
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

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

FIRST DAY.

LEXINGTON, KY., September 30, 1886.

THE SIXTIETH SESSION OF THE KENTUCKY ANNUAL CONFERENCE of the Methodist Episcopal Church convened in Centenary Methodist Episcopal Church, Lexington, Ky., on the thirtieth day of September, 1886, at 9 o'clock, A. M.; Bishop Cyrus D. Foss, D. D., LL. D., in the chair. The Bishop read the third chapter of Ephesians. The 798th hymn was sung, and J. R. Eads led in prayer, followed by Bishop Foss.

The sacrament of the Lord's-supper was administered. Bishop Foss addressed the Conference.

The roll was called, and the following named brethren responded:

On motion, the benevolent collections on Statistics No. 1 be filled from Treasurer's papers.

On motion, Statistical Secretary, Board of Stewards, and Treasurer meet at 3 P. M., to receive reports and moneys from pastors.

On motion, a draft for \$30 on Chartered Fund was ordered to be drawn; and on Book Concern an order for \$103 was ordered drawn. On motion, all papers referred to proper committees without motion. On motion, rules of order of last year adopted.

On motion, Board of Stewards was made Committee on Claims.

Time was extended. Dr. Gillet was introduced. He addressed the Conference concerning the Sunday school Union work.

The apportionment of \$424 Episcopal Funds was announced, and, on motion, was referred to presiding elders for distribution.

Rev. J. R. Deering, Methodist Episcopal Church South, was introduced.

Doxology sung. Benediction by Bishop Foss. Adjourned.

SECOND DAY.

OPENED at $8\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock; Bishop Foss in the chair. D. Stevenson conducted the devotional exercises.

Nine o'clock, Minutes of last session read and approved.

On motion, roll of members absent yesterday called, and further call dispensed with.

On motion, printed Minutes were made the official Journal of the Conference.

G. M. Clarke was appointed to report for Western Christian Advocate. On motion, Statistical Secretary excused from reporting delinquents, to report next session.

TWENTIETH QUESTION-Greenville District was called-M. L. Centers, presiding elder. His character passed, and he reported his district.

A motion that T. G. Bosley be entered as withdrawn was made.

D. Stevenson moved, as a substitute, that his case be referred to the Committee on Conference Relations. Substitute was lost.

The original motion prevailed.

The character of each of the following elders was passed: E. D. Elliott, E. A. Davis.

Wm. Powis and J. H. Ford announced transferred to Southern Illinois Conference.

Lexington District was called—G. N. Jolly, presiding elder. His character passed, and he reported his district. The following named elders were called, and the character of each was passed: B. F. Whiteman, J. S. Taylor, J. S. Postal, I. T. Walker, J. M. Oliver, E. C. Pollard.

When W. B. Barnett was called—he having left his work during the year—his presiding elder and Brother Barnett made explanations, and, on motion, his character passed.

Louisville District was called—F. Grider, presiding elder. His character passed, and he represented his district; pending which report he gave way, in order to give Dr. Butler an opportunity to address the Conference.

Dr. Wm. Butler, former superintendent of missions in India, and later in Mexico, was introduced to the Conference, and addressed the Conference upon the work of our missions in India.

Dr. G. S. Savage, District Superintendent American Bible Society, was introduced, and addressed the Conference.

Dr. Bartlett, Presbyterian, Dr. Fulton, Presbyterian, Dr. Hyden, Baptist, Revs. Morland and Gilmore, Methodist Episcopal, were introduced.

Announcements were made.

Doxology sung, and benediction pronounced by Bishop Foss.

Third Day-Morning Session.

SESSION opened at $8\frac{1}{2}$ A. M., Bishop Foss in the chair. M. L. Centers led the prayer service.

Nine o'clock the Minutes of previous session read and approved.

Statistical Secretary reported delinquents in the matter of reports from pastors.

A communication was received from the Cincinnati Conference

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touching the Temperance Question. It was referred to the Committee on Temperance.

On motion, J. R. Shannon, J. R. Eads, G. M. Clarke were added to the Committee on Temperance.

FOURTEENTH QUESTION—Traveling Deacons elected to Elders' Orders. Jos. K. Creighton, Geo. R. Frenger, Jos. S. Marriott, Geo. S. Easton, and Wm. F. Maltbie; characters passed; elected.

Wm. I. Taylor's character passed. He being in school, was continued in second class.

THIRTEENTH QUESTION—J. H. Herron, called; was traveling deacon of first year. His character passed, and he was advanced to second class. He having passed a satisfactory examination in the studies of second class, is excused from examination next year.

John G. Bruce, supernumerary, made superannuated with claim. J. H. Lennin, supernumerary, was changed to superannuated with claim.

A motion to change relation of A. R. Crislip to superannuated was made. A substitute to refer to Committee on Conference Relation lost. Original motion prevailed, and he was placed on list of claimants.

Moved to place Mrs. H. Newman on the list of claimants. Adopted. E. A. Davis, effective, was made superannuated with claim.

SIXTEENTH QUESTION—Local Deacons elected to Elders' Orders. John G. Ragan being recommended by Lexington District Conference, was represented. On motion, Committee granted leave of absence to examine.

TENTH QUESTION was taken up, and Geo. W. Howes, who was duly recommended for local deacon's orders by the Ashland District Conference Examining Committee, reported, and he was elected.

FIFTH QUESTION taken up, and the candidates for admission into full membership were called forward to the front seat. Hymn was sung. Bishop Walden led in prayer. Bishop Foss addressed the class, and propounded the Disciplinary questions. The following named were reported by examining committees and presiding elders, were admitted into full membership: Pulaski H. Ebright and Wm. E. Cook, local deacons; George M. Clarke, an elder; Chester H. Williamson, elected to deacon's orders; Thomas B. Stratton, a local deacon, to be examined on "Harmon;" Cyrus Riffle and Wm. B. Snead, elected to deacon's orders.

SIXTEENTH QUESTION — Who are elected Local Elders? John G. Ragan, duly recommended by Lexington District Committee on Examination, reported, and he was elected to local elder's orders.

Dr. Bayliss, editor of Western Christian Advocate; Dr. Rust, Corre-

sponding Secretary Freedmen's Aid Society; Dr. Spencer, Assistant Secretary Church Extension Society; C. L. Loos, President Kentucky University; J. J. Taylor, Baptist, city, were introduced to the Conference.

On motion, it was ordered that when we adjourn it be to meet at 2 P. M.

On motion, time was extended.

On motion, Dr. T. C. Carter, editor of *Chattanooga Methodist*, was invited to address the Conference after Dr. Bayliss.

Dr. Bayliss addressed the Conference, ably urging the claims of the *Western* to join us in the work of the Church in this field.

Dr. Carter addressed the Conference upon the importance and success of our work in the South.

Bishop Foss presented a communication from National Association of Local Preachers touching post-office address. On motion, each pastor was directed to furnish Secretary with address of all local preachers in his charge. Also a communication on Chinese Question. On motion, it was referred to a special committee of three. J. G. Bruce, C. M. Giffin, and I. T. Walker were make the committee.

Bishop Walden was introduced to the Conference. Doxology sung, and benediction by Bishop Walden. On motion, adjourned.

Third Day-Afternoon Session.

SESSION opened at 2 o'clock afternoon, Bishop J. M. Walden, D. D., LL. D., in the chair. C. J. Howes conducted devotional exercises. Minutes of morning session read and approved.

Bishop Foss took the chair, and the TWENTIETH QUESTION was taken up. F. Grider, presiding elder, concluded his report.

The following elders were called, and the character of each was passed: G. W. Barnett, H. W. Bailey, J. R. Shannon, S. W. Shelton. Bishop Walden took the chair, and Dr. Rust addressed the Conference in behalf of the Freedmen's Aid Society.

Bishop Foss took the chair, and the TENTH QUESTION was taken up—What Local Preachers elected to Deacons' Orders? Chas. S. Smith, who was duly recommended by the Greenville District, was represented by the presiding elder, and he was elected to deacon's orders.

SEVENTH QUESTION — Who are received upon recognition of orders? Nestor C. Lamb, duly recommended by Greenville District. He was

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represented by presiding elder, and, on motion, his orders in the Freewill Baptist Church recognized.

Bishop Walden took the chair.

Dr. Spencer addressed the Conference upon the Church Extension interests.

C. J. Howes moved that all the pastors take Church Extension collections in December, and send money to A. Shinkle, Conference Board Treasurer.

A report from Committee on Resolutions touching the Sabbath. Adopted. (See Report.)

R. T. Stevenson, North Ohio Conference, and J. S. Shows, Christian Church, introduced.

The allowance from the Preachers' Relief Society is included in above report.

On motion the basis of apportionment for Conference Claimants be the amount allowed this year.

For detailed report of receipts from Churches see Statistics, No. II. Committee of three on Chinese Question presented a report, and the report was adopted. (See Report.)

SEVENTH QUESTION taken up.—Henry M. Gibbs, who was duly recommended by Ashland District Conference for recognition of his orders in the Free-will Baptist Church, was represented, and his orders recognized.

On motion adjourned, with benediction by Dr. Carter.

Fourth Day–Morning Session.

CONFERENCE opened at $8\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock A. M., Bishop Foss in the chair. J. S. Cox conducted the prayer service.

At 9 o'clock the Minutes of previous session were read and approved. On motion the presiding elders were directed to urge the preachers to take the Church Extension collection in December, and forward to A. Shinkle, Conference Treasurer.

On motion a committee of three was appointed to nominate Triers of Appeals. H. W. Bailey, J. R. Eads, and A. Boreing were made the committee.

A motion that same committee be ordered to nominate members upon the several Conference boards, societies, and committees not otherwise provided for, was lost.

On motion the presiding elders were made a committee to nominate members of the several Conference societies, committees, and boards not otherwise provided for.

Committee to visit Ayres Academy reported. Referred to Committee on Education.

J. S. Taylor was excused from further attendance.

Committee to visit Augusta Collegiate Institute reported. Referred to Committee on Education.

M. L. Centers, presiding elder Greenville District, represented the case of G. P. Jeffries, which had been referred to him last year.

On motion a committee of five was appointed to investigate.

DAILY JOURNAL.

On motion the Secretary was made a committee to nominate, and J. G. Bruce, J. S. Cox, J. S. Marriott, D. Stevenson, and T. F. Garrett were nominated, and on motion they were elected.

The Board of Managers of Preachers' Relief Association presented a recommendation to amend the constitution by adding to Article III, the following words, to wit:

"Provided that the widow of a deceased preacher who had not at any time, by payment of dues, become a claimant upon funds of the Society shall not become a claimant upon its funds after his decease."

The same having been adopted by three-fourths of the members of the Board of Directors.

After discussion, the previous question was called and the amendment was approved.

THIRD QUESTION taken up—Who remain on Trial? John Dover, Davis P. Holt, Frank E. Vance, Frank P. Fitzgerald, Alfred M. Abbott, Morton G. McNeeley, John College were continued and advanced to second year's course of study; and Charles Smith was continued in first year's course, with the privilege of being examined in both years' courses of study.

Charles W. Sutton, Daniel McDonald, Alfred C. Gentle, and Thomas McNamara were continued in the first year. Robert Liddell was announced transferred to St. Louis Conference. Thomas Williamson was discontinued, Thomas P. Walters continued in first year to attend De Pauw University.

THIRTEENTH QUESTION--Who are Traveling Deacons of the Second Class? Daniel F. Kerr, character passed; represented by Examining Committee and presiding elder, and he was advanced. Joseph L. Hawk, character passed, and advanced.

EIGHTEENTH QUESTION—Who are the Supernumeraries? E. T. Curnick, character passed; he was changed to effective.

J. W Zimmerman, character passed. A motion to change his relation to effective was lost. On motion he was continued.

S. K. Ramey, character passed, and on motion he was made effective.

J. M. Cook was continued.

Resolved, 2. That we continue Dr. Stevenson as principal under same conditions as formerly.

At a subsequent meeting held in Lexington, Ky., October 1, 1886, Dr. Stevenson was appointed Educational Agent for the Board.

F. Kelley was requested to act with the Committee.

# STANDING COMMITTEES.

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

The subject of education can not be too strongly emphasized. It is undoubtedly the will of God that every one of his rational creatures should be brought to the highest possible state of improvement. The rude, untaught, and unimproved child of nature is not what God designed him to be, else he would not have been endowed with such wonderful capacities for growth and improvement as he possesses. The lower orders of creatures possess no such capacities. It is only when these capacities are regarded and cultivated that the will of God is properly regarded, for it is only then that the rational human being is capable of properly filling his place in the purposes of God.

It is, therefore, the religious duty of every man to use all the means in his power for storing his own mind with useful knowledge and for strengthening and developing his faculties, and also for the education of those whose improvement has, to any extent, been committed to his oversight and care. Ignorance and sin are very closely allied to each other, while righteousness and truth, like "righteousness and peace, have kissed each other."

Education was a marked feature in the national life of the Jews, the people who most perfectly represented and illustrated the divine mind. It has been a marked feature also in the history of the Christian Church, and the Church has prospered in its various branches in exact proportion as it has been an educated and an educating Church.

There never has been a time when the Church has had more need to be thoughtful and active in promoting the work of education than the present. Are we fully awake to the importance of this work? Are we fully observant of the signs of the times? Do we preach upon the subject of education, as required by the Discipline? Do we seek to induce the members of our Church to educate their children as we ought? The rising generation of Methodists must be educated, or else the Church, notwithstanding all its spiritual excellence, will lose much of the ground that it has gained and much that it is now gaining.

We must, moreover, call attention to our own schools, and especially to the schools of our own Conference. Other Conferences, even the largest and the richest, have the wisdom to devote their energies to the building up of their own institutions of learning. Shall we, in our comparative poverty, be more liberal than they? Shall we not devote our energies to the promotion of education in our own midst? Shall we not cultivate the vines of our own planting? It is only by being true to these in their infancy and feebleness that we can hope to assure to them a mature and vigorous growth. If the present foundations were destroyed, who would have the heart to begin to lay other and more abiding foundations?

The Methodist Church has lost much by not taking care of what she has had in hand, while looking aimlessly into the future for some greater and better thing.

### Augusta Collegiate Institute.

THIS institution is not a mere preparatory school. In addition to a comprehensive academic course of studies, it has a two years' collegiate course. It is under the control of the Board of Education of this Conference, and this Board is empowered to confer degrees and to do all other things that trustees of colleges generally are empowered to do. With the exception of the small amount of interest received from the Educational Fund of

this Conference, its only source of income is that which is derived from the tuition and boarding fees of students. Our people are scattered, and many are poor and not a few of them indifferent to the education of their children.

Hence the necessity, if we wish to retain this institution under our control, of every member of the Conference endeavoring to bring to it a patronage that will afford it certain and continued support. The attendance last year was only fair, though the closing exercises were remark-ably fine. The present school year has begun with a considerable increase in the attendance over that of last year.

The charges for tuition and board at this institution are as low as those of any school of which we have knowledge of equal grade and advantages. In view of these facts and considerations, we present again the resolutions which were adopted last year.

1. Resolved, That we will do all we can to sustain this institution by speaking in its favor, and endeavoring to secure to it the patronage of the

members and friends of our Church. 2. Resolved, That we will do what we can to increase the Educational Fund of this Conference, either by trying to secure contributions to it ourselves, or by giving aid and encouragement to Dr. Stevenson, the agent of the fund, in his efforts to secure them.

3. Resolved, That we will preach on the subject of Education, and endeavor to induce the members of our Church to see the necessity of having their sons and daughters liberally educated.

### Ayres Academy.

WE learn that this institution had a good attendance of students during the last scholastic year, and that its prospects for the present school year are very favorable. We would call attention to it and would urge our friends in the part of the State in which it is situated to give it a liberal patronage.

### Theological Schools.

THE Theological Seminaries of the Church, to wit: Boston, Drew, Evanston, and DePauw, are undoubtedly accomplishing much for the intellectual and spiritual interests of the Church by affording special training for the work of the ministry; and we recommend young men who believe that they are called to preach, and who have laid a sufficiently thorough foundation in general knowledge in academics or colleges, to attend one or the other of these schools, if able to do so, before proposing to enter upon the active duties of the pastorate, unless by urgent need of their services they seem to be providentially called to that work without being permitted to take such a course.

### Visitors.

WE recommend the appointment of I. T. Walker, John R. Eads, and E. L. Shepard as visitors to Augusta Collegiate Institute, and the presiding elder of Lexington District and the preacher in charge of College Hill to Ayres Academy.

We would, in addition, offer the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, That each presiding elder be requested to call an educational meeting in his district within the first six months of the coming Conference year, or else to give special attention to the subject of education at the first District Conference of his district.

2. Resolved, That at the next session of the Conference, the first night of the session be devoted to the subject of education, under the management of the Board of Education of this Conference, and for the benefit of the D. STEVENSON, I. T. WALKER, GEO. W. BARNETT, Educational Fund.

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

THE Committee on Temperance beg leave to present the following report:

The liquor-traffic continues to be the greatest and direst foe of the Church, the home, and the nation, the prolific source of nearly every species of crime that disgraces our civilization, the one appalling and unparalleled curse of Christendom.

"Its enormities seem rather to increase than diminish, its attitude be-comes more defiant and audacious," its power is unquestionably great in dominating the politics and corrupting them, in permeating the social life and poisoning it; in fact, there is scarcely an honest and helpful agency in the land that is not threatened by this monstrous demon power.

The Methodist Episcopal Church, by its monstrous demon power. The Methodist Episcopal Church, by its written laws and by its highest official declarations, stands clearly and fully committed to the suppression of this accursed, desolating, and damning traffic. In the Book of Discipline it is emphatically stated, "We regard voluntary total abstinence from all intoxicants as the true ground of personal temperance, and complete legal prohibition of the traffic in alcoholic drink as the duty of civil govern-ment." It also declares that "The buying selling or using intoxicating It also declares that, "The buying, selling, or using intoxicating ment." liquors as a beverage, signing petitions in favor of intoxicating liquors, be-coming bondsmen for persons engaged in such traffic, renting property as a place in or on which to manufacture or sell intoxicating liquors," is "imprudent and unchristian conduct." It is, therefore, impossible to conceive how a Methodist can be other than an open, determined, and aggressive enemy of this traffic. To be neutral is alike inconsistent with the declarations of the Discipline and the teaching of the Bible, and can not. therefore, be other than unchristian and criminal.

We, therefore, beg to submit the following platform of principles: I. Believing that the constitutional prohibition of the liquor-traffic is the real and only successful goal that Christians ought to aim at, and that will suffice to wipe out this awful stain on the face of our nation, we would, therefore, urge the preachers of the Conference to keep this always before the people.

II. We affirm our belief that tax laws or license as a means of legislation against the liquor-traffic is productive of no good results, but rather a source of great evil, because it stamps with the sanction and approval of the State this wicked traffic.

III. "Believing that the temperance cause will be greatly promoted by the dissemination of scientific knowledge respecting the deleterious effects of alcohol upon the human system, we respectfully urge the General Assembly to pass a law requiring that instruction upon that subject be given in the public schools of the State." IV. That "whenever genuine prohibition of the liquor-traffic can be se-

cured to any extent by local option laws, without involving us in the

support of license or taxation, we will accept such laws as a step toward the goal we seek, and co-operate in securing and enforcing such laws."

V. "The recent assassination of the Rev. George C. Haddock, at Sioux City, Iowa, by the bloody-handed murderer, the liquor-traffic, reveals the real character of the foe with which we do battle, and calls upon every true man and woman in the whole nation to arise in the might of an unconquerable purpose, and, with like courage and consecration, dare to do, until the heartless foe is vanquished and the final victory won."

VI. And, finally, we obligate ourselves, as a Conference, that, "in the spirit of that wisdom and charity which the Gospel enjoins, we will urge our people to stand *religiously* with us in this platform of Christian inde-pendence, in aggressive warfare upon the" nefarious "liquor-traffic."

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY-SCHOOLS AND TRACTS.

THAT the Sunday-school of to-day is a great auxiliary to evangelistic and missionary work, is a fact recognized by all intelligent, consecrated people. But, that its efficiency as an evangelizing and benevolent agency in our Conference may be more readily seen and appreciated, will you consider the following facts?

1st. For the year ending October 6, 1885, there were in the Sundayschools of the Kentucky Conference 637 conversions.

2d. For the year ending October 6, 1885, the Sunday-schools of the Kentucky Conference raised \$916 for Missions, being three-fourths of the whole amount raised.

But that the above is only a part of what should be done is evidenced by the facts following:

1st. There are in the Conference 85 Charges, with 221 Churches-144 of these Churches have Sunday-schools, while 77 are without Sunday-schools.

2d. Of the 144 Sunday-schools, 29 report missionary collections aggre-

gating \$916, while 115 report no collection; therefore, Resolved, That we urge our Pastors to carry out the provisions of our Discipline in forming Sunday-schools (¶ 266 of Discipline), and that these schools be organized into missionary societies as required by  $\P$  273 of Discipline.

We commend to your consideration "Good Tidings Day" as a convenient combination of Sunday-school Union and Tract interests, calling the attention of our preachers to the fact that one-third of the joint collection for Sunday-school Union and Tract Society will be refunded in tracts if they so request. ### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FREEDMEN'S AID SOCIETY.

WHEREAS, The Freedmen's Aid Society, since its organization twenty years ago, has accomplished so much for this people in the erection of numerous buildings for normal school, seminary, collegiate, and university purposes, to which has been recently added the splendid and magnificent University at Chattanooga, Tenn., centrally located in, and adapted to our white work in the South, which is now a legitimate field of this Society ; and.

WHEREAS, It has provided these schools with a noble band of self-sacrificing teachers during this period, and the great and good work of educa-tion, moral elevation and salvation of seven millions of the race is to a great extent dependent upon our efforts for their dual emancipation (mental and moral); and,

WHEREAS, The Methodist Episcopal Church, at the total expenditure of \$1,737,606.51-real estate, secured in lands, etc., \$850,000-has directly and indirectly helped near a million of this ill-treated people to a better social, moral, and spiritual life; therefore, be it

Resolved, 1. That this Conference deems it no time to slacken her efforts; emphatically so, as there is back of all this 200,000,000 in Africa looking rightfully to these preachers, teachers, and physicians (elevated by this society), and saying, "Come over and help us;" therefore, be it *Resolved*, 2. That all the preachers in charge in the Conference do their

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY.

Resolved, 1. It is indeed a matter of surprise that many persons, and many Churches, while admitting in general terms the importance of a wide distribution of the Scriptures throughout the world, allow year after year

to pass without contributing to promote the world, andw year after year to pass without contributing to promote the interest of this Society. *Resolved*, 2. That the receipts of the year for general purposes were \$523,910.59, a decrease from the previous year of \$64,003.75. *Resolved*, 3. That we, the members of the Kentucky Conference, recog-nize this Society as one of the benevolences of the Church, and urge a contribution from all the Churches. Jos. S. MARRIOTT, Chairman.

THE Committee on Chinese Question would respectfully report that, after an examination of the subject as presented to them, they would recommend the adoption and forwarding of the memorial which they now offer. J. G. BRUCE, Chairman.

### To the Senate and House of Representatives in Congress assembled :

The Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, composed of eighty-five ministers, and representing twenty-three thousand Church members, beg leave to present to your honorable body their respectful petition, showing—

1. That the treaty of 1880 between the United States and China, in which China gave her consent to the restriction of immigration of Chinese laborers to this country, provided that "Chinese laborers who are now in the United States shall be allowed to go and come of their own free will and accord, and shall be accorded all the rights, privileges, immunities, and exemptions which are accorded to the citizens and the subjects of the most favored nation." Said treaty also contained the following solemn pledge on the part of our Government: "If Chinese laborers, or Chinese of any other class, now either temporarily or permanently residing in the territory of the United States, meet with any ill-treatment at the hands of any other persons, the Government of the United States will exert all its power to devise measures for their protection, and to secure to them the same rights, privileges, immunities, and exemptions as may be enjoyed by the citizens or subjects of the most favored nation, and to which they are entitled by treaty."

2. That most flagrant and grievous outrages have been perpetrated upon the Chinese in Wyoming and Washington Territories, and in the States of Oregon and California, and in many places in that portion of our country the purpose is still openly expressed of driving out the Chinese inhabitants.

3. That in the course of these outrages not only has much property belonging to Chinese residents been destroyed, but many persons have been put to death.

4. That the failure to keep our treaty obligations, and the inhuman persecutions and brutal massacres which have been perpetrated upon these strangers in our midst, have disgraced our country in the eyes of the civilized world, and subject us to the just judgment of a righteous God.

5. That the safety of our citizens in China is imperiled by these frequent and unredressed wrongs to Chinese subjects in the United States, and that we have no right to expect that the people of a heathen country will be more careful of the rights of American merchants and missionaries than the people of this Christian country are of the rights of the Chinese in our land.

6. That these outrages have already borne sad fruit in the destruction of the property of our mission at Chung King, in Western China, and the expulsion of our missionaries.

7. That it is imperatively necessary that immediate measures of the most stringent character be taken for the protection of the lives and property of the Chinese in this country, and the spirit of persecution and lawlessness, so rife in some regions, be sternly rebuked, and prompt and efficient punishment visited upon lawbreakers.

We, therefore, petition your honorable body to enact without delay such measures as will enable the officers of the law to suppress all efforts to persecute and drive out the Chinese, and secure to them, wherever they may be in our wide domain, the same protection afforded to all other persons in "life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness," and especially that the In-demnity Bill pending when Congress adjourned be passed without delay. And for this your petitioners will ever pray. Signed by order and in behalf of the Conference.


Resolved, That we were glad to have had Bishop J. M. Walden with us.

### REV. HERMAN NEWMAN.

REV. HERMAN NEWMAN, of the Kentucky Conference, was born in Cabell County, West Va., December 15, 1816, and died November 19, 1885, near Young's Springs, Bath County, Ky. Trusting in the Lord, he fell asleep in Jesus. He joined the Methodist Episcopal Church in Cabell Court House, West Va., December 1, 1833. He was born of the Spirit March 1, 1834. Soon after his conversion he was appointed class-leader in his nineteenth year, and in his twentieth year he was licensed to exhort. He served the Church faithfully as class-leader and exhorter, and in his twentysecond year was licensed as a local preacher in the Church, doing his duty as a faithful servant of the Lord. He was ordained deacon September 8, 1844, at Marietta, Ohio Conference, by Bishop Joshua Soule; ordained elder March 6, 1870, at Maysville, Kentucky Conference, by Bishop Edward Thomson. He received the following appointments from the Conferences: Louisa, Coalton, Carter and Elliott, Sandy and Blaine, Fox Springs, Bangor, Irvine, and Jeffersonville. He was reappointed to the Jeffersonville Circuit the second year. Filled his appointment at Laurel Spring, which was his last sermon. He was taken sick after preaching, arrived home, and lingered sixteen days, suffering intensely from Bright's disease. He bore his afflictions patiently, trusting fully in the Lord, in whom he had believed for over fifty years. When told by his physicians that he could not get well, he was not alarmed. His wife, weeping by his bedside, was told not to weep for him, saying, "Living or dying I am the Lord's," and "Tell my brethren of the Conference that I am not dead, but transferred." He being dead yet speaketh, for he was a devoted servant of Jesus Christ.

### MRS. ANNIE P. BRUCE.

ANNIE Ross, daughter of Thomas and Rosalinda Ross, was born in Warren, Trumbull County, Ohio, September 30, 1808. Shortly after her birth the family removed to Hamilton County and settled on Pleasant Ridge, a few miles north of Cincinnati. Her parents, being members of the Presbyterian Church, united with the Church of that denomination at Pleasant Ridge, of which Rev. Mr. Hayden, a most excellent Christian, was the pastor, and in which her father became a ruling elder. Here she was brought up in "the nurture and admonition of the Lord," which developed in her that beautiful and symmetrical character which marked so distinctly the whole of her subsequent life. In 1825 her father died, and soon afterwards the family sold the farm and took residence in Cincinnati, where she was brought into association with Methodists, with whom she united in Church fellowship—a fellowship never disturbed till severed by death, and she "went from the Church below to the Church above."

On the 4th day of September, 1834, she was joined in holy wedlock with Rev. J. G. Bruce, then of the Ohio Conference, the ceremony being performed by the Rev. T. A. Morris, afterwards bishop. She entered upon her new relations with a modest distrust of self, but with a high resolve to do what she could to meet the just claims of the Church and of society upon a pastor's wife; and faithfully through life did she adhere to her purpose.

The Sabbath-school, the class and prayer meetings, the love-feast, the chambers of the sick and suffering were the seed-beds into which she cast the "incorruptible seed" from which were to be gathered tender plants to be reset ultimately in the garden of God. But it was in her own home especially, the center of her power, that those whom Providence had committed to her loving care rose up "to call her blessed." "The stranger within the gates did her reverence." MEMOIRS.

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Widely known in the Church, and intimately associated with the people of the several fields of labor to which her husband was assigned, she endeared herself to all by her "merk and quiet spirit," and a "thousand hearts throbbed with anguish when she died." Her last illness was an almost imperceptible waste of vital force, until weakness, more than pain, confined her to her room and bed, where for two weeks she slowly glided down to the river, which she reached in the light of early day, May 1, 1886, and passed over to rest in the shade beyond.

### MRS. ELIZA HARRISON.

MRS. ELIZA HARRISON, widow of the late I. F. Harrison, of this Conference, was born in Ohio, but came with her husband to Kentucky before the reorganization of the Kentucky Conference. Her husband was one of thirteen preachers who comprised the membership at its reorganization. She continued to be the devoted wife and faithful co-worker with her husband during the time of his itinerancy, which continued until his death, a few years since. She was subjected during these years to the many privations and sacrifices incident to the condition of the work then in this Conference. Some time since—we do not know when—she became an occupant of the Widow's Home on Walnut Hills, an endowed charitable institution, where she died, we think, before the session of our Conference at Covington last year. We can get no data on which to predicate statements definitely as to when she died, or what was her spiritual condition in her last hours; but, judging from her previous life and the bountiful grace of God through Jesus Christ, we believe she rests in peace and in the hope of the resurrection of the just.

### MRS. GERTRUDE RANKIN.


MRS. GERTRUDE RANKIN was born in Scott County, Ky., July 3, 1798. Her family name was Burgess. She embraced religion and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church in early life, and after her conversion, was married, February 21, 1820, to Thomas Rankin, who subsequently became Rev. Thomas Řankin, of the Kentucky Conference. She was a faithful co-worker with her husband through his long itinerant course, and survived him from October 11, 1881, until July 26, 1886. She had attained the great age of eighty-eight years and twenty-three days. Her remains rest by those of her husband in the cemetery of Williamstown, Grant County, Ky. She was the mother of nine children, and left behind her twenty-one grandchildren and twenty-eight great-grandchildren. Since her husband's death, she resided mostly with her son-in-law, Salathiel B. Fitch, and his wife, formerly Nancy Rankin. While she had health and vigor she was a true sharer of the burdens that fall to the lot of an itinerant's wife, took deep interest in her husband's work, and did all in her power to forward the cause of the Master. She also had the care of a very large family, and used her position to secure their personal salvation, some of whom preceded her, and all the survivors are following the steps of her own and her husband's faith. From the time of Father Rankin's death, her mind was most of the time impaired, especially her memory, but when aroused on the subject of religion it seemed clear, and she often spoke of being ready to go at the call of her Savior, and said she expected a happy meeting with her husband in heaven. For some time before death she could not speak, but just before the end came, she raised her hand, pointing it heavenward, then quietly shook hands with her daughter (Sister Fitch), and in two hours had gone home. She was very kindly cared for in her last years by her children, who, in ministering to her, did all in their power to lessen the burdens of extreme age, bodily weakness, and mental infirmities. May they all find the rest she and her husband H. C. NORTHCOTT. have gained.


