Powell be continued in charge of the campaign to raise funds with which to liquidate the debts on the two institutions; that they be given large powers in choosing plans by which the campaign shall be carried on and that every member of this Conference pledge them the fullest possible support and co-operation in the task.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Pursuant to adjournment the Conference met at 2:00 p. m., with Bishop Darlington in the chair. "What a Friend We Have in Jesus" was sung. Dr. J. F. Rawls led the Conference in prayer.

Minutes Approved—The Minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

Statistical Secretaries—On nomination C. L. Cooper was elected Statistical Secretary with H. K. Carl, J. S. Howard, G. E. Graden, N. C. Gray, L. M. Rogers, W. F. Pettus, George Kitson, J. T. Harmon, L. F. Moody and Olsen Harrison as assistants.

Publishing House—J. A. Baskerville, representative of the Publishing House, presented a check from the Publishing Agents to the Conference Board of Finance.

General Conference Delegates—Second ballot for delegates to the General Conference was taken. There were 129 ballots for clerical delegates cast making sixty-five necessary for election. There was no election. Forty-one ballots for lay delegates were cast making twenty-one necessary for election. E. B. Lovern received twenty-four votes and was elected.

Historical Society—The Bishop vacated the chair for a meeting of the Conference Historical Society. W. E. Arnold, President of the Society, introduced J. E. Savage who read "A History of Methodism in Montgomery County."

The Bishop resumed the chair.

Church Extension—B. L. Poole, representative of the General Board of Church Extension, was introduced and addressed the Conference in the interest of the work of that Board.

Admission on Trial—Question No. 1, "Who are admitted on trial?" was called. Charles Marshall Cavit, Dee Warren Cobb, Robert Lee Anderson and John Ramsey Parker, a local elder, having been recommended by their respective District Conferences, having passed approved examinations, and being recommended by the Committee on Admissions were admitted on trial by a vote of the Conference.

Location of Next Conference—Question No. 47, "Where shall the next session of the Conference be held?" was called. On invitation Corbin was made the unanimous choice of the Conference.

Delegates to General Conference—Clerical Delegates, on the third ballot, 129 ballots were cast making sixty-five necessary for election. O. B. Crockett received sixty-eight votes and was elected.

On the fourth ballot, 121 ballots were cast making sixty-one necessary for election. There was no election.

On the fifth ballot, 123 ballots were cast making sixty-two necessary for election. There was no election.

On the sixth ballot, 106 ballots were cast making fifty-four necessary for election. There was no election.

On the seventh ballot, 113 ballots were cast making fifty-seven necessary for election. H. C. Morrison received sixty-six and was elected.

Lay Delegates—On the third ballot for lay delegates, forty ballots were cast making twenty-one necessary for election. J. D. Whiteaker received twenty-four votes and was elected.

On the fourth ballot thirty-nine ballots were cast making twenty necessary for election. There was no election.

On the fifth ballot thirty-four ballots were cast making eighteen necessary for election. There was no election.

On the sixth ballot thirty-seven ballots were cast making nineteen necessary for election. There was no election.

On the seventh ballot thirty-four ballots were cast making eighteen necessary for election. Mrs. Ludie Day Pickett received eighteen votes and was elected.

Alternate Delegates—Clerical alternates. On the first ballot for clerical alternates, 140 ballots were cast making seventy-one necessary for election. There was no election.

On the second ballot ninety-five ballots were cast making forty-eight necessary for election. W. L. Clark received seventy-five votes and W. V. Cropper sixty-four and they were elected.

Alternate Lay Delegates—On the ballot for lay alternate delegates, thirty-three ballots were cast making seventeen necessary for election. C. P. Caudill received twenty-nine votes and J. T. Cannon twenty and they were elected.

THIRD DAY-FRIDAY

MORNING SESSION

Carlisle, Kentucky, September 3, 1937.

The Conference met at 8:30 a.m. with Bishop Darlington in the chair. The Bishop conducted the opening worship service.

Minutes Approved—The minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

Vote on Unification—The order of the day for taking the vote on the proposed plan of union having arrived, the Bishop read the question as stated by the College of Bishops and explained the method of voting. A. R. Perkins, F. C. King, P. C. Gillespie, W. B. Garriott and G. E. Graden were appointed tellers. There was a total of 165 votes cast. The affirmative vote was 131 and the negative vote was thirty-four.

Introductions—B. C. Gamble, of the Western Virginia Conference; L. D. Rounds and A. J. Cox of the M. E. Church, and Elmer T. Clark of the General Board of Missions was introduced.

Delegates to District Conference—The following memorial was read:

"We, the Danville District Conference, hereby memorialize the Kentucky Annual Conference of the M. E. Church, South, to make a change in the number of delegates elected to the District Conference and a change in the method of said delegates.

"Realizing that the present plan of representation in the District Conferences is inadequate for proper and sufficient execution of the program of the church, we hereby make the following recommendations:

"First, That the number of delegates elected from each church be increased.

"Second, That said delegates be elected by the Church Conference instead of being elected by the Quarterly Conference.

Signed: G. R. TOMLIN, ONIE U. KAYS, VIRGIL L. MOORE."

The memorial was adopted. The Bishop appointed G. R. Tomlin, E. C. Watts and P. F. Adams as a Committee to bring in recommendations.

Benevolences—The Bishop announced that the Conference had paid 100 per cent on the acceptances of the benevolences.

Passage of Character Resumed—The characters of James E. Wright, T. W. B. Demaree, J. R. Savage, R. F. Jordan, J. E. Roberts, M. S. Clark, and J. W. Simpson were approved and their names were referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for the Superannuate Relation.

REPORT OF ORPHANS' HOME COMMITTEE

The Orphans' Home Committee met September 2nd, at 2 p. m. The report of Mr. R. C. Tway, President of the Orphans Home Board of Trustees, was read before the committee. We quote from his report:

"We began the Conference year with 107 children; received twelve and placed fourteen. Of this number seven were returned to their mothers, four were placed in foster homes, and three reached the age of eighteen

and are filling good positions. The average size of our family for the year was 108. Our food bill increased \$325.29 this year over last year. We consider this a very small increase as we received much less in supplies. However, we were able to cut our expenses so that our actual increase for opreating is \$258.15, although we cared for seven more children than last year."

The auditor's report, A. J. Lynn & Company, was read and approved by the committee.

Your committee wishes to commend the splendid management of the Home. We feel that too much cannot be said in behalf of Mrs. Jessie Ray Williams and her corps of helpers, for their tireless labors, their motherly care for the children and their efficient management of the Home.

The following resolution was passed by the committee:

"That this Conference express to Mrs. J. B. Berry, of Cynthiana, Kentucky, our appreciation of her gift to the Home, installing lights for the childrens' playground and pillars and lights at the entrance, with tablet in memory of her daughter, Louise Berry Jameson."

Your committee also requests that each church throughout the Conference take regularly the fifth Sunday offering and see that they are forwarded promptly to the Home.

The committee recommends Dr. W. P. Fryman and Dr. T. G. Cook for re-election to the Board of Trustees.

The program of Evangelism is committed to our General Board of Missions and also the Conference Board of Missions, the agency of the General Board in the Annual Conference. We have no other mission, except as we make this one essential mission profoundly alive in our churches. We are committed to this unreservedly. We ask the cooperation of every pastor and every church in this program during the coming Conference year.

We rejoice with our Church in the first phase of the Bishops Crusade; \$403,000.00 was subscribed and more than \$387,000.00 has been paid. The unpaid amount at this time is less than 4 per cent. We are grateful for the splendid cooperation of the entire leadership of the Conference and the members of the churches that we could report an offering from every charge in the Conference. But, the first phase of the Bishops Crusade could have been held in abayance, if we are not ready to make the second phase one of the deepening of the Spiritual Life of the Church and advances in winning souls to Jesus Christ our Lord. The Kingdom waits on the results of the second phase of the Bishop's Crusade, when we shall all be brought into a closer relationship with our Lord and Saviour. The Conference Board of Missions, through the General Board of Missions, is one of the agencies of the Church commissioned to help carry out the program of our Bishops and especially Bishop A. Frank Smith, the Director.

They also took charge of the children's program when it was found that Rev. and Mrs. W. T. Beeler of Lynch could not get there.

Rev. Phillip Lee, of China, greatly lifted the crowds on Woman's Day with his two messages on China and in his vocal solos.

It was also our pleasure to have Dr. Herbet Youell, of Washington, D. C., who presented the Oberammergau Passion Play.

The Asbury Radio Male Quartette were on our program the first Sunday and the last four days of the meeting, much to the delight of everyone.

Others on the program were Mr. William Myers, who gave an organ concert, Miss Aileen Kane, who acted as pianist until the Brooks arrived, Rev. Herschel H. Hobbs, pastor of the Baptist Church at Crestwood, who led the singing until Mr. Brock could take charge.

The offerings provided for all of this year's expenses with a slight

balance with which we can get under way in 1938.

History of Methodism in Kentucky—The report of the Commission on Publication of the History of Methodism in Kentucky was read and adopted. H. W. Whitaker, C. A. Sweazy, A. R. Perkins, O. B. Crockett, and J. E. Savage were appointed the committee called for in the report.

HISTORY OF METHODISM IN KENTUCKY

One year ago the Kentucky Annual Conference authorized the publication of Volume II of The History of Methodism in Kentucky, and assumed the financial responsibility for the publication and distribution of an edition of 1,500 copies of the book, the same to be sold for \$1.00 per copy, plus wrapping and postage.

By action of the Conference a Publication Commission was to be appointed by Bishop Darlington, to have charge of all matters connected with the sale and distribution of the book. H. W. Whitaker, C. A. Sweazy and A. R. Perkins were appointed. The Commission has tried to use all available means for carrying out this program.

Approximately the same number of copies have been sold as that of the first volume. However, the greatly reduced price has meant a loss in receipts. The cost of publication was \$1,175.75. The Treasurer, A. R. Perkins, has remitted to the Pentecostal Publishing Company \$574.39. Postage, wrapping and bill heads amount to \$48.49. The Conference still owes the publishers \$601.36. Outstanding book accounts total \$179.40.

We recommend: First, that a Publication Commission of five persons be appointed by the Bishop in charge, this Commission to continue collec-

tions of accounts and further promotion of the sale of the book.

Second, that the Annual Conference authorize the officers of the Commission, acting as its agents, to give a note to the publishers for the unpaid balance due on publication of Volume II, and, if necessary, to renew the same.

Third, that the Conference earnestly request all our pastors to redouble their efforts to place both volumes in as many of our Methodist homes as possible.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

We are well pleased with the successful management of our Publish-They have reported a profit of \$111,748.71. Our Board of Finance received a check for \$2,058.84 to be distributed to our Conference This is an increase of \$205.38 over last year.

The Publishing House is still putting out the Christian Advocate at much less than cost. Their report states, "A new and better way for the paper is greatly to be desired."

The Methodist Hymnal has had a hearty welcome. We recommend that our churches use our Hymnal, taking advantage of the easy payment plan when necessary.

Almost all kinds of literature and supplies to meet the demands of our people can be purchased from the Publishing House, and we urge them to do so.

There is a considerable number of our church schools which do not use our literature, stating they cannot afford to pay for it. We are glad to inform them, if they will observe the educational program of our Church, sending their Fourth Sunday Missionary Offerings to the Conference Treasurer of that fund, they can send the remainder of their offerings to our Conference Executive-extension Secretary, and receive the literature they should have to keep in harmony with the program of our Church.

Th Kentucky Methodist is endeavoring to serve our Conference in the best manner possible. Splendid editorials, news items of interest, and information and announcements, concerning the carrying out of the educational program of the Church are contained in its columns. Those who are loyal to the program of their Church cannot afford to be without it.

There are at present 1,476 names on the mailing list. Balance on

hand, August 30, 1937, \$182.46.

We are glad the paper has been so successfully managed, and with the co-operation of our people it will continue to succeed. Subscriptions cannot be carried beyond the date they expire without added expense to the publisher. Therefore, we recommend the renewal of subscriptions on or before the date of expiration.

We suggest that the Conference accept 2,500 subscriptions as the minimum goal for next year, and that the minimum goal for each district be 500. We also suggest that the month of April be designated as Kentucky Methodist month.

American Bible Society-The report of the Committee on the American Bible Society was adopted without reading.

REPORT OF THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

Your Committee on the American Bible Society reports with satisfaction on the activities and achievements of the Society for the year 1936. The New York City headquarters of the Society, after having been located for eighty-three years in the old historic Bible House on Astor Place, were moved during the summer to a commodious new building nearer the heart of the city's business and religious life.

Translation

Encouraging progress was made in the always tedious but important work of translating and revising the Scriptures. At the end of 1936 the whole Bible had been published in 176 languages, and the New Testament in 214, portions or selections in 601 more, so that the Scriptures have now been published in 991 languages and dialects.

Distribution

The Bible Society's chief task, of course, is the distribution of the Scriptures. During the year 1936, through its district and division secretaries in the United States and its agency secretaries abroad, the Society put in circulation, in upwards of forty countries, a total of over 7,760,000 Bibles, Testaments, Gospels and Portions, an increase of more than half a million over the preceding year. Of this number more than 3,000,000 volumes were distributed in the United States.

A much appreciated factor of the Society's ministry is its service to the blind. Volumes in Braille or similar systems cost from two to eight dollars to manufacture. These the Society furnishes at twenty-five cents per volume and offers "talking book" disc records at the same price.

Universal Bible Sunday

Following its custom of many years the Society will issue material for the use of pastors and churches in observing Bible Sunday which will occur on December 12th, the second Sunday in December.

Your committee respectfully presents the following resolutions: Whereas, The American Bible Society is adapting its program of service to meet the changing demands of the day, and renders a unique service in translating, publishing, and distributing the Bible, a ministry of great importance in the life of the churches and indispensable to the whole missionary enterprise, be it resolved:

First, That we express our hearty approval of the activities of the Society in deepening interest in the Bible and in promoting its circulation throughout the world;

Second, That this body should be distressed in the recession of the gifts from Southern Methodists during the past decade. amount given was \$35,112. During 1936 the amount was \$12,717.

is too great a decrease for such an important cause;

Third, That inasmuch as Sunday, December 12th, has been designated as Universal Bible Sunday, the ministers and churches represented in this body be urged to take advantage of the cooperation offered by the Society in furnishing assistance, and plan carefully for a worthy observance of the day.

We believe in a sound financial system in every church—a system that includes: (1) Regular offerings on the part of every member as an act of worship. (2) That every contribution be brought to a stewardship basis, a basis of spiritual sharing. (3) A thorough every-member canvass seeking a contribution from every member.

We recommend the continued observance of Layman's Day, and urge that presiding elders, pastors, and district lay leaders make definite plans to this end.

We regret that Dr. W. L. Lester who has been our Conference Lay Leader for ten years, finds that he is unable to carry on as our leader of lay activities and we express our sincere appreciation for the work he has done, for his Christian leadership and untiring efforts as Conference Lay Leader.

The World Outlook made splendid progress on its recovery program last year. We are yet 20,000 subscribers from the highest subscription list. We hope each congregation will do everything possible this year to reach the peak.

The General and Conference Evangelists

A report of their activities this year was made and they have been kept busy. They came before the Board of Missions and offered their services for the coming year, in the second phase of the Bishops Crusade.

The General Missionary Council

The General Missionary Council will meet in Savannah, Ga., January 11-14, 1938. This meeting will be surrounded with the memories of John Wesley's Ministry on the American Continent and will be the dynamo for the second phase of the Bishops Crusade. Leaders from all Methodism in America will be among the speakers. Sometime during the year we will have another great group meeting led by Bishop A. Frank Smith within the bounds or reach of the churches of the Kentucky Conference.

Good Samaritan Hospital

Lewis, the former President, who has been ill sometime. Only one Conference other than our own has failed to meet its pledge to the Council for the last two years. And yet, we find that our women have raised practically as much for local work as for Missionary work. We trust our pastors will assist our good women in correcting this condition.

REPORT OF BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION-NO. 2

Your Board is pleased to report that the past year has been one of success in our work. The Young People's and Adult assemblies were well attended by enthusiastic participants; the Christian Adventure Camps made contributions to the Christian development of fine groups of boys and girls. Training credits were about equal in number to those of the year before but classes were much more widely distributed and many more schools were touched by training work, while work on college campuses was extensive and effective.

Major emphasis was placed on the rural church and with the assistance of a larger number of volunteer workers a large number of circuits were visited with much benefit to many of them. We are greatly indebted to the volunteer workers who so willingly gave their time and effort to this work.

The office of the General Board has been generous in giving help wherever it could be given for which we hereby express our thanks.

For the coming year we plan to continue our camps and assemblies, press the battle for a larger number taking training by one of the methods offered, follow-up the work of visitation to the rural churches and ask the cooperation of all presiding elders and pastors in this work.

The only legitimate end of all this work is the spiritual life and development of our pupils and we welcome the opportunity of taking part in the Aldersgate Commemoration which is the second phase of the Bishops' Crusade. We exhort pastors, officers and teachers to join in a a great campaign to increase enrollment, maintain attendance, secure pupil co-operation and to work for and expect the conversion and growth in grace of those who come under our influence. Let this be the major emphasis in every school. We are not interested in programs for programs' sake but to make effective the spiritual work for which programs are set up.

The School for Pastors was the most successful we have ever had and preparations are being made for a better one next year.

Our Excutive-Extension Secretary and our efficient office secretary have been tireless in all this work.

The Kentucky Methodist edited and published in the office of this Board brings to us twice a month the news items of Conference happenings to stimulate our efforts in all lines of church work. No other Conference excels us in a serviceable organ at so low a price. We are glad to report that that the paper is meeting expenses and bespeak for it a much larger circulation.

We were delighted to have with us again this year Dr. W. F. Quillian, the Secretary of the General Board of Christian Education whose counsel is always appreciated.

Your Board has elected Mr. Dennis V. Snapp as our Executive-Extension Secretary, and ask that you confirm the election.

Temperance and Other Moral Questions—The Report of the Committee on Temperance and Other Moral Questions was read and adopted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE AND OTHER MORAL QUESTIONS

Today, as never before, the alcohol problem stands as a barrier to all advance. The saloon of the nineties was evil,—admittedly evil. The character of the problem faced by the church was never brought into the question. It was a war between Bethlehem and Gomorrah, a conflict between repulsive wrong and accepted right.

Now, the moral fundamentals at the very base of the problem are ignored. The drink interest is skillfully integrated with all life. Infiltrating suggestion carries its temptation by every avenue into every field. The habit forming character of alcohol is ignored. "Drink," our children are told, "drink constantly but not too much." "First the man takes the drink, the drink takes a drunk, then drink takes the man." So runs the experience of the ages, but we disregard the experience.

The trouble with the liquor policy of the state of Kentucky, as of nearly every other state, is that it ignores, it disregards, it assumes that what has always happened will not happen again.

what has always happened will not happen again.

The social evils which have their origin in the drink custom are in direct proportion to the amount of liquor consumed and the amount consumed is in direct proportion to the facilities for promotion of the traffic and for gratification of the appetite.

Having these fundamentals in mind, we earnestly protest:

- 1. Against the assumption of beer as a drink having no grave social consequences. The history of our own country and the world, disputes the assumption, an assumption which can be called nothing but wishful thinking of the most reckless character. Death and disaster, moral ruin, and community demoralization are the fruits of this dishonesty and folly.
- 2. Against the multiplication of licenses. Redundant licenses make redundant drinking.
- 3. Against the toleration of liquor advertising. If there is justification for the sale of drink at all, there can be no justification for advertising the sale of it. Advertising makes the consumption; consumption makes drunkeness and crime, waste and woe.
- 4. Against the sale of beer or liquors in close proximity to dancing or other commercialized amusements. This mal-administration is productive of moral ruin and should stop. The road house is a growing menace in Kentucky.
- 5. Against sale of liquor in proximity to the sale of gasoline. Drink must be divorced from driving.
- 6. Against the failure to realize the importance of manipulating hours of sale in the interest of temperance. Much of the drunkenness could be prevented by prohibiting the sale of intoxicants in the leisure hours.

Kentucky is failing to realize the possibilities inherent in its vast wealth of human and material resources because special interests are allowed to prey upon the people. Kentucky belongs to the men and women and children who live within its borders. Their systematic exploitations are under the protection of the government is indefensible.

Our people must survey the extent of this menace and unite for its extripation. If prohibition is not immediately possible decency is, and for decency we ought to contend with no hint of compromise. Therefore your committee urges that our ministers bring before their congregations the necessity of a crusade for Right Living, which would include education for total obstinence from alcoholic drink; a greater appreciation of the sacredness of home relations; better Sabbath observance and the responsibility of Christian citizenship.

The Woman's Christian Temperance Union is in the midst of an aggressive five point educational program, emphasizing deeping of the spiritual life, Alcohol Education, Character Education, Christian Citizenship and a World Peace. They have raised half of their 10,000 quota with which to promote the program. We endorse their program and ask the cooperation of our people.

Local Option. Sixty counties have held elections under this law. Forty-seven have voted dry. Elections in four of these counties have been invalidated by the courts. Court contests are pending on at least three other counties. Thirteen have voted to retain the sale of liquor. Fourteen counties have prepared for elections before the close of the year. The Local Option law which prohibits the sale of all drinks above one per cent alcoholic content is said to be the best in the nation. It is under constant fire of the liquor interests, therefore since constructive legislation is needed for solving many of the problems in question, and protection is needed for the Local Option law. Your committee recommends the appointment of a Legislative Committee from this body to work in cooperation with the temperance forces of the state to that end. Your committee further recommends the following for that committee: Judge George W. Vaughn, Mr. Earle Savage, and Rev. A. G. Stone.

We nominate the following as Anti-Saloon League trustees: Rev. E. K. Arnold, Rev. A. G. Stone, and Rev. O. B. Beck.

MEMOIRS

REV. HUBERT THOMPSON BONNY

The subject of this sketch, Rev. Hubert Thompson Bonny, the son of John D. and Lucy Rucker Bonny, was born at Waco, Madison County, Kentucky, November 29, 1872. He was educated in the common schools of that community, and while he had not the advantages of college training he had an unusually alert mind and his long contact with the business world equipped him for a very effective and fruitful ministry. He was for many years a merchant, either in the employ of others or conducting business for himself. He served as postmaster of the little village of Waco for about twenty years.

His childhood home was a Christian home of the highest order, both parents having been members of the Methodist Episcopal Church at College Hill, Madison County. The training given him in that home never ceased to wield an influence over his life, the first fruits of it being his conversion, a definite experience of which he was often heared to speak, at the age of nine years. He united with the church of his parents and remained a member of that church until about 1899, when he united with the Baptist Church, of which his wife was a member. He remained a member of that church until 1916 when he united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, at Pine Grove on the College Hill Circuit. 1911 during a tent meeting held at Waco, in which Rev. T. P. Roberts did the preaching, he sought and obtained the blessing of the Baptism of the Holy Spirit, which blessing he enjoyed and preached until his death. Soon after his sanctification he was ordained a minister in the Baptist Church, but he never preached for that denomination. In 1916, soon after uniting with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, he was granted local preachers' license, and at the Annual Conference held at Shelbyville that year he was appointed as a supply to the Estill Circuit, which charge he served for four years. He then served the Mt. Hope charge for one year, at the end of which time he was returned to the Estill and Revenna Circuit, serving that charge one year. He then served Mackville five years, Burgin four years, College Hill four years, Grassy Lick and Camargo one year, and Mt. Zion about one and one-half months. He was admitted on trial into the Kentucky Annual Conference in 1919, and served faithfully and effectively in the itinerant ranks until God called him home, on November 2, 1936. At the time of his death he was assisting Rev. K. O. Potts in a revival meeting at Milton. He was stricken with a heart attack on Saturday, from the effects of which he died on the following Monday. His body was taken to the home of his sister, Mrs. Bettie Thorpe, at Waco, where it remained until November 5th, when funeral services were held in the Methodist Church at Richmond, conducted by the writer of this memoir and Rev. K. O. Potts, pastor of the Milton Church. Notwithstanding the fact that the weather was bad, and the services were held at 10:30 o'clock in the morning, the spacious auditorium of the church was filled with relatives and friends from many counties of Central Kentucky, which was a testimony of the popularity of this man of God. To know him was to love him, because of his warm heart, his cheerful disposition, his affable manner and his Godly character. If he had an enemy in the world he knew not of it. His great passion was to win souls to Christ, and he was never happier than when telling the "Old, Old Story," and exalting Him who had so wonderfully saved and sanctified his soul. He was a powerful preschool of the old time Gospel and the fruits of his labors in souls are preacher of the old-time Gospel, and the fruits of his labors, in souls saved and sanctified, will be revealed in eternity.

He was twice married. First to Miss Mary Dudley, of Waco, in 1898. She departed this life without living issue in 1904. He was next married in 1907 to Miss Eunice Scott, of Carroll County. He is survived by his wife, two sons, Coleman and Thomas Bonny, and two sisters, Mrs. Bettie

Thorpe, of Waco, Madison County, and Mrs. C. B. Hamilton, of Tucumcari, New Mexico.

His body was laid to rest in the Richmond cemetery beneath a bank of beautiful flowers, which spoke silently of that beautiful life upon which he has entered.

Faithful servant of God, lover of souls, loving husband, devoted father and brother, true friend, my chum of the yesteryears, we all know where to find you, for you must be very near the Throne of God.

GEORGE W. YOUNG

Dr. Geo. W. Young was born at Antioch, W. Va., November 29, 1844.

He joined the Western Virginia Conference in 1868, and was transferred to the Kentucky Conference in 1880 where he served the churches in Newport, Williamstown, Perryville, Richmond and Cynthiana. He rendered able and acceptable service in the pastorate in these fields of labor, but there was opening up to him under the guidance of the Spirit and the demands of the work a new field of service for which he was especially fitted—the great cause of temperance and to this cause he gave his entire time, retiring from the regular ministry in 1899.

Dr. Young was married to Miss Isabelle Groves, Kessler's Cross Lane, Nicholas County, W. Va., December 7, 1871.

His wife died nine years ago, they having lived together for fifty-six years.

To them was born one child, Miss Frances, who survives them.

After Dr. Young's retirement from the pastorate he made his home in Louisville near the Crescent Hill Methodist Church. He great endeared himself to the people of this church through his faithful service as teacher of the Men's Brotherhood Class for several years.

Dr. Young passed peacefully away at his home in Louisville on Christmas day, December 25, 1936, after an illness of several weeks. He had just passed his 92nd birthday and of course in the last year or two he had shown the increasing weakness coming from his advanced age, but his faculties were clear until the last two or three weeks of his life. He was, so far as we know, the oldest minister in the Methodist Church in point of Conference membership of sixty-eight years.

His was a mind of rare depth and power and he was a prince on the rostrum and in the pulpit. His clear insight, vivid and strong utterance, keen wit, withering sarcasm and quick and telling repartee made him a foe that carried fear into the camp of his opponents. Ill fared the man who dared match swords with him.

After his retirement from the regular ministry he worked under the auscipes of the Anti-Saloon League and was in their employ until his advanced age made it impossible for him to do the arduous work required of him in that capacity.

The Methodist Preachers' Meeting of Louisville District paid the following tribute to Dr. Young: "His memory will long be held in affectionate regard by multitudes of people. To many of the preachers of the Louisville District, as well as throughout the state, he was an elder brother, and able counselor, a loved and an honored friend. His services to the Church will abide through the years, while his courageous and effective devotion to the cause of temperance will inspire many of us to strive to catch his mantle with a prayer that a double portion of his spirit may fall upon us."

He was not only recognized and honored in his own church but he was a national figure, having spoken throughout the length and breadth of our country in the cause of Prohibition. He was a master of assemblies—a powerful voice in the great conventions and campaigns for the temperance cause.

The return of the liquor traffic and the flooding our land with a deluge of death and destruction, after he had helped, as he thought, to destroy it forever nearly broke his heart.

The funeral services were conducted at the Crescent Hill Methodist Church by the presiding elder, assisted by Rev. B. B. Pennington, the pastor of the church and the writer.

He was laid to rest by the side of his wife in the burying ground at her old home in Kessler's Cross Lane, W. Va.

God buries His workmen, but carries on His work, and we confidently believe that the cause of temperance and righteousness that he so ably championed, will again triumph over the powers of evil and that his and his fellow laborer's work will not be in vain.

MRS. ROBERT F. JORDAN

At Augusta, Kentucky, on November 8, 1936, Mrs. Robert F. Jordan, nee Jennie M. Miller, one of God's noble women, passed to her rest and reward. She was the daughter of Otho P. and Martha Lloyd Miller and was born in Clermont County, Ohio, on February 14, 1862. At six years of age she came with the family to Kentucky and at twelve years of age she united with the old Fairview Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in Bracken County, and retained her membership there the remainder of her life.

She was united by marriage to Robert F. Jordan on Novembr 22, 1882, and for fifty-four years was his counsellor, his comfort and his helper in all the varied experiences of life. When, in 1903, he gave himself to the ministry as a pastor in the Kentucky Conference she did the same with no less a degree of consecration to the task. His work was her work; his joys, her joys; his triumphs, her triumphs, and in many a difficult situation her steady hand and strong heart helped to bring success where failure threatened. It was the good fortune of the writer to be, many times and for days together, in their home and never once did he hear her complain of hardships or difficulties. She loved her church and her work too well to complain. Her deepest interests were bound up in the people they were appointed to serve. Their appointments were received as from God and every talent she possessed was invested in building up the work.

She had been in failing health for some months and the family fully realized the seriousness of her condition but death came sudden and unexpectedly on Sunday morning while she was engaged in her household duties. On Sunday and without a long period of suffering. It was fitting that it should be so. She was ready when her Lord called and needed no special season of preparation.

Besides her husband she is survived by the following children: Mrs. Beulah Anderson, Hazard, Kentucky: Walter E. Jordan, Farmland, Indiana; Will J. Jordan, Middlesboro, Kentucky, and three brothers, one sister, three grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

Her remains were taken back to the church of her childhood where a host of relatives and friends gathered to express their love for her and the funeral service was conducted by the writer and Rev. Floyd D. Rose, assisted by Revs. H. K. Carl, A. D. Houghlin, I. J. Scudder, W. H. Cardwell and C. H. Rayl, after which her body was tenderly laid to rest in the beautiful cemetery a short distance away. Her active work was done but her influence still goes on, "She being dead yet speaketh." DR. O. J. CHANDLER-1868-1937

As a personal friend of Dr. Chandler I have been asked by the family to write an appreciation of his life and work. I do this not only in response to this request but as an offering to the memory of a very dear friend.

My connection with the family began in my early life, having taught school in Fleming County the first year after my graduation from Kentucky Wesleyan College. I had the privilege of boarding in the home of "Uncle" Stamper Dickey, a brother of Rev. J. J. Dickey of blessed memory in the Kentucky Conference.

In this family was a daughter, Miss Sally Dickey, who afterward became the wife of Dr. Chandler.

It was my privilege to become closely associated with him after his coming into the Conference.

His unusual ability as a preacher and the attractiveness of his personality soon won for him a large place in the affections of our people and he was in great demand in all our churches. Among the appointments he filled were Newport, Shelbyville, First Church, Winchester, and First Church, Lexington.

Though fighting against the dread disease that finally carried him away, he was a ray of sunshine wherever he went. If he was burdened or downcast by reason of this conflict he never let his friends know it nor in any way did he cast a shadow over the path of others.

In the last charge the writer served, at Crestwood, his daughter, Mrs. Poulter, placed her membership in the church there and thus our fellowship was renewed and more than once did he delight and edify the congregation with his splendid gospel sermons.

He was unusually gifted in the art of expressing the truth in the choicest language and his appeal to cultured and thinking people made him a minister of outstanding influence in every community in which he served

We record our deep grief over the loss of the two brothers, M. T. and O. J. Chandler, and rejoice in their reunion in the "Home above." We pray for comforting grace for the wife and daughter.

Identified as Dr. Chandler was with the two Conferences, the Kentucky and Western North Carolina, it is fitting that an appreciation of his work should be given by each Conference, so we present a fuller memoir by W. A. Lambeth, of Winston-Salem, which renders unnecessary a more elaborate sketch on our part.

Dr. O. J. Chandler, the son of Samuel and Catherine Chandler, was born in Austin (Scott County), Indiana, on October 6th, 1868. He died in Asheville, North Carolina, on April 16th, 1937. He was graduated from the High School of Scottsboro, Indiana, and from DePauw University, Greencastle, Indiana. He was married on August 29th, 1894, to Miss Sallie Dickey, of Fleming County, Ky. Their daughter, Emma, is now Mrs. Richard H. Poulter, Route 2, Anchorage, Kentucky.

In September of 1891 he joined the Kentucky Conference at Harrodsburg, Kentucky, and was sent to a large circuit in the mountains of Eastern Kentucky. He often jokingly recalled, during the later years of his life, that the "fruits of my first year of work in the ministry was \$6.00 in money, half a dozen pairs of socks, and a pair of shoes."

During succeeding years he rose rapidly in the Conference, being sent to charges of increasing importance and responsibility. In 1915 he was transferred from First Church, Lexington, Kentucky, to First Church, Alexandria, Louisiana.

On account of his failing health, he moved his family to Asheville, North Carolina, on March 9th, 1916. For the rest of his life, he became a superannuate member of the Kentucky Conference.

However, he regained his health sufficiently to do supply work in the Western North Carolina Conference. He was assistant pastor of Central Church, Asheville, from 1922 to 1927. For several years he taught the Men's Bible Class of Central Church, Asheville, with great satisfaction to the members thereof. During different years of his residence in Asheville, he served as supply pastor of the following churches in Western North Carolina: Elk Mountain, Emma, Riverside, Asbury Memorial, Haywood Street, and Boone. At the time of his rather sudden and unexpected death, he was serving as supply pastor of the Asheville Circuit.

A funeral service of Dr. Chandler was held in Central Church, Asheville, on the afternoon of April 19th, 1937, with that great church crowded to its full capacity with men and women, boys and girls, white and black, who loved him with a deep devotion. The next morning, at Shelbyville, Kentucky, another funeral service was held by the Reverend C. W. Grant,

the pastor of Crestwood M. E. Church, South, assisted by Rev. B. O. Beck. Dr. Chandler's body was buried in Grove Hill Cemetery, Shelbyville, Kentucky, which is near the home of his daughter, Mrs. Emma Chandler Poulter.

On the next day after his death, an editorial in the Asheville Citizen contained the following: "It is no invidious distinction to say that he was contained the following tribute: "It is no invidious distinction to say that he was the best beloved man in Asheville at the time of his death. Such he was in fact and in truth. Loving much, he was loved much.

"The amazing part of his place in the life of this community is the fact that he never held permanently a major pulpit charge in Asheville. His frail health, which placed restraints on his activity but not on his loving kindness, disabled him for the exertions inevitable to a large and exacting pastorate. Much of the time that he lived here was spent as a supply preacher at various churches. * *

"Losing him, Asheville must strike from its spiritual balance sheet one of its richest assets."

Many of his friends delighted to call him by this affectionate title: "The Bishop of Buncombe!"

Gradually, through the years, he became preacher and pastor not merely to the members of the Methodist Church in Asheville and Buncombe County, but also to the Jews, the Roman Catholics, and to all Protestants. He was welcomed at the synagogue, where he was often called to preach. He served as emergency pastor, sometimes for weeks, occasionally for menths, to both Presbyterians and Baptists.

While he was noted for his pulpit utterances, many times delivering sermons which stirred the entire community toward greater righteousness and more effective service, his major work in Western North Carolina was done as pastor and friend. He had a real pastor's heart. He was a genuine shepherd of the sheep. He would not let people suffer, in body or mind, alone. He probably rang more doorbells and carried in more comfort, during the last fifteen years of his life, than any other man in Buncombe County. The halls of hospitals and sanitoriums knew the sound of his approaching footsteps and always welcomed him. Many patients in Asheville hospitals and sanitoriums requested that the funeral service in Asheville be broadcast by station WWNC, and this was done.

It is no exaggeration to say that Dr. Chandler officiated, or helped to officiate, during the last ten or fifteen years of his life, at more weddings, baptisms, and funeral services than other clergyman in Buncombe County. The comfort he imparted by his prayers and talks on funeral occasions was one of his remarkable contributions to the people of Asheville and vicinity.

He was a continuous member of the Asheville and Buncombe County Ministerial Association. He was an honorary life-member of the Kiwanis Club. He was initiated into the Weaver Clan, one of the large and important families of Western North Carolina. All the Civic Clubs felt honored whenever he would come and speak to them.

It is gratifying, but not surprising, to be able to record that the judge and the lawyers adjourned court at the courthouse on the day of his funeral service.

With reference to Dr. Chandler, surely two verses of Scripture ought to be quoted:

"He hath shewed thee, O man, what is good; And what doth the Lord require of thee, But to do justly, and to love mercy, And to walk humbly with thy God?"

"Pure religion and undefiled
Before God and the Father is this:
To visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction,
And to keep himself unspotted from the world."

REV. CHARLES LEATH BOHON

Brother C. L. Bohon, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Bohon, was born in Mercer County, Kentucky, April 9, 1871. He was converted early in life and united with the Methodist Church. He felt his call to preach while young and was licensed as a local preacher and served in this relation for several years. He did not feel that he should accept money for preaching the Gospel; therefore, he operated a small farm which he owned in Mercer County and from which he made his living, and preached as he had opportunity without financial renumeration. According to his testimony, it took three years of crop failure and other discouragements to make him realize that preaching the Gospel could not be a part time job for him, and that the Gospel minister, like any other laborer, is worthy of his hire.

Brother Bohon was educated in the public schools of Mercer County, and at Hogsett Academy, Danville, Kentucky, and Vanderbilt University. He had a great intellect. His thought processes were ponderous and stimulating. In his preaching he was an essentialist. As a writer he showed exceptional ability. He excelled in public prayer. His prayers were great sermons turned God-ward. His diction was flawless and his unction and earnestness lifted all into heavenly places.

Brother Bohon joined the Kentucky Conference on trial in the year 1899, and served the following charges: Middlesboro, Shilo Circuit, Epworth, Owingsville, Georgetown, Carlisle, Versailles, Frankfort, Jackson, Hazard, Port Royal and Burnside. He was, also, the presiding elder of the Shelbyville and Danville districts, serving each district four years.

Those who knew Brother Bohon intimately were impressed with his capacity for friendship, the bigness of his heart, the genuineness of his character, and the gentleness of his life.

His best earthly friend outside of his immediate family was the late Rev. James M. Fuqua. Their souls were knit together in an undying love. Then he had a host of other friends among both the clergy and the laity. He had a heart larger than his body. He gave love and sympathy to all. He was genuine. No one would accuse him of insincerity in religion or any other matter. He shared the gentleness of Christ and this fine characteristic found fullest expression in the home circle and in the pastoral relation.

On October 8, 1908, Brother Bohon was united in marriage to Miss Lida Summers Robertson, daughter of the late Rev. and Mrs. D. W. Robertson. They were suited to one another in every way. They were both poetic by nature and cultivation, and devoted whole-heartedly to the same great Cause. They walked down the years in love and peace together, serving the Lord and his Church. They departed this life together in a automobile accident at Burnside, Kentucky, May 28, 1937. They were united in love and life, united in Christian service, united in the Lord, united in death, and united in eternity, where they shall ever be with the Lord.

Brother Bohon is survived by his son, Billy, of New Orleans, and a sister, Dr. Dixie Bohon Tucker, of Los Angeles. No son ever had a more devoted father than Billy. In the last letter written by this loving father to his son, the following words appear: "I have scarcely had such peace and joy in praying as I have in recent months,—in talking about you to our Heavenly Father. Well, that is all for this time except the usual terminal assurances which seem to fall with more than accustomed emphasis this time."

Closing services of tribute and comfort for Brother and Sister Bohon were held in the Georgetown Methodist Church where they were united in marriage. The services were conducted by the pastor, E. M. Fossett, assisted by W. V. Cropper, Felix K. Struve, W. L. Clark, and O. B. Crockett. Many ministers were present and a large company of friends from differ-

ent parts of the state. Their bodies were laid to rest in a single grave in the Georgetown Cemetery.

"An angel up in Heaven dreamed
That 'round the Throne of God was space
That not quite full of glory seemed
And came to earth to fill the place.

"He looked among the pure and good

Then, gently, as an angel would

Miss Robertson was united in marriage to Rev. C. L. Bohon, October 8, 1908. When she became the wife of a Methodist itinerant preacher, she did so with full knowledge of what it meant. This was the kind of life with which she was most familiar and of which she was greatly proud. As the wife of a Methodist preacher, she was a supreme success. The people loved her dearly. Her remarkable and varied talents were fully dedicated to the Master's service. She went bravely with her husband from place to place, serving the Lord in the beauty of holiness. At all times she took a deep interest in the affairs of the church. She played the piano, violin, and pipe organ, and in their appointments assisted with the music on these instruments.

Mrs. Bohon was a faithful and helpful wife, a devoted and loving mother, a true and loyal friend, an affectionate and obedient daughter, a dependable servant of the church, and a sincere follower of the Lord Jesus.

She departed this life, with her husband, in an automobile accident at Burnside, Kentucky, on the afternoon of May 28, 1937. The last solemn services were held in the Georgetown Methodist Church. The services were conducted with her husband's and by the same ministers. She was laid to rest in the same grave with her husband in the Georgetown Cemetery.

REV. PETER COOPER EVERSOLE

Rev. Peter Cooper Eversole was born at Hazard, Perry County, Kentucky, June 20, 1873. He was the oldest of ten children, eight boys and two girls.

He was educated at Laurel Seminary, London, Kentucky, and in a private school at Kirksville, Kentucky. He read law and was licensed to practice at an early age. He served a term as County Attorney of Laurel County.

At the age of nineteen he was married to Nora Belle Jackson, of London, Kentucky, March 4, 1893. To this union one child was born, Earl J., who is a doctor in Louisville, Kentucky.

He was a kind, considerate and loving father, and a faithful, loyal and devoted husband.

A few years after his marriage, he was led to Christ through the influence of his consecrated wife. Genuinely converted, he continued to be a consecrated Christian.

Soon after his conversion, there came the call to the ministry. He responded to the call, and joined the Kentucky Conference at Lexington, Kentucky, in September, 1900. He served faithfully and efficiently numerous charges in the Conference. Included in the charges are the following: Simpsonville, London, Flemingsburg, Jackson and New Castle. He was serving his third appointment at New Castle at the time of his tragic death. For four years he was presiding elder of the Covington District.

He was a manly man, possessing the elements requisite and essential to true manliness. Though somewhat retiring in disposition, he found pleasure in coming into contact with men. He delighted in their association and fellowship. He was ever interested in men and loved them. He made friends. What is better, he possessed and practiced the art of keeping friends. While he made new friends, he kept his old friends. His intimate acquaintances and friends appreciated him and loved him.

As a minister he is widely known and remembered. He was a good preacher. As a minister he possessed natural equipment. Nature endowed him with a keen, inquiring, discriminating mind, and a retentive memory. To this natural equipment was added the training of the schools, including his law course. During the years of his ministry, he continued to be studious. Books were his companions. He appreciated books not for their fancy binding or attractive illustrations but for what they contained. His library indicated that the volumes it contained were selected with discriminating care. As a minister he was sincere. His preaching was not based on theory, but on Scriptural teaching and personal experience. He knew whereof he spake. He personally knew the Christ whom he preached to others.

As a pastor he was appreciated and beloved. He knew his members and identified himself with them. He was one of them. How intimate is the relationship between a pastor and his people. In a real sense a pastor participates in all the experiences of his people—their joys and sorrows, successes and failures, victories and defeats. Throughout the Conference, in all the charges served by him, men and women and children mourn the departure of a faithful and beloved pastor.

Brother Eversole died July 3, 1937, the result of an automobile accident. The same accident caused the death of his beloved sister and devoted wife. Though fatally injured himself, his last words were expressive of a solicitous interest in the welfare of others. A few words spoken concerning himself evidenced the presence of a faith that sustained him in the hour of greatest need.

The funeral service of himself and sister was held at New Castle, July 5th, and was conducted by the writer, assisted by Dr. W. L. Clark, Rev. W. B. Garriott and Rev. A. C. Johnson. A number of the members of the Kentucky Conference were present. The church was crowded with former parishioners and sympathetic friends to pay a loving tribute of respect to the memory of the departed. The remains were taken to London,

Kentucky, and after a service conducted by Rev. Price T. Smith, were interred in the cemetery at that place, there to await the resurrection of the Just.

A good man, a devoted father, a loving husband, a faithful friend, a true minister, a beloved pastor, and an humble and consecrated servant of God has gone to his final reward. Peace be to his memory.

MRS. RHODA ELLEN CHAMBERLAIN

Mrs. Rhoda Ellen Chamberlain, daughter of James W. and Sarah Berry, was born in Harrison County, January 13, 1840. Having known her Lord from her earliest recollection, she united with the Mt. Gilead Methodist Church at nine years of age, which relation she adorned by a faithful, active, effective and victorious Christian life for eighty-eight years.

She was married to the Rev. W. W. Chamberlain, a member of the Kentucky Conference, at the age of nineten, with whom she lived, labored, sacrificed and endured the hardships incident to the life of a pioneer, itinerant Methodist preacher for forty-five years. This happy union was severed here on earth thirty-three years ago when God called her faithful husband from labor to rest. In 1918 she located in Cynthiana, transferred her church membership from the Mt. Gilead Methodist Church to the Cynthiana Methodist Church in which she lived and worked until her departure.

To this happy union were born four children. One daughter died in early life, and one daughter and two sons survive: Mrs. Orpah Smith and James W. Chamberlain, of Cynthiana, Kentucky, and Dr. J. P. Chamberlain, of Breckenridge, Harrison County, Kentucky.

As calm, quiet and beautiful as the close of a summer day, her tired, sweet, gentle spirit entered into rest February 13, 1937, aged ninety-seven and one month.

Sister Chamberlain was the wife of an itinerant Methodist preacher for forty-five years, and his widow for thirty-three more. This enabled her to see much of life—much of its hardships, its deprivations, its self-denials and sacrifices; and also, much of its successes, its joys and victories. It enabled her to contact individuals as worthless as shale and other as valuable as rubies, to encounter the winds that tested the fiber of life and the sunshine and refreshing showers that sweetened and inspired life. Through this varied experience she came to a ripe old age with the clear conception that the one thing of infinite value in this realm of our existence is manhood and womanhood purified and stabilized by the refining grace of Jesus Christ. In a statement to her pastor only a few days before her victorious home-going, she said she had lived in the consciousness of her Lord's presence and approval without the loss of a single minute at any time for the past twenty-five years.

She loved her church and attended its worship services, both morning and evening, and the mid-week prayer service until within a few weeks of departure. Her conversation was confined almost wholly to her love for her Christ, to her activity and interest in her church. She often expressed a desire to be with her Lord, and frequently remarked that she did not understand why she was being kept here. But, because of her victorious Christian experience, her prayers of faith for her church and community and the influence of her life of devotion, her going is a greater loss to the community than the average citizen realizes.

Funeral services were conducted in the Methodist Church by her pastor, Rev. R. T. Brown, assisted by the Rev. M. S. Clark and the Rev. Floyd D. Rose, after which her body was laid to rest in the beautiful cemetery of Jacksonville, Bourbon County, Kentucky.

CLARA MARTIN POYNTER (MRS. WILEY TAUL POYNTER)


Clara Martin Poynter, daughter of Hezekiah Davis Martin and Juliet Jameson Martin, born in Bourbon County, Kentucky, December 17, 1846, was educated in Bourbon County, received her degree of Bachelor of Arts in 1863 from Wesleyan College, Wilmington. Delaware, and her honorary degree of Doctor of Literature in 1930 from Centre College. From her earliest days she had a keen intellect, a scholarly mind, broad interests and sympathies; deep interest in race problems, in national and international matters, in the church and all phases of its work. For a few years after her graduation from college she taught in Bourbon County, but also devoted much time to work in the Paris Methodist Church of which she was an active, enthusiastic member.

In September, 1877, she was married to Reverend Wiley Taul Poynter, D.D., who for four years had served the Paris Methodist Church. Two years later they were persuaded to buy Science Hill School at Shelbyville, Kentucky, where for seventeen years she was co-principal with Dr. Poynter, though she took little active part in the work of the school since she felt the bringing up of her three children, who were born during those years, was a greater obligation. She gave much time, also, from 1878 to 1896 to the work of the Home and Foreign Missionary societies of the

Kentucky Conference, holding the office of Corresponding Secretary of the Foreign Society from 1878 until 1883; of President during the year 1884-1885; of President of the Home Missionary Society from 1891 until 1901. She organized many societies, worked to create interest in missions, and with Miss Sue Bennett did much of the first planning of the location and, later, for the building of Sue Bennett Memorial School at London. From 1878 to 1879 she was President of the pioneer Missionary Society of Carrollton; from 1879 until her death, March 7, 1937, she was President of the Missionary Society of Centenary Methodist Church, Shelbyville and its work was one of the first interests of her life to which she gave generously of her thought, strength and substance. Her sense of obligation to serve her day and generation, her love of humanity, her unfaltering faith in God were three of her outstanding qualities which were an inspiration and challenge to all who knew her.

After the death of Dr. Poynter in 1896 she became principal of Science Hill School which under Dr. Poynter's guidance had become one of the well known preparatory schools for girls of the country. Because of her education enriched by broad reading and by travel in this country and Europe, her culture and refinement, her executive ability, her progressive ideas and good judgment she was able to continue the school until her death, so directing its policies that it grew with the years and gained a recognition which in turn caused an honorary degree to be conferred upon her when she was eighty-three years of age because of the signal contribution she had made to education for women. Her ideas of education, which included a training of mind, heart and soul, she demanded of self so that she remained throughout the more than ninety years of her life active mentally, alert to the needs of those in distress and ready to serve them, tolerant, generous, courageous in thought and action, seeking to help herself and others "to higher thinking and nobler living."
