





GREENUP, KY., September 28, 1887.

THE SIXTY-FIRST SESSION OF THE KENTUCKY ANNUAL CONFERENCE of the Methodist Episcopal Church was begun in Greenup, Ky., September 28, 1887, at 9 o'clock. Bishop E. G. Andrews, D. D., LL. D., in the chair, read from Exodus, twelfth chapter, and Hebrews, ninth chapter. The 393d hymn was sung, and the Bishop led in prayer.

The sacrament of the Lord's-supper was administered.

On motion, the time of meeting was fixed at 8.30 A. M.; adjournment, 12 M.

On motion, the presiding elders were made a committee to nominate standing committees.

On motion, the printed Minutes was made the official Journal of the Conference.

On motion, it was ordered that the Statistical Secretaries and

Board of Conference Stewards see that Report No. II agrees with the Stewards' receipts for Conference claimants and Episcopal Fund, in order that this statistical report shall be the detailed report of the Board of Stewards.

Also, that Statistical Report No. I shall agree with the report of the Conference Treasurer, in the benevolent collections, and that these statistics shall be the detailed report of the Treasurer.

Bishop Andrews presented a statement that the Conference was authorized to draw on Chartered Fund for \$30, and on Book Concern for \$119; and on motion, it was ordered that the order be drawn for these amounts. Also, a communication from the Committee on General Conference Entertainment; referred to presiding elders. communications were handed to proper committees.

Doxology was sung, and benediction by R. H. Westervelt. Adjourned.

SECOND DAY.

SEPTEMBER 29, 1887.

Session opened at 8.30 A. M., Bishop Andrews in the chair. J. S. Taylor lead the devotional exercises.

D. Stevenson reported to the Conference touching the Barboursville school property, and, on motion, all papers relating to this school were referred to Committee on Education.

The Statistical Secretary read list of charges not reported and one wrongly reported.

On motion, E. L. Sanders and G. W. Barnett were appointed to examine candidates for local deacons' and elders' orders.

On motion, D. Stevenson was appointed to find amounts paid on J. D. Hearne's proposition for education.

On motion, the following brethren were appointed Committee on Conference Relations: J. R. Eads, S. K. Ramey, A. Boreing, J. S. Cox, J. M. Oliver, H. W. Bailey.

TWENTIETH QUESTION taken up, and Ashland was called, E. B. Hill, presiding elder; his character passed and he reported the district.

The character of J. R. Eads and G. R. Frenger, effective elders, passed.

Barboursville District—W. B. Barnett, presiding elder, was called, and his character passed. S. F. Agreeably to resolution adopted, the Doxology was sung.

On motion, the Conference approved the sale of the church in Danville, Ky.

Resolved, 1. That the preacher in charge of the Harrison Circuit, and the presiding elder of the Covington District, be directed to inquire into the advisability of entering Carlisle and Cynthiana, Kentucky, and, if possible, organize our Church in these places.

2. That in each district, the several pastors and the presiding elder consider the practicability of entering towns not hitherto occupied by us, and organize

our Church in them.

It was adopted unanimously.

Pending the above resolution, time was extended and the following was presented:

Resolved, 1. That Bishop Andrews be, and hereby is, requested to ask the General Missionary Committee, at its next session, to increase the missionary appropriation to Kentucky Conference by at least \$2,000.

2. That the same request of this Conference be sent to Dr. J. M. Trimble, member of the Missionary Committee from this district.

J. H. Bayliss, D. D., editor of the Western Christian Advocate, R. D. Morgan, of Ohio Conference, and T. G. Dickinson, Ohio, were introduced to the Conference.

On motion, the order of the day to-morrow, after finishing the Fifth Question, was made the election of delegates to General Conference.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION.

THE Board of Education of the Kentucky Conference met in Augusta, June 4, 1887. There were present at the meeting, J. G. Bruce, J. D. Walsh, J. R. Eads, D. Stevenson, G. W. Moneyhon, and S. G. Pollard.

Miss Ruth Ellis, Higginsport, O.; Ninna May Asbury, Germantown, Ky.; and Nannie D. Gault, Washington, Ky., were granted diplomas conferring the degree of Bachelor of Letters.

D. Stevenson, D. D., reported to the Board, stating that the enrollment of students the past year had been greater than that of either of the two past years, and the general condition of the school had been good. He then offered his resignation as principal of Augusta Collegiate Institute. A Committee was appointed to draft a series of resolutions upon his retirement, which subsequently reported as follows:

WHEREAS, The Rev. D. Stevenson, D. D., has tendered his resignation as

President of Augusta Collegiate Institute; and

WHEREAS, He has held the position of President of this Institute for five consecutive years under this Board, maintaining a school of high grade; and WHEREAS, The funds of the Board have been much increased by his personal

labors on this behalf; therefore,

Resolved, 1. That in accepting the resignation of Dr. Stevenson, we desire to record an expression of our appreciation of his arduous labors, both in maintaining a school of high grade for the Kentucky Conference, and awakening an increased interest among our people in our educational work in Kentucky.

Resolved, 2. That we hereby express, as from year to year we have before recorded, our satisfaction at the painstaking thoroughness of the instruction given by Dr. Stevenson and his assistants.

J. D. Walsh, J. D. Hearne, and S. G. Pollard were appointed a Committee, with full power to act for the Board with regard to the Presidency of the

Institute.

A subsequent meeting of the Board was held in Greenup, Ky., October 1, 1887, at which the Treasurer, J. D. Hearne, submitted his report. (See Report.)

A motion prevailed, appointing D. Stevenson, D. D., Educational Agent for the Board, allowing him twenty-five per cent on the first thousand dollars collected, twenty per cent on the second, fifteen per cent on the third, and ten per cent on all thereafter.

J. D. Walsh and J. H. Tinsley were recommended for election to the Fifth

Class.

J. G. Bruce stated he had appointed L. W. Owens principal of Ayers Acad-

emy, which action the Board approved.

It was further moved that D. Stevenson be authorized to bid for the right of redemption of the school property at Barboursville, known as Union College, with the view of purchasing said property for the Board, he not giving more than one hundred dollars for said right of redemption.

The following was also adopted:

Resolved, That in the event the right of redemption of Union College, at Barboursville, is bid off to Dr. Stevenson, as the agent of the Board, the Treasurer, J. D. Hearne be, and he is hereby, instructed to sell the bank stock belonging to the Board, and apply the proceeds of the same towards the purchase of said property.

Resolved, That in the event of the purchase by the Board of said Union College, whatever arrangements or plans for conducting the school therein for the present

year, be approved, or continued to the close of the school year.

No further business, the Board adjourned.

STANDING COMMITTEES.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

Your Committee on Education would submit the following report: The subject of education is one of vast moment. It is not only, as the great statesman Burke has so wisely said, "the cheap defense of nations," but the primary condition of national development. The school must be built as well as the Church. It becomes the duty of each citizen to champion the cause which has to do with the culture and elevation of society. Different nations in the past periods of the world's history have had their ideals of civilization and manhood. With some the cultivation of the physical nature was considered supreme, and under such instruction the nations made better fighters than men. Some of them chose the intellectual as their ideal, and lost sight of the moral and physical. made intellectual giants, but moral pigmies. Christianity proposes to draw out and cultivate the faculties and powers of the whole man.

Jesus Christ is the teacher of men, and we should value the fact that our educational institutions are under the direction of pure Christian minds. These schools should be multiplied in our country, and especially in our Church.

The real need of better educational schools in our Conference is mani-We can not expect permanence in our work without the light of superior Christian schools. Educated men under God were the founders of our glorious Methodism, and the Church has always been a devoted patron of higher education. While we have, and do receive, men to our ministry who have not the highest culture, it is well understood that our standard is high.

We do not speak for the common schools of Kentucky, which so much require immediate attention, but we do earnestly urge that this Conference realize the fact that it is under a serious responsibility to provide education for the people who come to our communion and to our ministry.

The Augusta College property having been surrendered, we now have but one institution of learning under the supervision of our Conference Board of Education, and that is AYERS ACADEMY, which does not meet the demands of our Church in the State, although it had a fair attendance of students during the past scholastic year, and has a reasonable outlook for the future. It should receive a liberal patronage from the people where it is located.

The theological seminaries of our Church are in a flourishing condition. Boston, Drew, Evanston, and DePauw were never more popular than now. No young man should be satisfied with his preparation for the Christian ministry without adding to his academic or college course the finish of one of these valuable schools.

Your Committee would submit the following resolution:

Resolved, That we will preach on the subject of education, and make a special effort to increase the Educational Fund of the Conference.

We would also submit the two resolutions adopted last year:

1. "That each presiding elder be requested to call an educational meeting in his district within the first six months of the coming Conference year, or else to give special attention to the subject of education at the first District Conference of his district."

2. "That at the next session of this Conference the first night of the session be devoted to the subject of education, under the management of the Board of Education of this Conference, and for the benefit of the Ed-

ucational Fund.

Further, we would recommend the appointment of Rev. J. R. Eads as president of Ashland Collegiate Institute.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

THE Committee on Temperance submit the following report:

We regard the traffic in intoxicants as the greatest evil of this age, damaging to man in the extreme in all the relations of life-in his phys-

ical person, in his mental, social, and moral life.

But, as being more especially in our line, we desire to emphasize the fact that it is the one powerful and uncompromising enemy of the home and the Church. We believe that Satan would rather yield his grip upon every other form of wickedness combined than to give up the liquor-traffic. And we need not be surprised that the first real genuine effort at its suppression—namely, legal prohibition—arouses all pandemonium, and causes the powers of darkness to marshal their forces under the black banner, with the motto, "War to the knife, and the knife to the hilt." Let us not be deceived. "To resist such a foe successfully will require our mightiest efforts.'

We feel that we can not do better than to reaffirm our convictions expressed in the very carefully prepared platform of principles adopted by

this Conference last year, namely:

"I. Believing that the constitutional prohibition of the liquor-traffic is the real and only goal that Christians ought to aim at, and that will suffice to wipe out this awful stain on the face of our nation, we would, therefore, urge the preachers of the Conference to keep this always before the people.

"II. We affirm our belief that tax laws or license, as a means of legis-

lation against the liquor-traffic, is productive of no good results, but rather a source of great evil, because it stamps with the sanction and approval

of the State this wicked traffic.

"III. Believing that the temperance cause will be greatly promoted by the dissemination of scientific knowledge respecting the deleterious effects of alcohol upon the human system, we respectfully urge the Legislature to pass a law requiring that instruction on that subject be given in the public schools of the State.'

"IV. That whenever genuine prohibition of the liquor-traffic can be secured to any extent by local option laws, without involving us in the support of license or taxation, we will accept such laws as a step toward the

goal we seek, and co-operate in securing and enforcing such laws.
"V. And finally we obligate ourselves, as a Conference, that, in the spirit of that wisdom and charity which the Gospel enjoins, we will urge our people to stand religiously with us on this platform of Christian independence in aggressive warfare upon the nefarious liquor-traffic."

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY-SCHOOLS AND TRACTS.

THE Sabbath-school is the Christian wonder of the modern world. It is impressing the rising generation and bringing it under the transforming light of God's Word as no other instrumentality is doing. Its past achievements only faintly reveal its future potentiality. The simple facts of its work in our own midst demonstrate that it deserves universal en-

couragement and support. The Sabbath-schools of the Kentucky Conference poured \$958.25 into the treasury of missions in the last year, which is three-fifths of the amount paid by the Church for the same purpose.

The membership of our Sabbath-schools is 9,910, over one-half that of our Church in Kentucky. The number of conversions in the last year was 580. But many children in Kentucky need to be turned from the desecration of God's Holy Day to the benediction of the Sabbath-schools.

We recommend a larger attendance of parents and adults, that there may be more reserve force for teachers, and that the schools may enjoy

the cheering presence of the heads of families.

The efficiency of tracts will last as long as the printed page is a vehicle of the truth to the heart of man. We suggest increased activity in this department, and that our preachers apply to the Tract Society for a return in tracts of one-third the joint collection of the Sunday-school Union W. H. CHILDERS, Chairman. and the Tract Society. W. G. Bradford, Secretary.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FREEDMEN'S AID SOCIETY.

THE Committee appointed in behalf of the Freedmen's Aid Society. after due consideration of the subject, reaffirm, in the name of the Conference, our indorsement of, and heartily pledge ourselves to work in harmony with, the policy of the Parent Society; and, as members of the Kentucky Conference, will put forth every reasonable effort to secure in full the amount required of us for the ensuing year.


