No less than 19,000 copies of this profound yet winsome, bright though searching, faithful and fervid treatise, for treatise it is, have been sold. The work is a Biblical study of a high order; it is detailed, yet comprehensive; calm, logical, solid, though eloquent, persuasive, and tender; and, while its perusal must prove profitable to all, those who really study it will find that "it hath dust of gold." "Everyday Religion," pp. 212, is a series of thoughtful, exegetical, spiritual, and practical Bible studies. They are not what are generally known as addresses or sermons, though they are really the best order of such efforts. They are a successful attempt to make the Bible explain, illustrate, and enforce its own teaching. Here the Bible says much and man says little, and each study is as a nugget of pure gold. "The Record of a Happy Life" (Boston: Willard Tract Repository, U.S.A.): In this neatly got-up volume Mrs. Smith tells the story of the life of her son Franklin, who was a most promising Christian and student. One sometimes barely knows which to admire the more, the mother or the son, the writer, or the hero of her story. A copy could be given with advantage to every youth in the land. It is a most savory and stimulating, as well as an impressive and touching work. It is more absorbing than any novel. "The Science of Motherhood" (White Ribbon Publishing Co., London) costs but sixpence, and yet no work could well prove more helpful to mothers. Mrs. Smith is a wise and devout councillor, and mothers cannot do better than study this little manual which has been prepared for them.
