### FIRST DAY.

THE SIXTY-FOURTH SESSION OF THE KENTUCKY ANNUAL CON-FERENCE of the Methodist Episcopal Church convened in Barboursville, Ky., October 9, 1890, at 9 A. M.

No Bishop was present. The Secretary of the last session called the Conference to order, and read a telegram from Bishop Mallalieu, stating that he was delayed by a wreck on the railway.

The Conference proceeded to elect a President by ballot. Shepard was elected on the third ballot.

The Chairman read the seventy-second Psalm and third chapter of Colossians, the two hundred and forty-first hymn was sung, and prayer by J. R. Eads, and the sacrament was administered by D. Stevenson, F. Grider, I. Crook, R. D. Lashbrook, C. W. Sutton, H. W. Bailey.

On motion of Thos. Hanford, the Conference ordered the election of Secretary by ballot. J. D. Walsh was elected, and given the privilege of nominating assistants.

S. G. Pollard was elected Assistant; J. S. Young was elected Second Assistant. Thomas Hanford was elected Recording Secretary.

T. F. Garrett was elected Statistical Secretary; C. S. Markin and F. D. T. Bickley assistants.

W. F. Maltbie was elected Conference Treasurer, and John G. Dover and M. G. McNeely, assistants.

On motion, the presiding elders and one from each district were made a committee to nominate standing committees, and G. R. Frenger was elected to act in place of E. L. Shepard; and S. K. Ramey, F. P. Fitzgerald, J. S. Miller were appointed.

D. Stevenson called attention to an error in the published Minutes of 1889, and on motion it was ordered to correct on page 4, Minutes 1889, by entering the names of J. G. Bruce, S. G. Pollard, J. D. Walsh, J. S. Taylor, D. Stevenson and J. R. Eads as Conference Trustees instead of the names published.

On motion, the bar of the Conference was fixed to include six seats from the front.

The time of meeting was made 8.30 o'clock, and adjournment at noon, solar time—the first half hour to be prayer-meeting.

On motion, time was extended.

J. W. Zimmerman was appointed reporter for Western Christian Advocate.

An exhibit of the Book Concern was presented by the President, and handed to the Committee on Book Concern.

Announcements were made, Doxology sung, and benediction by E. B. Hill. Adjourned.

### SECOND DAY.

BARBOURSVILLE, October 10, 1890.

Conference opened at 8.30 A. M. Bishop Willard F. Mallalieu in the chair. The Bishop led the prayer-meeting.

At nine o'clock, D. Stevenson led in prayer, and the Minutes of previous session were read and approved.

On motion, J. M. Oliver was made a Committee on Gospel in All Lands.

Bishop Mallalieu presented papers to the several committees.

On motion, the Board of Stewards was made a Committee on Episcopal Fund, also on the Preachers' Relief Association.

The Bishop announced that the Conference could draw upon Book Concern for \$598, and Chartered Fund for \$30. On motion, drafts were ordered.

On motion of Secretary, the printed Minutes was made the Official Journal of the Conference.

On motion, the Board of Stewards were instructed to assist the Statistical Secretary in making up Statistics No. II, and the Conference Treasurer to fill the benevolent columns in Statistics No. I, for the Secretary, and these statistics, duly signed, to be the detailed reports of the Board of Stewards and Treasurer respectively.

TWENTIETH QUESTION.—"Who are the Effective Elders?"

Louisville District—E. L. Shepard, presiding elder, was called, his character passed, and he reported the district. The following effective elders were called, and the character of each was passed, and he reported his missionary collection: D. F. Kerr, W. E. Cook, I. Crook, J. D. Walsh, R. D. Lashbrook, J. K. Creighton (transferred), G. P. Jeffries (absent), M. G. McNeely.

The following brethren were introduced: Rev. W. W. Carhart, of Central Pennsylvania Conference, and President of Bremen Institute; and S. A. Day, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

EIGHTEENTH QUESTION—" Who are Supernumerary?" J. W. Zimmerman, continued; L. B. Piersal was made effective; G. M. Clarke, deceased; M. L. Centers was made effective; A. M. Abbott.

NINETEENTH QUESTION—" Who are Superannuated?" J. S. Taylor, A. B. Colledge, Wm. Wyatt (deceased), A. R. Crislip, E. A. Davis, E. D. Elliott, J. G. Bruce, J. H. Lennin, J. C. Gill, J. M. Cook.

J. G. Bruce addressed the Conference, and D. Stevenson presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That we rejoice that God has spared the life of our dear brother, John G. Bruce, to meet with us in Conference session once again—a man of

abundant labors, of noble courage, of natural leadership, of mingled poetry and strength, and of unblemished character, ripening beautifully and gracefully for his ascent to heaven.

Which was adopted, and he was invited to a seat on the platform.

On motion of A. Boreing, H. C. Northcott was made superannuate, with claim, and Jedediah Foster was made superannuate.

On motion of D. Stevenson, C. H. Williamson, and W. G. Bradford, the following, amended to six, was adopted:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Conference that the work of the Conference ought to be embraced in five, instead of four, districts, and we respectfully request Bishop Mallalieu to arrange the work accordingly.

Thomas McNamara was granted a location at his own request.

E. L. Shepard presented the interest of Bremen Institute, and Professor Carhart was permitted to address the Conference.

On motion, the matter was referred to Committee on Education.

Assistant Secretary J. S. Young was appointed to collect moneys for publishing Minutes.

On motion, the order of the day for Saturday, at ten A. M., was the consideration of change of Discipline, par. 63.

On motion, J. W. Zimmerman was elected to examine the class of the fourth year on Butler and Harmon, in place of J. D. Walsh, excused, and J. S. Taylor to assist in examining local preachers for deacons' and elders' orders, in place of Henry Tuckley, excused.

Announcements were made, Doxology sung, J. G. Bruce pronounced the benediction, and Conference adjourned.

### THIRD DAY.

BARBOURSVILLE, October 11, 1890.

- 8.30 A. M.—Bishop Mallalieu in the chair. Prayer-meeting led by W. A. Robinson.
- 9 A. M.—Henry Tuckley led in prayer. Minutes of previous session read and approved. Roll of those absent at first session called.
- D. Stevenson reported the situation at Middlesborough, and the work done there. Amos Shinkle spoke on behalf of Church Extension, and said if the Churches will give \$1,000 this year he will give another \$1,000, and the Parent Board will use it all in Kentucky; and if the Parent Board will give \$2,000, he will add \$2,000 more, making \$6,000.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That our people observe the first Sabbath after the National Thanksgiving in 1890 as a day of prayer to God for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on our Church in Kentucky, and that on that day the collection for Church Extension be taken.

On motion of E. L. Shepard, a vote of thanks was given to Amos Shinkle for his generous offer to aid in Church extension in Kentucky.

Tenth Question—"What Local Preachers were elected to Local Deacon's Orders?"

Marcus M. Roundtree, recommended by Ashland District Conference, and William M. Brown, recommended by Lexington District Conference, were reported by Examining Committee, and, on motion, they were given another year to make up course of study.

D. Stevenson presented a resolution, which was adopted. (See Resolutions, page 46.)

On motion, the order of the day was taken up. A communication from the Board of Bishops was read, touching the change on Lay Representation, and a rising vote was called for. Fifty (50) voted in the affirmative, and none in the negative.

Statistical Secretary and assistants given leave to retire to work on reports.

Tenth Question—"What Local Deacons elected to Elder's Orders?" Wm. M. Brown was called; Committee reported, and, on motion, he was given a year to make up his studies.

TWELFTH QUESTION—"Who are the Traveling Deacons of the First Class?" Committee and presiding elders reported, and the following were advanced to second class: Charles S. Markin, J. M. Sturgill, W. H. Crain, J. S. Young, T. J. Anthony, Charles S. Smith, John R. Howes, Jasper Fields.

FOURTEENTH QUESTION—"What Traveling Deacons have been elected Elders?" The Committee and presiding elders reported, and the following were elected to elders' orders: Wm. H. Calvert, Lewis P. Hanks, Jos. S. Miller, John Thomas, Harvey D. Burnett, Alfred M. Abbott.

Dr. Hurlbut, Corresponding Secretary Sunday-school Union and Tract Society, was introduced, and addressed the Conference on the subject of Sunday-school Union and Tracts.

SECOND QUESTION—"Who remain on Trial?" was asked. The Committee and presiding elders reported: Wm. T. Stafford, left

without appointment to attend school, and continued in first year; Chas. Atchisson, continued; W. C. Benson, continued; Edward H. Bullock, continued in first year; Wm. R. Hunt, continued; J. H. Hayes, continued.

Third Question—"Who are admitted into Full Connection?" Abram Whitworth was discontinued at his own request. W. C. Judd was continued in the first year's course of study. Lafayette Davis was continued in second year's course. N. C. Lamb was absent, and continued in second year's course, and the following were received into full connection, and elected to deacons' orders after the Examining Committee and presiding elders reported them, and the Bishop propounded the Disciplinary questions, and Dr. Hurlbut led in prayer: Nathaniel G. Grizzle, John Cheap, Thos. Perkins (already a deacon), Jas. M. Taulbee (already a deacon), R. D. Biven, Wm. Jones, Wm. H. Spybey (left without appointment to attend school), John. B. Perryman (already a deacon), Thos. G. Cocks, Thos. H. Conrey.

Doxology, and benediction by Dr. Hurlbut.

### FOURTH DAY—FIRST SESSION.

BARBOURSVILLE, October 13, 1890.

- 8.30 A. M.—Conference opened. W. A. Robinson conducted prayer-meeting.
- 9 A. M.—Bishop Mallalieu in the chair. W. W. Carhart and Dr. Spencer led in prayer. Minutes of previous session read and approved.
  - H. W. Bailey, of Alabama Conference, was introduced.
- Dr. Spencer, Assistant Secretary of Church Extension Society, addressed the Conference on the subject of Church Extension.

Committee on Church Extension made a report through I. Crook, Chairman, which was adopted. (See Report.)

Conference Treasurer and assistants granted leave to retire.

The Board of Education presented a report through the Secretary, S. G. Pollard. The report was adopted.

Committee on Periodicals and Literature made a report by F. D. T. Bickley, Secretary, which was adopted.

Also Committee on Tracts and Committee on Sunday-schools.

Hearne, showing that during the year he had received from Mrs. Fanny Speed fifteen hundred dollars as an additional contribution from her to the Educational Fund, the interest of which is to be used in aid of Union College, and had paid the same over to the Treasurer for investment.

## STANDING COMMITTEES.

#### ON EDUCATION.

Education being an essential element in religion, we, as a Church, are bound, in faithfulness to God, to give it great attention; and as our schools are the chief means by which education is promoted, it is to them that much of our care must be given. In this Conference we can hardly overrate their importance in regard to the general intelligence of our people, and more especially the cultivation of those who become candidates for the ministry. Our Conference schools are not only an expression of our educational desire, but, to some extent, also of our educational ability.

We have two schools under the control of the Conference Board of Education-Union College, Barboursville, under the presidency of Rev. Daniel Stevenson, D. D., and Ashland Collegiate Institute, with Rev. J. R.

Eads, A. M., as principal.

Union College has an excellent building, worth about \$10,000, and capable of accommodating a very large school. This year it has an endowment of \$3,000, by Mrs. Fanny Speed, of Louisville, which renders much efficiency to its management. The college is entirely free from debt, and conducted on a safe basis. Its success seems to be assured. It is well located, being in the midst of a rich and progressive part of Southeastern Kentucky. Barboursville has promise of becoming a large and prosperous city.

We call special attention to the Theological Department of Union Col-The endowment referred to is for the more special purpose of helping students for the ministry. Young preachers who wish to enter this Conference are hereby informed of this fact, and are earnestly recommended to avail themselves of the opportunity. Dr. Stevenson is by scholarship and

experience well fitted for this very important work.

Ashland Collegiate Institute is also a good property, and well situated. This school is in the northeast part of the State, and is easily accessible to all parts of the Big Sandy Valley, and more especially to the people of Ashland, Catlettsburg, and their vicinities. By the original gifts of Rev. R. D. Calahan, and contributions by other citizens of Ashland, we have here a school property valued at over \$12,000, on which there is a debt of over \$2,340, which ought speedily to be liquidated. Professor Eads is an The friends of experienced educator, and has able assistants in his school. education will do well to send some of their help in this direction.

Perryman College is located at Bremen, Ky., in the western part of the State, and is under a Board of Local Trustees, who hold the property for the Methodist Episcopal Church. #### ON SUNDAY-SCHOOLS.

THERE is certainly no one other institution in the Church equaling the Sunday-school as an agency for instruction in the "Word of Life," and for the growth of the Church. It has most appropriately been called the nursery of the Church, and should be most carefully guarded and

We wish to most strongly deprecate a growing tendency in some places of divorcing the Sunday-school from the Church, and most earnestly exhort our brethren to stem this drift, and to lay their hands most decidedly upon the lever of power, and retain still this God-sanctioned institution for the building up of the Church and the advancement of religious instruction and enthusiasm.

We regard the salvation of the children as the all-important part of the Sunday-school work, and we urge the carrying out of the spirit of the Discipline concerning the classes for religious instruction, and sincerely believe that grander results would obtain were more earnest and devout attention awakened in this regard, both among the preachers and the officers of the schools.

Two days now come before us for special recognition—namely, Children's day and Glad-tidings Day—and we recommend that both of these days may be given their proper recognition and a fair trial, and that their funds may be devoted to their special purposes and forwarded to the And we pledge ourselves to do our best to fully set forth proper treasurer. their importance to the people.

The Sunday-school being one of the most important factors in building up the Church and training children for usefulness here and in heaven hereafter, therefore let us for this year determine:

1. That there shall be more and better instruction in the doctrines of

Methodism in our schools.

2. That Methodistic literature shall be used in all our schools in preference to every other competing agency.

3. That it shall be provided that the Catechism shall be more exten-

sively taught in every school.

4. That the highest possible standard of benevolence shall be attained in each school, not only as missionary societies in name, but also as working societies.

5. That instead of the general review of the lessons at the end of each quarter we will use the Temperance lesson provided for that day in our Lesson Leaves. F. D. T. BICKLEY, Chairman.

3. That the use of tracts shall be adopted in the calls for our benevolent enterprises.

4. That Glad-tidings Day shall be observed, as far as possible, on all our charges, as advised by the Sunday-school Union and Tract Society, and that the young people of our Churches be enlisted in its interest.

We earnestly recommend all our people not to be partakers, in any form whatever, of these iniquities, and to "avoid the very appearance of evil" by setting their faces as a flint against all this brood of evils, and to so deport themselves that it may be apparent to all that they do not even sympathize with any social or business custom which tends in the least to W. #### ON TEMPERANCE.

YOUR Committee feel that no more timely or forcible attitude and action can be taken on this most important subject than that of our General Conference, found in our Discipline. To this we pledge our fidelity. The liquor oligarchy is the Nero of the hour, and is to be fought by moral suasion, by legal suasion, and by every lawful means which we can command. We believe the triumph of temperance demands that the liquor power be pulverized, and this requires the destruction of the saloon system as a public resort, and the drinking of liquor as a private resort at the home.

We also recommend to all our people to use only unfermented wine in the sacrament of the Lord's Supper, that no person with a slumbering appetite may be tempted in the very act of vowing faithfulness to Jesus; and we urge, also, that the sin of drunkenness and dram-drinking be faithfully preached against, and its insidious encroachments so pointed out in public and in private that our children and young people may be led to see that there is about as much hope of getting rid of the leprosy as of the appetite for strong drink, when once it is formed, and that, therefore, the only safety is in total abstinence. A sure way to break up the drink system is to stop the drinking.

We rejoice that the Legislature has passed an act requiring the use of a text-book in the public schools, showing the physiological effets of alco-W. A. Robinson, W. H. Spybey, hol upon the system.

We bespeak for it a wide circulation among our young people, and urge that we, as pastors, do our utmost to place a copy of it in the hands of every young person of our Church. We wish, also, to express the great pleasure we have experienced in the visit and addresses of Rev. Dr. Hurlbut and Rev. M. D. Carrel; and we congratulate the Conference upon the appointment by the League Convention of the Fifth General Conference District of Rev. C. H. Williamson as our Conference Secretary of the League. #### ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

1. We are convinced that once more Kentucky has become a pivotal State in the great moral conflicts going on in our country. The Methodist Episcopal Church, in her advancement, has turned the flank in Virginia and Missouri; while the influences peculiarly adverse to us, and standing between the great body of our Church in the North and the far South, are chiefly in this State.

2. There are urgent reasons for our pressing into the regions needing the gospel of peace, and to extend our lines so as to successfully contend with the sharp rivalry of less envangelical Churches. We feel sure of our call to "spread Scriptural holiness over these lands," and our God hath

sounded forth a trumpet which shall never call retreat.

3. Already we are largely in the rural districts, which is not a mistake but a real advantage in occupying any country; but by reason of a new commercial life, seen in new and large enterprises, and the consequent influx of people from other States, the time is at hand to enter the centers of population in both the older and newer towns and cities.

- 4. And because the meager support given the great majority of our preachers is inadequate to meet the ordinary necessities of life, even when supplemented with the present assistance afforded by the Missionary Committee, and because of this fact it is exceedingly difficult to man the work with the kind of men which the emergency of the hour demands; therefore,
- 1. Resolved, In view of this phenomenal condition of affairs, the present missionary appropriation does not adequately meet the necessities of the case.
- 2. Resolved, That for the sake of the cause of the Master, and of the needy men in the field, and of those who should be in the field, we memorialize the General Missionary Committee to appropriate to this Conference seven thousand dollars, as the minimum amount which will meet its present needs.

#### REV. G. M. CLARKE.

REV. G. M. CLARKE was a native of England. Few of the facts of his early history are known to us, even those relating to his Christian life and experience. He seems to have been converted in youth, and moved by the Holy Spirit to the work of the ministry. For this he became a student,

and graduated from a college in London.

He came to America under an engagement to preach for the Congregationalists, but after a year's service came into the Methodist Episcopal Church, and joined the Kentucky Conference. It soon became apparent that he was a man of more than ordinary ability as a scholar, thinker, and preacher, and with some he formed warm and lasting friendship. He preached for some time on the Mt. Olivet Circuit, one year at Bellevue, one at Dayton, and two at Sardis and Murphysville. Before his appointment to the last mentioned charge his health had begun to fail, but it was hoped that removal from the low grounds of the Ohio River might be the means of his complete recovery. In this both himself and friends were too sanguine. His strength gradually declined, and his ability to preach was almost entirely destroyed. This was to him a very sore trial, for he was ambitious to preach and tenacious of life. When it was apparent to almost every one that he must soon die, he buoyed himself up with the hope of recovery. Not in any degree realizing this in America, he was seized with an intense desire to return to his native land. To this God opened up the way, but it was not that he might get well, but there find a grave. We can not think that anything but the hope of recovery led him hence, since he left behind a faithful and loving wife and a child, only a babe. In England he had an aged mother, who lived in the north; but delicate health retained him in the Isle of Wight and London, where he died, far from kindred and from many of his best friends. Stricken down in the very heyday of life, he needed much grace and trust in God to be reconciled to his will. He did not always do what his friends wished him, but he undoubtedly did what he thought best and right. As an opponent, he was persistent and severe, but as a friend he was faithful and true. The last communications received from him were to the Rev. Amon Boreing, his presiding elder, and they reveal a tenderness of soul that melted other hearts, a resignation that was heroic, and a trust that was without misgiving. If before there had been dark clouds in the sky, the evening sunset was golden and glorious, and as we mourn over his early grave, the stars of a blessed hope shine out from the sky of his tribulation. Had Brother Clarke lived he would have been an ornament to this Conference, but having passed to the roll-call of the general assembly that is without fault before the throne of God, we must think of him as one of them, and lovingly cherish his memory. He came to us with all the dew of youth upon him, and he has left us only to be with Christ. "The Lord gave, and the Lord hath taken away, and blessed be the name of the Lord." J. W. ZIMMERMAN.

#### REV. WILLIAM WYATT.

REV. WILLIAM WYATT was born in North Carolina, March 16, 1814, and died near Berea, in Madison County, Ky., March 22, 1890. He was converted in 1833, and was licensed to preach in the same year. He was

ordained deacon in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, at Asheville, N. C. He was ordained elder at Newport, Ky., by Bishop Davis W. Clark, March 1, 1868. Brother Wyatt was a minister of the olden type—a vigorous Methodist, holding tenaciously to our doctrines and usages. He was a man of deep spiritual experience, and the intense longing of his soul was the salvation of sinners and the sanctification of believers. On nearly all of his charges he witnessed gracious revivals, and many souls were brought to Christ through his instrumentality.

At the Conference of 1878 he retired from the active work of the ministry, and lived a quiet Christian life at his home in Clay County, Ky., until his death. His illness was brief. Stricken with brain trouble, he lingered but a short time; and though he does not answer the roll-call on earth, he has been transplanted to the Church triumphant.

#### OUR LAYMAN.—AMOS SHINKLE.

It is very gratifying to be able to present, with the Minutes of Kentucky Conference this year, an excellent likeness of Brother Amos Shiukle, whose noble generosity has made his name familiar, not only throughout

Kentucky, but in all the broad field of Methodism.

Brother Shinkle has been a regular attendant at our Conference sessions for more than twenty years. He has served on the Board of Stewards; and it was in this service that he first became acquainted with the needs of our superannuates, widows, and orphans, and the inadequate provision made for their claims. When he saw this, his heart conceived the noble purpose of supplying this want, not for a few years merely, but for all time to come. Brother Shinkle requested the Conference to organize a "Preachers' Relief Society," which was done in 1879. The first subscriptions for this Society were taken at Somerset that year. The first dividends for Conference Claimants were \$59.57 in September, 1880. This has grown to \$1,055 distributed in 1890.

The present value of invested funds is over eighteen thousand dollars, and growing faster than ever, over two-thirds of which is from Brother Shinkle's personal contributions. When the above is stated, "the half has not been told;" for has he not discovered the needs of the effective ministers also, who come up from year to year from the hard circuits? No figures can tell of this, for the "left hand is not permitted to know." More than this: he has aided in building churches all over the State of Kentucky, and, in not a few cases, has attended the dedication service where it cost him thousands. Nor yet is this all. Kentucky can not bound Brother Shinkle's liberality. He is a "fruitful bough by a well, whose branches run over the wall." Churches and preachers in the regions beyond could bear witness to this. The Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education Society has for many years been the recipient of the wisdom of his counsel and the help of his hand.

Brother Shinkle enjoys attending the Conference sessions, and the ministers have come to regard him as a full member—one of them. 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
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
