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



"RESEARCH INFORMATION REGARDING RESPONSIVE PEOPLES AND AREAS:

A BARTIST REPORT"

INTRODUCTION: The purpose of this paper is to present some preliminary research findings related to responsive peoples in India. This information can be used to identify areas of high potential for Baptists to initiate church planting efforts. India is more Christian than is generally recognized. With 27 millian (2.7 crores) Christians in 1980, 3.9% of the population is Christian (Barrett 1982). Some 91,000 congregations of Christians represent numerous large and small denominations and fellowships. Five Indian languages have more than one million Christian speakers each: Malayalam (8.5 million), Tamil (5.58 million), Telugu (3.48 million), Marathi (1.35 million) and Kannada (1.16 million).

A.D. 52, according to the St. Thomas tradition. The further development of Christianity in the sub-continent is traceable to several infusions. From the Roman Catholic side, the coming of Francis Xavier in 1542 had a major impact resulting in 60,000 converts in 10 years. The first Protestant imput with the coming of Ziegenbalg and Plutsshau in 1706. In 1798 some 40,000 Protestant Christians were reported in South India. The coming of William Carey in 1793 began a new epoch, the modern Missionary movement, which, through a variety of efforts and agencies,

resulted in the penetration of most areas of the land (Neill 1971).

The spread of Christianity, however, has been uneven. About 80% of India's Christians is found in the South, especially in the coastal areas of Kerala, Goa, Tamilnadu and Andhra. Another 15% of India's Christians is found in the North East where several states are substantially Christian -- Manipur 26%, Meghalaya about 50%, Nagaland probably about 80%, and Mizoram 86% Christian (Hedlund 1982). The remaining 5% of India's Christians are thinly and unevenly spread out over the vast areas of North and Central India but includes pockets of concentration at Bombay (7% Christian) and among tribals in Orissa and Bihar (Ranchi). In most areas may be found substantial unevangelized populations and by-passed people groups. Before turning to some of these, let us take a closer look at Baptists in India.

BAPTISTS IN INDIA

Baptists in India consist of at least 6,832 known congregations. Terhuja (1982) indicates over 9,00,000 communicants and a total Baptist population of 2.5 million. Barrett lists 23 Baptist bodies for which he gives statistics, but he mentions 6 additional organizations said to be working in India for which he gives no statistics. 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Baptist Mission sends missionaries to Madhya Pradesh as well as into Assam and bordering states in North East India. Several mission agencies have sprung up among the Nagas. North East India has at least 15 indigenous mission, agencies (Hedlund and Hrangkhuma 1980), at least half of which are Baptist. Eccleasiastically, North East India is primarily Baptist territory. What about other areas of India? Where are there promising fields for Church growth from fresh foundations?

RESEARCH FINDINGS

As Baptists consider the possibilities of advance on new ground, it is wise to have a look at the actual situation. That Christianity is so unevenly spread is due to a number of factors. It is not correct to assume that largely unchurched areas have been overlooked by the Church, nor can we dismiss such areas as "resistant". India is exceedingly complex. Each major linguistic region should be treated as a separate entity inhabited by a diversified population. CHURCH GROWTH RESEARCH CENTRE is engaged in people-oriented evangelistic research in several areas of the country. A brief summary about the Church, unreached peoples and related information on each state of India is found in BUILDING THE CHURCH (Hedlund 1982). The information which follows is drawn from several current research projects.

1. Andhra Pradesh. Not only is Andhra a Baptist area with a sizable Christian population stemming from conversion movements of the past, Andhra is the only state in which there is a significant movement to Christ among the Hindu Castes. In order to better understand this phenomenon, a research effort is in progress to measure the extent of the Christian penetration of Hindu castes in several coastal districts. This movement is felt to centre in Krishna district which is already a Christian stronghold in the state. Investigation of Krishna District is expected to yield significant information. Preliminary findings in other districts seem to indicate

trends.

In East Godavari it was found that the Harijans, representing about one fourth of the total population of the district, were 23.2% Christian. Only 1.8% from the "respectable" Hindu castes had become Christians. A closer look, however, reveals the following: from the populous Kapu caste (2.06,000) 1.519 had become Christians (0.7%); from the Kammas (61.000) there were 688 converts (1.1%). The Chettybalijas (57.800) had become 4.1% Christian (2.362 converts), and the 16.000 Yeru Kala/Erukala had become 9.5% Christian (1.529 converts). In this district smaller numbers of Brahmins (190 out of 33.750 or 0.5%) and Reddys (138 out of 16,500 or 0.8%) had converted, but 935 Kshatriyas (2.2% out of 42,000) had become Christians. Ten percent (650) of the Devangulu caste had become Christians. No converts were reported from the Lambadees, Koya, Yadava, Mangali, and Vadrangi castes in East Godavari. When asked whether they felt that many more of their people would scon turn to Christ, Caste convert Christians in 48 villages replied "yes", three replied "No", and 25 said "maybe". In other words, in 73 out of 76 villages a further conversion movement was believed possible.

The picture is slightly different in West Godavari. Here the Harijans, comprising 43% of the population, are 33.8% Christian and 2.9% of the Hindus have become Christian. The largest number is from the Kappu community with 3,864 converts (2.9% of the caste), followed by the Kammas with 1,660 (1.8% of the total). In this district converts seem to have come from every community including the Brahmin which has yielded 927 converts (5.2%)! Other significant Christian groups come from the Reddys (5.4% Christian 860 converts), Chowdris (8.2% Christian, 618 converts), the Gowdas (6.3% Christian, 543 converts) and the Eadigas (6.5% Christian 312 converts). Caste convert Christians in 22 villages believe that many more of their people would soon turn to Christ, in 19 villages they felt this might be a possibility, and in only 5 villages did they feel this was not at all likely. When asked whether the formation of separate congregations of caste convert Christian would encourage the convertsion movement, 26 villages said "yes", whereas 20 said "No". It seems significant that Christ groups, Bible study groups and unbaptized secret believers were also found in 26 villages.

Research is in progress in Guntur District and is anticipated in Krishna District as well as in Hyderabad. This is expeacted to give more accurate picture of what is happening in this state. Potential appears high. Baptists need to examine carefully what approach is needed and appropriate for this situation of harvest. The needs of chisting autonomous groups of new believers should be considered.

The ethnic background of the three predominant Churches makes an interesting comparison. Harijans comprise 51% of the Church of South India membership and 75% of the T.E.L.C., but only 22% of the Roman Catholic membership. Nadars made up 30% of the membership in C.S.I., 13% in T.E.L.C., and 14% in the Roman Catholic Church. Some 17% in the Roman Catholic Church is Vellalar and about 2% of the T.E.L.C. The Roman Catholic membership also is approximately 29% Udaiyar, 3% Thewar, 3% Kallar, 2% Mudaliar, and 1% Reddiar background. The Church of South India membership also is about 5% Thewar, 3% Marayar, 3% Panikar, and 2% Pillai in origin

along with smaller representations from other communities in Rammad District.

It is estimated that about 8.5% of the Udaiyar Community (13,000) out of 1,51,000) has become Christian, about 7% of the Nadars (10,000 out of 1,40,000), 3.8% of the Vellalars (6,500 out of 1,67,500), and 4.6% (24,000 out of 5,21,500) of the various Harijan castes. The dominant Kallar, Maravar, and Agumudaiyar communities appear to have yielded fewer than 3,000 converts to Christianity in Rammad District...

In adjoining Madurai District and in Western Tirunelveli, the Thevars and the Kallars have exhibited signs of receptivity. Hundreds have been baptized by the Churches of Christ in Tirunelvelli, and incidents reported from Madurai suggest an openness in these communities. Classed by the government as backward communities, these people are in need of social uplift and economic development.

Data is yet to be collected for each of the districts in order to have a complete picture of the states of the unreached and of the Church throughout the state. We have begun with a detailed survey in the three distircts which we think might be crucial for a fresh people movement to Christ, but other important areas may also be found in this responsive state. Harijans are responsive, but are neglected by the Church. The City of Madras has more churches (523) than any other city in India. But the City has numerous "hidden" people groups not being contacted by existing Churches. No one has a serious strategy for evangelizing either the Hindus or the Muslims.

Rajsthan, Gujarat and the corners of Madhya Pradesh and Maharashtra has been completed. Seminars were conducted in December 1980 and in August 1982 for the workers of the various missions and churches engaged in tribal evangelization. A series of small people movements seem to be starting and growing among several tribes. This is a very sensitive situation. The information is somewhat privileged and there should be no publicity. I am not recommending the tribal belt as a Baptist field at this time. It is already entered by the Church of North India and Methodists of Gujarat, the Rajasthan Pentecostal and the Rajasthan Bible Institute, by TEAM and SAM in Maharashtra and by numerous indigenous missions such as INDIAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY, INDIAN EVANGELICAL MISSION, FRIENDS MISSIONARY PRAYER BAND and several others.

I do suggest the possibility of further survey of the non-tribal peoples of this area. It has been reported that there are completely neglected former Christians from Pakistan living in isolation in Rajasthan and Punjab. Perhaps Baptists should try to locate this community and determine their needs as well as the possibility of further outr ach in the area.

4. Maharashtra. A separate district by district survey of the tribes of Maharashtra is being carried out in this year. Very little evangelism of tribals is being carried out, so far as is known. The purpose of this survey is to compile factual information and then to challenge the Churches and Christian agencies with the need and possibilities. Anything related to tribals is sensitive and must be given a very low profile. Baptists should give further thought to Maharashtra, but first a survey should be conducted among non-tribal populations of the state.

(BCA) and should be extended to Pune as well as other centres.

OTHER AREAS OF RESPONSE

In the search for fields, it is not necessary to look toward the spiritual "deserts" alone. While areas of resistance should be carefully watered and the soil prepared for an eventual harvest, the purpose of research is to discover areas of need and of ripeness and to discorn where the Holy Spirit is at work in various ways in many places. I will now suggest a few such areas for Baptist consideration.

1. Assam. North East India is Baptist country, as we have previously noted. The present state of Assam is surrounded by Christian populations, primarily Baptist. The North East is out of bounds for any foreign missionary involvement, and evangelization is rightly in the hands of local badies such as the COUNCIL OF BAPTIST CHURCHES IN NORTH EAST INDIA, the North Bank Baptist Association, the Magaland Missionary Movement and the Zoram Baptist Mission as well as others. Evangelization is in progress among the Rabhas and other tribes of the state. Is there more that can be done? Would a Baptist missionary training institute be an asset to the cause? Would such a centre help the developing Christian movement in Tripura, Arumachal Pradesh, and the Burma border?

2. Karnataka. In this least Christian state of South India, the Telugus have veen found responsive by Baptists as well as by other denominations engaging in aggressive evangelism. According to some para-Church agencies, there has been an unprecedented interest in the Gospel among the Kannada people in recent years. This should be explored. The presence of various ethno-linguistic groups suggests the possibility of continuing and accelerated growth for the Baptist Convention in this

state,

3. Madhya Pradesh. Generally considered one of the more resistant parts of India, Madhya Pradesh has been identified as an area of church growth by the Roman Catholics: Exactly what this means is not clear, but from time to time response has come from the Satnamis and other minority Igroups in the state. I am not suggesting M.P. as a priority church planting field, but my point is that situations

sometimes change and that we need to keep alert and aware.

4. Orissa. Like Madhya Pradesh, Orissa is a state which expresses its opposition to Christianity in the form of legislation to inhibit conversion. Nevertheless, this state seems to have considerable conversion movement among the tribals. Orissa is a Baptist field: BMS, ABFMS, CBOMB. The spiritual and social meets of the needy and oppressed should not be overlooked as an area for expanded Baptist involvement. Kanjamala's study (1981) of the Catholic population of Northern Orissa offers some

helpful insights.

5. Uttar Pradesh. The most populous state of India has not been the most responsive to the Christian message. Nevertheless the present restless quest of Harijan populations bears further investigation. It is reported that some are ready for conversion. For the most part of the church is not present to respond to the needs of the oppressed. Response to the Gospel has been recorded by Christian organizations working among some of the peoples of the state. A sensitive approach could be made to target groups to determine their needs (social and other), then begin an approach which responds to those needs in the Name of Christ. While this may not result in rapid church growth, it may be a means to discover latent receptivity as well as to meet human needs.

Conclusion. Baptists should think in terms not of one approach but of several, not of one new field but several potential fields, and of multiple objectives. Aggressive church multiplication should be the goal in areas where this is possible and needed. It is not always possible. In the struggle for human dignity there are west areas of social need. Baptists might also consider formation of an inter-Baptist relief and development agency for responding to human needs but also sensitive to the demandation of Church's evangelistic mission.



UNIVERSAL CONCERN IN INDIA BOMBAY

Report on Universal Concern In India presented at the Leaders consultation of Baptist Union of India, Hyderabad held from 17-19thMarch '83

The Universal Concern In India was established in the year 1974 with its office in Bombay, with the objectives of planting indigeous and self supporting churches on the Baptist doctrine.

The area of ministry is in the Western region of India covering Bombay and xMarathwada in Maharashtra, Ahmedabad in Gujarat and Jaisalmar, Sirohi, and Kankroli in Rajasthan, with 22 persons working in 15 worship centres and a Balwadi school and one library.

Inspite of difficulties faced, particularly that of housing accommodation and communication (travelling) in Bombay the out reach is encouraging and particularly that of Telugu.


During the year under report the ms pastors and evangelists had the joy of bringing 320 souls in the experience of of Salvation and Baptising 78.

The year 1982 was a year of struggle for my work and for my own family. It was also a year of victory because I felt personally the presence of God at work through these experiences. The BUI attempted to hold several meetings for the regions and the areas of Baptist work. Of the North, South, West and Northeast regional meetings for which we attempted to held meetings, only the NE India region was able to meet successfully. I was able to do only spade work for organising these regions and areas through correspondence and actual visitation with leaders. I observed that individuals in local churches are keen to know about BUI work and several churches have effective working programmes. But there is a lack of coordination and communication with BUI programmes and aspirations at these levels. It is not uncommon to see several churches as battle grounds for "the sake of Jesus Christ." Under such conditions the churches are exposed for the first time to the idea of meeting together as Baptist brethren Apart from financial difficulties, attitude toward the possibility of just meeting together as believers is a far cry for some churches. Resistance and insensibility toward Christian fellowship are destroying churches which were built over the years. Some churches are very active but many of these establishments have 'kingdoms' where BUI is still a stranger. I will refer to some of my travel experiences later in this light. & mother in law

I experienced hardship at home. My own siter, father/ were bedridden suddenly with illnesses and were both considered incurable.
But God miraculously healed them during the same year. This adversely affected my travel outside bu I was able to attend more of the
meetings in NE India.

Travels: (read along with my travelogue of 82)

South India: My wife and I travelled with a Gospel Singing group of six young Angami Nagas, sponsored by the Angami Baptist Church Council, Nagaland. We visited areas of BOBC, STBC, KBSS for 21 days. As soon as the team packed up to travel, letters and telegrams from some sources arrived home requesting us not to visit them. There was a sudden declation of The Assam bandh blocking travel routes on the day. However, we started out and gained many new experiences. The team members decided to travel even just to pray and visit homes even if church to be closed to them. We visited churches at Guwahati Baptist Church, Assam; Lower Circular Baptist Chapel, Calcutta; Kammagpur Union Church with Rev. A.Shear; some villages in Guntur with Rev. R.Danamaya. We attended city churches in Ongole, Nellore, Kurnool, Hyderabad, Bangalore, and Madras. We faced tensions over STBC church dividion issues at Nellore and Madras where we were given opportunities for Christian witness. The team observed that churches have inherited 'wealth' in terms of vast church properties which are not normally found in NE India Baptist areas. For the first time, some of them became aware of the presence of fellow Baptists in other states, caste problems, and also heard of court cases involving churches. The travel ended with a Bangal bandh at Calcutta but we reached home safely after some delay. It was a learning experience in many ways.

North India: I visited churches in Northern India for 10 days.

Wherever I went, I called church leaders for consultation and presented BUI programmes. In Delhi area, there is no full-time worker yet. I visited Palwal Baptist School of Hariyana and met the Principal who showed me the school and the hospital area. He is also the Secretary of the CBCNI.

West India: I visited CBCNE, STBC and UCI areas for 16 days. This was my second travel down South in the year. Mr. B.Kruparao took me to visit churches in Visakhapatnam. I met several high caste Hindu converts in this trip. I met Baptist church leaders at Kakinada for BUI support plans. I met the BUI President Rev. G.Samuel at Hyderabad to plan for BUI programmes.

I moved to Bombay and stayed there 4 days at the CNI Guest house. I met Rev. V.K. Yangad Vice-President of BUI and visited Baptist churches of Bombay. I felt that for such similiar areas as Bombay, similiar city areas as Bombay, a congregation offering worship in English also can be formed even to help students and believers in transit. I met Rev. B.Samuel, Acting Director of UCI in his office and at his home. Northeast India: I attended the annual meetings of the North East India church Council at Kohima; the Nagaland Baptist Church Council at Jalukie (both in Nagaland). I attended the third NEIBF at Jorhat, Asssam where a constitution was already accepted by 5 Baptist Mission groups out of 6 groups at work.

I attended several tribal Baptist associations and local churches.

A youth choir travelled with me to Mao areas of Manipur. I participated also in such meetings as Nagaland Christian Youth Rally, Dimapur;

BWA at Nairobi, NCCl consultation meet in at Whitefield, Bangalore,

NBCC leaders consultation meet in the sero.

I am grateful to BWA men's fell to Dr. O.Cooper for helping me to attend the BWA, eetong at Marie to the NCCI which paid my travel to Whitefield.

Observation:

The essence of the gospel remains same for all time and all cultures, but methods of presentation and mangement of churche must change. In areas like NE India, Baptist have more full time field secretaries but haveing lesseer faid pastors for local churches. But in areas of BBU, CBCNC, CBCNI, BUNI there is no full time secretaries to cover the areas of work. We must have full time paid secretaries for better coordiantion of work. I personally tried with leaders to form regional fellowship but if requires more efforts. The need must be first felt by regional groups themselves. Evangelism vision or outsied threats to undermine Christian activities have helped some churches to seek unity at this stage. Several Chruches want BUI in their programme but unfortunately they develop this attitude to gain financial helps. This attitude must change for churches in India today. The church must grow from the heart and the faith of believers and therefore the need for church growth and support must come from the soil. With all our debts to the foreign mission bodies who help us to grow, we must face the trend toward using our own resources of culture, people and finance to grow. Therefore, we must be willing to cut across the individual "kingdoms" and slave the wealth together, experiment together for the glory of our Lord and his churches in India.

When we met in the Quadriennial meeting at Cuttack in 1980, we appointed the following persons to call together the respective delegates to discuss about formation of regional Baptist Fellowship:

Rev. P. Dadanandam for the South India Baptist Fellowship Rev. V.K. Yangad for the West India Baptist Fellowship Mr. A.K. Saha for the North India Baptist Fellowship Mrs. K. Terhuja for the North East India Baptist Fellowship

With the help of those leaders I kept on trying to contact the leaders to form regional fellowship. The NEIBF had been formed and now it is functioning smoothly. I hope the other regional fellowship will be formed soon.

The BUI is a fellowship of all Baptist Mission in India. The representatives are drawn through the foreign mission related constituent bodies in regional wise. Through BUI, the national leaders can develop the aspiration of working together and exercise the church programmes in the way they should grow. The Baptist church must learn to depend herself for church management and for outreach programmes. That will enhance our co-existence by helping one another.

Since 1979 to today (as far as I know) Dr. O.Cooper UCI is helping BUI without any string attached. So BUI is functioning according to its own programme. This is a chance for all the church leaders from the different Baptist missions to come together through BUI and help the church to grow. We must keep encouraging the Baptist churches to depend on her resources for church management and for outreach programme because the response has been poor.

A big coungry lie India, with a population over 683 million has only 2½ % Christian. The task is so tremendous but the labourers are so few. How can we reach the people with the Gospel ? We need to strengthen our own flock and go out to the bigger field of India. Plan and programme alone will not work, let us covet the spirit of God to work with us.

Some suggestions for restructuring BUI: a) Administration: Regional Secretary

True to Baptist traditional structure, the strenght of the Baptist churches lies with the local churches. Control and coordination lose its hold at the level of the higher-ups. Moreover for a vast country like India having many different ethnic groups, and difficult communication system, it may be more effective or conducive to have 4 full time workers for the 4 regional groups. We may ask some donors to help us at the beginning but thes secretaries may finally get financed by their groups. His duty will be:

- to assist the Executive Secretary of the BUI;

- to act as a link between Baptist missions in the region and the BUI

- to conduct consultation meetings for better understanding;
- to conduct leadership training for church leaders, pastors;
- to conduct evangelistic campaign in the different churches.

b) Outreach programme:

The BUI may also encourage the growth of societies which can be formed by like minded persons who will do evangelism through education, literature work, evangelistic coursign, kealth care etc. These societies may operate like para-church organisations but will work with the BUI churches. Their service must cut across different Baptist missions so that our churches can draw strength from these resources. As we have not operate is vener with a Baptist identity some talented person are already to us. This need not be interpreted as narrow denoming the most of the service for the service

A brief report of the Baptist leaders consultation conference on Baptist works in India, at Hyderabad, during March 17 - 19, 1983 by Mr. R. Terhuja, Executive Secretary BUI

To Baptist groups of India (National & Parent bodies)

The Consultation:

This was perhaps the first of the kind on national level for the Baptist family to meet with Parent agencies to discuss mutual needs. The Hyderabad Baptist Church of Hyderabad hosted the Consultation Conference. Some thirty seven delegates from the national and parent agencies of Baptist Missions attended the Conference. Dr. R. Hedlund came as a speaker and observer. Except the Execom members of the BUI, all the sending bodies paid the travel expenses of their delegates but food and lodging were all paid by Rev. Jerry Rankin of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Purpose of the Consultation:

The purpose of the consultation is to bring all the various Baptist groups (national and parent bodies) together so as to formulate certain general understanding to coordinate the mission efforts. It was also to encourage each Baptist groups to emphasize Christian life style in all waks of life among its members and to create a new awareness for evangelism to reach beyond own circles.

Both verbal and written reports were received from the following missions or organisations. Most of the reports were already given to the delegates.

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A Consensus:

Having received the reports and sharing personally the problems and the prospects of Baptist works in India, a consensus about the future work can be indicated a, as follows:

There emerged definitely a better understanding among the mission bodies. All participants expressed the need to stabilise the organisation of the BUI for joint efforts of evangelism. The National bodies can increasely work together under the umbrella of BUI to tread new areas of work and reach new people with the gospel. The parent bodies can also coordinate with greater team work and trust as co-labourers toward the same evangelism front. The inward growth as individual Baptist Missions or organisations alone may not meet the demanding evangelism challenges of the day. But the outreach growth toward and evangelism front with fellow Baptists can bring spiritual health and wealth to the body of Christ-the Church. The BUI Execom presented five recommendations to the Consultation Conference for consideration. These were discussed and approved in principle. The recommendations will be referred to the various Baptist groups for actual implementation and they are:

- 1. The Baptist churches are engaged in various outreach programmes and for better and wider coordination and effectivenes, the churches must be kept informed about the activities. To achieve this goal, a Baptist Outreach Fellowship as an evangelical wing of BUI will be formed. The BOF will be opened to national groups, mission agencies or para-church organisations for joint afforts and who will be doing outreach projects related to the Baptist faith.
- 2. An appeal will be given to all Baptist groups both national and parent bodies to support the BUI which need Rs 35,000 yearly and four regional promotional Secretaries which need Rs 25,000 each for a year.
- 3. We are requesting all the Baptist groups to uphold Baptist Quadriennial Assembly which will be held in 1984 at Dimapur, Nagaland. We need about Rs 10,000 for local arrangement and Rs 50,000 for travel and food scholarship.
- 4. The Baptist churches can have better understanding through regular publication of a BUI Bulletin for which the BUI needs support from the Baptist groups. The BUI publications need Rs 7000/- quaterly.
- 5. Training programmes to train church leaders, pastors and lay people become very important in the churches. Therefore the BUI requests the parent bodies to help in financing various training programmes in different part of Baptist fields.

Conclusion:

Having known the needs, I trust all Baptist groups in India and the parent bodies will earnestly try to put these into action. Let us continue to pray for the present Baptist fields and regions to be won for Jesus Christ.

Hyderabad March 19, 1983 BAPTIST LEADERS CONSULTATION FROM ALL BAPTIST GROUPS IN INDIA AND PARENT BODIES

March 17 - 19, 1983 at Hyderabad Baptist Church, Hyderabad - reported by Jessie Rosser (Miss) C.B.C.N.C.

Thursday, 17.3.83 - 6:00 p.m. Inaugural Meeting

Chairman - Rev. G. Samuel, President BUI

Rev. G.Samuel welcomed the delegates, then led in a session of silent prayer, following which was the roll call of Baptist bodies in India, and introduction of special guests and local church elders. Greetings were brought by the Rev. William Scott of the STBC and the BIM of the American Baptist Convention and Rev. V.K. Yangad, Vice President of the BUI and representative of the UCI.

Mr. R.Terhuja, Executive Secretary of the BUL gave an introduction to the consultations. The process are as follow:

- 1. To help national Baptist leaders to understand more fully Baptist work in India and to collect information about it:
- 2. To formulate a general policy for working together in future;
- 3. To prepare a programme for evangelism to be carried out under the BUI

Greetings were brought by Dr. Jarry Rankin from the Southern Baptist Foreign Board. He told of the desire of Factor agencies in North America to help the BUI to explore means to reach India for Christ.

Our Responsibility to it" using the book of Mehemiah to present three challenges: 1) to reconstruction of the walls of Jerusalam: The standard should have a new awareness of its identity, developing a working constitution with freedom, dynamism, and unity of spirit. 2) to religious revival through reading the word, and repentance. We Baptists in India must let the spirit move in our heart to revive us.

3) to renewal of the Covenant; We need to review our Baptist history and God's guidance in it, and to renew our Covenant relationship with God. With unity, we can contribute to the growth of the universal Church.

Friday 18. 3. 83

Representatives of the parent Mission bodies gave reports:

- 1. B.I.M. (of American Baptist Convention) Oral report presented by Rev. William Scott. He mentioned the outreach to Banjaris. - The Bajara Mission' supported by the B.I.M.
- 11 CBOMB a report on policy, appraches, priorities and present assistance being given to India.
- 111 I.B.M. Dr. Jerry Renkin reported on the involvement of their organisation in Karnataka, develped recently and the study undertaken on the spiritual nature of the church, leading to their concern in training and equipping leaders.

Following the above reports, Dr. Roger Hedlund of the Church Growth Reaserch Centre, Madras, gave a very interesting and inforative address on their research finding on Baptist work in India, and conversions in various districts and states. He listed five areas for possible evanglistic thrust by Baptists.

Saturday, 19. 3. 1983: Rev. G. Sauel chaired the meeting. Dr. Jerry Rankin led in Bible Study, using I Cor. 9:27 as his test, especially the words' lest I be rejected' i.e. 'lest I become useless in God's service'. Worldly desires, lack of spiritual discipline etc., could render us useless at any time. We must keep close to Jesus Christ and be continually aware of God's purpose for our lives, the life of our churches, and the life of the BUI.

The Chairman then reviewed the proceedings of the previous sessions and the history of the BUI. The following recommendation of the BUI Executive were placed before the delegates. (No 1 - 5 recommandations.)

Dr. Jerry Rankin explained the perspective of the Baptist Mission agencies of North America. He emphasized their desire to combine resources to aid the national bodies to reach India for Christ. This cooperation effort should not supplant the present commitments of the Mission Boards in the areas of the national bodies, that is, it should not be a threat that it ional bodies, nor should it. create a new organization. Elie should be a forum for dialogue to share needs of various was sold be the umbralla organization, representing the various aptist bodies, being a forum for NOT TO BE USED WITHOUT COPYRIGHT PERMISSION sharing.

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Rev. William Scott, Miss Jessie Rossen and Miss Mildred Law, representing the BIM and CBOMB commented on the recommendations, suggeting a greater financial share from India in the FTE publication, a strengthing of BUI Sunday, and a working out of the details for implementing the five recommendations.

Rev. R.Joseph of ACTC emphasized the meed to stabilize the organization of BUI in order to undertake on outreach programme, the need for intensive training of leadership in national Baptist bodies, aiming at dedicated leadership, and the necessity for the BUI to relate to the national Baptist bodies.

Rev. Patro of Orissa, Rev. Banjamin of STBC and the President of the Hyderabad Baptist Church gave helpul comments. The Rev. Petro suggested the publication of the BUI journal be undertaken in Hyderabad editor, manager etc to be in Hyderabad.

Afternoon, 19.3.1983

(I missed the first part)

The 5 recommandation were discussed. Rev. G.Samuel stressed that the BUI must create confidence by its honest accountability for Sunds received and expended. It was suggested that Re 1 per head be requested from our churches.

Mr. R.Terhuja mentioned that those with a burden for outreach should come to the Baptist Outreach Fellowship and choose their own leader. BUI should be merely an umbralla. The outreach undertaken should be outside of the present national Baptist bodies' areas.

Rev. R. Joseph moved that the 5 recommandations be accepted to be taken up by the BUI and that the BUI Executive should study the implications of each recommendation.

Rev. R.Hedlund gave a challenging address on "How can the Church grow in India?" Using illustrations from several states he showed how we can learn from present history, how to make plans for outroch, when to work, how to reach the people for Christ.

Dr. Shelby led the prayer session.

Hyderabad March 19, 1983 Report on the works of the Utkal Baptist Church Central Council (UBCCC), and Utkal Baptist Evangelistic Crusade (OBEC) of Orissa submitted to the Secretary, BUI during the Baptist Leaders consultation held at Hyderabad on 18.3.83 by Brother Sarat Chandra Nag. Secretary, UBCCC, Orissa.

Praise and glory be to the precious Name of our Lord and Saviour Jesus whose grace has enabled the church leaders of the different Baptist churches and church-unions of Orissa state of India, which have not joined the church of North India, to meet together in the Baptist Church, Cuttack on July 8-9,1978 to reorganise the aforesaid churches and unions knetting them into a body called the Utkal Baptist Church Central Council (UBCCC).

At present, 82 Baptist Churches and only 3 District Baptist Church unions, namely Cuttack-Dhenkanal Baptist Church Union, Kond-Hill Baptist Church union and Balangir Baptist church union have been affiliated into the body of UBCCC. In most of these churches pastors are appointed by the concerned church, except in the Kond-Hills and Balangir Baptist church unions where the pastors are appointed by the concerned union. Because of various difficulties we have not yet reached to the stage of running the different church administration of these Baptist churches through a single common purse of UBCCC. Owing to lack of funds and proper co-ordination of the funds of these churches many of the pastors and evangelists fail to enjoy proper financial aids and this stands in the way of evangelism. Over and above this, we have not been able to raise funds for giving Biblical training to get future church workers and to award help especially to needy children for study. At present, no doubt, this is an important factor for our area where the Cuttack and the Sambalpur Diocese of the C.N. I. situated in Orissa are trying in various their sides before the means to win the Baptist bull presence of our needy Bapt to liver ers belonging to our churches. As I am personally concerned in the church affairs of Balangir

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Baptist thion as the Area Superintendent and the honorary pastor of the Baptist church, Balangir for nearly the last 11 years being stationed at Balangir which is the heart of the Sambalpur Diocese of C.N.I, the aforesaid issue has been coming to us as a great challenge every now and then. In this texture, I would appeal to the Baptist believers in general and the Baptist church leaders of B.U.I. in particular to take this issue with sympathy and christian love and find out ways and means possible at their level to redress the needs of the zealous youngmen and women to be trained for Lord's service and the school and college going of children of the poor folk of the Baptist Churches our area where many of our brothers and sisters are in low financial status being tribal aboriginal folk residing in hilly regions.

At last but not in the least, I am deeply grieved in my spirit to make mention that when UBCCC was expecting something move to be strengthened in the works of the Lord through keeping fellowship with the brotheren of Universal Concern Federation of the United States, whom I had the chance to meet in the capacity of the Secretary of UBCCC at Calcutta on their way back from the Asian Baptist conference held at Hyderabad our hopes have been dashed to nought because of Devil's plan in causing Internal Church problems, especially in the Baptist Church, Cuttach and ultimately this badly affected the work of UBCCC inspite of the love and help granted to us by U.C.F.

With a view to finding out some solution to our problems through proper consideration and judicious views I put forth below a few lines.

Many thanks to our respected and beloved brothers of U.C.F. which is marching ahead taking in concern for Lord's work through the unfainting leader winsom personalities of Dr.Owen Cooper and Dr.Blanch se they were gracious enough in sanctioning a salari st of a travelling secretary

for UBCCC as per our request to then during the days of the last quedrinniel meeting of B.U.I. held at Cuttack. But I am deeply pained to say that this news of sanctioning the new post could not even be conveyed to the Executive Committee, UBCCC by our President, who was then, of his own accord making frequent correspondence with keen interest and zeal with U.C.F. on behalf of UBCCC and through whom the aforesaid sanction of the post was received from U.C.F. Then again, with a grant given by U.C.F. to UBCCC for arranging a pastors' Conference, our respected President personally organised the pastors' conference at Cuttack overlooking all the other office bearers as well as Executive members of UBCCC with a spirit of openly claiming that grant to be a personal money of his own given by U.C.F. Besides this, he, without the Knowledge and approval of the executive committee of UBCCC, has manipulated in getting one of his favourites appointed, by U.C.F. to the said post of the travelling secretary for UBCCC and the person thus appointed to the post is found not at all working even for a couple of days for UBCCC. Such works of the President have severely hammered UBCCC in its march. Now, under the leadership of the president and the said person one more organisation called OBEC (Orissa Baptist Evangelistic Crusade) has been formed with the sole aim of handling the help that comes from UCF for Evangelical works of Orissa, OBEC, in the name of Evangelical works is giving tamptation to the simple poor baptist believers of our churches of getting foreign help. The needy folks are attracted to such famptations and in many other places, mostly in Kondh-Hill union the believers side with OBEC. In many churches this has been causing divisions among the Baptist churches. Particularly in Balangir Baptist Union where I have been personally work in Lord's work since long werk sec has created two divisions as I have said before, the in many churches. Instead of Kenning unity and co-operation with

the Balangir Baptist Church Union leaders OBEC has intentionally and forcibly entered into its churches with the help of a few undesirable persons who have never given any lead to the Baptist believers of this area and many of whom are involved in anti-church actions.

Two persons who have been appointed as Evangelists for Balangir district by OBEC are not the persons associated with the concerned Union in reorganising or serving the Baptist people. They were previously workers in the Sambalpur Diocese dissiminating anti-Baptist feeling among the believers of C.N.I. and have left the C.N.I. with a record of insincerity and unfaithfulness both in their social andspritual fields. They have entered into our church not as champions of Baptist faith but with sheer selfish motive of getting filthy lucre. Thus appointment to such persons as Baptist Evangelists is not only detrimental to true evangelism, but also mere wastage of money of god's people as well as a ridicule to the works of Baptist Churches of the concerned area. How saddening it is a fact to think that the money which reaches to OBEC through a sacrificial spirit of love and concern from our esteemed friends of UCF is being harnessed in causing division among the believers of the Baptist Churches and in recruiting undesirable hands for sanctified work like evangelism, without keeping co-operation and unity with the concerned churches and unions.

Hence I would once more appeal to the learned members and office bearers of B.U.I. to advise the leaders of OBEC to refrain themselves from such of their activities and the UCF to be aware of such situation in Orissa and be in fellowship with UBCCC for all of the same as they desire and

plan for Orissa, because UBCCC happens to be the First Organisation, dedicated and prayed for, for promulgating christian amity and unity among the scattered Baptist Churches within the State of Orissa. UBCCC is not yet defunct as some view but only detained on its march due to the hurdles posed on its way by its own members, particularly Mr.S.Patra the President and and his associates who have in the meanwhile left UBCCC in actions.

Report on Baptist Union of India Commultations held March 17-19, 1983, at Baptist Church, Hyderabed, Narayanaguda.

To: CEFMS Oversees Department / CEFMS Central India / BCA (Maharashtra)

participant: as observer because I am not a mamber of BUI, as a participant because I was asked to present a paper. The gathering was attended by 38 official delegates plus observers Rev. G. Samuel, President of BUI and pastor of BCH presided. Reports were presented by Mr. R. Terhuja, BUI Executive Secretary and on behalf of NRIBF member bodies, and by representatives of STBC, CBCMC, OBMC, UCI, RBCC, BIM, SBC and GBOMB.

My contribution was given as "Research Informations Regarding Responsive Peoples and Areas: A Baptist Report." Because of the sensitive nature of some of the data, the report is not for publication although the information is made available to reliable persons and agencies who will make proper use of the information for planning evengelism strategies. While this was to have been my sole contribution, near the close of the consultation I was asked to give a further address on church growth. Fortunately I had with me some lecture notes from a previous conference!

A number of the problems of some of the constituent bodies dame to light, but this was not the major impact. The main thrust of these meetings had to do with opportunities for fresh outreach. Five points were presented and accepted: 1) a Baptist Outreach Feliquenip should be formed as a voluntary body to endourage work outside and beyond existing churches. Parent (overseas) agencies are encouraged to do now church planting. Personnel can be recruited from existing churches for outreach work.

- 2) BUI should continue to function as a fallowships support is needed from all agencies. A regional promotional sacretary should be appointed to serve regions outside North Hast India. The four BUI regional fallowships are N.E., North, South and West.
- 3) A quadramnial assembly should be held, beginning from 1984, and other Beptists not members of BUI will be invited to attend as well as members. The 1984 assembly is to be in March in Negaland if possible, otherwise at Bengalore.
- 4) For better communication bonie, then expanded into a cation. It was also decided in to be prepared under the

should be launched on a querterly end ultimetaly a monthly publi-Beptist Directory of India. This f Rev. G. Samuel with the assistance of CHURCH GROWTH RESEARCH CENTRE by 1984.

5) The need was stressed for training through seminars, conferences and refresher courses for pastors and members.

Various financial needs (and sources) to achieve these objectives were also discussed. The real meaning and purpose of this meeting was expressed by Jerry Rankin of FMB/SBC as a forum for information and co-operation to unleash resources for going into new areas without threat to others and without creating new structures. BUI is therefore convenient and usable not for organic union but as a fellowship/umbrella and forum of exchange.

It is my conviction that it is in the interests of CBFMS and especially BCA to participate in this forum. If not as members, we ought atleast to go to the assembly as observers. I would recommend that BCA/CBFMS send observers.delegates to the 1984 BUI assembly. As non-members, I feel we should also provide statistics and other reports as part of the Baptist family in India.

The sincere efforts and commitment of the executive secretary Mr. R. Terhuja and of the president, Rev. G. Samuel, deserve our confidence and participation.

Dear Dr. Cooper:

Greetings from South India. For years I have known of the work of Universal Concern in India, and have had contact with various of your personnel from time to time. Perhaps I should introduce myself. From 1974 - 1978 I taught at the Union Biblical Seminary, Yavatmal, as Associate Professor of Missiology. Since 1978 I have been associated with the CHURCH GROWTH ASSOCIATION OF INDIA as its Co-ordinator and Acting Director of the CHURCH GROWTH RESEARCH CENTRE in Madras.

In case you are not acquainted with our work, let me briefly state that CHURCH GROWTH RESEARCH CENTRE is engaged in research and study related to the evangelisation task in India. We publish the INDIA CHURCH GROWTH QUARTERLY as well as other materials of interest to mission and evangelfzation. We conduct Church Growth Seminars, Workshops and Conferences. related to missionary work in India today. More meently we have collaborated with the Southern Baptist Mission in doing research pertaining to perspective fields for Baptist Church planting in India. By the way, I should mention that I am a Baptist sponsored in India by the Conservative Saptist Foreign Mission Society of Wheaton. During March I attended the Baptist Union of India Consultation at Hyderabad. The paper which I presented there may be of interest to you and will give you some indication of the type of ministry that we seek to promote. I will ask our office to send a copy of this paper to you. Last year we published a small book entitled "BUILDING THE CHURCH", the final chapter of which contains a summary of the present status of the missionary task in each of the States and Union Territories of India. If you are intersted we can send you a copy of this as well.

But I write to you in relation to two specific matters. The first concerns the possible availability of the Yavatmal property being vacated by the Union Biblical Seminary which is shifting to Pune this summer. I enclose a carbon copy of a letter to Dr. Narandra John of the Free Methodists in relation to this matter. If you have any further questions of interest concerning this matter, I will be happy to hear from you and explain what I can.

finances come from a variety of sources. While the Conservative Baptists contribute a small part, a much larger share was subsidised by another agency namely, Overseas Crusades of Santa Clara, California. Due to the recession and perhaps other factors, Overseas Crusades has not been able to continue their subsidy for the past year. We have been able to carry on through research funds contributed by World Vision, The Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board, and other gifts. What this means is that we lack adequate funds for full development and operation of our complete programme. It seems to me that the nature of our ministry, e.g. research pertaining to unevangelised people groups etc., is very much related to the interests of Universal Concern in India. For this reason I have taken the liberty of writing to you in this way. I would be pleased to discuss further details with you. I look forward to hearing from you. Thank you very much.

I have received and read with interest your letter of April 5, 1983. It came when I was on an extended trip; hence my delay in replying.

I have heard of you and your work. Jerry Rankin had discussed your work with me sometime ago and stated that he would be working with you in the future. I am glad to note that this has come to pass. Certainly, the work you are doing is a constructive prelude to expanding a program of witnessing in India as is contemplated by NIM.

I look forward to receiving a copy of the paper that you presented in Hyderabad. I would also like to receive a copy of your book, "Building the Church". Contrary to my general habit, I will read the last chapter first. Please dispatch one to me at your convenience.

In my discussion with Jerry Rankin, I do not feel that they are interested in getting involved with property in India. My observation of BBU, CBCNC and SBTC leads me to believe that property can create more problems than it can solve. This does not mean that I would not be interested in having information about the possible availability of Yavatmal property when the seminary is moved to Pune this summer. There are several questions that obviously arise.

- 1. The cost of the property.
- 2. The cost of maintaining the property.
- 3. The cost of maintaining a faculty on the campus.
- 4. Other costs incidental to operating a school.

My interest in the school would be largely determined by operating an institution that would train people to be church planters in villages and probably be bi-vocational pastors initially.

Any information you can give would be appreciated.

You also mention the matter of financial support for the Church Growth Research Center. May I give you a word about UCI. We are a small group that was organized for a single purpose. That purpose is being fulfilled and it is our plan to phase out extra thin the next five years. 

I have before me that excellent presentation you made before the National Consultation of the Baptist Union of India entitled "Research information regarding responsive peoples and areaas - a Baptist Report" Of course I didnot have to listen to it as I had to leave the consultation earlier.

Since you have indicated that this material is not for publication I seek your permission to use it in the Inaugural number of the Baptist periodical the Baptist Union of India executive have asked me to edit and publish. I request you kindly to edit it and send me the material by about the 25th of this month. May we also publish Appendix - B?

Just a comment on Appendix-A - "List of Baptist Bodies in India". This is an admirable compilation and for most part, accurate. Under the caption 'ethno-linguistic composition' you indicated against Convention of Baptist Churches of Northern Circars, you mentioned "Madiga" and against samavesam, "Mala". To begin with, there two are interposed and both the conventions have 'Malas' and 'Madigas' but predominantly the C.B.C.N.C. is 'Mala' and S.T.B.C. is 'Madiga'. I suggest that you donot use these words because the present day generation resents it and also it is a fact that there is a sizeable influx of non-harijan converts into both these Conventions. Secondly, how far is Mala -Madiga strain ethnological or simply social. The Dravidian streak in their culture is by no means restricted to them as most of the lower strata of Sudras also have the Dravidian background. This is just to bring my comments to your notice.

I was so glad to meet you at the consultation and look forward to the pleasure of meeting you again in the future.

THE BIBLE AND THE UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS

By Carl W. Tiller

Before proceeding to look at specific Biblical texts, it is well to take note that the Universal Declaration of Human Rights is primarily an affirmation of fundamental freedoms which are similar to those which we Baptists affirm as corollaries of the God-human relationship. Our affirmations are rooted in the understanding of the God-man (God-human) relationship as we interpret the Bible as a whole.

Some of Our Doctrinal Affirmations

Freedom of Choice. We understand that each human is given the choice of accepting or rejecting God's redemption, that God does not coerce us, and that neither parents nor "god-parents" can make the decision for one. Spiritual rebirth into the Kingdom of God is a personal matter.

Freedom from "props." We understand that baptism is not a means of grace, but a symbol of what has already happened to the believer - death to the old self, and resurrection to the new life. Thus we affirm that salvation is not dependent upon properties (such as water) or upon other humans (such as a baptizer). Rather, each human's salvation depends upon a direct relationship to God, in which no third party is necessary.

Freedom from religious hierarchies. We understand that God, the Holy Spirit, will enlighten the believer who studies the Word and truly seeks understanding, and that neither Pastor nor Bishop nor Synod can rightly coerce us. Everyone has a right to freedom of opinion, a right to express opinions, and a right to vote as he/she is led, as we believe, by the Holy Spirit.

Freedom from the State. We understand that the State should keep "hands off" in matters religious. Just as God does not coerce us neither should the community of people (the State) seek to coerce our consciences or beliefs.

Freedom from class distinctions. We understand that all of God's children are loved equally, and that in the economy of God there are no distinctions of race, color, sex, language, national origin, or other such "status" characteristics of birth and rearing. Nor does our Christian fellowship place of above another because of economic or political environment, or because of economic or political attainments.

Association for the Common total Free Editividuals have duties to the community (Society), says the Declaration. Annotation of the Declaration

In the left column below, we quote the 30 articles of the Declaration (omitting the Preamble). In the right column, we cite some Biblical verses which seem relevant to the passage across the page. However, the Biblical texts are not presented here in the context in which they occur, and therefore are in no sense "proof texts" for the Declaration.

In the selection of Biblical passages, we have drawn extensively on the Biblical references in the Spanish language booklet, "La Palabra de Dios, Los Derechos Humanosy EI Pueblo de Dios". published in 1981 by the Consejo Latino-americano de Iglesias (en formacion), but we quote them here in the English language, utilizing several translations.

The Declaration

Article 1 All human beings are born free and equal in dignity and rights. They are endowed with reason and conscience and should act toward one another in a spirit of brotherhood.

Article 2 Everyone is entitled to all the rights and freedoms set forth in this declaration, without distinction of any kind, such as race, color, sex, language, religion, political or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth, or other status. Furthermore, no distinction shall be made on the basis of the political, jurisdictional or international status of the country or territory to which a person belongs, whether it be independent, trust, non-selfgoverning, or under any other limitation of sovereignty.

Article 3 Everyone has the right to life, liberty and security of person.

Article 4 No one shall be held in slavery or servitude; slavery and the slave trade shall be prohibited in all their forms.

No one shall be held guilty of any penal offense on account of any act or omission that did not constitute a penal offense, under national or international law, at the time when it was omitted. Nor shall a heavier penalty be imposed than the one that was applicable at the time the penal offense was committed.

Article 12 No one shall be subjected to arbitrary interference with his privacy, family, home or correspondence, nor to attacks upon his honour and reputational Everyone has the right to the protection the law against such interference or at the law against such agai

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Article 25 Everyone has the right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-being of himself and his family, including food, clothing, housing, medical care and necessary social services, and the right to security in the event of unemployment, sickness, disability, widowhood, old age or other lack of livelihood in circumstances beyond his control.

Motherhood and childhood are entitled to special care and assistance. All children, whether born in or out of wedlock, shall enjoy the same special protection.

Article 26 Everyone has the right to education. Education shall be free, at least in the elementary and fundamental stages.

Elementary education shall be compulsory. Technical and professional education shall be made generally available and higher education shall equally accessible to all on the basis of merit.

Education shall be directed to the full development of the human personality and to the strengthening of respect for human rights and fundamental freedoms. It shall promote understanding, tolerance and friendship among all nations, racial or religious groups, and shall further the activities of the United Nations for the maintenance of peace.

Parents have a prior right to choose the kind of education that shall be given to their children.

When you gather the harvest of your land, you are not to harvest to the very end of the field. You are not to gather the gleanings of the harvest. The Declaration was adopted by the General Assembly of the United Nations on 10 December 1948 by a vote of 48 to 0 (with some law, but is a standard of achievement to the law, and all nations.

Two major covenants (treaties) to carry the last were offered to the States in 1966 and have become law for the States which character to them: the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (NOT TO BE DESEMBLIANDE ED PRICHE) PERMISSION THE International Covenant on Economic, Social, and Cultural Rights (NOT TO BE DESEMBLIANT THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY)

Also, some 16 supplementary conventions have been written and have come into force for the States which have agreed to adhere to them. They cover such subjects as: freedom of association, prevention of the crime of genocide, suppression of traffic in persons, equal remuneration for men and women, the status of refugees, the political rights of women, the abolition of slavery, the nationality of married women, the abolition of forced labor, eliminating discrimination in employment and occupation, the status of stateless persons, against discrimination in education, on the international right of correction, on marriage, and on the alimination of racial discrimination.

Further, the General Assembly in 1981 proclaimed a Declaration on the Elimination of All Forms of Intolerance and of Discrimination Based on Religion and Relief.

You are aware that this is the 5th year that Baptists in India have been making attempts to have better communication among the different Baptist Missions on national level through the Baptist Union of India. Attempts were made before through honorarium workers but a new beginning with fresh records are being maintained after creating the post of an Executive Secretary to cover the works.

It has been difficult to focus our concern toward a common Baptist identity although it is a contextual necessity today in India for survival and evangelism. To forge this consciousness the Baptist groups met in Cuttack, Orissa in 1980 at a Quadriennial Assembly which was perhaps first of its kind on national level in this country. Baptist leaders were able to meet together more often through coordinated efforts of local means and help from concerned friends abroad.

A new opportunity to meet is before us again when we will meet in March 1 - 4, 84 in Dimapur, Nagaland, N.E. India. We will expect at least 350 delegates from outside Nagaland.

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

I was back in India in July, but I regret that my itinerary did not bring me to Madras this time and I did not have an opportunity to see I imagine that it would not have been likely to find you at home anyway considering the time of year and your busy schedule. I trust that everything is going well.

I want to express my appreciation again for your presentation at the Baptist Consultation in Hyderabad, especially the research report and the opportunity you had to challenge the group to reach out to some of the new potentially responsive areas. Although I am quite sceptical concerning the future of the Baptist Union of India, I am optimistic about some cooperative efforts of local Baptist groups and agencies working together. We were able to lay a lot of groundwork for our expanded church planting program and leadership training program during Jack Shelby's six months in India. We will be initiating quarterly training seminars in nine locations in October and by January will be involved in several church planting projects.

I hope to write you in detail about all that we are doing, but my main purpose in getting this letter off is to let you know that we will be reducing our contribution to the Church Growth Research Centre in January 1984 to \$100 each month. We recognize the value of what you are doing and are committed to it, but with the initiation of the expanded program we have been working toward for several years in India we don't feel we can maintain the \$200 monthly contribution and meet the priorities of our budget needs. We will plan to continue support of \$100 monthly and hope you will be understanding of the necessity of this adjustment. By the way, with our taking over work in Bombay we are very interested in receiving any research reports you may have compiled recently possess.





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NORTH EAST INDIA BAPTIST FELLOWSHIP CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE

The Baptist are the largest Denominational group in the North East India. They are actively operating in their respective areas. The Baptist leaders in their first Consultation at Dimapur, Nagaland in 1979 felt the need of their coming closer for fellowship and cooperation for greater evangelistic outreach efforts etc. and that they should have a functional and viable body like 'North East India Baptist Fellowship, to enable them to work together with a common goal in view.

As a result, the second meeting of the North East India Baptist Fellowship (NEIBF) was held in Gauhatj, Assam in 1981. Where a draft constitution on the NEIBF was accepted by the representatives of the Baptist Churches of the Region. This Constitution, accepted by the representatives on the date November 13, 1981, come into force after it is finally approved by the member bodies of the NEIBF.

I NAME

The organisation shall be known as NORTH EAST INDIA BAPTIST FELLOWSHIP' herein after referred to N.E.I.B.F.

II AIMS

The general aim of the NEIBF shall be:

- A. To express oneness of the Baptist churches in NEIBF:
- B. To promote spiritual growth through mutual sharing and closer Fellowship;
- C. To promote the United Baptist Mission of NEI: and to unitedly stand together in respect source non problems;
- D. To give expression to the property of view on various issues.

III MEMBERSHIP

Membership shall be of two kinds:

A. Full membership:
