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

1. The numbers, 1, 2, etc., indicate the division of work among the Examiners.
2. Examiners and students should be prepared on every subject within its own period. The student, when fully ready, not before, will notify the Examiner, who should have his questions (not fewer than 25 nor more than 100) written out beforehand, with space under each question for its answer by the student.

5. As soon as the papers are received by the Examiner, he will give to each answer its own proper credit, ranging from o to 10: obtain the sum of all the credits, and divide the sum by the whole number of questions asked. The quotient will be the grade of the student. This the Examiner will mail at once to Rev. C. W. Sutton, the Secretary of the Board, and also notify the student of the result. The minimum grade for passing is 7. In grading, while greatest weight will be given to the substance of the answers, some consideration must be given to the style, syntax, orthography, chirography, and comparative neatness of the answers,

6. On the back of every written sermon or essay there should be a statement, signed by the person presenting it, that the conception, composition, and handwriting are his own work.

7. Instead of syllabi as heretofore, let the students be prepared to give such evidence that they have closely read the books as the Examiners may require.

8. The grading on sermons or essays, and, on "books to be read," will hereafter be on the same scale (from 0 to 10) as on books to be studied, with 7 as the minimum grade for passing.

6. Candidates for local orders, when it is impracticable for them to be examined previously, will be examined on the day before Conference convenes, beginning at 9 o'clock.

JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS.

FIRST DAY.

THE SEVENTY FIRST SESSION OF THE KENTUCKY CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH, was held at Pineville, Ky., from Wednesday, September 8th, to Monday the 13th, 1897.

A devotional service was held from 8.30 A. M. to 9 o'clock, led by Rev. Amon Boreing, who in the absence of Bishop Mallalieu was elected President of the Conference.

Roll.—E. B. Hill, Assistant Secretary of last year, called the roll, and sixty members and probationers answered to their names the first day.

The President and Presiding Elders administered the Lord's Supper to ninety-six communicants.

Elections.—Thomas Hanford was elected Secretary, and on his nomination F. Grider, W. A. Schell, and J. W. Walters were elected Assistant Secretaries.

Introductions.—The following were introduced to the Conference: B. R. Wilburn, Drs. Jesse L. Hurlburt, A. J. Palmer, W. B. Collins, Trinity Church, Louisville; and Rev. E. A. McClure, M. E. Church, South, Pineville.

Bar.—The Bar of Conference was made to include the first six seats from the pulpit.

Time. The time of addresses was limited to fifteen minutes.

Dr. Schell, of the Epworth League, was introduced and addressed the Conference; also Dr. Hurlburt, of the Sunday School and Tract Societies; and Dr. Palmer, of the Missionary Society; also Mrs. James B. Jones, of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society.

On motion it was ordered that all reports be presented in duplicate form.

The time of Conference sessions was set from 8.30 A. M. to 12 M. The first half hour to be given to divine worship.

The committee to nominate the Standing Committees reported. The report was adopted. (See Report.)

J. W. Zimmerman was elected Conference reporter for the Western Christian Advocate.

On motion, the statistical reports of the preachers were ordered to be delivered to the secretaries from 2 to 4 this P. M.

J. G. Dover, P. E., reported the Ashland District.

It was moved and seconded that after announcements are made we adjourn.

The Presiding Elders were made a Committee on Missions.

Announcements were made, and E. L. Shepard pronounced the benediction.

Adjourned.

SECOND DAY.

THE prayer service from 8.30 A. M. to 900 was conducted by F. Grider.

Bishop Mallalieu, having arrived at the seat of conference, took the chair.

The Minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

R. D. Biven was appointed agent for Gospel in all Lands.

The Roll was called for absentees, and further reading dispensed with.

I also hold belonging to the General Fund, as follows:

\$2000 6 per cent. Kenton County, Ky, Funding Bonds, due Dec. 1, 1913. \$100 4 per cent. Covington Funding Bond, due Aug 1, 1920.

The Board owes the estate of John R. Eads \$1,607.37, with interest from Oct. 1, 1896.

By order of the Board I used \$77.50 of last year's collections to pay five years insurance on the buildings of Ashland School, leaving but \$73.50 to apply to this debt, which was not enough to liquidate the year's interest; consequently the debt was increased by the net transactions of the year.

Resolutions have been passed at several sessions of the Conference by unanimous vote to raise fixed sums during the incoming Conference year towards paying this debt, none of which have been productive of satisfactory results, and the debt is to-day substantially what it was several years ago. We can not with propriety use our investments or money raised for specific purposes to pay this debt, as it is long past due, and payment may be demanded any day. Some effective plan should be devised by which it may be liquidated.

CHURCH EXTENSION.

Saturday evening, a large congregation gathered at the anniversary of the Church Extension Society, Dr. Amon Boreing presiding. Dr. W. A. Spencer, corresponding secretary of the Society was the speaker, and with song, sermon, and story, in his own inimitable way, he brought his audience into a high state of enthusiasm for his worthy cause.

SUNDAY.

The Conference love-feast was held at 9 o'clock, conducted by J. S. Taylor. The testimonies were usually brief, and many testified to the saving power of Christ. Brother Taylor is a good leader, and the meeting bore unmistakable evidence of the power of the Holy Spirit.

At 10.30 A. M., Bishop Mallalieu announced his text, "God is faithful." (1 Cor. i, 9.) The bishop is an ideal gospel preacher. His sermon grew in pathos and power, and closed with deep, profound, almost extraordinary effect upon the packed congregation. Bishop Mallalieu fully understands and appreciates the heroism of Kentucky Methodism, and his words of sympathy are not idle words.

At the close of the sermon, the following were ordained deacons: A. E. Ulrich, W. J. Cain, E. L. Hughgart, and J. C. Love.

Preceding the service at 3 P. M., Bi-hop Mallalieu baptized Miss Otey Marie, adopted daughter of Professor G. E. Hancock and wife, of Union College. Following this came the ordination of Bird Hughes and F. L. Creech as elders. W. B. Collins preached with power on the "Love of God." Dr. Spencer exhorted." The altar was crowded with seekers, and several were converted. Bishop Mallalieu proved as successful in altar work as in other functions of his office.

Dr. Spencer preached a searching sermon, full of quickening power, Sabbath evening to a packed congregation. It developed revival and converting power. The altar and adjacent pews were crowded with seekers, and many conversions followed. Probably more than fifty were converted during the day, and the number of inquirers could not be estimated. Dr. Spencer has marvelous capacity and endurance for revival work. May God bless him wherever he goes in his mission of building churches and saving souls!

FREEDMEN'S AID® SOUTHERN EDUCATION SOCIETY.

We, your committee on Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education Society, beg leave to submit the following as our report:

The influence of our schools in the South witness to thine worth, and it is with profound thankfulness that we have noted the work of this Society; and it is evident that with proper encouragement, it may be made more efficient and far-reaching in its blessings to both races. We earnestly request each pastor to present this collection, and see that his charge contribute its apportionment. No foreign field excites the same enthusiasm that the mission in the South among the colored people does, for this affects our own civilization.

We regret that we note another annual decrease in our collections. The receipts of last year show \$624, while the receipts of the year ending September 18, 1897, show only \$401, a decrease of \$223.

The apportionment to the Kentucky contribution is \$1,000; we have paid \$401, leaving a deficit of \$599.

We, your committee, would urge that the pastors take this in hand at once, preach on this subject, and give the people to know the claims of this Society upon them and urge increased liberality.

EPWORTH LEAGUE.

THE Epworth League, devoted especially to the interest of our young people, is worthy of the careful and prayerful consideration of the entire

church. The object of the League is to bring our young people into intelligent, active church membership; and all its meetings and work should be directed to the attainment of this end.

We call especial attention to the importance of encouraging all the members of the League to become acquainted with the Holy Scriptures and the history and discipline of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

We recommend to all the members of the League the Epworth Herald and the Western Christian Advocate.

We suggest that where it is practicable the presiding elders encourage the holding of district or sub-district Epworth League Conventions at least once a year.

We also suggest that each presiding elder preach at least once a year in each pastoral charge on the object and needs of the League.

WHEREAS, The simplicity and comprehensiveness of our Sunday school and Tract work stand unrivaled in modern Church history, marvels in cheapness and practical in application, and of such indispensable importance in aiding every Methodist pastor in discharging his duties; Therefore, be it

Resolved, first. That we employ these helps wherever we can along with other lines of our Church work.

Second. That, while we would not antagonize the use of literature and the methods of other denominations and social unions, yet, in our direct church labors, we would give the preëminence to our own, embracing the entire course of the Sunday-school department and of our Tract publications as far as the same may be of practical use in the various localities demanding their distribution.

Third. That we should utilize the aid of the Sunday-schools and the use of such Tract matter as will best help us in all the great anniversaries of the benevolences of our Church, in connection with such printed programmes as may be furnished by the parent Boards of the various causes.

Fourth. That the foregoing duties may be better understood and practiced by our people, we recommend that our pastors frequently hold local

Board meetings, in which they may instruct our various Disciplinary committees and regular society officials as to the fullest possible employment of our Sunday-schools and Tract helps in the prosecution of their regular Church labors—not as ignoring the use of greater help, such as Bibles, etc., but as auxiliaries in carrying forward more successfully the great work of Christian evangelization.

Fifth. That we may show practically the appreciation due from us as a Conference, of our Sunday-school Union and Tract Society in gratuit-ously supplying our needs in the past, and of their purpose and capability of continuing similar assistance to others, we pledge ourselves severally as a Conference to try to raise in full the \$235 for the Sunday-school Union, and the same amount for the Tract Society, as apportioned to us for the ensuing Conference year by the respective Parent Boards.

Memoirs.

REV. A. B. COLLEDGE.

REV. A. B. COLLEDGE died at Lexington, Ky., March 14, 1897. A brave and true man has gone from us, but not until he passed his threeseore and ten years in the Christian warfare.

He "fought a good fight," "finished his course," "kept the faith," and gave the sword in exchange for the crown, in his seventy-fourth year. He came of a family noted for piety and Christian integrity. His father, Samuel Colledge, was a minister of the gospel. He came to America when the subject of this memoir was but eight years old. At the age of fifteen he was converted, and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church. his twenty-sixth year he was licensed to preach at Dayton, Ohio. His itinerant work began as a supply on the Hillsboro Circuit, Ohio. He continued in the local ranks, supplying charges in Kentucky and Ohio until 1866, when he was admitted on trial in the Kentucky Conference. He was ordained to deacon's orders by Bishop Thomson, at Lexington, 1867, and to elder's orders by Bishop Clark, in Louisville, 1871. His ministerial labors, as a member of the Kentucky Conference, were mainly in Mason, Lewis. Montgomery, Bath, Rowan, Ohio and Grayson counties. In 1878, while traveling in Lewis County, he met with a very serious accident, caused by his horse falling through a defective bridge. His injuries were a crushed ankle and his right leg broken in two places. He never fully recovered from this shock. His health soon began to fail, also his mind wavered, but his faith in God and loyalty to his Church and devotion to his family and friends remained to the end. He was united in matrimony to Miss Eliza A. Thomson, of Maysville, Ky., December 2, 1857. Four children were born to them—two died in infancy. Miss Elida resides in Vanceburg, Ky., with the widowed mother, and Rev. John A. Colledge is a member of the Kentucky Conference, and stationed at Ludlow. Brother Colledge remained at home with his family for a number of years after his mental powers began to fail. But it became necessary to send him to the Asylum, where he spent the last five or six years of his life on earth. "Many are the afflictions of the righteous, but the Lord delivereth him out of them all." A few days before his death his reason seemed to return, and he said: "The end is approaching, but I am ready." His faith was triumphant, and his last moments calm and peaceful.

SOPHIA J. DAVENPORT.

MRS. SOPHIA J. DAVENPORT was born April 25, 1865, in Floyd County, Kentucky, and died February 10, 1897, in Lawrence County, Kentucky, on the Flat Gap Circuit, Ashland District, Kentucky Conference. She was

the daughter of James and Asminta Perry, and the wife of W. Davenport, of the Kentucky Conference. She was the mother of seven children. She was converted, and united with the M. E. Church December 27, 1887, and spent the remainder of her life faithful to her vows. She was a helpmeet to her husband in the itinerant ministry, sacrificing friends and home for the cause of Christ.

Her end came suddenly but peacefully, being the victim of pneumonia. She had no time to say good-bye, and as she passed calmly into rest she came in touch with the poet:

Life, we've been long together
Through pleasant and through cloudy weather;
'Tis hard to part when friends are dear,
Perhaps 'twill cost a sigh or tear,
Then steal away, give little warning,
Say not, "Good night!"
But in some brighter clime
Bid me "Good morning."

The life of an affectionate wife and a fond mother has ceased on earth, but just begun in heaven.

REV. JEDEDIAH FOSTER.

JEDEDIAH FOSTER was born in the State of Ohio in the year 1811, and died in Mason County, Kentucky, November 26, 1896.

Brother Foster was admitted on trial in the Kentucky Conference in the year 1836. He was ordained deacon, and received into full connection in 1838, and was ordained Elder in 1840. He was effective thirty-six years. Six of those years he filled the office of Presiding Elder.

Brother Foster was a godly man. His reputation was good, his character pure. He was a sound theologian and a faithful pastor. He was well acquainted with Methodist theology, and was able to defend the peculiar doctrines of our Church. He was a sweet singer, and loved by all who knew him.

Brother Foster did not believe that slavery was a Divine institution, and he regretted the division of the Church, which took place in 1845. He was loyal to our Government during the rebellion, and in the year 1867 he was re-admitted into the Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church from the Kentucky Conference of the M. E. Church, South, and was appointed Presiding Elder of the Louisville District, and remained on that district four years. He continued to labor in our Conference until the infirmities of age made it necessary for him to ask for a superannuated relation. But his heart was in the work, and he loved the brethren until the day of his death.

Through his labors many were "turned from darkness to light, and from the power of Satan to God."

A great man and a prince has fallen. Jedediah Foster walked with God. He is no longer with us, for God took him.

Servant of God, well done! Rest from thy loved employ.

REV. R. D. LASHBROOK.

In the death of Rev. R. D. Lashbrook the Kentucky Conference has lost one of its oldest, truest and best members. He was converted in his early life in the old-fashioned Methodistic way, and soon after joined the M. E. Church.

As a layman he was loyal to his Church in all of her interests, and was one of those heroic members which stood true to her highest principles during her darkest hours of peril, (I mean the stormy days of the separation in 1844 to 1846.

He began in the itinerancy when a local preacher in the Green River District as a supply when it was a mission field, and became identified with the Conference at its re-organization in 1852, and continued a staunch and uncompromising friend and a tireless laborer for her rich fruitage till the day of his death.

As a man, in his physical constitution he was robust and strong, capable of severest toil and hardship which a Methodist minister is called to undergo.

He was a man full of courage. No constituent element of his nature, had the slightest tinge of fear. He was one of this nation's truest and best patriots. He jeopardized his own life in denouncing the principles that propagated and perpetuated the late war, for he was true to the Union.

He was true to the cause of temperance, lifting a dissenting voice against those principles which have lead to the engendering of intemperance and death sweeping its millions into a premature and Christless grave.

Not only did he dare to teach those principles as he met the hundreds and thousands of people around their own hearthstone in his pastoral vis tations and from the pulpits which he occupied, but by example he kept himself from this awful curse as he walked among men.

As a preacher he showed himself approved of God, rightly divining the word of truth. His preaching was plain and practical, yet powerful. That which he lacked in education seemed largely to have been made up to him in native ability, for he was possessed with a large degree of tact and common sense. We may truthfully say he was unique as a preacher. This Conference never had but one R. D. Lashbrook and doubtless will never have another, and this is truer in character than name.

The bold, uncompromising and scathing manner in which he rebuked sin, seemed in part constitutional and characteristic of his nature. He spared no one even in the Church because of rank, wealth or social position.

This often incurred the bitterest antagonism from those who turned to be his foes, yet he was true to his conscience, which dictated to him the principle of duty and right, and which secured for him the approbation of his God, rather than the smiles and applause of men. He was a son of thunder, his voice was tremendous; he could reach ten thousand people as easily as most speakers could five hundred.

And with all the force and volume which characterized his masterly

voice it was not destitute of melody nor pathos, for it is said that through his preaching over four thousand souls were brought to realize their lost state, repent of their sins, turn their eyes toward the glory of the cross, and unite with the Church. As to the thoroughness of his consecration to the Lord, this is demonstrated in his apparent willingness to obey the orders of the Church and the voice of his God in accepting his appointments, and going when sent without a murmur to his field of labor. It is said of all the long and irksome moves which he was called to undertake (and they were many), that he never had money enough to move him from his old to his new appointment with one exception. Yet he went on walking by faith and not by sight, trusting in the Christ whose promise he counted as sure and steadfast, which promise was so verified in him that he left the world without owing a dollar to any man. He preached right. eousness to the standard of the law. Two weeks before his death he preached in the Main Street Church in Covington, Ky., with clearness of thought and demonstration of the spirit.

After the death of his wife, last fall, he felt himself unable to keep house longer, so he found homes as best he could for his children, broke up housekeeping, and went to visit his oldest daughter in Harrison County, from which he expected to return to help his ministerial brethren in revivals.

Strange to say that the peculiar, fascinating influence which came to him in the call to the ministry to preach salvation to dying men, never left nor abated him in the least. The highest ambition of his life was to preach Christ to a dying world. He told me how he expected to help the brethren in their revival meetings, but in it was his Father's voice speaking in disguise to put his house in order, for he was to answer the roll call in heaven.

He died with dropsy of the heart, being sick only a few days. He died as he lived, expressing his hope to the last of immortality and eternal life. Ah, my brethren, may we not say that a prophet indeed has fallen, but sweet and precious be his memory. Blessed be the Lord, his sun has gone down to rise in a more glorious hemisphere.

How appropriate that truth in God's word which says, "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth, yea, saith the Spirit, for they do rest from their labors, and their works do follow them."

In that day many will rise up and call him blessed.

He died in May, 1897, full of years, crowned with victorious success as a soul-saving minister of The Word in his seventy-fifth year—fifty years of same given to the active ministry.

May the Lord bless his fatherless children!

MRS. V. LASHBROOK.

VIRGINIA LASHBROOK, the wife of Rev. R. D. Lashbrook, was born in Mason County, Ky. Her maiden name was Graham. Sister Lashbrook was a true helpmate to her husband in all of his arduous laborin the Master's vineyard. She was an ideal Methodist preacher's wife, a model, Christian, economical housekeeper, a quiet and peaceable neighbor, a faithful wife and an affectionate mother. She died October, 1896, in the glorious triumph of the Christian faith. Her death was caused by consumption of the lungs after an illness of about eight months. When the hand of affliction was laid upon her she kissed the chastening rod and began to draw near the Master as death approached. She was greatly concerned about full salvation in Christ by faith, and seemed to embrace the blessing of perfect love before her death. Her maternal love was exhibited to the last hours of her life in the tenderest care and anxious concern for her five children, but she committed them to the care of Him whose promise is a father's care and blessing. The morning of her death she called all of her five children, with her grief-stricken and aged husband, to her dying bed and gave them a parting blessing, exhorting them to meet her in heaven, and kissed them good-bye to meet no more in the body till they meet in the great resurrection morn.

REV. CHARLES S. SMITH.

On the 19th of January, 1839, in Virginia, C. S. Smith was born. When about twelve years of age his father's family removed to Ohio. He was employed by Rev. J. H. Lennin to travel the Owensboro Circuit. He joined the Kentucky Conference in 1885, and in due time was admitted into full connection, and was also ordained an Elder.

His pastoral appointments have been Owensboro, Hopkinsville, Greenville, Deer Lick, Marion, Tompkinsville, Gap Creek, and Gradyville. While in charge of the Deer Lick Circuit he married Miss Grace Sanders.

Brother Smith never deserted his charges. Some of them paid but little, and discouragements were serious and numerous. His economy, truly remarkable, enabled him to continue where many others must have failed. People were added to the Church in all his different Circuits. He was a clear doctrinal preacher, preaching at times sermons of uncommon power.

It would be difficult to determine which shone the brighter, his loyalty to the Methodist Episcopal Church or to his Government. He was threatened with violence, but he never swerved from his obligations to State, Church or family. He suffered from disease for years—more than falls to the common lot of mortals—but knew the comforting and sustaining power of Grace Divine. He died February 25, 1897, in joyful anticipation of eternal life. He leaves a wife and two children to the prayers and sympathy of the Church and Conference.

REV. DANIEL STEVENSON, D.D.

Daniel Stevenson was born in the town of Versailles, Kentucky, on the 12th day of November, 1823. He came of a long line of Methodist ancestry reaching far back to the first days of the work in Maryland under Stroobridge. In early life he was very delicate, and it was thought that he would not live to see adult life. In 1840 he joined the church after much earnest inquiry. He did not for some time find the rest of heart that he sought. In the fall of 1843 he entered Transylvania University, and after overcoming many difficulties he graduated as one of the first linguists of his class in 1847. He taught for awhile, and it was not till 1850 that he took up the work of the ministry.

On the 5th of August, 1849, he married Miss Sarah Ann Corwine, the only daughter of the Rev. Richard and Sarah Hitt Corwine. To them were born seven children, of whom four now live to cherish as well they may the dear memories of a home life redolent with self denial of parents for the good of the children, and memorable as few homes have been for the feeling that has engendered in the passing years that the interests of one were common to all the others. The home was "knit together in love."

His business habits and knowledge of needs brought about many changes for the better. He secured the recognition due to such a position, and wrought out a system which has been working for the good of the Commonwealth ever since. He held the office of Superintendent of Instruction from September 1863 to 1867.

During these years we pass through one of the most eventful crises of the life before us. It was met and mastered as might have been expected. This is not the place to tell the story of "The Eighteen," who at the session of the Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, held at Covington in 1865, located and then asked for admission into the ranks of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The men for the most part went out like Abraham of old, "not knowing whither they went." The work grew, and the decades have well justified the wisdom, the courage and devotion of these brave souls. Their ranks have thinned, but their spirit abides to inspire those who follow on. As might have been expected, Dr. Stevenson was one of the leaders in this movement.

After the fall election of 1867 there was a complete change in the public offices of the State.

Following this his work in the pastorate included Parkersburg, West Va., Lexington, Ky., the presiding eldership of the Covington District, Louisville, then five years in the New Hampshire Conference. In 1879 he was invited to take up the work of building up the educational interests of the Kentucky Conference by establishing a Collegiate Institute at Augusta, Ky. He labored there till 1887, when the work was transferred to Barboursville, Ky., where he spent the remainder of his life.

Dr. Stevenson was sent to the General Conferences of 1872 and 1896, in both of which he served the church in all faithfulness.

Early in December he was taken sick with erysipelas, and after a severe struggle with approaching death, he joined the host in the upper kingdom January 2nd, 1897. Scarcely six months afterwards he was joined by his devoted wife, and they both lie in the beautiful cemetery at Lexington, Ky., awaiting the resurrection of the just.

Dr. Stevenson had a most vigorous personality. He had a strong determination to make the most of himself. He met opposition and rebuffs only to find them changed to aids

He never allowed himself to be turned aside by the mere passing feeling from the end afar off. He had in marked degree an ethical perspective of life that told upon all his actions.

He was determined to train his brain for the use to which he might be called to put it. He never ceased his studies. He read his Bible in four languages. He kept up with the progress of thought.

He did not allow himself to stick fast in the clogging present when the future bade him on. He kept a young man's heart in the body of age. The last words we have found in his long journal are these, written Nov. 13th, 1893: "Yesterday was my birthday. I have now reached the age of seventy, but it is hard for me to realize it, as I feel as if I were not more than forty or fifty years of age."

He was eminently constructive. His whole cast of mind revealed the builder's activity. He was not happy if not doing something to build up the church or the State in some of their phases. Several charges owe to him their church edifices. The church owes to him part of its advance in the effort to build up a better prepared ministry for the work of God. He refused to drift.

His ideals were of the highest, both for the private life of the man of God, and for his public position. He had in rare combination the practical and the ideal. He handled the material with the touch of the spiritual. He had the sentiment of the true poet, as many know from his published bits of poetry.

He had strong convictions, and did not hesitate in their expression when it became necessary to urge his point. He was at home upon the conference floor, annual or general, when crossing swords with strong men. He saw straight without subterfuge, and did not try to win men by smooth sentences or soothing promises, which are sometimes made only to be forgotten. He was the soul of sincerity.

He was unselfish, and many live to day whose better future is the product of his strong purpose to make this world better by his surrender of himself to the present duty as he saw it.

He was a clear, forcible and at times powerful preacher. He said once to his son when talking of methods of sermonizing, "I never tried to be eloquent." He meant that he followed his thought to its proper end,

not however without welcoming the accompaniments of pathos and passion.

He was above all else a teacher of men. He had an ambition to educate a strong class of young men for the church he loved. The Kentucky Conference was very dear to him, and he returned to it with a devout purpose to give it his last as he had given it his first efforts to promote its higher interests.

The rugged earnestness and uncompromising moral tone of the young man's life were softened, as the years were away, not to less devotion to truth, but to less rigor of expression. The man of tenderness was added to the man of sternness. He was always brave, and he now grew gentler. He had vast power of resistance to wrong. He developed great tenderness of sentiment.

In his religious life he allowed more and more abandon of expression as the years wore away to the end. He was never profuse. He grew more willing to open his heart to his fellows. He was always simple and sincere. He grew less reticent. His faith in God ran in a fuller life cur rent to the end, and his latest annotations in his wide margined Greek Testament show what his chief thoughts had to do with the saint's yearning for the highest life to be gained through grace.

MRS. SARAH ANN STEVENSON.

Sarah Ann Corwine was born in Turnersville, Tenn., Dec., 15th, 1826. Her father was the Rev. Richard Corwine, at the time in charge of the work in that section of Kentucky adjoining that portion of Tennessee where she was born. Her mother was Miss Sallie Hitt. Among her ancestors on her father's side was the younger John Winthrop, of Connecticut. On her mother's side was the Rev. Daniel Hitt, prominent in the early history of Methodi-m in the East.

Miss Corwine was educated at the famous school founded in Shelby-ville, Ky., by the gracious lady whose influence is still felt throughout the South, Mrs. Julia Tevis. After the death of her father, Miss Corwine spent several years in Lexington, Ky., where her mother lived during the student life of her son, afterwards the Rev. J. D. H. Corwine, at that time in the Transylvannia University. The student to whom she became devoted, as he to her, was Daniel Stevenson. They were married in Bourbon Co., Ky., on the 5th of Aug., 1849.

From that time forwards for nearly fifty years these two entered into all the trials and triumphs of the Methodist itinerancy. After the death of Dr Stevenson in January, Mrs. Stevenson felt the isolation which was not all allayed by the devotion of her children, and when she died in Delaware, at the home of her son, Prof. R. T. Stevenson, it was to enter into the reunion towards which she had looked forward most longingly.

The four surviving children were privileged to minister to her and to be known by her for some time before her departure,

Mrs. Stevenson was converted early in life and till the day of her death remained the same cheerful and devoted Christian wife, mother and friend. She was active during her young womanhood in such work as opened to her in the Sunday School and kindred work. She was full of sympathy for all in trouble. She was gifted with a very quick intuition of others real character, and seldom misjudged those with whom she was brought in contact. She was the true helpmeet of her husband in all that went to make up the whole round of his duties. She was not of the demonstrative sort of Christians, but the flavor of her piety was diffused like the aroma of a hidden flower. The utmost sincerity characterized her life. She loved her home and during the many necessary absences of her busy husband she never failed to gather the little family about her and lead in the worship of God. She taught the little ones to pray about the family altar in turn. The house was a happy Christian home.

She died August 5th, 1898, in Delaware, Ohio, and was laid to rest by the side of her husband, in the cemetery in Lexington, Ky. She died in the faith of the Gospel and has rejoined her faithful husband, where as often on earth they sang the songs of Zion, they now sing the song of Moses and the Lamb. In their lives they were one, and in death they were not divided.

OLIVER M. WILSON.

OLIVER M. WILSON was born January 26, 1867, in Knox County, Indiana. His parents were members of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and early gave to their son the training that determined well his later life. Educationally, Brother Wilson was well equipped in the common English branches, and for a number of years taught school in his native county. His conversion was clear and bright, and occurred in connection with family-worship. Almost immediately there came a call to a higher sphere of usefulness, and in August, 1895, he was licensed as a local preacher. He was recommended for membership in the Indiana Annual Conference in the Fall of 1895, but owing to the crowded condition of the work, was not admitted. The same Fall he was employed by the Presiding Elder of the Louisville District, and placed in charge of Beaver Dam Circuit of the Kentucky Conference. In 1896 he was admitted as a Probationer in our Conference, and was continued in charge of Beaver Dam Circuit. He was an exceptionally good worker, and the charge, under his care, was greatly prospered. During the past winter he came into the blessing of perfect love, and lived a life of such sweetness as silenced all opposition touching his exalted profession. Evidently, Brother Wilson was fast ripening for glory, and on August 11th, after a brief illness, he fell sweetly asleep in Jesus. His ministerial life was brief, but he has left behind an influence that will long be felt for the Master. His abilities were marked, and in time he would have taken rank among our best workers. But these prospects are to remain without realization, and our Brother is to know of the bliss of heaven. We bow in submission to God's will in this bereavement, and with our Brother's family indulge the hope of a final meeting in glory.
