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PREFACE.

THE following course in Bible-marking was pursued, during its first appearance in *The Christian Endeavor World*, by more than three thousand registered "Bible Marksmen." Among these were many busy pastors, some of whom could find time for this work only by rising in the small hours of the morning. Many others were earnest Sunday-school teachers, whose classes were enthusiastic over this practical method of gaining familiarity with the Book of Books. The superintendents of Junior Christian Endeavor societies found the course well within the understanding of their young charges. In fact, the ages of those following the course ranged, so far as is known, from five to eighty-six.

Mothers marked Bibles for their sons to use when they should be able to read. Classes were formed in homes. Other classes, led by pastors, were formed in Christian Endeavor societies. The Y. M. C. A., the Epworth League, and other organizations, found it useful to some of their members. The plan was utilized in family prayers. Some enthusiasts copied the entire course for others that could not take the paper. One missionary even proposes to translate the course into Chinese! Moreover, Marksmen reported themselves from many distant regions of the earth—from South Africa, Canada, Japan. Mexico, Turkey, England, Jamaica, Cuba, China, New Zealand, and even a class of twenty-two in Palestine, nearly all of whom did their marking in Arabic Bibles.

Since the course has met with such a reception, it has been thought likely that many may wish to have it in permanent form, more especially as, so far as the author knows, no system of Biblemarking, at the same time simple and comprehensive, has ever before been printed.

It is believed that familiarity with this method will give great facility not only in marking the Bible, but in using it after it is marked. Fifteen minutes will easily suffice to accomplish the work here laid down for any day, and is not that small fraction of time well bestowed if it will acquaint us with a great Bible truth, and place it where our hands can readily find it if our memory at any time proves treacherous?

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THE BIBLE MARKSMAN.

DIRECTIONS FOR BIBLE-MARKING.

This course in Bible-marking has been made as simple as possible. The simpler the method, the clearer it is, and the more likely it is to be followed throughout life. The materials should be readily accessible, and therefore we shall dispense with colored inks, carefully ruled lines, and elaborate symbols. We shall use black ink and an ordinary pen.

It is not well to underscore, except for emphasis, of which underscoring is the natural sign. The place for Bible-marking is the margin, where the marks are most easily seen, and where they will not confuse the eye.

The most obvious symbols for Bible-marking are letters, and those we shall use in this course. The chief topics will be represented by single letters,—"F" for faith, and so on. The less important topics under each letter will be represented by two letters,—"Fg" for forgiveness, etc. The second letter is to come from the accented syllable of the word, if possible.

One great subject is chosen for each week. Thus in the course of the year all the important topics of the Bible, and most of the less important teachings, are systematically covered and mapped out. At the close of the year the system may, of course, be extended to other topics.

Scarcely any subject can be exhaustively considered; this is especially true of the supreme subjects with which the course opens. Only the principal texts can be given, with the expectation that later reading will add others.

The theme for each week is divided into seven sub-topics, illustrated by the chief passages that bear on the subject. These are numbered,—(F1, F2, F3, etc.,)—and each is carried on by a list of texts running through the Bible. It is the expectation that the careful reading and meditation will be spent only upon the first passage for each day, the remaining passages being read less carefully and marked as they are read.

To prepare your Bible for marking, first number the pages of the New Testament consecutively with those of the Old, if they are not so numbered already, and insert in the back of the book several pages of firm, thin paper. Upon these pages will be written, in order, the week's subject and subtopics, with the seven initial texts for each week, or, if preferred, the page on which each is found. These will guide you at any time to the beginnings of the seven chains of texts under each topic. Taking as an example the first sub-topic of the first week, "God is almighty," turn to its reference, Isa. 40: 12-26, and write "G1" in the margin. The first text to be linked with it in the chain is 1 Chron. 29:11, 12, which (in my Bible) is on page I therefore place 448 below G1, thus: ^{G1}₄₄₈, 448. Turning now to 1 Chron. 29: 11, 12, write G1 in the margin; see that the next text, Job 38:4, is on page 553, and complete the sign opposite 1 Chron. 29:11, 12, making it ^{G1}₅₅₃ Thus proceed, taking each day a fresh start on a new chain. The last text of each day's chain will be marked simply "G1," or whatever the symbol may be, and later reading may lengthen the chain from this point.

Of course, if a verse is upon two different subjects, it will come to have two marks in the margin. If the entire chapter is on one subject, you can write the symbol opposite the chapter title. To indicate that more than one verse is included, draw a vertical line in the margin from the first to the last, or repeat the symbol, making the reference to the next text only with the last verse. It is still better, probably, to include the whole in a symbol opposite the first verse. Thus, if you want to indicate under J2 the reference, 2 Cor. 3:8, 13–15, write "J2" opposite 2 Cor. 3:8, add beneath it "vs. 13–15" or simply "13–15," and beneath that the next page number.

Some prefer to link the last text of each subtopic to the leading text of the next sub-topic. joining the last text of all to the first for the week, thus binding the chain together. Some place the *last* page above each symbol as well as the *next* page below it, thus being able to read either forward or backward. Some write the subtopic number as an exponent, thus: Fg2. Some indicate the leading texts by circles around their symbols. Some find it more convenient to begin marking at the end of each chain, thus working forward. Some do the marking for the entire week on one day, that for the rest of the week they may use these markings in reading and meditation. Some prefer an indelible pencil to ink. Some write the leading texts in a notebook instead of the backs of their Bibles, leaving space each week for original comments. Many variations such as these have been brought to my attention; and, indeed, the plan is so simple as to lend itself easily to whatever modifications the taste or circumstances of the Bible-reader may suggest.

I desire to urge upon all beginners in Biblemarking the purchase of a Revised Bible, with good type, firm paper, and large margins.

HINTS ON BIBLE STUDY.

THIS is called an age of Bible-study, and I will

grant that it does shine conspicuous in that regard over all ages that have gone before. And yet—and yet—!

Now I am not a pessimist. But take the first Christian you come across—some regular Sundayschool scholar, say; or—take yourself. You think you are a great Bible-reader. Try it by such a test as you would give your newspaper.

"At what price did Brown and Jones offer sheeting in their advertisement?" "What page had the notice of Professor Seaver's lecture?" "What did the President say in his message?" "What was that scandal the reporter told about?—that scandal of the Thompsons, you know." Such questions as these we ask each other about our newspapers that we have read only once. And we usually get an answer.

"In what chapter and book is the saying, 'I am the light of the world'?" "Where shall I go to find out about Gideon?" "By what name did Christ most often speak of Himself?" "What is the first event mentioned in the New Testament?" "Which is the oldest book of the Bible?" Surely such questions as these ought not to trouble a regular Bible-reader, since such questions as I gave first would not trouble a hasty newspaperreader. But just try them, and see what the result will be. I once put into the form of an acrostic five tests of wise Bible-reading. It must be

> Biblical, Independent, Benevolent, Long, Every day.

1. Your Bible-reading must be biblical. That is, you must put the Bible first. You must not read your commentary, or your Bible history, or any other book about the Bible, and think you are reading the Bible. These are all needed, but try the plan also of letting the Bible be its own commentary. When you have exhausted *its* resources, go to other books, and not till then. You will be astonished to see what depth and fulness this plan will give to your Bible knowledge.

2. Your Bible - reading must be independent. Don't go to the Bible with your head filled with other people's theories of what the Bible says; find out what it says for yourself. Don't go to it with the feeling that you *must* get from it certain doctrines. See for yourself whether those doctrines are there. No man is well indoctrinated until he has indoctrinated himself. I would not have you despise guides to Bible study,—that would be foolish. But go as far as you can by yourself. Use the methods you find most helpful. Take the order you find most convenient. It is *your* brain that is to receive; therefore it, and not the brain of another, is the judge of the way it can best follow.

3. Most Bible-study that fails, fails for want of a purpose that is adequate to carry one over its hard places. The desire to shine before men will not do it, nor will mere love of learning, nor will a barren sense of duty. Nothing will, but love of God and love of men; the desire to draw close to one's Father and help one's brother. Go to your Bible with these aims, and you will go to it with constantly increasing eagerness and profit. 4. Much Bible-reading fails because of brevity. Momentum tells in this work, as in every other. The force and beauty of large portions of the Bible can be learned only through reading several chapters at once. Ten minutes a day is far too little time for Bible-reading that shall tell; half an hour a day would allow time to get up steam, and to use the steam after it is generated. How many of you give half an hour a day to the Word of God?

5. Finally, in this brief acrostic-summary, your Bible-reading should be every day. It must become as much a habit as eating, and for much the same reason. You cannot eat in one day your dinners for the six following days. "Give us day by day our daily bread "-spiritual, as well as physical. This is one great blessing among the many that are springing from our Christian Endeavor pledge, with its promise of daily Biblereading: it is changing for thousands their Biblereading from a spasm into a habit. Read the Bible on the cars instead of your newspaper. Prop it up before you at your kitchen table. Put it in your pocket when you set out for a lonely walk. Be only a tenth part as zealous to get time for your Bible as you would be to get ten dollars, and you will get the time-never fear.

I have just said that your Bible-reading must be independent. True; but your independence, though good to start with, will not carry you far. You must get help from books.

The best of all book-helps for Bible-study is the Revised Version. Difficulties by the thousand are cleared up in the new version, and it places you as near as our English can to the original Hebrew and Greek. Then, don't try to get along with the concordance found in the back of the teachers' Bibles. Nothing more trying to the student was ever put within covers than these half-way compilations. They are of use only as tests of patience and good temper. On the other hand, the remaining helps found in the standard teachers' Bibles are of the greatest assistance, and you will need to consult them constantlyespecially the atlas. A Bible dictionary you must have, and a commentary. The best commentary in small compass is, probably, Jamieson, Faussett, and Brown's. A better plan is to buy separate commentaries on the separate books of the Bible, as you come to them in your studies. The best series of such commentaries—a series, however, as yet incomplete and its different volumes are of unequal value-is the "Cambridge Bible for Students." If you join with others in the study, the expense for books may be shared among you. These are all the books you will need; though, of course, the larger the library to which you have access, the better,-provided you know how to use it!

There are many ways of studying the Bible; but, manifestly, the first thing to do is to get a knowledge of its contents. Until you know what is in each book, and where to put your hand on what you want in it, no topical study can be carried on to any advantage. Straight through the Bible then, book by book, must be your first journey,—such a pilgrimage as I conduct in the companion volume to this, "A Bible Year."

Take the books in their order. First read the book. This reading will take you, in many cases, only a few minutes. Make a comprehensive survey of it. Divide it into sections, according to the changes of theme. Give titles to the chapters. Mark the most helpful passages. Commit them to memory. Write analyses of the events. Trace different characters through the book. Make a four-hundred-words abstract of the book; then a one-hundred-words abstract. Learn all you can about the author of the book, and the times in in which it was written. Geikie's "Hours with the Bible " will be of great help there. Compare the book with the books you have already studied. Test your familiarity with the book in all sorts of ways, seeing how readily you can turn to any desired passage, seeing how much of the contents of the book you can recall in outline. Write out a set of questions on the book,—every query you can think of,—and come back to them after a few days to see whether you can answer them all. Don't leave the book for another until you are quite sure you have grasped at least its principal contents, so that you know what is in it, and where to "find things." *Then* proceed to the next book.

After you have gone through the Bible in this way, a broad and delightful field opens before you—the study of the Bible topically,—the study to which the present volume is an introduction. Each book has something to tell you about Christ. Learn what it is. There is work for many months. Trace each great doctrine through the Bible—the doctrine of immortality, of atonement, of the forgiveness of sins, of the Holy Spirit. These studies, of course, will last a lifetime, and will be as varied as the students are. It is unnecessary, and, in fact, impossible, even to outline them. My purpose is merely to insist that such topical studies should be carried out by every Christian.

A man once possessed a rare and valuable collection of medicines. This collection contained drugs from every clime, elixirs of powerful virtue, liquids of priceless worth. The owner of this noble possession often congratulated himself in the presence of his friends upon his good fortune.

"But you can't read," objected his friends.

"Nevertheless," he replied, "the collection is unequalled in the world."

"But you don't know one medicine from the other," they answered, "and if you were sick, you would only stumble in profitless confusion among all these glass bottles."

"But, don't you see?" he said, "it is mine. I own the whole matchless collection." "No," they replied, "we don't see. You do not actually own it, though you may keep it in your house forever. No one could truly own it except a skilful physician, who could read the labels, and understand when and how to use each medicine."

Now, too many of us are in just this foolish plight regarding the Bible. We have it in our house, but not in our minds. We own the paper and binding, but the essence is not ours. Our Bible-reading is a farce unless we practise it.

"But how can we practise it?" you ask. "This morning I may be reading some lesson on anger, and the whole of the day may not contain a single provocation to wrath; or it may be some comforting thought regarding death, and all my dear ones are alive and in good health."

Is it not evident, then, that the only practical reading of the Bible is one that stores it away in the memory, and stores it away so systematically that any needed portion can be found just when it is needed? Of what use is a spade if it can be found only when raking is in order? What is the good of the camphor-bottle if it pops up when you need the hamamelis? What is the advantage of a handful of keys if the particular key that will fit the case is lacking?

It is not how much you read, but the manner of your reading, that counts. This is a remark so trite that you may fling it aside without seeing whether it fits you or not. A single Bible verse, digested each day and made a part of your spiritual organism, would mean in the course of the year 365 verses,—some twenty chapters. It would be easy to get the essence of the entire Bible into those 365 verses.

In this book, then, I suggest a plan for your Bible-reading. The plan is very simple. It merely consists in writing, after each Bible text you come across that is likely to be helpful, the initial of the circumstances under which it is likely to be of use. For instance, after all passages treating of death,—all passages, I mean, that appeal especially to you as you read them,—print neatly the letter D. When you meet with verses that seem to you likely to be comforting in seasons of sorrow, print after them the contraction, So. You are often worried. Place a big Hp after the many verses that help to make men hopeful. An L will distinguish for you the passages that will tend to make you a better laborer. There is little more to the plan, and the topics I have indicated, and the texts under each topic, are given merely as stimulating nuclei of your own collection, which is to grow as you grow.

This is to be a very real affair all through, and so I urge you never to mark a verse that does not at the time impress itself upon you with its beauty and force. Coming back to it some other day you may see in it a meaning you had never before suspected. Wait for that day before you mark it.

And finally, but most important point of all, *review*! Most work of this kind is a failure because it is done and then forgotten. A marked Bible is no better than an unmarked Bible unless its owner is entirely familiar with the marked passages, and can turn to any one of them whenever he pleases.

And so, as soon as you begin thus to emphasize passages, begin to review them. At first, glance over day by day every verse you have marked. Later, when the number of verses becomes larger, select each day only a single category of them, such as those marked with Ct for "contentment." Review them, and review them, until you are perfectly familiar with every verse you have marked that bears on this subject. And then, the next time you feel the cold mists of covetousness or envy settling down over your life, you will know where to go for the sunshine. To return to my former illustration, you will not put your hand on the camphor-bottle when you need the hamamelis.

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
