John James was born in Buckingham county, Va., August, 1782. He emigrated to Kentucky about the year 1797, and settled in the Green River country. He was married to Margaret Taylor, September, 1803. About the time of his marriage, he embraced religion, and joined the Methodist Church.

Soon after, he commenced exhorting and preaching, in which he was strongly opposed by his relatives, yet God made him the instrument of the conversion of his father and mother. His father-in-law, who was wealthy for those times, disinherited his daughter because her husband was a Methodist preacher. Such was the conviction of his mind that it was his duty to preach the gospel, that neither his natural timidity, nor yet the opposition he met with, deterred him from entering upon that long, arduous, and self-sacrificing itinerant life that has been crowned with such success and honor. His first instruction in preaching was under that master-spirit and workman, the Rev. Marcus Lindsey. Father James joined the travelling Connection in 1820; consequently, he had been in the regular work forty years, though, at the time of his death, he had been preaching more than half a century. He filled various important and responsible appointments in the Conference acceptably and successfully. Though he had a growing family, yet, for several of the earlier years of his ministry, he received only from forty to sixty dollars per annum for his services; and when his pay reached two hundred dollars, in the language of Mother James, "it began to look like living." In addition to giving his life and labors for fifty years to the Church, he also expended the proceeds of two farms of some three hundred acres. Father James departed this life in the calmness of Christian confidence, ——, 1860, in Millersburg, where he had for many years resided. His remains lie sleeping in the cemetery at Millersburg, where his friends propose to erect a monument to his memory. Father James was a fair English scholar. He made the Bible his great text-book. He was a man of great zeal and earnestness, and faithfully discharged the duties of his office to the last. His saddle-bags were packed preparatory to his proceeding to an appointment to preach on the morning on which he was taken to his bed. His preaching ability was good, partaking more of the characteristics of an earnest hortatory appeal than of severe logical doctrinal discussions. During his ministerial life he won many souls to Christ, and was re-garded in his old age as a father in Israel. He loved his work to the last, and might be said to have descended from his horse to the grave. We herewith present an account of his last hours, as taken down at the time by D. Stevenson, one of the committee: "Father James was confined to his bed one week. When it became evident that he could not live, I asked him if he wished to send any word to his brethren of the Conference. He answered: 'Tell them that I have tried to serve God and promote his cause. I have done this feebly, I know; and, in looking back, I can see wherein I might have done better, but my great aim has been to glorify

God. But I claim nothing on the ground of my efforts. My only reliance is in the merits of the Lord Jesus Christ: trusting in these, I have no fear of death. The doctrines of the Methodist Church, which I have preached all my life, I still believe to be true, though I love the true followers of God wherever I see them. Having devoted my life to the service of God, I do not now regret it. Had I to live it over again, I should again devote it to his service. I have not always fared as well as I could have wished; but I have not been, and am not now, disposed to murmur at the dispensations of Providence. I commend my wife to the care of my brethren of the Conference.' Some one present asked him if, now that he was about to depart, he could encourage his brethren of the Conference to go on in their labors and toils in preaching the gospel. 'O yes,' he replied. Some other question of similar import was asked him by some one else, to which he gave a similar response. He then continued talking for some time in the same strain. A short time before he died, I asked him if all was well. 'O yes!' he said, in a voice now scarcely audible. He continued sensible to the last, and evidently understood all that was said to him. Indeed, we seemed to converse with his spirit even in the very act of its separation from the body, and were thus singularly and powerfully impressed with the truth of the immortality of the soul."

Benjamin F. Wilson departed this life at nine o'clock P.M., July 26, 1860. He was born in Columbiana county, Ohio, November 25, 1834; was awakened and converted to God, September, 1853, at a Cumberland Presbyterian camp-meeting, in Caldwell county, Ky., and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, under the ministry of the Rev. J. W. Emerson, on the Empire Iron Works Circuit, the same autumn. He was licensed to preach by the Quarterly Conference of that charge, July 15, 1854, and was admitted on trial as a travelling preacher in the Louisville Conference the following October. His first appointment was to the Elizabethtown, his second to the Scottsville, his third to the New Haven, and his fourth to the Louisville Circuit. His fifth and sixth appointments were to the Russellville Station. In all these different charges he was highly acceptable, and in some of them eminently useful. He possessed a mind of great original strength. His perceptive faculties were clear and discriminating; while his reasoning powers were equalled by few, and surpassed, perhaps, by none of his age. As a preacher of the gospel, he was plain, impressive, practical, and, at times, effective and powerful. Had his life been spared, if true to himself, his Church, and his God, he must, at no very distant day, have taken rank among the first and most distinguished ministers of the South-West. Benjamin F. Wilson died, as he had lived, a Christian, in the fullest sense of that term. He died strong in faith, trusting implicitly and alone for salvation in the mercy of God, as revealed in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ. He had been somewhat indisposed for several days before he was confined to his room. It was not, however, until Wednesday evening, July 25th, that he was considered at all dangerous. A very marked change then took place in his symptoms, and it was soon manifest to all that his stay upon earth was rapidly drawing to a close. On Thursday, July 26th, he conversed fully and freely with his brethren and friends in relation to his approaching dissolution, giving the most entire satisfaction to all who heard him. A few hours before his death, he was asked if his faith in Christ was still unshaken: he promptly replied in the affirmative. Being then asked if he had any special message for his brethren at Conference, he was understood to say by those who were near him: "Tell them I die fully satisfied of the truth of Christianity, and with the most un-shaken confidence in God my Saviour." He has left an affectionate wife, two lovely little sons, a devoted father and mother, with a numerous circle of brethren and friends.

Gabriel A. Hardison was a native of Hopkins county, Kentucky. He died in June, 1860. Brother Hardison was of respectable and pious parentage, and embraced religion at an early age. He was licensed to preach by the Quarterly Conference of Marion Circuit, under the administration of the Rev. N. II. Lee, presiding elder, in the autumn of 1855; and he was employed by the presiding elder to form a mission on Green River, known subsequently as "Green River Mission." He was received on trial into the travelling connection in 1856, at Elizabethtown, and appointed to Green River Mission by Bishop Early. At the close of the first quarter, he was changed by the presiding elder to Hardinsburg Circuit, where he labored for the rest of the year. At the Conference at Smithland, in 1857, he was appointed by Bishop Pierce to Hancock street Station, Louisville. At the session in Hopkinsville, in 1858, he was appointed to the Louisville Circuit. In 1859, at the session at Bardstown, he was appointed to Calhoun Circuit. This was his last appointment. He went immediately to his circuit, and evinced more than usual interest in his work. While on his circuit he was quite ill; and becoming better, he went on a visit to his father's, in Todd county. Here he preached his last sermon. He was attacked violently with erysipelas in its most malignant form. He lingered and suffered extremely for about eight months. It was finally decided by the physicians that amputation of the limb principally affected was necessary, as the last and only alternative. He submitted to the operation with perfect calmness and self-possession; but he died shortly after the operation, in great peace. His reason was unimpaired to the last; and he gave the utmost satisfaction to his friends as to his preparedness for heaven. He spoke freely and triumphantly of his departure, and sent word to his brethren of the Conference that he was departing safe, and that he hoped to meet them in heaven. He had been in the fiercest fires of affliction for many months, and the dross had all been consumed, and nothing but the pure metal remained. He was a man of more than ordinary intellectual endowments, and enjoyed the advantages of a respectable mental culture. He had made good proficiency in Christian theology, and was a very good preacher for his age.

Benjamin S. Ashby. 1.

Benjamin S. Ashby was a native of Kentucky. We know nothing definitely of his early history, except that he emigrated to Missouri in 1818, being then about twenty-one years of age. At this time he was a licensed local preacher, and came to Missouri with the intention of entering at once the travelling connection, but his aged, widowed mother coming soon after, he deferred entering upon the itinerant work until he had provided for her comfort. In 1823, he received his first appointment to New Madrid Circuit; in 1824, LaMine; 1825, Cedar Creek; 1826, St. Louis Circuit; 1827 and 1828, Buffalo; 1829, Fishing River. In 1830, he received a superannuated relation, in which relation he was continued until he located in the year 1834. In 1845, he was readmitted into the travelling connection, and appointed to Brunswick District. In 1846 and 1847, he travelled the Keytesville Circuit; in 1848, stationed at Palmyra; in 1849, Portland Circuit; in 1850 and 1851, the Richmond District; in 1852 and 1853, he travelled the Savannah District; in 1854, stationed at Clarksville and Paynesville:

in 1855, stationed at Canton. In 1856, he was appointed as supernumerary to Brunswick Station; and in 1857, his strength was so far exhausted that he took a superannuated relation, which relation he retained until his death. He was a delegate to the General Conference in 1854, and was noted for the soundness of his judgment, and the practical character of his views upon all matters upon which he was called to deliberate. Brother Ashby was a zealous, faithful preacher: in the pulpit he was always sound, instructive, and sometimes powerful. He was a man of prayer, being much on his knees in private as well as in public. On Wednesday, August 29, 1860, he preached twice, delivering his last sermon on Matt. xi. 28, 29: "Come unto me, all ye that labor," etc. Near the close of the sermon he was greatly blessed: related his experience, regretting all unfaithfulness; he affirmed that if he had a thousand lives, he would give them all to the ministry, and that he would like to die at the altar of God. The following day he was apparently in the enjoyment of his usual health-attended church morning and night. After sermon in the evening, he talked with penitents for near an hour. It was intimated to him that it was time to close; he answered that it was, but that he wanted to pray first. The hymn being concluded, he called upon the congregation to join in prayer. He led the prayer until near its close, when he was observed to pause for a moment, and then to attempt to speak, but his voice was faint as one going to sleep. He fell to the floor. The attack was thought to be epilepsy. In twenty minutes he so far revived as to be able to swallow a little water, and, with much effort, to speak a few words, but was soon taken with another spasm, in which, for a few minutes, he appeared to be in great distress. But this soon passed off, and at fifteen minutes past twelve o'clock, on the morning of the 31st, he slept in Jesus without a struggle or a groan. His remains were interred at Keytesville.

JAMES A. CUMMING was born in Buncombo county, N. C., November 23, 1826. Of his early opportunities and boyhood peculiarities we know but little. His father being a preacher, it may be inferred that his mind was early impressed with religious truth, and that his home education gave to his character the elements of that eminent personal piety which matured in after life. He embraced religion at an early age, and became a member of the Methodist Church. In 1849, July 14, he was licensed to preach, and was admitted into the Indian Mission Conference, October 28, of the same year. His first work was among the Indians on the Shawnee and Delaware Mission. He speaks freely in his journal of the embarrassments and difficulties of this work, arising from his want of experience, and the process of reaching the Indians through interpreters. By the change of boundary lines, he fell into the St. Louis Conference, in which he ended his days. Having given himself to the itinerant work, and feeling the spirit of a Divine call to the ministry, he ever stood before the Conference, saying, "Here am I: send me." How willingly and cheerfully he went to his work, and how patiently and heroically he endured hardness and suffered affliction, those who labored with him and knew his spirit can testify. His labors were blessed to the Church on West Point Mission, Oceola, Columbus, Neosho, Deep Water, Potosi, and Ste. Genevieve Circuits, and none rejoiced more than he when the Lord prospered the work of his hands. Brother Cumming was everywhere acceptable to the Church, and labored efficiently for the advancement of all her interests. He inherited much of the spirit of his father, the Rev. David B. Cumming, and tried to do all the work of a Methodist preacher. His personal piety was deep, earnest, and consistent. Indeed, to lead a holy life himself, and teach others so, was the great controlling principle of his character. He was prudent and dis-creet in all his intercourse with the world, and sought studiously to give none occasion to offend, feeling that, while "all things were lawful for him," yet "all things were not ex-pedient." If any one term could distinguish his character and describe it to the world, that term is love. He approximated as nearly the fulfilment of all the law and the prophets as any man perhaps of the St. Louis Conference. As a preacher, Brother Cumming was successful. Turning not aside for the accommodation of any false or corrupt tastes, and catering not to the vagaries of popular fancy, he expounded the word of God faithfully and pointedly, making it "quick and powerful" upon

the sinner's heart, and hopefully inspiring to the Christian's faith. He "studied to show himself approved unto God, a workman that needed not to be ashamed." He was just making character as a preacher, under discouragements and afflictions, when the hand of death marked him as a victim; and ere the strength of maturity had crowned the preacher, an inscrutable Providence removed the saint. He left a journal of his ministerial career, which confines its records mostly to facts that may be gathered from the published minutes of the Conference, except the spirit of humility and resignation to the will of God, under severe and protracted afflictions, that breathes through it.

[The following memoir is inserted by request of the Conference, though it should have been furnished for the Minutes of 1859.]

JOHN WESLEY HAWKINS was born in Gibson county, Ind., December 3, 1826. He emigrated with his father to Gasconade county, Mo., in the autumn of 1841. In 1844, under the ministry of J. R. Burk, he professed faith in Christ, and joined the Methodist Church. He was licensed to preach in July, 1848, and in the autumn of the same year was admitted on trial in the St. Louis Annual Conference. Having voluntarily entered the itinerant ministry, he sought no favors at the hands of the Conference, but was ever ready to go whither the appointing power might direct. The Church was blessed with his godly labors on Thomasville Mission, Steelville Mission, Charleston Circuit, Benton Circuit, Ste. Genevieve Circuit, Wolf Island Circuit, Cape Girardeau Circuit, Christy Chapel Station, St. Louis and Springfield Station—at the latter place two years. He was always well received, and highly appreciated as a preacher and a Christian gentleman. On the 9th of May, 1858, while in his pulpit in Springfield, preaching "Jesus Christ and him crucified," in the holy effort of receiving singular to "feet of the singular to sing in the holy effort of warning sinners to "flee from the wrath to come," he felt his nervous system give way, and sat down, assured that his work was done. He travelled South, and wasted away slowly with consumption, until December 3, 1858, when he calmly fell asleep in Jesus. He died at the residence of Dr. J. W. Sullivan, in Monroe county, Ark. Brother Hawkins was a true son of John Wesley, not only inheriting his name, but much of the spirit of ardor and consecration to the work of the ministry which characterized that great He was a sound, practical, gospel preacher, depending not upon the showy tinsel of ornament to attract, but the power of gospel truth to enlighten, convict, and convert the sinner's heart. In his hands the gospel was "the power of God unto salvation;" and the day of eternity will disclose the success of his ministry, in every field of labor, in the conversion and salvation of souls, that will be his

crown of rejoicing for ever. He combined the elements of an humble, intelligent, courteous, Christian gentleman, in all the private walks and relations of life, with the dignity, urbanity, and catholicity of an evangelical Christian minister.

COLEMAN HARWELL CROSS was born in Giles county, Tenn., Oct. 5, 1833: was blessed with pious parental instruction; was converted and joined the Methodist Épiscopal Church, South, in 1857; received into the Tennessee Annual Conference in the autumn of the same year, and appointed to the Savannah Circuit as junior preacher. His labors on this circuit were crowned and blessed of the Lord in the conversion of many souls. In 1858, he was appointed to the charge of Shoal Circuit, where again his labors were signally blessed. In 1859, he was sent to the Springfield Station, where he remained a short time, and preached a few sermons, greatly endearing himself to his brethren and those who attended on his ministry. Declining health compelled him to desist and return to his native county, where he died triumphantly, August 9, 1860. The education of brother Cross was such as could be obtained in the common schools of our country: his gifts as a preacher were promising, and his general deportment gentlemanly and Christian-like. He was industrious and energetic in whatever he undertook. His success in winning souls was attributable to his untiring efforts and industry, and prompt attention to all parts of his duty, in the exercise of that faith which is mighty, through God, to the pulling down of strongholds and the establishment of the kingdom of Christ. He professed the enjoyment of sanctification, which he found precious to his heart, and which he manifested in his life for about eighteen months previous to his death. only anxieties that disturbed his mind during his illness grew out of a desire to make the best possible provision for the happiness of his servants; and after this was accomplished to his satisfaction, his sky grew brighter and brighter as he drew nearer and nearer to his end, till at the close he triumphed gloriously in the light of the gospel which he had proclaimed for the comfort of others.

WILLIAM J. COOLEY was born October 18. 1818. He professed religion in 1840 or 1841. He was licensed to preach in 1844, and admitted on trial in the Tennessee Conference at its session in Columbia in the autumn of the same year. We have no means of ascertaining what appointments were filled by him until the year 1850, when we find his name on the Wartrace Circuit. In 1851, he was supernumerary on the Waverly Circuit; in 1852, he was on Wayne Circuit; Bellfonte, in 1853; Red River, 1854; and in 1855, we find his name on the list of supernumeraries. His health continued to decline; so much so, that we find his name on the list of superannuated preachers for the year 1856, upon which list his name stands to the day of his death, which took place December 11, 1859. Brother Cooley was endowed with a liberal share of intellect. He understood the doctrines of the Bible, and preached them. He was an acceptable and successful preacher on the several circuits on which he labored. Very many souls were brought to God through his instrumentality. In all the relations which he sustained, he was faithful in the observance of his duty. Notwithstanding protracted ill health prevented him from doing the work of an itinerant preacher, his declining strength was spent with his brethren in his Master's cause. Having devoted his time and all in the service of his God for nineteen years, he was ready when the summons came. A short while before his death, he was assisting Brother M. L. Whitten at a meeting—the last one he ever attended—when he was made unspeakably happy in a Saviour's love. Though his sufferings were long and severe, his confidence in God and love for the Saviour of sinners were not destroyed. He met death triumphantly, giving glory to God.

ALEXANDER R. ERWIN, a native of Caddo Parish, Louisiana, was born January 12, 1820, and died January 10, 1860. His father was a minister of the Baptist Church. His mother was a pious woman, and, although death deprived him of her watchful care when not quite eight years of age, yet her example lived to do him good long after she had gone to her reward. At a camp-meeting in Williamson county, Tenn., 1839, he made a profession of religion, and joined himself to the Methodist Episcopal Church; was licensed to preach in 1840; was admitted into this Conference on trial in 1842, and appointed to 'Madison Circuit. In 1843, he was appointed to the Limestone Circuit; in 1844, to Wesley; 1845, to Columbia Station; 1846, to Clarksville, where he remained two years; and in 1848, he was appointed President of Clarksville Female Academy, which position he occupied till 1854, when he was stationed in Nashville at McKendree charge, where he continued two years. In the summer of 1855, he received

the degree of D.D. from the Nashville Univer-The two years following he was stationed in Huntsville; in 1858, he was agent for our Publishing House Fund; in 1859, was appointed President of Huntsville Female College. Well did he sustain the responsibilities of the various charges committed to him, laboring constantly and successfully as a faithful minister of Jesus Christ. His person was tall and slender; his physical organism fine and delicate; his countenance, manly and benignant, beamed with sunshine; and mild and cheering were the rays which his pale blue eyes cast from his warm and generous heart upon those who heard him in the pulpit. He seemed to be born to look at the bright side of things, and rarely, if ever, did the trials of life cloud his placid brow or depress his elastic spirit. His intellect, naturally clear and elevated, was enlarged and refined by study and religion, so that his knowledge was extensive and exact. His piety was deep and unpretending; his preaching attractive, instructive, and powerful. His death was a triumph. For a few months only he labored under consumption, steadily pursuing his high calling, working on within two weeks of his departure. At length the morning came when he said to his wife: "Lou, my work is done: my death begins to-day." On a subsequent day, a preacher said to him: "You are suffering very much, Doctor." His reply was, "Right, right; like our Master, we are made perfect through suffering." Wishing to see his three youngest children baptized, the preacher in charge of the station came at his request and performed the service. Then he beckoned to his two little sons, who were still lingering in the room; they approached him one at a time. Summoning his remaining strength, he laid both hands on the head of each, and then slowly, solemnly, and sub-limely said: "The blessings of God Almighty, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, rest upon you, soul and body, for this world and the world to come. Amen." To his wife and friends he said: "You are not to weep for me; I am going to rest—going to heaven going to my Father's house above." On the day before his death, in answer to a gentle-man who inquired, "How are you this morning, Doctor?" he said, with a smile, "Almost home, my brother." A few hours before he expired, a friend said to him, "You seem to be very happy, my brother." He replied: "I see the pillars of the eternal city. I shall soon be in Abraham's bosom." Thus, with the city of God clearly defined to his inner vision, the pure spirit of our much-loved brother, redeemed by the blood of Jesus, went forth to the home of the sanctified, into which no foe shall enter, and from which a friend shall never depart.

WILLIAM H. GILLESPIE was recommended from Ripley Circuit, and admitted on trial in the Memphis Conference in 1850. His first

appointment was the Purdy Circuit. The next year, 1852, he travelled the Paris Circuit. In the autumn, however, he was transferred to the Arkansas Conference, and stationed at Helena, where he did a faithful year's work. He then returned to the Memphis Conference, and was appointed, in 1854, to the Holly Springs Station, where his health failed. In 1855, he was granted a supernumerary relation; the next year, a superan-nuated relation; and in 1857, he was changed to a supernumerary again. In 1859, he went to Florida to regain his health, and for a time supplied with great usefulness an appointment Returning to Tennessee, impressed with the fact that the state of his health disqualified him for regular work in the itinerancy, he went to Nashville to prepare himself for the practice of medicine; but his powers were rapidly failing, and he calmly folded his mantle about him and "fell asleep in Jesus." He died of congestion of the lungs and brain, near Paris, Tenn., February 21, 1860. Brother Gillespie was a pure and estimable man, "full of faith and the Holy Ghost." He was an able minister of the New Testament; and the fervor of his spirit and the preciousness of his virtues will gratefully linger in our remembrance. His record is on high.

JOHN SUMMERFIELD HARRIS, son of the Rev. George W. D. Harris, D.D., of the Memphis Conference, was born in Williamson county, Tenn., February 25, 1831. He professed religion at the Trenton camp-meeting in 1848, and was received on probation in the Mem-phis Conference in 1854, and appointed to the Belmont Circuit. He travelled Hernando Circuit in 1856; and was ordained deacon by Bishop Early at the Conference held in Jack-His next year of labor was on the Brownsville Circuit. In 1857, he travelled the Wesley Circuit. He was ordained an elder by Bishop Paine at Trenton, and appointed to the Lagrange Circuit. He finished his labors on the Carrollville Circuit, after the third quarterly meeting, and died in full assurance of immortality, August 15, 1860. His disease was an aggravated form of typhoid Every attention that Christian sympathy and fraternal affection could offer solaced his last moments. His brother, the Rev. W. T. Harris, received his dying testi-When asked if he could trust in Christ as a present Saviour, he replied with that firmness which was the glory of his Christian character: "O yes, surely, always," and similar expressions. Our departed brother was a young man of strong intellect, well furnished for the work of the ministry. Manly in bearing, prudent in life, inflexible in integrity, decided in sentiment, and unfaltering in duty, "he died at his post." As he sank like a Christian warrior upon his shield, in the field of his last conflict, the people of his charge gathered about him in tearful devotion. His physician remained with him day and night. His venerable father reached his bedside in time to receive a dying look of recognition. His remains were conveyed to the family burying-ground in Dyer county, Tenn.

BENJAMIN M. DRAKE was born in Robertson county, N. C., September 11, 1800. his childhood his parents removed to Muhlenburg county, Ky. They had deep experience in the things of God, and the new home was consecrated to prayer and to public worship. Here the father watched his flocks and tilled his fields, and his children were taught the fear of the Lord. The subject of this memoir does not seem to have had any definite religious conviction until 1811, when the terrible carthquake shocks which convulsed the country about New Madrid aroused him to a sense of his danger. For a season he had great mental and moral struggles. He seemed to be aroused to a sense of his need of pardoning mercy, for he felt the danger of sudden death, and trembled at the thought of meeting God without the pardon of his sin, and without the renewal of his nature. This conflict lasted. with intervals of repose and seasons of penitence and hope, until 1818, when his trusting heart received the Saviour. So clear was the sense of pardon, so full and joyous was the witness of his adoption, that he praised God Along with conversion came the call to the ministry; and the God who had called anointed him to the sacred office. He sought alone the means of acquiring an education, and was only hindered from the pursuit by ill He was employed by the presiding elder on Henderson Circuit in 1820, and was received on trial into the Tennessee Conference in the autumn of the same year, and appointed to Fountain Head Circuit; but before the year was completed, his health failed, and "he returned home to die." At the Conference for 1821, he was sent to Catawba Circuit, then in this Conference. In 1822, he was appointed to Attakapas and Rapides Circuit, in Western In 1823, he was stationed in Louisiana. Natchez. In 1824 and 1825, he was sent as a missionary to New Orleans. He built the first Methodist church in that city, collected the scattered flock, and gave to Methodism there its first permanent organization. 1826, he was sent to Washington, Miss., and to Natchez in 1827. In 1827, he was married to Susan Hawkins Magruder. For four years, beginning with 1828, he was President of Elizabeth Female Academy, the first Methodist school established in the State. In 1832, he was reappointed to New Orleans, and from that period up to the time of his death he took work annually in this Conference, going in and out before us accepted of God and approved of men. In 1854, he was elected to the presidency of Centenary College, which position he held for several months with the fullest approval of the Board of Trustees. In 1852, the Faculty and Trustees of Centenary College, in consideration of his unblemished purity of character and his eminence as a biblical scholar, conferred on him the honorary degree of D.D. From 1828, he was a

member of all our General Conferences, taking active part in all the great questions deliberated upon by that body, and holding honor able rank among the first men of the Church. Thus it will be seen that for forty consecutive years he was in the full sense of the word an itinerant preacher: watered and watering others, he abounded in labor. Patient research made him familiar with great thoughts, and the completeness of his consecration to God gave a moral grandeur to his life. He was signally a man of one work, bringing to its achievement an intellect of no ordinary vigor, a courage that faltered not, a steadiness of purpose which grew fixed as his years increased, a geniality of disposition which made him companion to the gay or the sad, and a reputation upon which a shadow never fell. As a minister, he felt the vows he had taken, and the living savor which dwelt within him made him instant in season and out of season. Cheerful, meek, dignified, firm, his presence was a savor of good, and his whole life an illustration of the saving strength of grace. He cared for the churches, the children, and the poor. His disease was an affection of the heart. For some weeks he had apprehended a sudden death—had talked of it freely and frequently, and expressed no other motive for life than a desire to see his children educated, and to do the devil's kingdom a little more harm. He said to a friend a few days before his death, "I know that I shall die suddenly, but I hope not soon. Still my preparations are all made, and I am ready with or without the warning." In conversation with his wife a few moments before his death, though without any thought of a speedy departure, he said: "For forty years I have tried sincerely to serve God. I know that he will not forsake me now. Thy promises, they comfort me; and though thou slay me, yet will I trust in thee." We commend his will I trust in thee." memory to his brethren, and we commend to their prayers and their sympathy his sad and sorrowing widow and her fatherless children.

In recording the death of LEWELL CAMP-BELL, we are entirely dependent on such incidents as we have heard him relate in connection with his Christian experience for his early history. From these we infer that he grew up an orphan, without any relatives within his knowledge. Of the circumstances of his awakening, conversion, and joining the Church, we are not informed. He was admitted as a travelling preacher into the Kentucky Conference in October, 1831, where he labored six years on circuits—three as junior preacher, and three as preacher in charge. The printed Minutes show that he graduated to deacon's and elder's orders in due course. At the end of his sixth year in the Kentucky Conference, he was appointed a missionary to the Republic of Texas, which was then in-

cluded in the Mississippi Conference. After spending a short time in Texas, he attended the session of our Conference, held in Grenada, Miss., December 5, 1838. Such was then the vast extent of our Conference territory, and the limited supply of preachers, that it was difficult to fill some of our most important charges. In consequence of this, Brother Campbell was withdrawn from Texas, and appointed two successive years in New Orleans. During his stay in New Orleans he was married to Miss Sybil Ruter, the accomplished daughter of that highly gifted man and minister, and first missionary to Texas, the Rev. Martin Ruter, D.D. From his first coming to our Conference, in December, 1838, his connection with us was unbroken until his death. Of the twenty-eight years of his itinerancy, he labored eight on circuits, two on stations, sixteen on districts, one as Agent for Centenary College, and the last year of his life he was on the superannuated list. He was elected a member of the Louisville Convention, and was a member of every subsequent General Conference held previous to his death. His early educational advantages were very limited; but after he entered the ministry he was a diligent and successful student to the close of his life, and became intellectually and theologically a man of great strength, and may justly be held up as an example of encouragement to all others similarly situated. Brother Campbell was scrupulously honest in his investigations and conclusions about every subject that passed in review before his mind, and was bold and independent in the expression of his settled convictions. He was constitutionally ardent and impulsive in his temperament, and sometimes, for a moment, he would yield to his impassioned nature, and give utterance to extreme opinions; but if ever he learned that he had incautiously wounded the feelings of any one, he became the more afflicted of the two, and embraced the earliest opportunity for explanation and reparation. After becoming the head of a family, he was often annoyed with the temptation that some member of his household might sicken and die during his long absence from home. This led him to seek that entire consecration to God which would enable him to commit his family fully into his hands when far away from them; and, to use his own expressive language, "I asked God to sanctify me wholly, and he did it, and since that time I have had but little anxiety about sickness and death in my family when away from home, doing my Master's work." Brother Campbell was not what we usually term a revivalist, yet he entered fully into the revival spirit; and in conducting his protracted and camp-meetings, he was judicious in selecting such ministers for the pulpit as were most successful in conducting revival exercises. As an administrative officer, he was quite above mediocrity, and the preachers of his district had the utmost confidence in his sense of justice to them, as well as the interests of the Church. His health had been precarious for years, and he was subject to violent attacks of illness. At our last Conference he reluctantly consented to be placed on the superannuated list. In the spring he travelled northward in quest of health, and was so improved that he returned flattered with the idea that he was fully restored. He felt a burning anxiety to engage once more in his appropriate work, and finding the Fayette District had been vacated by the death of its presiding elder, the Rev. B. M. Drake, he expressed a willingness to be employed in that charge, which met the approval of Bishop Kavanaugh, and he accordingly entered upon its duties. But he was mistaken as to the permanent restoration of his health. As soon as he commenced the active duties of the ministry again he began to decline, and after attending four quarterly meetings, in an attempt to reach his home, in Jackson, La., he was violently attacked on board the boat, so that by the time he reached Bayou Sara, he seemed to be unconscious; and after lingering from Tuesday until Friday night, September 21, he was permitted to enter into the rest of the redeemed from earth. In his death we have been deprived of one of our best counsellors and most influential ministers, and we mourn our loss as for a brother dead; but we know where we may find him again,

GEORGE C. LIGHT was born in Westmoreland county, Va., February 28, 1785. In his seventh year, his father removed to Mason county, Ky., and settled where the town of Maysville now is, and remained there until January, 1799, when he removed to Clairmont county, Ohio. While in Maysville, he enjoyed the advantages of a common school. In Ohio he assisted his father in the cultivation of his farm; and, although of a gay disposition, fond of amusement and lively society, was what may be termed a moral youth. When in his seventeenth year, his sister joined the then persecuted Methodists; and when in his eighteenth year, his father joined them. In 1804, William Burke, P. E., William Patterson, and Philip Gatch, held a protracted meeting in his father's neighborhood, which was attended by the family. Young George was observed to be deeply affected, and to retire to the woods alone for some days after each service. He finally presented himself at the altar for prayer. He soon found pardon by faith in Christ, and arose rejoicing. He soon began to exercise in prayer and class-meetings, and to pray alternately in his father's family. During the same year, William Burke took him to a Quarterly Meeting, when he called upon him to exhort, then to take a text and preach.

Many conversions were the result of this meeting. Mr. Burke then gave him a letter of introduction to Jacob Young, P. E., who gave him work on Manitta Circuit, where he labored with usefulness and great acceptability. In 1805, he was employed on the Nolachucky Circuit, in Tennessee. He was admitted on trial in the Western Conference in 1806, and appointed to Clinch Circuit, and returned for the year 1807. In 1808, he was on New River Circuit. During that year he became acquainted with Ann T. Campbell, to whom he was married on the 3d of July. At the end of that Conference year he located and removed to Ohio, where he remained until 1822, laboring on the farm, teaching school, acting as surveyor, serving as a representative in the Legislature, and filling other offices of trust and honor-but never forgetting the obligations of the Christian ministry. ordained elder by Bishop McKendree in 1815, at Lebanon, O. In 1822, he was readmitted into the travelling connection in the Kentucky Conference, and appointed to Limestone Circuit. In 1823 and 1824, he was stationed in Lexington; 1825, Conference Missionary; 1826-7, Louisville; 1828, Shelbyville and Brick Chapel; 1829 and 1830, Frankfort Station; 1831, Lexington Station; 1832-3, Agent for the American Colonization Society: 1834, Maysville Station. At the end of that year, he was transferred to the Missouri Conference; and, 1835, appointed to Palmyra Circuit; 1836, reappointed to Palmyra Circuit. In 1837, he was Presiding Elder of Palmyra District; 1838, Hannibal Circuit; 1839, stationed in St. Louis; 1840, left without an appointment at his own request, with a view of winding up unsettled business in Ohio and Kentucky; 1841, he acted as Agent for the Colonization Society. In the autumn of that year he was transferred to the Kentucky Conference, and stationed in Covington, 1842 and 1843; in 1844, Maysville. He was transferred again to the Missouri Conference; and, in 1845, was stationed in Booneville; in 1846. Palmyra District; 1847, Hydesburg Circuit; 1848-9, Hannibal Station. In the autumn of 1849, he obtained a superannuated relation, and came to Mississippi, hoping to find the climate such as to benefit himself, and relieve him of rheumatism. He was employed to fill Woodville Station, in 1850. At the close of that year, he was transferred to the Mississippi Conference, and filled Woodville Station in 1851; 1852-3, Vicksburg Station; 1854, Canton and Pearl River; 1855, Canton Station; 1856-7, Sharon Circuit; 1858-9, Lexington and Richland. At the Conference in Nov., 1859, he was granted a superannuated rela-On the fourth Sabbath in February, 1860, he preached in Canton, from Isaiah iii. 10, 11. The following day, February 27, he went to Vicksburg, in company with Dr. W. F. Camp. In conversation on the way, he was

cheerful and interesting, and gave expositions of passages of Scripture, viz.: "Hearken unto me, ye that follow after righteousness," etc. Isa. li. 1. "I have seen an end of all perfection, but thy commandment is exceeding broad." Ps. exix. 96. "And thou, Solomon, my son, know thou the God of thy father, and serve him with a perfect heart." 1 Chron. xxviii 9. He then remarked that "if he had to see the next day, he would be seventy-five years of age; and, so far as he was concerned, if the world were put up at auction, he would not be a high bidder." He slept quietly that After dressing the next morning, he requested Brother Camp to read the first chapter of Colossians, upon which he commented for an hour. After prayer, he asked the same brother to read the fifth chapter of 2 Corinthians, and commented upon it for some time. He spent most of the day in visiting and conversing with old friends. He reached the Rev. C. K. Marshall's about four P. M., and remarked, "I am almost dead." He was assisted in: and after being seated, and taking a stimulant, felt somewhat revived, and commenced conversation with Brother Marshall in his usual cheerful manner; but in a few moments his head fell back on the chair, and, without a groan or struggle, his spirit passed away to God. Brother Light was an able, energetic, useful, and successful minister of the New Testament. Many were the seals to his ministry; great was his usefulness in the Church. But he has passed from us to the better company—the Church triumphant. Most of his family had gone before him. His aged widow still lingers behind, looking forward to a reunion in heaven. Two childrenone a member of the Texas Conference—remain also.

THOMAS C. THORNTON, D.D., was the son of Dr. Thomas Thornton, and was born in Dumfries, Prince William county, Va., October 12, His grandfather, Thomas Thornton, acted as surgeon in the British navy for several years, but afterwards entered the ministry of the Established Church of England. came to America previous to the Revolutionary War, and in that struggle was the firm friend of Washington and the cause of American independence—selling all his plate to the last spoon, and his stock to the last cow, and giving the money to the commander to help defray the expenses of his suffering soldiers, urging them to fight for their liberties, and not falter. Brother Thornton graduated at an institution in his native town, under the Rev. Charles O'Neil, in his sixteenth year. He then began the study of medicine. But soon the Rev. Richard Tydings began to preach in the town, and young Thornton in a short time became serious and anxious for his soul's salvation. His father was a High-Church Eniscopalian, and discouraged his course.

joined the Church; and soon after, taking a few clothes in a handkerchief, he walked to a camp-meeting some forty miles off, and there found God merciful and gracious, July 31, His soul was filled with the love of God. As he left the ground, a friend said, "My young brother, when in trouble, or difficulty, or temptation, resort to prayer: never forget that." This he found to be of great service to him before he reached home. knew his father would be angry, and perhaps violent. He was tempted to say nothing of his conversion at home, but to be religious secretly. Under this temptation, he felt discouraged and gloomy. He resorted to prayer, and found God was with him, and gave him courage to confess all that had been done, and strength for the trial which awaited him. His father was so enraged at his joining the Church and professing to know God had pardoned his sins and given him a new heart, that he gave him a severe correction, and demanded an immediate renunciation of his religion and Church relation. This he refused. His father then determined to send him away as a common sailor, and made all the necessary arrangements. The day was appointed when he was to leave all that was dear of earth, and go he knew not whither on the wide ocean. The night previous to the morning for his departure he spent in prayer for the conversion of his father. About four o'clock A.M. his father called him. He found him in tears and great distress. "O, Tommy," he said, "I have done you great wrong, and intended doing you great injustice in sending you away. Tommy, won't you forgive me?" "With all my heart, father," he replied. "Tommy, won't you pray for me?" "With all my heart, father." That day he was converted. Tommy said he must be a preacher. His father opposed, and insisted on his reading medicine. But he said he must and would preach. "Then," said his father, "if you will preach, go to the farm and select a horse, get a saddle and saddle-bags, and go." This he did, and the next day he rode with Richard Tydings thirteen miles to a church near Stafford Court-House, and preached his first sermon to an astonished people, from the text, "Ye must be born again." He was then in his sixteenth or seventeenth year. He continued on the circuit the remainder of the year. Being persuaded that on account of his youth the Conference would not receive him, he engaged in teaching until in his nineteenth year, preaching as opportunities offered. In March, 1813, he was admitted on trial in the Baltimore Conference, and appointed to Winchester Circuit; in 1814 and 1815 to Prince George's Circuit. He was ordained Deacon by Bishop Asbury, 24th March, 1815, at Baltimore. In 1816, he was sent to Stafford and Fredericksburg. He was ordained Elder by Bishop McKendree, 16th March, 1817, at Baltimore. In 1817, he was appointed to Severn Circuit; 1818, Lancaster; 1819, Lancaster and Westmoreland; 1820 and 1821, Fredericksburg Station. In March, 1822, he located, to wind up the business of his father's estate. In 1823, he took charge of the Menokin Academy in Virginia, where he remained until called to take charge of a Collegiate Institute in Northumberland, Va., where he remained until 1831, when his health forced him to seek a more active life on a farm. health being restored, he reëntered the Baltimore Conference, March, 1833, and was appointed to Prince William Circuit; 1834 and 1835, Baltimore City; 1836, 1837, Agent for Dickerson College; 1838, 1839, Carlisle Station, and Teacher in Dickinson College; 1840, 1841, Foundry Chapel, Washington City. In 1841, he was elected President of Centenary College, and in the autumn of the year came to Mississippi Conference. He was President of Old Centenary College, 1842, 1843, and 1844. He asked to be transferred to the Alabama. Conference at the Conference of 1844, but, through the prejudice gotten up against him, he was located without his consent. This irritated him; and feeling assured of the determination of certain men to persecute him as long as he remained in the Methodist Church, he gave up his credentials, June 6, 1845, to the Rev. J. N. Hamil, and withdrew from the Church. Soon after this, he united with the Protestant Episcopal Church, and became connected with a college in Jackson, Miss., where he taught for some years. He next was connected with a college in Brandon, Miss., for some years. While in the Protestant Episcopal Church, he exercised as a preacher, but did not take orders in that Church, because he could not subscribe to their doctrine of apostolical succession. In 1850, he returned to the M. E. Church, South, and at the Conference held in Yazoo City, Dec., 1850, his credentials were restored to him. In 1851, he was elected President of Madison College, which office he filled until his labors and sufferings ceased, on the 22d March, 1860. In November, 1853, he was readmitted into this Conference. In 1854, he was on a mission to the colored people in connection with his labors in the College. He had regular pastoral work seventeen years; was College agent two years; was connected with institutions of learning thirty years—in eight different institutions—in all of which he was successful and popular as a teacher. a professor or instructor, he stood preëminent. As a minister of the New Testament, he was a workman that needed not to be ashamed, as he gave to each his portion in season, and brought forth from his vast treasury things new and old, and thousands were converted to God under his ministry. As an expounder of the Scriptures, but few equalled him-perhaps none in this country excelled him.

While in Baltimore, he wrote his "Theological Colloquies;" and when stationed in Washington City, at the solicitations of distinguished gentlemen, he wrote and published his "Slavery as it is in the United States," in reply to Dr. Channing. His end was peaceful and triumphant. On the afternoon of the day of his death, feeling that his departure was at hand, he called together his family, and after giving them instructions as to what he wished done, and bidding them farewell, he repeated the 23d Psalm, pronounced the Gloria Patri and the Benediction. He said, "If I die tonight, I shall have the victory.

'I the chief of sinners am, But Jesus died for me.'

Let a gust of praise go to the ends of the earth, for a sinner saved by grace. If it be the will of the Lord, I would like to live for the benefit of those around me, especially my family, the College, and the China Mission. But the will of the Lord be done." Turning to his weeping wife, he said, "Cheer up, cheer up, my dear; the storm is heavy, but Jesus is at the helm." He expressed gratitude to his kind physician for his unremitting attention, and to the servants for their kindness. He met death with the firmness of a Christian philosopher, and realized the saving power of that gospel which he had for nearly half a century preached to others.

BENJAMIN C. STEGALL laid his armor down June 10, 1860, in his forty-sixth year. He was a native of Jasper county, Ga., where he embraced religion when quite a youth. He died on the same night of the week, and near the same hour, in which he embraced religion in an upper room of his father's house. His brother, J. W. Stegall, and brother-in-law, R. B. Jones, were present on that occasion, and were present when he died. He remarked to them, a few days before his death, that the same Jesus who converted his soul in the State of Georgia was with him still, and that he had no fear of death. A friend says: "I made his acquaintance in 1847 in Ouachita Parish, where he lived and died. From that time we were intimate friends. He was one of our best men. He had a heart to weep with those who wept, and to rejoice with those who rejoiced. He had a word of comfort for all that applied, and many will call him blessed in the great day of accounts. He won the esteem and confidence of all classes. He had exalted views of the Christian religion. He was an acceptable preacher." This friend was with him during his illness; and at the closing scene, when the chill of death was upon him, he asked him if his faith was unwavering. He replied, "Certainly! Brother W—, how could it be otherwise?" Thus the good man died, full of faith and hope. Brother Stegall joined the travelling connection in the Mississippi Conference about the year 1837, travelled some six or seven years, and located for a season. He was reidmitted in the Louisiana Conference in 1855, and has been travelling ever since. At the time of his death, he sustained a supernumerary relation.

Samuel Hawes was a native of East Baton Rouge Parish, La. He was born in 1819, and born again in 1840. Shortly after his adoption into the family of God, he heard the voice of the Spirit "inly speak," calling and moving him to the work and office of a minister in the Church of God. The Church recognized the

call of God, and duly authorized him to exercise his gifts and graces as a minister. For something more than a year he labored in the local relation, but he yearned for a wider field and a more thorough consecration to the work of God. In 1842, he was admitted on trial in the Mississippi Conference, and was successively appointed to Amite, Neshoba, Pearl River, and West Baton Rouge Circuit. Upon the division of the Mississippi Conference, he became a member of the Louisiana Conference, and was appointed to Donaldsonville Station and Preston Mission in 1853; in 1854, to the New Iberia Circuit; in 1855, to Thibodeaux and Napoleonville; in 1856, to Thibodeaux Station; in 1857, to Grosse Tête; in 1858, to Plaquemine; in 1859, to Bonideau; and in 1860, to Bartholomew Circuit-where, on the 2d of July, 1860, after an illness of twenty-two days of typhoid fever, he rested from his labors. He was a courteous Christian gentleman, pure, peaceable, gentle, easy to be entreated, full of mercy and good fruits; and by innocency of life and the beauty of holiness adorned the doctrine of God our Saviour. As a minister, he was faithful and devoted: his good report is in the churches, and his memory shall leave "a long and sweet perfume." From the day of his attack, he was impressed that his sickness was unto death, and said "the time has come." He murmured not, but said, "God's will be done." The fondest and most endearing ties bound him to earth; but he walked by faith, and without fear trusted all to God. When pious friends, near the closing hour, sang his favor-ite strain of praise, "Sweet rivers of redeeming love," though weak and short of breath, he joined in the song. And when one said to him, "Whither goest thou?" with the strong confidence and hope of the gospel, he replied, "To a better world." His youthful widow and two orphan children are commended to our sympathy and love.

Henry Wise Bellman was born in Lycoming county, Pa., March 11, 1824. When about sixteen years of age he was converted to God. Soon after his conversion he felt himself called to the ministry, and obtained license to preach

in 1848. In the spring of 1849, he was received on trial by the Baltimore Conference. Two years after, he was admitted into full connection and ordained a deacon by Bishop Morris, and in 1853 was ordained an elder by Bishop Waugh. Not long after his ordination his own health and that of his wife became so enfeebled that he was obliged, though with a sad heart, to take a supernumerary relation to the Conference. In 1856, finding that his circumstances afforded him no prospect of continuing in the active work of the ministry, he was located at his own request. That he might not become a burden to the Church or his friends, he now took up the study of the law, hoping that his strength would be sufficient to enable him to realize something towards his own support. During his study and practice of the law his health improved, but the health of his wife declined rapidly until he was called to bear the great sorrow of following her to the grave. His health improved to such an extent, he was led to hope that he might with safety attempt the duties of an itinerant preacher again: accordingly he offered his services to the Church, and was received into this Conference at its last session in Lynchburg, (1859.) He was appointed to Wesley Chapel and Rocketts, in the city of Richmond. On this field of labor he entered with cheerfulness, and toiled with great energy and success, until his strength failed, and he was laid upon the bed of death. ther Bellman was a faithful, earnest, efficient Methodist preacher. His life, though short, was one of trial and suffering. He carried the burden of a feeble frame and diseased constitution, and felt from early life that he must at last fall a victim to the fatal disease that had marked him for its prey. He died of consumption. The last hours of Brother Bellman were calm, and his experience furnished another blessed exemplification of the triumph of Christian faith over the fear of death. He repeatedly said, when questioned about his feelings, "No fear, no fear-no, not the least. I have settled that matter long ago." Full of hope, and without a struggle, he fell asleep. His funeral-sermon was preached by Dr. Doggett: the ministers of our Conference stationed in Richmond attended and assisted in the services. Followed by the Sons of Temperance, who were very kind in their ministrations to Brother B. during his illness, and attended by his weeping congregation, the last remains of Henry Wise Bellman were borne to the grave. He sleeps in the Shockoe Hill burial-ground, in the city of Richmond. Brother Bellman leaves two little children, who are reported to be provided with a home at the house of Brother B.'s father-in-law.

THOMAS H. JONES was born and brought up in Gloucester county, Va. At an early age

he professed conversion, and united with the M. E. Church. Conceiving it to be his duty to preach, but deeming his education inadequate for such a position, he went to Randolph-Macon College, and applying himself diligently to his studies, graduated with credit at that institution. While at college he won the universal esteem of the faculty and students by his consistent walk and godly life. His influence there in favor of religion, as all who knew him at that time will testify, was marked and extensive. Few young men have probably ever passed through a college course with such a record of piety, unblemished by a stain, as that which distinguished our beloved Brother Jones. In 1841, he was received on trial in the Virginia Conference. Two years thereafter he was ordained deacon, and in 1845 ordained an elder. From the time he was received on trial to the day of his death, he was an earnest and successful preacher and faithful pastor to the full measure of his ability. He had, as many of the members of this Conference know, peculiar and severe trials, but amid them all he bore himself as a Christian minister, having the confidence and esteem of preachers and people. He died of typhoid fever, September 12, 1860, at the residence of B. H. Jones, Esq., near Scottsville, Albemarle county, Va. illness was severe, but throughout all the duration of those painful days and nights, he was patient and resigned. He seemed nearly all the time to be engaged in devotional ex-As he approached the hour of ercises. death his faith was unshaken, and his pure and peaceful spirit calmly awaited the call to the skies. His family, who resided in the city of Richmond, reached his bedside a few days before he died. He called them around him, blessed them in the name of God, enjoined them to meet him in heaven, and, with a tenderness and pathos that touched every heart, urged his little ones to love and serve the God of their father. Just a few minutes before his death, he exclaimed, "Now, Lord, let thy servant depart in peace, for mine eyes have seen thy salvation." Among his last words he repeated the entire hymn, "Come on, my partners," etc. In great triumph he passed to his reward on high.

J. H. Watson was received on trial in the Virginia Annual Conference in 1825, ordained deacon in 1828, and elder in 1830. He travelled as a Methodist preacher in the faithful and efficient discharge of his duties for several years, until, on account of a painful disease, he was obliged to take a superannuated relation, in which relation he remained until death. His was a long and terrible furnace of affliction—for more than twenty years he was tried as by fire. He met death unmoved by its terrors, and passed away leaving abundant evidence of his acceptance with God.

WILLIAM P. TWYMAN was admitted on trial in the Virginia Conference, November 29, 1854, and sent as the junior preacher to Loudon Circuit. The following year, 1855, he was sent as preacher in charge of the Potomac Circuit, and at the close of that year was received into full connection in the Conference, ordained deacon, and returned to the Potomac Circuit in 1856. He was sent next to the Elk Run Circuit and labored there two years, 1857 and 1858. Here as elsewhere he enjoyed the confidence and affection of his people, and labored with zeal. From Elk Run he was sent, in 1859, to Spottsylvania Circuit, where he labored with much zeal until stricken down by an illness which terminated in his death. He was ill about two weeks, and died on Thursday night, October 25, 1860, aged about thirty years. Brother Twyman was a man of devoted piety, affectionate and amiable disposition, and died in great peace. He was married to a most estimable lady but a few weeks before his death.

WILLIAM G. DULIN was born in Maryland about 1828, and died in Prince Edward county, Va., January 17, 1860. The disease of which he died was consumption. We know comparatively little of his history in early life. He was for some time a student at Randolph-Macon College, where his life was upright and consistent. He was admitted on trial in this Conference in 1856, and received an appointment to Prince Edward Circuit. In 1857, he was appointed to Fincastle Circuit. In 1858, he was, on account of illhealth, placed on the supernumerary list, and in 1859 was appointed to a mission in Gloucester Circuit; but this field of labor he never Early in life Brother Dulin was converted, and felt called to the work of the ministry. This work, however, he did not commence until several years had passed. His Christian life, so far as we know, was consistent from beginning to end. In all the means of grace and usefulness connected with the Church of his choice, he took a deep interest until the signal was given for him to come up higher, and leave the field for ever. He loved Jesus, and wanted to be spent in his service. In the hour of death he felt that his trust was in Jesus, and he was sustained by the power of his exceeding great and precious promises. Not long before he expired, he said to all within his room, "Those of you who will try to meet me in heaven, raise your hands. I expect," said he, "soon to be with my Saviour in heaven. I bid you all an affectionate farewell."

JAMES HENRY BRENT was born in the county of Rockingham, N. C., in the year 1825. His early associations, apart from a pious mother, were unfriendly to religion. He was endowed with a fine intellect and a noble nature, instinctively high-minded, honorable, and generous. His father failed in business at a time when he needed educational assistance, and on that account he was, in youth, thrown upon his own energies and efforts. Heroically struggling with the difficulties of his situation, he was preparing himself for the profession of medicine, when, in the year 1843, under the ministry of the late Rev. John Rich, he was converted to God. Soon after his conversion, he felt that he was called to the ministry. Without hesitation he at once changed his plans and course of study, and bent all his energies to a preparation for the great work. He did not, however, offer himself as a candidate for admission into Conference until 1850. While endeavoring to ed-

ucate himself, he also assumed the additional burden of educating his sisters and brothers. In the relation of brother, few if any have excelled him. After teaching and going to school, and spending several sessions at Randolph-Macon College—from which institution he afterwards received the honorary degree of A. B.—he was admitted on trial in the North Carolina Conference, at Warrenton, in 1850. He first received an appointment in connection with the Topsail Academy. From the Louisburg Conference in 1852, he was appointed to the charge of Smithville Circuit. God peculiarly owned him as his servant in crowning his ministerial efforts with success. From Smithville he removed to Goldsboro', and founded the Goldsboro' Female College, now Wayne Female College. He presided successfully over this College for two years, until the winter of 1855, when he resigned, and was stationed in Fayetteville. At the session of Conference held at Greensboro', in session of Conference held at Greensboro, in 1856, he located. He was readmitted in 1858, and stationed in Newbern. In 1859, he was reappointed to that place, where he died at his post, in the midst of his labors, at one o'clock A. M. on Friday, August 17, 1860. Just before his death, being informed that his departure was at hand, and asked if the religion he professed sustained him in the solembar heart has replied. "I have no doubts nor diff. hour, he replied: "I have no doubts nor difficulties on my mind. I look back upon all my labors for the good of souls as a very small matter, and my whole trust is in Christ. I feel that I can and do fully trust in the atonement." The Newbern Progress, just after his death, closed a very highly eulogistic notice of him with these words: "His warning voice will no more be heard in Centenary Church, or elsewhere; but his precepts and example will live in the minds of many a wayward son and daughter of the race for many long years to come. His place will be hard to fill, for he had very few equals in the North Carolina Conference as a preacher and pastor."

Hugh E. Ogburn was received on trial in the South Carolina Conference in 1838, and died in the district of Williamsburg, January 19, 1860, in the forty-third year of his age. Sudden and frequent attacks of illness having disqualified him for continued and active service in the regular work, at his death he held the relation of a superannuated preacher. Before and during this time he labored with zeal and acceptability in winning souls to Christ: a good preacher, sound in doctrine, preaching often with the unction from on high. short time before his death, he remarked that "three things had been matters of special prayer—that he might die easily, die in his senses, and die happy; and now his prayer was answered." Bidding his wife and children meet him in heaven, he exhorted them to put their trust in God. To one of the preachers of the circuit present, he remarked, "Religion is good to live with, but it is good now." Thus, in holy triumph, our brother has passed away to the rest that remaineth to the people of God.

HENRY BASS departed this life May 13, 1860, on Sabbath morning, just as the sun was rising-permitted to enter the temple above at the hour he had been accustomed to arrange his thoughts and his heart for service in the temple below. He was born in Berlin, Conn., December 9, 1786, the son of Daniel Bass, one of the daring patriots that threw the "tea" overboard. About the age of twenty-one, he came to Fayetteville, N. C., with the avowed object of bettering his temporal condition. It was here he became acquainted with the Methodists, and joined the Church on probation in 1807. Soon after, being powerfully moved to preach the gospel, and conferring not with flesh and blood, he offered himself to the South Carolina Conference, and was admitted in the town of Camden, December, His classmates have nearly all passed away, the only survivor in this Conference being the Rev. Nicholas Talley. Brother Bass was ordained deacon by Bishop Asbury in Fayetteville, January 16, 1814, and an elder by Bishop McKendree in Charleston, December 28, 1815. He died in the forty-ninth year of his ministry, thirty-seven years having been spent in an effective relation to the Conference, and a few months more than eleven years in the relation of a superannuated preacher. Eighteen years he spent on districts, in the office of presiding elder, and nineteen years on the circuits and stations. He was always laborious, attentive, and useful, never consulting his own ease or convenience; he abounded in good works, willing to spend and be spent for Christ. The disease of which he died, cancer, made its appearance in 1856, and gradually spread, until his whole system became vitiated. For about six months before his death, he was confined to his bed

almost entirely, and most of the time under the influence of anodynes. But whenever awake, the subject of religion was first; and in his Christian experience there was no confusion. He would often say, "How good the Lord is!" and "I trust in God above all." In almost every instance when prayer was offered at his bedside, he seemed carried along with the service, and his expressions of faith and holy joy presented a true spectacle of moral sublimity. Thus lived and died a guileless Christian minister. He is doubtless with God, and "his works do follow him."

REDDICK PIERCE was born in Halifax county, N. C, September 26, 1782. His father brought his family to South Carolina, and settled on Tinker Creek, in Barnwell District. Here his son was awakened to a sense of his danger, under the ministry of the Rev. James Jen-kins. In 1802, he was received into the Church by the Rev. Thomas Darlay. He, with his brother Lovick, became a travelling preacher in 1805, and was appointed to the Little River Circuit, in Georgia. He continued an effective travelling preacher until 1812, at which time he located. He subsequently reentered the Conference, and remained effective several years. His increasing deafness made it necessary for him to assume a superannuated relation to the Conference, in which he remained until death. Although he had no pastoral charge, his zeal for God was so intense that he labored incessantly and with marked ability. Indeed, his mental force, his grasp of thought, and logical skill were surpassed by few; and his matured Christian experience imparted to his religious life commendable uniformity. Even after he became so deaf as to entirely prevent his hearing the preacher's voice, he would go to church regu-When asked why he did so, he replied: "I go to fill my place, as every good man ought." A few months prior to his death, he declined rapidly. His physicians could not detect the characteristics of any particular disease; but the energies of life yielded under the pressure of many years, until death came as a welcome messenger and called him He died in peace, at the house of Jacob Stroman, Esq., his long-tried and fast friend, July 24, 1860. He sleeps in Jesus, and his record is on high.

CHARLES F. CAMPBELL was born in Marion District, S. C., and was admitted on trial in this Conference at the last session, and appointed to the Blackville Circuit. He entered upon the duties of a travelling preacher with promptness, and was faithful according to his strength. He was amiable in his disposition, and was much loved by the people. But having taken a severe cold, which resulted in serious indisposition, the Quarterly Conference, at the close of six months, gave him per-

mission to go home; and, after lingering a few weeks in the midst of kindness and affection, he gently sunk into the arms of death. It is reported by those who were with him that his faith stood firm in the final hour, and that he passed away sustained by the triumphant hope of a happy immortality.

WILLIAM ARNOLD was born in Ashboro', Randolph county, N. C., March 4, 1786, and died in Eatonton, Ga., January 12, 1860. At the age of sixteen he joined the M. E. Church, and in his twentieth year he was licensed to preach, and in his twenty-second year he joined the South Carolina Conference, which then embraced the State of Georgia. IIe was an active laborer for twenty-two years, during which time he was twice elected to the General Conference, and served sixteen years as presiding elder. As a preacher he ranked among the first of his day. His sermons were admirably arranged, and well digested, richly interspersed with poetical quotations, judiciously selected and admirably adapted. He was a man of an exceedingly gentle and ami-able spirit, and was beloved by all who knew His last sermon was preached on the last Sabbath in 1859. He seemed to be conscious that it was his last, and so expressed himself. In a few days after he was attacked with pneumonia, and lingered till the tenth day, during which he suffered much; but there was no time when his mind was not entirely clear, or he had not the fullest assurance of acceptance with God. On one occasion he said: "I am a great sufferer; I want the hour to come." On another occasion he said: "My trust is firm in the Lord Jesus Christ; I am confident of heaven; my trust is unwavering." The last expression he was understood to utter was "Glory, glory, glory!" Thus, in the full assurance of the blessedness of that heavenly world, to which, in his ministrations, he had so often directed his transported hearers, his life and labors ended together quite in the verge of heaven.

Noah Smith, a superannuated minister, died on the morning of September 14, 1860. We have no information as to the time and place either of his birth, conversion, or admission to the ministry. He was admitted into the Georgia Conference about 1837 or 1838, and took a superannuated relation in 1858. For many years he was a popular and useful travelling preacher. He possessed a useful order of talent, and was characterized by more than ordinary ability in preaching, great zeal, uncommon success as a revivalist, and extraordinary facility in making his gifts available to all classes of persons. He was a man of right principles, ardent piety, and a generous soul. Indefatigable in labors, amiable in temper, sociable in spirit, and affable in his manners, he was beloved by his ministerial brethren, respected and esteemed by the Church. Few ministers in Georgia have been instrumental in the conversion of more souls. The circumstances of his death were peculiar. He attended a camp-meeting in Tallapoosa county, Ala., where he labored with uncommon zeal, spirituality, and efficiency. After the camp-meeting, he continued his labors with unabated ardor at a protracted meeting. He frequently intimated a presentiment of his approaching dissolution. The day before his death, he declared publicly, while he seemed to be transported with heavenly rapture, that he expected soon to die. "No!" he exclaimed, emphatically, "I shall never die; I'll just go to sleep, and wake up in heaven!" How go to sleep, and wake up in heaven!" How soon was the presentiment realized! The next morning he was found in his bed, his body still warm, but the vital spark was fled. The spirit had returned to its God! Thus, doubtless, our brother "fell asleep in Jesus."

James B. Turner was born in Hancock county, Ga., January 26, 1793. His mother was a religious woman, and dedicated him to God in his infancy. He grew up to the age of seventeen a moral, well-disposed boy. He was awakened under the ministry of the Rev. Robert L. Edwards, and was converted in October, 1810. In the year 1813, he was admitted into the South Carolina Conference, travelled many years, and in 1835 took a

superannuated relation, "without claim," which relation he sustained at the time of his death, November 5, 1860. He was decided in his opinions, frank and candid in their expression. Sincere in his motives, genuine in his piety, ever prompt to defend the Church, and to vindicate the cause of his Master, he was a useful and venerated minister. He supported his last affliction with Christian fortitude and resignation, answering all the inquiries of his friends concerning his future hopes in the most satisfactory manner. When asked if he was ready to go, he answered: "I am ready; certainly I am!" Some one asked him, "Are you aware that you are dying?" He answered, "Yes, I am." "Are you prepared?" "I am, I am!" and, lifting both hands in token of victory, he expired. Thus our venerable brother passed from earth to the mansions of the blessed.

JOHN FOUST was born in Sullivan county, Tenn., in 1796. He was converted in Wilson county, Tenn., in the autumn of 1812. In 1824, he was licensed to exhort. Two years afterwards, he received authority to preach. The first account we have of him in connection with this Conference is that he served the New Lexington Circuit in 1845. From that time until his death last spring, we find him an acceptable and useful laborer in his Master's vineyard; and though, in consequence of declining health, he was compelled to sustain for three years a superannuated relation, yet even in that relation he did what he could for the cause that was so dear to his heart. For several days previous to his death, reason was unsettled, but even then his thoughts lingered around the altars of the Church, and he imagined himself administering the symbols of the Crucified to the people of God. Brother Foust made no pretension to greatness.

He was a plain, unpretending Methodist preacher, seeking to do good in his humble way, and to be approved of God. His life was one of fidelity to duty, and we doubt not that many will rise up in the final day and call him blessed.

Robert Robinson Dickinson was born in Pendleton District, S. C., December 5, 1815. He joined the Church in 1833, and was licensed to preach on the Bellville Circuit in this Conference in 1840. For many years he was a member of this body, serving various appointments with ability and success. Brother Dickinson was a man of most lovely charactermeek, guileless, and full of tenderness. He was in all respects a Christian gentleman. He was taken sick the 27th of August last, while laboring at a camp-meeting. He lingered until the 5th of December, when he surrendered his soul to God, in perfect trust and peace. His presiding elder says in reference to his last moments: "I visited him the afternoon before he died. He told me he had been kept in peace from first to last during his illness, and that not a cloud darkened his sky."

Joseph Whitaker Hightower was born in Harris county, Ga., November 6, 1834. He was blessed with godly parents, and was converted in 1847. At the close of the year 1854, he was licensed to preach, and was admitted at Talladega into the Alabama Conference, in which he labored faithfully until his death. Brother Hearn, his presiding elder, informs us that he "went to Lebanon Circuit from our last Conference with his soul fired with zeal to do good. At the close of his first round on his circuit, he was taken sick. The first Quarterly Conference was held in his sickroom, where he attended faithfully to all his business, and gave good evidence that he was prepared for living or dying. The impression made by him on the minds of his brethren was that of one filled with the Holy Ghost." But, alas! the archer had sped a certain ar-He never arose from that bed, but gently fell asleep in Jesus, February 11, 1860.

Peter J. Walker, a probationer in this Conference, was a ripe Christian, a faithful man, and a devoted minister. He was born in Williamson county, Tenn., in 1808; professed religion in Talladega in 1841, and was licensed to preach in 1851. He was admitted on trial in the Alabama Conference two years ago, and was appointed the last year in charge of the Brush Creek Circuit. The Rev. E. Hearn says: "I visited him a short time before he died, and conversed with him touching his preparation for death. He expressed himself as fully prepared for the solemn change." He died in great peace, at the house of his daughter.

THOMAS W. Cooper was born January 28, 1818. In his sixteenth year he embraced religion, and joined the Methodist Church. From childhood he was inclined to piety, and from the time of his connection with the Church he took an active part in her interests. During the years 1837 and 1838, he was a pupil in the Manual Labor School near Covington, and in the latter part of 1838 was licensed to preach, and recommended to the Georgia Conference. His first two years were spent upon the Telfair Circuit, where he did efficient work for the cause of Christ. At the close of this year he was received into full connection, ordained deacon, and sent to Hamilton Circuit by Bishop Andrew, where he remained two years, and was the instrument of some three hundred accessions to the At the close of this year he was ordained elder, and sent to the Monticello Circuit: here he did a good work. During this year he was married to Miss Georgia A. Hall, and, at the close of the year, asked a location, which relation he held one year, and was readmitted and sent to Quincy Station.

1846 and 1847, he served the Newnansville Circuit, where he conducted several gracious revivals. At the close of this year, having worn himself down by excessive labors, he was permitted to rest. In 1849, he served the Marion Circuit, after which he was permitted to rest until 1852, when he again served Newnansville Station. In 1853, he served Jacksonville Station, after which he was local until 1856, when he was readmitted and sent to Tampa District. Here he labored faithfully and efficiently. At our last Conference he was sent to St. John's District, where he commenced laboring beyond his strength, and soon fell at his post. The Sabbath before his death he preached with more than ordinary power. The following Tuesday night he was attacked with putrid sore throat. From near the first he felt that his work was done. Hence he sent for a brother and made all arrangements he could, first for the Church, then for his family, and last of all asked prayer for himself, during which he shouted the high praises of God. A few moments more he asked to be laid down, and with the exclamation, "Lord Jesus, come quickly," he breathed his last on Friday night Fakruary 24 1860 his last on Friday night, February 24, 1860. As a preacher, Brother Cooper was a forcible speaker and a very eloquent declaimer. Few men equalled him, especially in moving the finer feelings, and he was one of our most successful revivalists. He labored more than his strength would justify, and hence he doubtless hastened his end. But as a successful general, he died at his post with the shout of victory upon his lips.

WILLIAM EDWARDS was born September 4, 1823, in South Carolina. When a little boy he embraced religion and joined the Church, and ever maintained a good religious charac-He was early impressed with a call to the ministry, but, from extreme diffidence and a sense of incapacity, he delayed for some time. He at length applied and was licensed as a local preacher, in which capacity he served the Church for four years. He was then admitted into the Florida Conference, where he labored for the last ten years. For the first three years he served Baker Colored Mission. The next year he was sent to Irwin Circuit. In 1855, he served Sumter Mission. The next two years he served Black Creek Circuit. The next year he served Waresborough Circuit. In 1859, he served Flemington Mission. Here his health entirely failed, and at our last Conference he was superannuated. After Conference his health rapidly improved, and he was placed upon the Gainsville Circuit. Here he commenced laboring with more zeal than his strength could support. He was soon attacked with pneumonia, from which he rapidly declined, and breathed his last in peace, March 15, 1860. Brother Edwards was possessed of a most levely spirit. "To know

him was to love him." He was deeply pious—living and breathing the spirit of vital piety. As a preacher, he was sound and practical, and useful to the Church wherever he went. His dying testimony was triumphant—committing his family to God, in peace he passed to his reward above.

Hugh B. Hamilton was born in Rutherford county, Tenn., Nov. 18, 1818, and was brought up in Jackson county, Ala. He embraced religion in his sixteenth year, at Centre campground, and joined the M. E. Church. He never for a moment doubted the soundness of his conversion. The following spring he joined a company of volunteers, and went to the Florida War. During this campaign he backslid, and was not fully restored till 1843. He was licensed to exhort in Arkansas in 1843. He was under impressions of a call to the ministry, and in resisting them backslida circumstance he bitterly bewailed the remainder of his life. He was licensed to preach in 1844, and received his first appointment at Little Rock, Ark. In 1846, he married Miss Roberts, and removed to Texas, where he remained a local preacher three years. In 1849, he lost his only child, which he and his wife looked upon as a judgment from the Lord for having ceased to travel and preach. In the autumn of 1849, he entered the East Texas Conference, filling various appointments of usefulness to the time of his death. During the winter of 1854, he lost his wife. In 1855, he was married to Miss Cynthia Brinley, who survives him to mourn her irreparable loss. During the years 1857-8, he filled the office of Tract Agent in East Texas, with profit to the Church and credit to himself. Conference of 1858, he was appointed Presiding Elder of Clarksville District, which office he sustained with much dignity and acceptability. A few weeks before the session of the Conference of 1859, he was taken with typhoid fever. He lingered till the 5th day of December, when he fell asleep without a groan or struggle. Frequently during his

illness he imagined that he heard some of the brethren returning from Conference—would arouse up and inquire, "Where is my appointment?" He has received an appointment, but not to labor in this world of sin and disappointment: he has received an appointment among the blood-washed around the throne.

M. C. Robertson was born October 3, 1822, in Monroe county, East Tenn. His father died when he was a child, but his pious mother taught him the Holy Scriptures. He was converted in his nineteenth year. In 1844, he was licensed to preach, and entered the Holston Conference; and faithfully and successfully did he labor in that Conference for six years. He asked a location, and thence moved to Texas, and was readmitted into the East Texas Conference in 1853. As a preacher, he was earnest, practical, and useful. Although his doctrinal views were well defined and settled, yet his heart was warm, respectful, and kind towards Christians of other names. His health failed, and he was granted a superanneath failed, and he was granted a superan-nuated relation; yet, when he could no longer preach, he would lead the class and the prayer-meetings, talking and shouting of re-deeming power. He spake with rapture of the feast above only a few days before his death, which occurred August 4, 1860. His sufferings were intense; but he endured as seeing Him who is invisible. Just before his seeing Him who is invisible. Just before his spirit fled, the announcement of his triumph was, "Glory be to God, I am going to heaven!" He has left an affectionate wife and two little daughters.

Joseph D. Andrews was born in Giles county, Tenn., in 1822. He professed religion in youth. He was licensed to preach September 6, 1849; was recommended to the Tennessee Conference to be transferred to the Arkansas Conference, and was appointed to the Harrison Circuit as junior preacher for the Conference year 1850; Lapeil, 1851; Dardanelle, 1852, 1853; Clarksville, 1854, 1855; Dover, 1856; Augusta, 1857, 1858; Richland, 1859; Carrolton, 1860. He went home from last Conference and prepared for his appointed field; but God saw his work was done. He was suddenly stricken down with disease, lingered a few days in great pain, and departed in peace. Few men possessed a sweeter

Christian character than Brother Andrews. As a minister, he was faithful, and, though dead, he yet speaketh.

STEPHEN CARLILE was born in Arkansas about the year 1818. He professed religion under the ministry of the Rev. John Harris in the summer of 1837, and joined the M. E. Church. During the ensuing two years he exercised the offices of class-leader and ex-In 1839, he was horter in the Church. licensed to preach, and received on trial in the Arkansas Conference, and appointed to the Elizabeth Circuit. In 1840, he was appointed to Little Rock Circuit. In 1841, he was ordained deacon, and appointed to Pine Bluff Circuit; 1842, to Fayetteville Circuit; 1843, to Huntsville Circuit; 1844, to Washington Circuit; 1845, to Lafayette Circuit; 1846, to Benton Circuit; 1847, to Elizabeth Circuit; 1848, to Batesville Station. In 1849, he was appointed presiding elder of the Little Rock District; 1850, 1851, Batesville District; 1852, 1853, Little Rock District; 1854, Helena District, where he remained four years. In 1858, he was appointed to Searcy District, where he remained until his death, which occurred April 14, 1860. The immediate cause of his death was a congestive chill, which was followed by a few days of severe illness. He filled, with credit to himself and honor to the Church, many of the most important positions within her gift. Twice he was elected to General Conference—in 1854 and 1858. But he has left us. His life and labors ended together. He preached one of his most effective sermons but a few days before his death. When told that death was at hand, he replied that he was ready; and committing his beloved wife and babes to the care of his Father and God, he left the field of labor and conflict for the regions of reward and triumph.

Benjamin Kellogg died December 3, 1859, aged twenty-four years. He was licensed to preach in the autumn of 1856, was received on trial at the Conference at Princeton, and appointed as junior preacher to the Eldorado Circuit. His second appointment was to the Camden Circuit. His third appointment was to the Magnolia Circuit. At the last Conference at Monticello he was appointed to Liberty and Mound Church, but before reaching his new field he sickened and died. He was a young man of exalted piety, and a faithful gospel minister. Where best known he was most loved. In the midst of sympathizing Christian friends he breathed his last, gloriously triumphing over the final foe.

Jacob Whitesides, after a pilgrimage of more than fourscore years, died in Hempstead county, Ark., February, 1860. He was for more than half a century a minister of the gospel. In the early part of his ministry he was for a few years a member of the Missouri Conference. He located and removed to the territory of Arkansas, and, at the organization of the Arkansas Conference in 1836, he was readmitted into the travelling connection. For several years he has sustained a superannuated relation. He was a devoted Christian and zealous minister. The grace of God, that comforted him in life, sustained him in the final hour.
