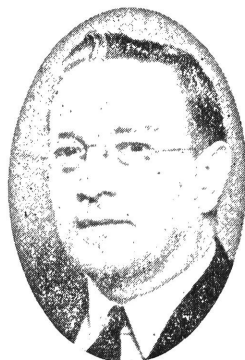
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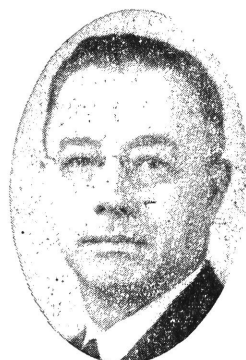

Standing Rules of the Kentucky Conference

I. Rules of Order

1. The Rules of the preceding General Conference, in so far as they may apply, otherwise, Robert's Rules of Order, revised, shall govern the procedure in the Annual Conference, except (1) that those present and voting shall be a quorum for the conference, and (2) in meetings of the boards, commissions and committees, or any other subordinate bodies of the annual conference, a quorum shall be those present and voting, and (3) where the Discipline provides otherwise.

II. Annual Conference

2. The pastors shall mail their Annual Conference reports to their respective District Superintendents on the second Monday preceding the meeting of the Annual Conference and shall mail any remaining World Service and Conference Benevolences to the Conference Treasurer at the same time.

3. The pastors and official boards of local churches shall co-operate with the Bishop and District Superintendents in holding quarterly checkup meetings as soon after the end of each Quarter as soon as possible for the purpose of checking on the payments to World Service and Conference Benevolences, the Episcopal Fund, the Conference Claimants Fund, the Minimum Salary Fund, and the Administration Funds by having all monies for these funds in the hands of the Conference Treasurer by the time of adjournment of the check-up meeting in order to be listed on the Quarterly Honor Roll. The Conference Treasurer and the Conference Missionary Secretary shall be charged with the responsibility of preparing the Honor Roll each quarter and sending it to The Kentucky Methodist for publication.

4. The Conference Roll shall be by members of the Annual Conference registering their names on enrollment cards furnished by the Secretary.

5. The Executive Officers of any Board of the Conference or of any Institution owned by the Conference shall have the privilege of the floor without vote, if he is not a regular member of the Conference for the purpose of discussing any matter involving the work of his Board or Institution.

6. The Kentucky Annual Conference will receive for admission on trial in the annual conference, only those who hold B. D. degree; except in the case of citizens within the bounds of the Kentucky Annual Conference, before the beginning of their college studies.

III. Reports of Boards

7. All reports of Boards, Commissions, and Committees presented to the Conference shall be in duplicate. All copies shall be in triplicate.

8. There shall be a Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes.

9. The Board of Education shall be composed of one layman from each District and an equal number of preachers in addition to those members provided for in the Discipline.

10. All matters relating to Temperance and Public Morals shall be referred to the Board of Temperance.

11. The Secretary and Treasurer of each Board, Commission or Committee shall combine their reports so that there shall be only one report.

IV. Ministerial Character

12. The Committee on Conference Relations shall enquire of each District Superintendent concerning the character of each Minister and make a report to the Annual Conference.

V. Districts

13. There shall be seven districts. A district conference shall be held annually in each District. In addition to the members named in the Discipline, there shall be one additional member from each pastoral charge. The District Stewards shall set the salary of the District Superintendents.

VI. District Superintendents

14. The District Superintendents shall constitute a committee to nominate from time to time the members of the Boards, Commissions, and Standing Committees of the Conference, and determine the number of members thereof, unless such nominations and members are otherwise provided for in the Discipline.

VII. Important Committees

15. There shall be a Committee on Journal and Courtesies which shall examine and correct the Journal and report to the Annual Conference, and shall attend to all matters of Conference Courtesies.

16. There shall be a Quadrennial Committee on Entertainment. The committee shall study all proposals for Conference entertainment and make recommendations to the Annual Conference.

VIII. Lay Members

17. The Lay Members of the Annual Conference shall be elected annually.

18. The Lay Members of the Conference Boards, Commissions, and Committees, who are not members of the Conference shall have the privilege of the floor without vote, to discuss the report of their respective Board, Commission, or Committee.

IX. Pension Rules

19. (1) Membership in the Conference and membership in the Ministers Retirement Brotherhood shall be made co-extensive. That all who shall henceforth unite with the Annual Conference thereby become members of the brotherhood and shall pay the dues of membership. Furthermore, that all present members of the Conference be granted membership at once upon the cash payment of the full amount of their dues from the date of their Admission, and that the membership benefits become retroactive to the day of the Admittance.

20. (2) Before an Accepted Supply can share in the retirement fund of the Kentucky Annual Conference, he must complete the Conference Course of Study in accordance with the regulations of the Discipline; except in the cases of men who have served for at least 15 years as full time pastors prior to the 1947 annual conference.

An Accepted Supply Pastor may count only four years for retirement claims prior to his completion of the conference studies, unless additional years are recommended by the Board of Ministerial Training and approved by $\frac{2}{3}$ vote of the annual conference.

21 (3) The rate of or assessment (for pension purposes) payable annually by each active member of the Conference shall be as follows:

On a graduating scale, against the established minimum salary 1%, from this up to \$3,000 on a 2% rate and on \$3,000 and over 3%. The entire proceeds from this assessment shall be paid by the men to the Claimants Office to be set aside for the Stabilization Fund, beginning with this Conference and carrying through the next Quadrennium."

In calculating this assessment against the District Superintendents there shall first be an expense deduction of \$1,500 and each Pastor shall be allowed 10% deduction on his salary.

X. Secretary, Treasurer

22. The Secretary of the Annual Conference shall be charged with editing and publishing the Conference Journal. He is hereby authorized to contract for the printing of the Conference Journal and to draw upon the proper Treasurer for the expense of the same, as the Conference may direct from year to year.

23. All materials to be published in the Conference Journal shall be in the hands of the Secretary within ten days after the adjournment of the Conference.

24. The Treasurer of the Annual Conference shall make final settlement and disburse all funds to the treasurers of the Annual Conference Boards, Commissions, and Committees as early in the Conference session as possible and before the adjournment of the Annual Conference.

XI. Standing Rules

25. The District Superintendents shall be the Committee on Standing Rules. Any member of the Conference desiring to amend the standing rules shall present in writing the proposed amendment to the committee for consideration and recommendation to the Conference.

XII. World Service

26. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall furnish each District Superintendent, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, and the Conference Missionary Secretary before adjournment of Conference, a written statement of the apportionments to the several districts.

FIRST DAY, WEDNESDAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

No. 21 (3)

The rate of or assessment (for pension purposes) payable annually by each active member of the Conference shall be as follows:

On a graduating scale, against the established minimum salary 1%, from this up to \$3,000 on a 2% rate and on \$3,000 and over 3%. The entire proceeds from this assessment shall be paid by the men to the Claimants Office to be set aside for the Stabilization Fund, beginning with this Conference and carrying through the next Quadrennium.

In calculating this assessment against the District Superintendents there shall first be an expense deduction of \$1,500 and each Pastor shall be allowed 10% deduction on his salary.

Memorials: A. R. Perkins moved that a committee be appointed to screen the Memorials to be offered to the Conference. Granted.

Committee: C. A. Sweazy, J. I. Meyers, D. V. Snapp, C. B. Vanarnsdale, A. R. Perkins, M. P. McClure.

Methodist Publishing House: Darrell Behringer, represented the Publishing House, and spoke of some of the problems of the publisher. After recommending current books to the ministers he presented a check for the profits from the Publishing House to Bishop Wm. T. Watkins in the amount of \$4,263.89.

CHANGES IN CHARGE LINES

Ashland District

Take Walnut Hill from Greenup Circuit, and put with Argillite to form the Argillite Circuit.

Take Dorton from Elkhorn City-Dorton charge, and put with Shelbyana to form the Dorton-Shelbiana charge in the Big Sandy Larger Parish.

Take Mt. Zion from the Sunshine Circuit, and put with Bethlehem and Limeville, to form the Ohio Valley Circuit.

Barbourville District

Take Grays-Felts charge and add Hart's Chapel and Chestnut Chapel from Rockholds Circuit, and take Gold Bug from the Williamsburg Circuit and create the charge to be known as the Corbin Parish.

Carlisle District

Take Trinity from the Fairview Circuit and add it to the Muses Circuit. Combine the remainder of Fairview Circuit with the Cannan Circuit, creating Fairview-Canaan Circuit.

Take Oakland Mills from Cassidy-Ishmael and make the Oakland Mills Station.

Take Tabor from Tilton-Tabor Charge and make Tabor a station.

Take Ewing and Clover Hill of the Ewing Charge and add them to Tilton, making the Tilton Charge and eliminating the Ewing Charge.

Danville District

BISHOP'S DECISION

Decision requested of the Bishop by M. C. Redwine, Layman from the First Methodist Church at Winchester, Kentucky, at the 1951 session of the Kentucky Annual Conference at Richmond, Kentucky.

First: Can annual report of the Conference Lay Board be approved before compliance with Section 722 "audit" of the 1948 Discipline?

Answer: The failure by oversight of a board of an Annual Conference to observe some legal requirement does not prevent a board from making a report to the Annual Conference nor does it invalidate the right of an Annual Conference to accept the report.

Second: Can a Conference Lay Leader be nominated, except on certificate in writing that at a regular meeting, with a quorum present that person so nominated was so named by ballot by a majority of said quorum of the Conference Board of Lay Activities?

Answer: When a member of a subordinate body makes a nomination to the Annual Conference for that body it is not necessary for him to state that the subordinate body has kept the law of the Church in arriving at its decision.

Failure by the one making the nomination to state that the vote was by ballot and that there was a quorum present does not invalidate the nomination. Neither law nor custom requires such.

Third: May the nomination of the Board of Lay Activities for Conference Lay Leader be made orally or must it be made in writing?

Answer: There is no requirement in paragraph 1494 of the Discipline that the nomination be in writing.

REPORT BOARD OF CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS

Your Board desires to make here a brief report covering some of the work of the year. Our complete records are to be printed in the Minutes for you. These will show how the funds committed to us have been handled.

We register our appreciation of the help given by the General Pension Board and the untiring personal services of Dr. J. Wilson Crichlow, their representative.

The following are the named officers for the ensuing year: M. P. McClure, Chairman; Carl W. Haggard, Vice Chairman; I. S. Pineur, Secretary; W. W. Ball, Treasurer.

As Executive Officer for the year we have set-up a permanent file containing the personal service record of Conference members. This includes the active men as well as those who are retired. A similar list of Supply men is nearing completion. This gives us important information concerning all those who shall later become claimants upon the Conference.

Our responsibility at the close of the year is: 70 men with 2019¼ service years; 66 women with 1498½ service years; 6 orphans with 118¾ service years; 15 Specials with 145 service years; making a total of 3772¼ service years. Thus you see it requires \$3,772.25 to pay \$1.00 each per service year to these Claimants. We will as you can see, distribute something over \$80,000 exclusive of the amount paid by the Brotherhood.

To date 6 members of this Conference have been referred for retirement this year. Their service years are 212¾ years plus 13 years of Special service. Thus the increased load is more than the deductions caused by deaths during the year.

By action of one year ago our Annuity rate this year is set at \$30.00 per service year. Special Claimants receive one-half the amount paid from the Claimants fund. We request permission to pay the widows seventy-five per cent, the maximum allowed. Carrying out the plan adopted last Conference we will print the record of men in Special Appointments. This will show their service record and Annuity responsibility, as a matter of permanent record.

We request this body to approve 30 years of service for Dr. J. B. Kenyon, asking for the retired relation. We also ask that 2 years of service be restored to the record of G. W. Hoffman, making his full service 40 years.

Your Board recommends that the following institutions be approved for Annuity Responsibility: The Methodist Hospital of Kentucky, Good Samaritan Hospital, Union College, Kentucky Wesleyan College, Asbury College, Asbury Seminary, and the Methodist Home, upon the payment of the annual apportionment of twelve times the annual annuity rate. This money to be paid to the Board of Conference Claimants.

We ask the World Service Commission and this Conference to make a 15% apportionment against the Churches for this year.

Finally, this board has taken action asking that the 1952-53 Clearinghouse Rate be set at \$30.00.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Local Church Section

The program of Christian education in the Kentucky Conference has seen some unusual advances during the past Conference year. Significant increases have been noted in several phases of the program promoted by your Conference Board. Church school enrollment at the close of this year was 52,873, an increase of 788 over last year. Vacation Schools reached more Methodist children this past year than ever in the history of the Conference. 11,000 Methodist children were in our Vacation School program, an increase of 304 over last year. The total amount raised for administration and supplies in the church school work amounted to \$99,074, an increase of \$11,753.

The work of leadership training has advanced during the year. One of the most important developments in this program was the Laboratory School held at Epworth Church, Lexington, on a Conference-wide basis. Fifteen training schools were held over the Conference with a total of 739 certificates awarded to teachers, officers and other church school workers.

Conference-wide assemblies and schools were well attended. The Youth Fellowship Assembly attracted a large enrollment, with 179 registered delegates from 67 churches. A one-day Conference Adult Fellowship Assembly was held at Park Church, Lexington, with 70 in attendance. The annual Methodist Student Fellowship Assembly had 120 enrolled from 11 college campuses in Kentucky. The Pastors' School was well attended. Three Christian Adventure Camps were held with 242 campers in attendance representing sixty-two churches.

Our work at the Wesley Foundation has made gratifying progress. The Director, Rev. Wm. Swift, reports approximately a one-third increase in students contacted at the University of Kentucky.

Church School Rally Day was included in the Roll Call offering this year with good results, and we recommend that it be so continued next year.

One of the most unusual records in Methodism has been made by our Executive Secretary, Mr. Dennis V. Snapp. When the Board of Education met recently for its annual meeting, Mr. Snapp made his 33rd annual report to that body. Mr. Snapp is the only person to serve in this capacity in the Methodist Church for 33 consecutive years. The Board wishes to commend him for long and faithful service, and to speak a word of appreciation for this layman who has devoted himself to the field of Christian education in the Kentucky Conference.

The Board has elected Mr. Snapp for Executive Secretary for another year, and Mrs. D. V. Snapp as office secretary. Mrs. Wm. Edwards, Nicholasville, has been elected Children's Director for the Conference, Miss Sally Adams Robinson, Lexington, Conference Director of Youth Work and Rev. E. T. Curry, Winchester Conference Director of Adult Work for the Conference program of Christian education for this coming year.

We call upon our churches to conform with the General Conference legislation in observing the following special days with program and offering:

1. Fourth Sunday for World Service and Conference Benevolences.
2. Methodist Student Day.
3. Race Relations Day.
4. Church School Rally Day.

We further recommend that the offerings from the annual observance of Race Relations Sunday be directed to the use of Paine College, Augusta, Georgia.

We recommend that the fifth Sunday be designated as Orphans' Home Day and that an offering be taken for our Methodist Home.

We have attached to this report a complete financial statement of the Kentucky Conference Board of Education submitted by our treasurer, Mr. Basil E. Hayden.

College Section

This has been a year of difficult adjustments for our Colleges. All are facing the problem of decreasing enrollments and increasing costs of operation. The Presidents have carried heavy responsibilities and we wish to commend them highly for valuable service rendered to the Kingdom. In spite of many problems, our Colleges have made progress for which we are grateful.

For the year 1950-51, Kentucky Wesleyan College reports the following:

Number of teachers, 19; number of students, 182 (including 1950 Summer School 230); Full-time students equivalent, 170; property value, \$629,327.08; Endowment, \$360,377.38; Indebtedness, \$40,000.00.

For the same period Union College reports the following:

Number of teachers, 27; Number of students, 876; Full-time students equivalent, 549; Property value, \$1,115,204.69; Endowment, \$616,241.79; Indebtedness, \$68,000.00.

For the past year Lindsey Wilson Junior College reports the following:

Number of teachers, 18; Number of students, excluding duplicates, 379; Full-time student equivalent, 261.9; Value of Property, \$417,430.81; Endowment, \$37,528.18; Indebtedness, \$100,000.00.

We recommend that the observance of College Day be in charge of an Executivea Committee composed of Bishop Wm. T. Watkins, chairman, and the presidents of the three colleges with Dr. Victor P. Henry, president of Lindsey Wilson Junior College, serving as treasurer.

We recommend that all funds derived for our colleges from Conference Benevolences, and College Day, be divided equally between the three colleges, Kentucky Wesleyan College, Lindsey Wilson Junior College and Union College.

We nominate for election to the Joint Board of Education of the Kentucky and Louisville Conferences, W. H. Poore, Richmond; Hon. Henry L. Nichols, Danville; Hon. W. A. Stanfill, Lexington (at large) for terms expiring in 1955.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON HIGHER EDUCATION ON THE METHODIST COLLEGES OF KENTUCKY

The recent developments of institutions of higher education related to The Methodist Church in Kentucky required, in the judgment of both the Kentucky and Louisville Conferences, some specify study before a program involving financial campaigns could be wisely instituted. Accordingly, at the 1950 sessions of both conferences resolutions were passed committing this responsibility to a commission consisting of the Bishop of the Louisville Area, the District Superintendents of the Kentucky and Louisville Conferences, and one person selected from each one of the districts in the Kentucky and Louisville Conferences.

This commission delegated to Mr. Marvin Eblen, Mr. N. O. Kimbler, the Reverend R. R. Patton, the Reverend R. H. Wade, and John L. Seaton, a consultant from the Division of Educational institutions of the General Board of Education, responsibility to make a careful inventory of the needs of each institution and report to the whole commission.

This sub-committee undertook to obtain firsthand information as to present conditions, range of service, definite needs that can be foreseen for the next five to ten years, and other factors which should govern the allocation of such funds as the annual conferences may provide. Since it is obvious that the cost of meeting the

recognized needs will exceed the funds likely to be available, sound methods of determination as to the amounts and times assigned to the respective institutions in regard to both capital and current funds are necessary. The commission, meeting July 13 at Louisville, reviewed the report of the sub-committee and adopted for presentation to the two annual conferences such considerations of principal and policy as appear now to be indicated. The commission at the same time is aware that the tining studies and adaptions in accord with shifting conditions will be essential to assure the Church of the best results from its investments in higher education.

I. HISTORY

It is well understood that the problems now before the conferences are not new. About ten years ago the three colleges were reviewed by a competent commission and their recommendations were rejected. Six years ago their report with some variations was again considered by the conferences with a like result. The marked gains at Union College and the transformation at Lindsey-Wilson College over against the relative decline at Kentucky Wesleyan College forced a reconsideration. It was at last too clear to be denied or ignored that the College could have no future such as the Church would desire to support at Winchester. A crisis was at hand for it and a proposal was made through alumni and interested citizens in Owensboro that it be removed to that city if the community would raise \$1,000,000. In a campaign of phenomenal enthusiasm and energy the City of Owensboro secured in pledges and cash an amount exceeding \$1,000,000. In connection with the transfer and the place of the other two colleges in the total situation, which has much promise, it is necessary to take a general inventory of the three colleges and to anticipate as accurately as possible at least the minimum needs of the near future.

II. INVENTORY

It should be understood that the commission did not make a detailed study of the colleges such as would be made in a formal survey. Through its representatives it had the benefit of reports made by the Presidents and of previous studies in considerable detail made over a period of years by one member of the committee. It is believed that the data here given are substantially correct and are sufficiently complete to serve the present purposes. In the statements, the current funds which are generally in small amounts and subject to quick turnover, are ignored.

The cost of moving and the losses on the sale of the Winchester properties, together with very probable expenses not now determinable, will reduce the total by a large amount—possibly \$300,000.00 to \$400,000.00. But there would still remain a large asset representing the generosity, the hopes and prayers, of thousands of good people, as well as the basic means of an increasing service to youth and the Church. The conferences should use all diligence and wisdom to conserve the fund and put it to the most effective use.

III. PROSPECTUS OF THE NEAR FUTURE

The attempt was made to foresee in consultation with the Presidents the needs of the present and the next five to ten years. Inevitably there were differences of opinion but in the main there was an encouraging agreement on the necessities of the near future in the order listed. The commission believes that as funds become available for each college they should be used in the order indicated by the numbering. It is, of course, aware that events might occur which would make a different order advisable or imperative. In that case the programs of the three colleges would need to be reviewed by the authorities of the colleges and by the representatives of the supporting conferences.

In the listing of needs endowment has not been included because the plant developments are so urgent and the amounts required for endowment would be so staggering. The time has come when \$5,000 of endowment per student — some colleges have more than twice that amount — is a modest figure for senior colleges. In its absence the difference must be made up by gifts or other forms of current support.

Furthermore, nothing is included in the lists which could be regarded as unjustified or excessive. The lists are in the nature of minima to be supplied as rapidly as possible, their relative urgency in each college being indicated, as seen now, by the order of the listing. It should be understood also that there are likely to be priorities among the colleges as to timing of developments. Just now Lindsey-Wilson College has a pledge in the amount of \$200,000 that must be met, and Kentucky Wesleyan College is engaged in an enterprise voted by both conferences, which requires satisfactory completion for the honor of The Methodist Church.

UNION COLLEGE

The following list of needs was presented by the President though not in the order here given. The committee is not aware that he had established in his own mind any definite order. It, therefore, takes the entire responsibility in this instance as in the other two colleges, though its judgment is based on conversations with the Presidents, observation of the conditions, and considerable knowledge of college plants.

It was thought possible at the time of the study that the campus might be obtained free as part of a development plan. Later, the committee appointed to make the selection found it advisable to purchase at a cost of \$80,000 a 40-acre tract, together with an additional 11 acres and the large home residence, subject to life estate by the owner. Though advantageously situated in relation to the city and generally level, the cost of sewer and water lines and of landscaping is estimated at \$77,000, bringing the total cost up to \$157,000.

LINDSEY-WILSON JUNIOR COLLEGE

The needs of a junior college are much less impressive than those of a senior college but equally urgent. In anticipation of what had to be done if Lindsey-Wilson College was to gain accreditation and to continue effectively, the Louisville Annual Conference pledged itself in advance to provide \$200,000 of the first money to be raised in a campaign. And prior to a study of the entire situation, it expressed approval of a joint campaign with the Kentucky Conference, and a ratio of division of the proceeds, which on the basis of full returns of \$1,500,000 would yield to the College \$450,000. On the strength of that action the College has borrowed, and is spending, nearly \$100,000. That explains the first item in the following list.

Since the estimated needs of the three colleges for the near future run to more than twice the amount of the contemplated campaign, it is obvious the first needs must come first, and an orderly plan of development must be followed. It should be clear, too, that the conferences should not be expected to supply all the funds for capital purposes, whether buildings or endowments. Unless the colleges can attract big gifts as well as small gifts from foundations, wealthy individuals, and the general public, doubts may well be entertained as to their worth and the extent to which the conferences will be justified in supporting them. They will always have a responsibility for some capital funds, but after the present crises has passed the major responsibility probably should be for adequate current support.

IV. THE PROJECTED CAPITAL FUNDS CAMPAIGN

Both the Kentucky Conference and the Louisville Conference voted for the relocation of Kentucky Wesleyan College. At the 1950 session of the Louisville Conference it took the following specific actions in support of its earlier vote:

"Because of the continued emergency at Lindsey-Wilson and the proposed relocation of Kentucky Wesleyan College at Owensboro, we recommend that the campaign for capital funds for \$1,500,000 for Lindsey-Wilson Junior College, Kentucky Wesleyan College and Union College in 1951-52, with the following modifications:

That the Louisville Conference set as its goal \$900,000 to be distributed in the ratio of 40% for Kentucky Wesleyan, 30% for Lindsey-Wilson, and 30% for Union College; with the hope that the Kentucky Conference will join in a like campaign with its goal \$600,000 at such time as it may deem wise;

With the provision also that Lindsey-Wilson shall receive the first \$200,000 received in cash for the campaign as a credit against the entire amount that shall be due that college at the completion of the campaign:

With the further provision that in the event that the Kentucky Conference does not join in the campaign that the Louisville Conference provide the \$200,000 for Lindsey-Wilson College as its first obligation.

We recommend the appointment of a commission to join with a like commission from the Kentucky Conference to make a study of our entire educational program; the commission to be composed of the District Superintendents and one other person from each district to be selected by Bishop Watkins."

This commission approves of the action taken as probably most likely to be acceptable. However, in view of the far greater demands on Kentucky Wesleyan College, it feels bound to say that a more reasonable division would be 52% for Kentucky Wesleyan College, 24% for Union College, and 24% for Lindsey-Wilson.

Recommendation No. 1—

After searching discussion and consideration of the various interests, the commission strongly recommends to

(a) The Kentucky Annual Conference that it accept an allocation of \$450,000 toward the funds to be raised for the three colleges. (b) Since a crisis is actually at hand and "time is of the essence of the contract" for the proper establishment of Kentucky Wesleyan in its new location, the commission recommends that the campaign be set up in the Kentucky Annual Conference to begin no later than the fall of 1952, and that the Louisville Annual Conference proceed with its financial campaign during the conference year 1951-52. (c) The commission further recommends that the \$1,350,000 be distributed as follows: \$700,000 to Kentucky Wesleyan, \$325,000 to Union College, \$325,000 to Lindsey-Wilson. Since Owensboro has raised \$1,000,000 to carry forward the program there, it is recommended that Union College, in order

to complete project No. 1, raise through its own efforts \$125,000, and Lindsey-Wilson raise through its own efforts \$75,000 to complete projects 1 to 5.

V. FUNDS FOR CURRENT SUPPORT

As previously hinted, current support will be a grave issue with three colleges to be kept out of the red. Education is costly now and it is likely to be more costly. The flood of G. I. students provided relatively lush years from various factors which need not be discussed here. Nearly all colleges anticipate large deficits next year and there is little prospect that the conditions will soon change. That means that the College Day collections and other conference support, such as from conference benevolences, must be brought to the level recommended by the General Conference—fifty cents per member—and kept there indefinitely, just as the support of various other causes is expected not to decrease. If this is done support will increase from \$47,000 to \$66,000 annually.

The division of the funds for current support should be considered with care and a firm intent to do what is best for the cause. Plainly, an equal division among the three colleges is inequitable in the present and is likely to be so at any time in the future. It costs more per student to operate a senior college than a junior college. This matter was discussed at length by your commission, but for many reasons it decided not to recommend at this time any change in present ratios for distribution. This action does not mean that they should be regarded as permanently fixed.

Recommendation No. 2—

(a) That the goal be placed for \$66,000 and (b) for the present funds contributed for current purposes be distributed as follows:

Kentucky Wesleyan	33 1/3%
Union College	33 1/3%
Lindsey-Wilson	33 1/3%

VI. PROBLEMS OF ADMINISTRATION

A proposed joint campaign of two conferences for three colleges, two of which have been under one type of control, and one under another type, would be likely under any circumstances to raise questions as to the form of control. It does in this instance, as was quickly evident in the meetings of the committee. There was immediate agreement that ownership and ultimate authority should be unquestionably vested in the conferences.

In senior colleges, for example, alumni representation and trustees at large may be much more important than in junior colleges. There are differences also in the kinds of representation needed among senior colleges. For a college to have its own Board is an almost universal form of control. The ends sought by a joint-board plan can be attained more effectively in other ways and without impairing the initiative and resourcefulness of individual colleges. Whatever the form of charter, it is considered essential that all the requirements of the Discipline be met.

To provide for these Boards, changes in two of the charters would be necessary and in the by-laws of the three colleges. In the case of Kentucky Wesleyan College the by-laws should make provision for the continued cooperation in the development of the College by the Owensboro group that has so effectively conducted the local campaign. Naturally one or more Trustees will be elected from Owensboro, but the additional group, entering largely into deliberations for the advancement of the College, and sitting often with the Board, appears to your commission to be a wise provision during the formative period.

Recommendation No. 3—

After thorough discussion the committee voted **unanimously** to recommend:

(a) That each college have its own separate charter and Board of Trustees, not all the Boards being necessarily of the same number or constituted in the same way;

(b) That a committee of three be appointed to prepare charters for Kentucky Wesleyan and Lindsey-Wilson.

(c) That the charter of each institution contain provision making it necessary to have the approval of the Kentucky and Louisville Conferences for any changes in or amendments to the charters.

(d) That the committee created under (b) be asked to cooperate with the Trustees of Union College in bringing that charter under the provisions of the above act.

In each case as here proposed, the Board of Trustees would operate the college within the policies adopted by the conferences, subject to decrees of the General Conferences. In order to assure harmony and guard against expensive duplications or harmful competition the commission further recommends the creation of a liaison or coordinating committee to be made up of representatives from all three institutions, with two members at large and the presiding bishop. The functions of the committee would be largely advisory but it should have authority to stay until the conferences could act on any proceedings which it considered unwise or fraught with peril. Your commission agrees unanimously that it should have authority to prevent any Board of Trustees from involving the college in debt amounting to more than 25% of its established and certified assets. In fact, such a deterrent should be placed in the charter of each college.

Recommendation No. 4—

That a liaison or coordinating committee be constituted as follows:

Two members from each Board of Trustees, two at large — nominated by the Board of Education of each Conference, with privilege of other nominations from the floor, and the presiding Bishop who will act as chairman.

Another consideration of consequence is the extent to which each institution should be regarded as a conference, an area, or a local institution. A study of student rolls which give the geographical sources of students shows that none of the colleges may be regarded as strictly local. Though junior colleges traditionally draw most of their students from the immediate community or county, Lindsey-Wilson College has students from beyond Union College and Sue Bennett Junior College. Union College not only draws from all parts of the state but more than one-sixth of its students come from outside of the state. Kentucky Wesleyan College has been considerably restricted, but in its new location there is no reason why it should not establish both wider and stronger local connections.

Recommendation No. 5—

Your commission recommends that the Kentucky Annual Conference and the Louisville Annual Conference constitute the unit in planning and general policy; that they unite in the purpose to advance each college for the common good without discrimination among them; and that each Board of Trustees administer its college to serve in the best possible way the area within which it is located, but also to aim at effective service to students who come to it from all parts of the state and from beyond its borders.

In brief, effective administration is necessarily institutional in details and specific operations, but it is related in policies and purposes to the Church throughout the state and to the Church Universal.

CONCLUSION

The question may be asked, why should the Church in Kentucky undertake this costly program of higher education? The direct answer might be that the two conferences now have three colleges and must face squarely and unflinchingly the resulting financial obligations. But beyond that a more pertinent and comprehensive answer is in the needs of the Church. That was seen early in Kentucky and Ohio and resulted in the founding in 1821 of Augusta College, "the first institution of learning under Methodist control that accomplished the work as well as bore the name of a college." The reasons which made that action "expedient and necessary" are in equal force today. The Church draws its leaders and to an unrecognized degree its effective "followers" from its own colleges.

A study made nearly fifty years ago showed that somewhat more than 80% of the college-bred ministers came from colleges of the Church and 6% from state institutions. The pattern still holds. "A study of Methodist ministers who are listed in *Religious Leaders in America* showed that 72.2% were graduates of Methodist Colleges; 10.8% came from other church-related colleges; 9.7% from independent colleges, and 7.3% from tax-supported institutions". (Dr. John O. Gross, *The Christian Century*, March 28, 1951). This extraordinary ratio that has remained approximately constant through nearly half a century is not likely to change much as long as the colleges are effectively maintained. They conserve and develop the inclinations toward the ministry with which students come to college, and they also win many candidates for the ministry and other forms of full time professional work in the church from students who came with no such inclinations. Moreover the chances heavily favor being educated in a Methodist college rather than elsewhere as a preparation for the most effective ministerial and lay leadership in The Methodist Church.

But the issues go much farther and deeper. "The church colleges contribute to the building of spiritual idealism in many ways not apparent on the surface. For instance, the main source of teachers of humanistic subjects for all institutions has been, and continues to be, Christian colleges. These persons fill strategic places in our national life. It is they who continually point out that if the spiritual is left out of the process of building human personalities and only pure intellectualism or unalloyed vocationalism is emphasized, vicious results to the personal and national character must be expected." (Gross, *Ibid.*) Science lessens the perils of life at one point only to increase them at another. External conditions are changed by material developments, but ugly passions continue to ravage mankind. The hope of the world is to multiply the number of men and women whose education in spirit, in ideal, and in fundamental philosophy is Christian.

"This generation has an appointment with destiny" for the church in all its activities and relations. In view of the shortage in its professional leadership and the crisis in world affairs, it is called upon to strengthen its own colleges to the utmost and at the same time to give all possible support to moral and religious forces in other educational institutions. The immediate issue for The Methodist Church in Kentucky and for the two annual conferences is the projected joint campaign. May the decisive action be taken with vision of the far years, with wisdom from above, with consecration, and with unselfish devotion.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EVANGELISM

AUGUST, 1951

Your Conference Board of Evangelism, through the regular appointed agencies, and in cooperation with the General and Jurisdictional Boards of Evangelism, have carried on a most aggressive and successful program throughout this Conference year.

Our Board has been represented at the various connectional meetings, including the Jurisdictional Meeting on Evangelism at Birmingham, Ala., the Conference Secretaries' Meeting at Albion, Mich., The Town and Country Commission at Sioux City Iowa, and Lake Junaluska, N. C.

The District Secretaries have carried on a most successful program, including District Rallies, simultaneous campaigns for both mass and visitation evangelism, and a spiritual program of assimilation of new members.

The Annual Conference-wide Convention on Evangelism was well attended, and your Board recommends the continuation of this Convention.

The figures coming from our Conference Statistician shows that we have had a total of 2,222 on profession of faith, 2245 by transfer, making a total of 4,467 accessions for the year.

Reports from our evangelists show that they have conducted a total of 148 revival meetings, with 4,748 professions of faith, and 1,407 uniting with The Methodist Church. We commend these evangelists for their fine, fruitful labors, and commend them to the Pastors of our Conference for the use of their services.

We recommend as Approved Evangelists Joseph Brookshire, James Gibson, J. B. Kendall, Eddie Moran, J. R. Parker, Dee W. Cobb, Paul J. Pappas, Joseph H. Lewis, and G. W. Kelley. We recommend G. C. Gaunce and Roscoe Jenkins, Local Preachers, to be recognized by this Conference as Local Preacher Evangelists with our endorsement.

We heartily endorse the plan for a Louisville Area Evangelists' Advance, to be conducted as soon as practicable, under the leadership of our Presiding Bishop, and the General Board of Evangelism, and authorize representatives from our Conference Board to meet for the planning of such an advance, with representatives from the Louisville and Memphis Conferences.

We deeply regret the death of D. M. Hutton, E. B. Lovern, and Mrs. Mary Conway, members of our Board, and welcome R. W. Gibson, Cecil Brown, and Bayard McCann as new members, to fill out their unexpired term.

We express deep appreciation to the Board of Directors of the Ruggles Camp Ground, and commend them for the progress which they are making in the work there. Since much of the program carried on at the Ruggles Camp is under the direction of the Board of Education, we recommend that a Committee from their Board be appointed to meet with a like Committee from this Board, to make plans for further property improvement and promotion.

We continue the request that a place be given on the Conference program of 1952 for the emphasis of the work of this Board, and that a capable speaker be secured for this occasion.

We urge the promotion of the cause of evangelism through all methods, and earnestly request that each Pastor and District Superintendent seek to see that there is an active Committee on Membership and Evangelism in each local church.

We recommend the following as District Secretaries for the new year: Ashland, J. H. Finch; Barbourville, J. B. Hahn; Carlisle, H. L. Moore; Covington, Frank D. Swanson; Danville, K. A. Clay; Frankfort, C. D. Goodwin; Lexington, I. J. Scudder.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

The Board of Hospitals and Homes met on August 15, 1951, with the following members present: Adolphus Gilliam, President; C. L. Cooper, Secretary; M. C. Redwine, C. B. VanArsdale, and Mrs. W. A. Hinton. Mr. Wm. Schaeffler sat in on the meeting in place of Mr. H. M. Zimmerman, without vote.

REPORT No. 1

Mr. W. B. Phelps, Administrator of Good Samaritan Hospital read the report of that institution. The report was received and filed for the Conference Journal. Mr. Jack Ott is recommended for re-election to the Board of Trustees.

The past year has been a most successful and profitable one from every angle. While we are interested in the financial phase of the hospital program we are equally interested in the healing of the ill and ministering to the physical and spiritual needs of people.

Following are a few facts of interest of the service rendered:

While our financial statement indicates a net profit for the year, this amount was absorbed in necessary additions to our equipment and physical plant and is reflected in the increase in the increased total net worth.

Among the several improvements made during the year were:

(1) The new auditorium and medical library with a seating capacity of 200. This meets a much needed service and is used by the county and hospital medical staffs and for lectures and meetings for hospital personnel.

(2) Increase of our emergency room to one of the largest and finest in the South. It has been increased from two operating rooms and two recovery rooms to three operating rooms and eight recovery rooms.

(3) Through an anonymous gift of \$30,000.00, we established the first Practical Nurses School in the state for Registered Practical Nurses. This school has enrolled girls who do not meet the requirements of entrants to the graduate nurses school. After one year of schooling they are eligible to take the state board and become a licensed Practical Nurse.

(4) Installation of a complete automatic fire alarm system with a direct connection to the fire department stations.

(5) Installation of an emergency automatic lighting plant to function in case of any power failure in the city.

The Good Samaritan Hospital continues to occupy its place as one of the outstanding institutions of service and assistance to the sick and needy. While the staff of over 500 employees are a devoted, consecrated group of individuals, we must not overlook the loyal staff of over 150 doctors who contribute so much for the indigent and needy. Little publicity is given to this phase of our program but the willing service cheerfully given by the doctors in our hospitals amounts to many thousands of dollars each year.

The numerous improvements and additions to our hospital have been the culmination of careful planning and deliberations by the Board of Trustees elected by this conference. Their interest in the hospital and faithfulness to their obligations is manifested by the near perfect attendance at each board meeting. Good Samaritan is fortunate in having a synticated organization of a consecrated staff of personnel, a friendly staff of doctors and a devoted board.

And finally I wish to express our sincere appreciation to the interest and loyal cooperation of the Conference ministers and lay people. It has been their interest through loyal support that keeps our hospital foremost in the minds of the Conference people as an institution of helpfulness and healing through Christian service.

1951 REPORT TO HOSPITAL & HOME COMMITTEES LOUISVILLE & KENTUCKY CONFERENCES

There is always joy and happiness in serving those whom Jesus said, "Suffer the little children to come unto me". This has been a hard winter on the children because of colds, virus infections and child diseases. We are happy to report all came through in real good shape and no ill effects as a result of same. The children in special training have made good and others will enter this year. We have seventeen boys in the armed forces and only one has been wounded. Dean Phillips was wounded in Korea but is improving.

We have cared for 109 children during the year, 83 at our Versailles Home and 26 at Franklin, at a cost of \$1.78 per day per child. This shows somewhat of a decrease over last year again, this being due to the adjustment of capital and expenses.

The Committee of Hospital and Homes of the Kentucky Conference recommended that the Board of Trustees study the advisability of the adopting children to suitable homes. The Board in full session authorized a committee to be appointed to study same and they made their report to the Full Board in session August 9, 1951. After careful consideration of the report of the committee, the Board unanimously voted to continue the present policy of placing and adopting children.

Fifth Sunday Offerings show an increase over last year. Total offerings for this year are \$40,211.54. Other gifts and special offerings have made it possible for us to operate in the clear. Our farm income has proven to be a profitable investment. There is no indebtedness against the Home as will show in the audit report.

The Downing Memorial building is near completion but has been held up because of shortage of materials going to defense work. We hope to occupy it by September 15th.

BOARD OF MANAGERS—METHODIST RETIREMENT BROTHERHOOD

The Board of Managers of the Ministers' Retirement Brotherhood of the Kentucky Annual Conference wishes to report that we have had a successful year, as the reports of our Treasurer will show.

Through an additional amount received from the Bequette Estate as a result of having finished our payments to the West Virginia Conference and through increased income from the funds of the Board, we were able to increase to \$5.00 per Annuity Year, the payments to the beneficiaries.

The report further shows that the cost of operation has been very small, due to the fact that our Treasurer, W. W. Ball, has made no charge for his services. The entire overhead expense of handling these funds for the year barely exceeds Two Hundred Dollars, excluding the cost of audit. Two of our prominent laymen and members of the Investment Committee, W. W. Ball of Maysville and J. C. Nichols of Lexington, have rendered most valuable service in the investment of these funds. The securities held by the Brotherhood are the very best that can be secured, which fact has been acknowledged and complimented by our auditor. Persons desiring to know the type investments of the Brotherhood may call on the Treasurer at any time.

The following persons, with term expiring in 1955, were elected to the Board of Managers: H. W. Whitaker to replace A. G. Stone, transferred; O. M. Simmerman to replace L. D. Rounds, retired; W. S. Peters; J. C. Nichols and Frank Clegg.

In order to adjust our payments to coincide with present pension legislation, which is now the law of the church, we are making the Board of Conference Claimants the distributing agent for the Ministers' Retirement Brotherhoods distributable income. A committee consisting of five members was appointed by the Chairman to meet with a like committee from the Board of Conference Claimants to review the laws under which we operate and to bring to the next annual session of the Ministers' Retirement Brotherhood plans whereby complete harmony of operation can be legally realized.

METHODIST BROTHERHOOD

Report of J. E. Savage

Exec. Director and Welfare Secy.

For four and a half years we have made a strenuous effort to raise a half million dollars to add to our Retirement Fund. And during that time we have

seemed to catch glimpses of nearly all of Paul's perils except shipwreck. But the blessed joy of adding not far from a third of a million dollars to the Fund has fully compensated. We have come up from the sixth place from the bottom to fifth place from the top, in Endowment, among the 35 Conferences in the St. Louis territory.

Pledges: A communication was recently sent to Churches asking for an appraisal and a report on cancellations, and stating that if we received no reply we would assume that the amount pledged was considered valid. The uncanceled total of pledges reported now stands at \$434,674.37. This added to a trust fund to be turned over later makes a total of more than \$444,000.00 pledged.

Payments: The total collected and allowed Church on previous gifts since the beginning of the effort amounts to \$337,052.87.

The present Conference average of amounts paid on pledges is 76.6 percent. Churches that will continue to pay on pledges will probably increase this percentage appreciably.

Of the total amount paid, the preachers have paid more than \$20,000.00. 71 have over-paid their percentage assessments by \$2448.80. One man and his family pledged and paid about \$400.00. His salary was never above the minimum. Another pledged seven times his salary for a year and has overpaid his pledge. A retired minister who could get along modestly without it has given back into the Fund a total of \$1316.60. Only Three Conference men have made no pledge to the Endowment Fund and paid no percentage assessment, and we believe that number will be reduced to zero. Many notable examples of sacrificial giving by laymen are also deserving of high appreciation. They have given money and service and leadership. Several thousand assisted, and many thousands contributed.

Homes: It is an outstanding reflection upon our moral sense of obligation that we furnish a parsonage for a Pastor so long as he is able to minister, and then turn him out without a home when he retires. We now have three homes—all occupied. But what about the next man to retire, and who has no home? Should we not definitely set about meeting this need?

We are deeply grateful to those who have given time and service and money for this great Cause—both preachers and layman. The Lord reward you!

REPORT OF CONFERENCE LAY LEADER

To Bishop William T. Watkins, District Superintendents, Members of
The Kentucky Annual Conference in Session at Richmond,
Kentucky, August 15, 1951.

It is an honor and a privilege to have the opportunity to present this report for the past year together with those of the District Lay Leaders, in order that you may consider what has been done and the objectives for the future.

The Conference Board of Lay Activities has completed another year of substantial growth in its lay work program. It is not without some regrets that the year has presented opportunities which have not been fully utilized due to the limitations of time.

Following a general discussion on the work program for the 1950-1951 Conference year at Berea, October 19, 20, 1950, the following objectives were adopted. This program of our Lay Activities work is somewhat similar in scope and content to previous years.

- (1) A well informed and active Charge Lay Leader in every church to counsel and cooperate with pastor in carrying on year's program.
- (2) Organize and perpetuate a group of chartered "METHODIST MEN" in every church where its men will respond to the challenge. The main objective shall be the strengthening of the local church.
- (3) Complete the "Stewardship Fund" on the basis of \$30.00 per district. The money raised to go to the General Board of Lay Activities to enhance the development of much needed promotional literature for "METHODIST MEN". This to be a freewill offering from laymen.
- (4) Continue the program for the identification of churches particularly in rural areas.
- (5) Cooperate fully in emphasizing the unified budget covering the eleven worthy causes presented annually in the churches, and give it enthusiastic support.
- (6) Endorse and vigorously promote the campaign to raise money for the Pikeville Methodist Hospital, and that it be accomplished by June 1951.
- (7) Promote the Layman's Conference for the Southeastern Jurisdiction at Lake Junaluska, North Carolina, July 26-27, 1951.
- (8) A wider distribution of readers for "The METHODIST LAYMAN". This magazine is the trade paper for the men of the Church.
Every man on the Official Board or Board of Stewards, the Charge Lay Leader and every member of Methodist Men should receive the Methodist Layman.
- (9) Observe Laymen's Day as an important phase of Lay Activities.
- (10) Respond fully in the Quadrennium program of "Advance for Christ and His Church", emphasizing as this year's theme "OUR CHURCH", and join heartily in the program.

LAYMEN'S DAY

According to reports from our seven District Lay Leaders, the District Superintendents and others, it is our belief that over 85 percent of our churches in the Kentucky Conference observed Laymen's Day this year by having one or more laymen conduct a regular worship service.

This recognition of Laymen of the church by the pastors on this special Sunday has helped to develop leadership in the local church.

The Laymen appreciate this fine spirit of cooperation on the part of the ministers to help them make Laymen's Day a significant event in the life of the church.

We call upon the laymen everywhere to give their best service to the church and Christ. All too often we give first place loyalty to secondary matters. The years that lie ahead will bring many new problems. The great need of our day is a deeper understanding of the majestic purposes of God; a nearer vision of the face of Christ.

We are in a bigger world than our fathers knew, our interests are wider, our knowledge in many fields is more extensive and exact. It calls for the best we have.

ASHLAND DISTRICT

The lay organization also raised its quota of money for the Conference Lay Program.

The district is looking forward to an aggressive program for the next Conference year.

The lay leader thanks the associate lay leaders and the charge lay leaders for their outstanding cooperation in promoting the Layman's Day program, as well as promoting the lay work in their respective charges.

This group intensified its program to mark every church in the district with a suitable sign and to install road markers. Several signs and markers were installed and the campaign will continue until every church is properly identified.

The district raised \$30 as its share of the Stewardship Fund of the General Board of Lay Activities. The lay program will again emphasize Stewardship in the coming year.

Mr. Dane Seale of the Ravenna church has been elected an associate district lay leader.

We look forward to greater things for Christ and His Church in the year ahead.

FRANKFORT DISTRICT

All churches in this district had Layman's Day this year.

Quarterly district wide meetings were held. The balance in the treasury is \$156.75. A gift of \$100 was made to a girl from the Children's Home at Versailles to be applied to her expenses at Asbury College.

A beautiful church at Pleasureville has been completed and practically paid for. The District Methodist Men, who have a deep interest in this church, have been invited to hold a dinner meeting there in the spring. There has been much improvement in church property. The Frankfort District has been on the Honor Roll this year.

In all churches without full-time pastors, arrangements have been made to have a layman conduct services when the pastor is not present.

The Eminence Methodist Men's Club provides an example of the work done by the most active clubs. Its monthly programs were in line with the general program of the church for this quadrennium. With the help of the W. S. C. S., club members redecorated the church. A fish fry raised \$174 for the Pikeville Hospital. The club expects to raise its quota for the hospital. A new bulletin board was installed outside the church. The club also helped in the charity work of the community.

Our district superintendent and all our officers are providing excellent leadership, and many young men are learning to handle responsibilities for the advancement of the Kingdom of God. Our pastors have helped greatly. The Henry County Parish Work has been effective and inspiring, and the district has enjoyed another year of progress.

We saw the splendid results from this visitation, not only from the ones visited, but from the laymen themselves in the thrill they received from their experiences.

Among those building and improving property in this district are Park Church in Lexington; Epworth Church, Lexington, who has completed their church; First Church, Lexington, who has completed a beautiful youth department and Wesley Foundation Assembly-room.

Several laymen, including the District Lay Leader, took part in program at the well-attended district conference at Epworth Church.

The district had four men at the Layman's Meeting at Lake Junaluska.

As we begin a new conference year we pledge our full support to the work of the Kingdom in furthering the program of lay activities throughout our Church.

REPORT No. 1

BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

Your Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension begins another year with a stronger conviction than ever that men are in desperate need of the gospel of Christ, that this is the time for an all out effort to bring the full impact of His message to the world, and that American Methodism has a tremendous responsibility in the accomplishment of this task. We believe that in parts of the world men must be awakened to their need of the Saviour and brought to Him now, or there will be no chance tomorrow. Godless communism is on the march and only the gospel can successfully combat its devastating influence. In such days of crisis and turmoil your Conference Board of Missions is anxious to play its part. We stand ready to serve within the bounds of our own Conference and in the world-wide missionary task. We pray that our Conference this year may see greater missionary progress than ever before. Our report is submitted to you in the hope that it will help toward this end.

I. MISSION LITERATURE

If our people are to become conscious of the needs that exist in the mission fields and the program of world service, it must be through the processes of education in which we seek to help them become "sensitized" to our mission. One channel through which this may be accomplished is our fine literature. Some of the literature which should be made available in every church is:

A. The Mission Study Book

The Mission Study Book for this year is entitled "The Negro and The Methodist Church". It is written by Dr. Mason Crum, a native of South Carolina and present professor of history at Duke University. Dr. Crum has given wide and sympathetic study to the negroes in general and is imminently qualified to write such a book. The book deals with one of the largest home mission programs and a subject of great importance. It is written in interesting and popular style. We would like to

call attention to the fact that Women's Societies may receive Jurisdictional Recognition when they participate in the study of this book on a church-wide basis. The book explores American Methodism's contact with negroes from the earliest times, the present status and future needs. It is the first of two volumes on the theme. It will be followed by a book on Methodism in Africa.

B. The World Outlook

The editors and publishers of the World Outlook are grateful for the recognition that has come to this publication through the entire life of the church. We would again call the attention of our pastors and people to the fact that The World Outlook is a magazine for and serving the church as a whole in the field of missions and is not limited to any one organization. Therefore, be it resolved that we continue during the month of November to secure an increase in the circulation of The World Outlook in our Conference through its presentation in our local churches.

C. Pamphlets

The Division of Education and Cultivation continues to provide us with an ample supply of the best literature from the mission fields of the world. In addition to this, the world service agencies print each month a four page folder on the various phases of the benevolent cause. These are now available in a size which may be easily inserted in the bulletins of the local church.

D. Turn-Over Charts and Other Materials

We commend the agencies for and call special attention to the materials now published for our use presenting the program of world service and aiding in the every member canvass. The latest of these is the turn-over chart which presents world service and has additional sheets on which the program of Conference Benevolences can be explained. This chart is available at a nominal price from 740 Rush Street, Chicago. Posters and other folders may be obtained in needed quantities free of charge or at a small cost.

II. THE LARGER PARISH PLAN

We now have seven Larger Parishes in the Kentucky Conference. Since these parish plans seem to be meeting a long felt need in the rural churches for concerted effort in training, in giving and in sharing, the Conference Board is happy to have a part in promoting these. Nearly 40 percent of our mission appropriations in the conference is being directed to this cause, in addition to help from the General Board.

III. MISSION APPROPRIATIONS AND MINIMUM SALARY

We are gradually working toward a new conception of missionary aid to the local church in our conference. Instead of a sustentation fund, we are coming to look upon aid as an effort to help struggling churches to become self supporting.

Through the receipts turned over the minimum salary fund this past year, we were able to advance the minimum salary level of the conference to \$1800 for married conference members, and \$1500 for single conference members, the standard voted by the conference two years ago. The level for accepted supplies and probationers was raised to \$1350. As soon as conditions permit, this will be raised. Since the requirements for the different districts on this fund will not be available from the superintendents until the close of Conference, we ask permission to make any necessary adjustments in these figures.

A. Mission Specials

We call attention of the churches to the importance of Mission Specials in our Advance Program. The Kentucky Conference has taken South America and Africa as our particular fields of interest and we urge that as many Specials as possible be taken by the churches for these needy fields. We particularly call attention to the work in Argentina and The Belgian Congo. Mission Specials at this time represent our intense desire to see the cause of missions not only hold its own but advance in times of monetary inflation and spiritual decay.

IV. MISSIONARY MEETINGS

A. District Missionary Institutes

We are happy to announce that the Reverend David Seamonds, a product of the Kentucky Conference, and at present a missionary in India, will be the guest speaker for our District Missionary Institutes. We commend the District Superintendents and the Missionary Secretaries for making the District Institutes last year real missionary rallies, and we urge that this emphasis be given even a larger place in the Institutes of the future. B. Mid-Year Meeting

The home mission cause was presented in our Mid-Year session at Lexington by Reverend S. P. Mahan, Superintendent of the Henderson Settlement School at Frakes, Kentucky; the speakers for the foreign mission emphasis were Bishop Ralph Ward of China, Bishop Clement Rocke of India and Reverend L. C. Johnson, missionary to Africa. This year we asked that the Annual Conference approve the action of its Board and the chairman by setting March 25 as the date for a rally to be held for the cause of missions.

C. The Youth Missions Conference

Reports have come to us that a very successful Youth Missions Conference was held in connection with the regular missions conference at Lake Junaluska in July. There were two in attendance from our Conference.

V. THE WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

A successful year is reported by the Woman's Society of Christian Service. Faithful and devoted service of these fine women has yielded dividends in the building of the Kingdom. We are glad to call special attention to their efforts to complete the organization of at least one society in each charge. At the present time there are 25 charges in the Conference that do not have organized Societies. The report of the Conference President of the Woman's Society is attached.

VI. CHURCH EXTENSIONS

We are happy to have with us on the Campus two representatives of the section of Church Extension of our Board: Reverend Edward L. Tullis, Associate Secretary of the Louisville Office, who has been very cooperative with us in every way, and Dr. Frederick L. Pederson, Associate Secretary of the Philadelphia Office, and guest speaker at the Anniversary Service.

1. Finish and complete the Center throughout with pine paneling, in all rooms, halls, baths and closets, at a cost of \$866.00.
2. Build and construct steps and sidewalk from the street level to the front porch at a cost of \$108.00.
3. And to paint the building two coats on the outside, at a cost of \$325.00.

We now have a comfortable, attractive and inviting summer Home at the Lake for Kentucky Methodists desiring to visit or having church business at Methodism's most popular recreation, fellowship and training grounds.

Junaluska Apartments, with its second unit now completed and occupied, valued at nearly \$250,000.00, are only a block away, making the location and use of Kentucky Center nearly double in value in the past four years.

We refer to our Report of 1950, page 111 of the Conference Journal for additional details.

This has been one of the best Seasons, and nearly a month remains.

So far nearly 100 guests have availed themselves of the facilities of the Center. During the School of Missions ten of our own women occupied every room. Many other requests for space for the same week had to be denied for lack of rooms.

We believe our people will more and more use our Center, for Junaluska is growing rapidly in every way. We desire to suggest that more Kentucky Methodist members use the Center during May and September, as a delightful vacation spot. No more attractive or better vacation trip could be planned. In this way our people would lengthen the time and extend the period of the Center's summer use and occupancy.

REPORT OF THE TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION TO THE KENTUCKY CONFERENCE

We are glad to report that there is evidence of continued progress in the area of the small town and rural work within the bounds of the Kentucky Conference. We believe in, and are supporting a program for the revival of the church in the rural areas.

The following factors are contributing to the advancement of the Kingdom of God and to the progress of the program of the church in these areas:

1. Continued and untiring efforts to provide a better trained leadership in all areas. The Commission has exerted its influence in order to get Accepted Supply Pastors and Local Preachers to attend all seminars and the School for Accepted Supply Pastors at Emory University. The Commission paid a portion of the tuition of some of these men.
2. Greater co-operation between small town and rural churches in all matters pertaining to social fellowship and in those pertaining to the forwarding of the Kingdom.
3. One of the most hopeful signs of the Conference year had been the increased interest of the county seat church in the churches of the rural areas. Many of the urban pastors have conducted successful revivals in rural churches during the spring and summer months.

The Town and Country Commission promoted the cause of the National Town and Country Conference at Sioux City, Iowa, July 21-24. Plans were made for the selection and the financing of the delegates at the meeting in March. Twenty-five delegates from within the bounds of the Kentucky Conference attended the meeting. The District Superintendents are to be commended for their excellent co-operation and interest in both the raising of the necessary funds and in advice in the selection of the delegates.

The Town and Country Commission sponsored a program Wednesday night, August 15, presenting the cause of the rural church. The speaker for the occasion was Rev. John Baxter Howes, Westminster Theological Seminary, Westminster, Maryland. His subject was "The Value of the Rural Church".

Looking to the future of the church, the Commission suggests to Bishop Watkins and the cabinet:

1. That all Accepted Supply Pastors and Local Preachers be urged to attend all meetings of the church so as to better acquaint themselves with the total program of the church.
2. That the cabinet consider the possibility of allowing the Commission to share some time with the Board of Evangelism at the mid-year conference-wide evangelistic meeting. This would give the Commission an opportunity to present the cause of rural church to the laity on a conference-wide basis.

1. That a committee consisting of Osso W. Stanley, Adolphus Gilliam, Walter I. Munday, J. W. Snyder, N. O. Kimbler and W. R. Reasor be appointed to prepare articles of incorporation for each of the aforementioned colleges.

2. That the Commission on Higher Education as presently constituted be granted authority:

a. to approve of the new charters presented by the committee provided for in item No. 1 of this report,

b. to elect four ministerial members and four laymen to the Board of Kentucky Wesleyan College,

c. to elect 3 ministerial members and 3 laymen to the Board of Lindsey Wilson Junior College,

d. it is understood that after the initial places on each College Board are filled by the Commission future elections shall be conducted as provided by the charters on By-laws of the institutions.

3. That (a) January 1, 1952, be fixed as the date for the termination of the present plan of operation of the Colleges by the joint boards and the beginning of the operation of the institutions under separate charters, and

(b) That the present Joint Board of Education be authorized to convey and turn over to the respective boards of Kentucky Wesleyan College and Lindsey Wilson Junior College all of the property and assets belonging to these institutions which it now holds in its name.

4. That the membership of the Commission on Higher Education from the Kentucky Conference be constituted as the liaison committee, with authority, to represent this Conference in the negotiations with the Louisville Conference in perfecting the plans for the establishing of Kentucky Wesleyan College and Lindsey Wilson Junior College as separate institutions of higher learning.

Be it further resolved that said Commission on Higher Education shall take diligence to see that all instruments prepared shall properly safeguard all of the interests of the Conference and provide for the efficient operation of the institution under the auspices and control of the Kentucky and Louisville Annual Conferences in harmony with the Discipline of the Methodist Church.

2. And by casting our ballots only for Godly men of wisdom, purity, and humility whom we believe are free of these taints and who seek not honor for themselves but only the good of the Church and the glory of God;
3. And by cultivating a Christian contempt for political self-seekers who violate our sacred tradition.

Be it further resolved: That we record our conviction that from the choice of local officials, the licensing of our preachers and the admission of them into the Annual Conference on to the election of clerical and lay delegates to the General Conference, the stability and future security of the Church rests upon the honesty, integrity and purity of the ballot. Methodism makes its choices and decisions by ballot. If the ballot be not holy, neither will the decision made by ballot be holy.

KAVANAGH CAMP GROUNDS

Bishop W. T. Watkins and the Members of the
Kentucky Annual Conference
The Methodist Church, Richmond, Kentucky

Brethren:

The 76th Annual Camp Meeting was held at Kavanaugh Camp Grounds, Crestwood Kentucky, with Bishop Roy H. Short of the Jacksonville Area, preaching and Prof. and Mrs. Marvin Dean of Wilmore, Kentucky in charge of the music.

Because of the moving forward of the Kentucky Annual Conference to the week following Camp Meetings, which had moved forward last year to an earlier date to avoid being close to the Annual Conference, many conflicts occurred as churches were endeavoring to wind up their finances and other affairs to be ready for Conference. Nevertheless, we had good attendance and the preaching was deeply spiritual and tremendously lifting and helpful. Prof. and Mrs. Dean gave us fine leadership in the singing and inspired us with solos and duets.

The Board of Trustees voted to hold next year's meeting in July, exact dates to be determined later, and to start on Saturday night instead of Thursday night, and run through the Sunday evening service a week later. We need the full cooperation of all District Superintendents and pastors to make Kavanaugh the success it deserves to be.

In addition to the Camp meetings, various youth camps occupied the grounds during June, July and August, with more than 1000 boys and girls under able Christian leadership, being inspired to dedicate themselves to Christ, with a large number of them committing themselves to Christian callings. These boys and girls are our greatest asset and our Conferences in Kentucky ought to make full use of Camp Kavanaugh and give full financial support to make it what it ought to be as a Youth Camp.

Other denominations are making more use of the camp than our Methodists, and a leader of the Evangelical and Reformed group said that it was the best camp for youth in Kentucky. That denomination desires three weeks next year instead of the one it has heretofore been allotted.

We respectfully request that this Conference along the Louisville Conference, appoint a Committee of three, other than members of the Kavanaugh Board, to make full investigation of the future possibilities of the Camp and make a report and recommendation back to the 1952 Sessions of the two Annual Conferences as to ways and means of proper and adequate support of its future programs.

Such a joint Committee should meet with the Board of Trustees early in the Conference year to get a complete picture of what has been done and what is now being done to develop the Camp and its program.

We recommend the following men for re-election to the Board of Trustees from the Kentucky Conference for three year terms, ending in 1954: J. S. Brown, Bennett Mossbarger and J. H. Pritchard.

WHEREAS, the term "holy Catholic church" is highly objectionable to many of our people:

Therefore, be it resolved that the Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Church meeting at Richmond, Kentucky, in the month of August, 1951, memorialize the General Conference meeting in the month of April 1952, at San Francisco, California, to change the Apostles' Creed, so far as Methodist usage is concerned, so that either the Church of God or the Church of Christ be substituted for "Holy Catholic Church".

The following reasons are presented for the suggested change:

1. The term "Holy Catholic Church," however meaningful it may be, offends the spiritual sensibilities of many of our people.
2. The terms Church of God and Church of Christ are used several times in the New Testament. And, these terms are frequently used in our sermons, our public prayers, and our Christian literature. Our people clearly understand these terms and explanation of their meaning is never requested.
3. When Methodist ministers receive new members they receive them into the Church of Christ and they bid them welcome to all of its privileges in the fellowship of the Methodist Church.
4. If we from Sunday to Sunday declare our belief in the Church of God or Church of Christ, it will not in the least affect our present attitude toward the Apostolic faith, the fundamental

principles of the historic creeds of the Protestant Reformation, and the Ecumenical movement which is developing so rapidly among the denominations today.

To the General Conference of the Methodist Church, to be convened April 23, 1952, in San Francisco, California:

Since the Discipline does not set forth the procedure by which a church may be constituted, We, of the Kentucky Annual Conference of the Methodist Church, respectfully memorialize the General Conference of the Methodist Church, to include in the 1952 Methodist Discipline the following steps:

1. The District Superintendent shall make such surveys as may be necessary to determine that a new congregation is needed to serve a community.
2. The District Board of Church Location and Building shall be asked to approve the proposed site, and if there is a City or District Board of Missions and Church Extension, that body should be asked to approve the site.
3. The District Superintendent may then ask the Cabinet for permission to organize a new church and authority to appoint the necessary officers to make up the Quarterly Conference. When the officers are appointed and the Quarterly Conference held, the church will be organized.
The Cabinet is the only body able to supply ministerial leadership. A minister is sometimes assigned before the membership roll is prepared. Often a Church School is organized before the Church.

4. To further dignify this procedure, the Cabinet may make an official request of the Annual Conference to constitute this new Church and admit it to the fellowship of the Churches by formal vote of the Conference.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF UNION COLLEGE

(Including all amendments)

July 1951

We, E. R. Overley, F. W. Harrop, W. W. Shepherd, Alvis S. Bennett, C. B. Norde-man, A. B. Cornett, J. M. Literal, H. E. Bullock, E. P. Hall, E. T. Franklin, A. M. Decker, and James D. Black, all resident citizens of Kentucky and over the age of twenty-one years, hereby associate ourselves together to establish a corporation to transact, promote, conduct and carry on the business, object and purposes herein stated and at the place and under the name herein stated, as follows, namely:

First—The name of the corporation hereby established is Union College.

Second—Barbourville is the name of the City and Knox is the name of the County—both in the State of Kentucky—in which the principal office and place of business of said corporation shall be located.

Third—The business, object and purposes contemplated and proposed to be transacted, promoted and carried on by said corporation are to make and constitute Union College a legal entity and corporate person, that it may, in its said corporate name, continue, enlarge, improve, perpetuate, manage, operate, and administer Union College as an institution for the promotion of liberal education, devote its efforts and being to the interests of Christian education and to qualify and equip men and women to engage creditably in the several employments, callings and avocations of peaceful and progressive society and to discharge honorably and usefully the various duties of

life; to confer by said college upon recommendation of the faculty of the said college and the election by its Board of Trustees, on students of said college who may be considered worthy and proficient such academical and collegiate degrees as are usually conferred by the standard colleges in the United States of America, and to confer the usual honorary degrees upon such other persons as shall likewise be recommended and elected for that purpose; to continue perpetually and to remain in perpetual succession in its corporate name, with power to make contracts and to sue in the courts of justice; to acquire, hold and take in the manner provided by law, and use for the purposes aforesaid and as hereinafter stated and necessary to those ends, property both real and personal, to issue annuity bonds and to pay annuity thereon, and to accept and appropriate donations, bequests, legacies, gifts, subscriptions, leases, demises, money and other obligations given or promised to said college, and tuition, incomes, and to borrow money when necessary but within the limit of indebtedness hereinafter stated, and to control, manage, use and dispose of all same in such manner as shall seem best adapted to promote the aforementioned objects and purposes of the college.

But none of said property or objects of said college is to be used or employed for gain or from which any private pecuniary profit is to be derived, but, on the contrary, all of said property and its income and the use thereof are to be devoted solely to the cause and in behalf of education as aforesaid and as contemplated by Section 170 of the Constitution of Kentucky, and exempt from taxation.

Fourth—To incorporators hereinafter named and herein provided for and their successors shall be called Trustees, and shall have authority from time to time, in collaboration with the faculty, to prescribe and regulate the course of study to be pursued in said college; they shall also have authority to fix the rate of tuition, board, room rent and other college expenses, to appoint the President and other members of the faculty, and such other officers and agents as may be deemed needful in the management and conduct of the concerns and interests for the said college, to define their duties, the duties of other officers and employees, if any, to fix all salaries, and to displace and remove the President and any member of the faculty or any of said officers or agents or employees; to acquire land and to cause to be erected necessary buildings, to purchase or secure books and chemicals, physical and other apparatus and other suitable instrumentalities or means necessary for the promotion of the objects and purposes of said college, to put in operation, if the Trustees deem that expedient, a system of manual labor and any other activities for the purpose of promoting the health of the students and lessening the expense of their education, to conduct a correspondence school, to make rules for the general management of affairs of the college and for the regulation of the conduct of the students, and to add, as the ability of said corporation shall increase and the interest of the college may require, additional departments for any and all of the liberal professions.

Fifth—The corporation hereby established is to begin business when these Articles shall be filed with the Secretary of State of the State of Kentucky and a certificate of that fact is issued by said secretary, and continue perpetually. It shall have no capital stock. It shall have a corporate seal which it may change as it may see fit. It may adopt by-laws, rules and regulations for the management and administration of its affairs not inconsistent with these Articles or of the Constitution of the United States or the Constitution of Kentucky or any laws of the United States or of said State. And it shall have an agent on whom process may be executed.

Sixth—The Board of Trustees shall consist of not less than eighteen nor more than twenty-seven individuals. The number to be elected annually and the term of service shall be determined by the by-laws. This said Board of Trustees is empowered to supervise the affairs of the corporation. In addition to the above Trustees, the President of said College and the resident Bishop of the Methodist Church shall be ex-officio members of said Board. A number of Trustees equal to a majority of those elected shall constitute a quorum authorized to transact business.

One-third of the Trustees shall be elected by the Kentucky Annual Conference of the Methodist Church or its successors, on the nomination of the Board of Trustees of Union College, and one-third of the Trustees shall be elected by the Louisville Annual Conference of the Methodist Church or its successor, on the nomination of the Board of Trustees of Union College, of which one-half of each respective nominees

shall be ministers and one-half laymen, provided this does not prohibit the respective annual conferences from making additional nominations, if they so choose by Conference action. These shall be known as Conference Trustees. Of the remainder, one-third shall be elected by the baccalaureate alumni, who shall be called alumni Trustees, and two-thirds by the Board of Trustees, who shall be called Trustees-at-Large. The number to be elected annually and the term of service shall be determined by the By-Laws.

The Board of Trustees may elect its President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Secretary and Treasurer and such other officers as it may see fit. The offices of Secretary and Treasurer may be held by one and the same person, and the Treasurer shall execute bond to the Board of Trustees with good and sufficient surety to be fixed by the Board of Trustees and conditioned for the faithful performance of his duties as Treasurer, said duty among other things being to account from time to time to the Board of Trustees for all money and other property which he may receive or which may come into his hands.

Seventh—*1 The corporation shall not incur an indebtedness exceeding at any time \$500,000.00 and the private and individual property of the incorporators or of their successors as trustees in office, or any one of them, shall not be subject to the payment of any of the corporate indebtedness.

*2 And should said college cease to function as aforesaid, all its property shall then and in that event revert to the Board of Education of the Kentucky Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

3. **Eighth**: These articles of Incorporation may be amended at any regular meeting of the Board of Trustees, duly called by letter with at least ten days advance notice and purpose announced in same, by two-thirds vote of members present and affixing their signatures. Such amendment shall become effective on approval of Kentucky and Louisville Annual Conference of the Methodist Church.
4. Kentucky, Louisville Conferences shall have power to remove for cause any elected trustee.

REQUEST

Motion No. 1.

We request the Bishop and cabinet to appoint John L. We request the Bishop to appoint a committee of one minister and one layman from each Board and/or Commission which he thinks should be involved in the establishment of a Conference Central Office for economy and efficiency, this committee to bring back to the 1952 Kentucky Annual Conference recommendations for its establishment and methods of setting up and financing this office.

WOMEN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

This has been a year of challenge, unity of purpose and steady growth.

As I have gone into the Districts and also visited many local units of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guild I have found enthusiasm and great interest in the program of work we are promoting.

The genius of our Woman's Work is the volunteer service. Our Women are busy women but they give freely of their time for our extensive program of worship, study, and service. I marvel at the way women sacrifice of time in order that the work of the church may be strengthened.

Last September Educational Seminars were held in the seven Districts with more than 1,000 women in attendance. The total educational program of the Woman's Society of Christian Service was outlined with particular emphasis on the four approved studies.

May 1-3 our Annual Meeting was held in Epworth Church, Lexington. This meeting surpassed all announcements and expectations. The attendance broke all records and the addresses challenged us as outstanding Christian leaders spoke on various phases of the theme, "Our Father's World—Our Parish". Out of Conference speakers including Mrs. Eloise Woolever, Mrs. Clifford A. Bender, Dr. Lena Madesin Phillips, Dean William J. Faulkner, Dr. Ted Hightower. Mrs. Rosa Page Welch was leader of music.

In June our Conference Secretary of Promotion, Mrs. C. L. Cooper, visited every District of the Conference and presented the new plans for the fourth year of the Quadrennial Advance.

A workshop on "The Family Living in the Community" was held on the Campus of Kentucky State College, Frankfort, in June in conjunction with the Lincoln Leadership School. The workshop composed of an interracial group of forty women from twenty-three communities was the first of its kind in our church. The school was superior and the work shop was so valuable an experiment that it will be made a permanent part of the school.

The Kentucky Conference School of Missions and Christian Service will be held at Sue Bennett College, London, August 27-31. Here the studies for the year will be presented. Also methods of teaching these studies. The four study courses for our women for the year 1951-52 are:

Latin America
Churches for Our Country's Needs
The Book of Acts
The Family—a Christian Concern

Members of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guilds will also participate in the church-wide study, "The Negro in the Methodist Church".

The total giving for missions for the year which closed on May 31, was \$68,510.-58. The total gain in income on appropriations during the three years of this quadrennium over the giving for the year which closed December 31, 1947 (Which is our base figure) is a 40 percent increase. The goal we had set was a $33\frac{1}{3}$ percent increase for the first two years of the quadrennium, and an added 15 percent for the third year. The 40 percent is, therefore, short of the goal for the third year, but in terms of increase in dollars, it means that our members have increased their giving for appropriations by \$15,000.00

We are grateful for this achievement. A start has been made on the fourth year Quadrennial Advance and an effort will be made in every society to attain the goal set for the quadrennium.

Dr. CHARLES CROCKETT FISHER

Dr. Charles Crockett Fisher was born at Cedar Springs, Wythe county, Virginia, March 29, 1855 and passed to his reward at Bristol, Virginia January 30, 1951 thus lacking less than two months of reaching ninety-six. Brought up in a parsonage home, he united with the Methodist church in early youth. He was soundly converted at fourteen. He was educated in the common schools of Virginia, and Asbury Seminary in Wythe county Virginia. He received the A. B. degree from Emory and Henry College, Emory, Virginia, in June 1886, the M. A. Degree three years later, and Doctor of Divinity from Kentucky Wesleyan College in June 1911.

His ministerial career began when he was licensed to preach at Pikeville, Tenn. in 1886. He joined the Holston Conference in 1886 and was transferred to the Kentucky Conference in 1897. Though he never held a pastoral charge he was an acceptable preacher and often occupied pulpits for his brethren. He was in educational work from the beginning as high school principle, President of Peoples College, Pikeville, Tenn., Professor in Sullins College and William and Mary College, and finally as owner and President of Millersburg, College of Millersburg, Kentucky for twenty-nine years. Thus he had forty-four years as teacher and administrator in school work.

He remained on the effective roll until 1927 when he took the supernumerary relation, retiring two years later.

Of his religious experience he writes— "I was wholly sanctified under the preaching of Dr. Beverly Carradine at the Wilmore camp meeting. This experience was a new era in my religious life and although I have not always lived up to my privilege in this new blessing, I am glad to testify to its genuineness and power".

Dr. Fisher was married to Miss Elizabeth Bickley Dickerson of Castlewood, Virginia on December 25, 1881. She survives him after almost seventy years of companionship.

He is survived by five children, Garland P. Fisher, Bristol, Virginia; Dr. Charles J. Fisher, Tokyo, Japan; Charles J. Fisher, New York; Mrs. Ethel Fisher Foster, Bristol, Virginia and Miss Olive Fisher, New York, and five grand children. A third daughter, Mrs. Elizabeth Fisher Kent, died in 1933.

Dr. Fisher was a great believer in and practicer of tithing, believing that Church financial problems could be solved by it. He was also a great promotor and supporter of missions by word and deed. He was a successful teacher, college administrator, a splendid preacher, loved and respected by his pupils and brethren.

HOSEA MILTON MASSIE

Hosea Milton Massie was born in Henry County, Kentucky, October 10th, 1887 and departed this life October 23rd, 1950, making him 63 years and 13 days of age.

He was the son of the late Alexander Morehead and Ella Riner Massie.

He received his education at Kingswood College, Asbury College, and Emory University.

He joined the Kentucky Conference as an itinerant Methodist preacher in 1912. He served the following charges: Hazel Green; Augusta; Pineville; Brooksville; Newport; Nicholasville; London; Perryville; Falmouth; Maysville, First; Shinkle, Covington; and Millersburg.

On May 29th, 1917, He was united in marriage to Anna Wright. To this union was born one daughter.

Brother Massie was a good man. He was a great churchman. He loved his church and was a tireless worker in carrying on its total program. He was deeply concerned that every cause of the church be presented to and supported by the congregations he served. He was a good preacher. Both through his ministry and those he called to assist him, many were turned unto the Lord and added to the church. Having a jovial and friendly heart and disposition, he had many friends. He was a

lover of his home, being a faithful husband and devoted father. Perhaps the crest of his ministry was reached at First Church, Maysville. However, his 2 remaining pastorates at Shinkle, Covington and Millersburg were most successful and he was loved by these two congregations as well as the other congregations he served.

After some months of illness, Brother Massie came to his death on October 23rd, 1950. He is survived by his wife and daughter, Mrs. Edsel Penn and granddaughter, Anne Darlene Penn.

GEORGE MILLER RYDER

Rev.-Dr. George Miller Ryder was born Nov. 17th 1862 on a farm near Woodstock, Ill. His Father, John M. Ryder and Mother, Cassandra Loudin Ryder, were hard working farm people. Dr. Ryder did not know his father for he died before he was born and his Mother worked hard to keep the family together and send them to school. At an early age Dr. Ryder decided to teach and preach so after attending the local country schools, he went to Heading College for his High School and part of his College work. Working his way thru as he could by being a barber and other jobs, he then did some preaching and decided to go further in his school work. He then went to Garrett Biblical Institute at Evanston, Ill., where he graduated in the same class with Bishop Shepard, who was his roommate part of the time he attended Garrett. They were life long friends and made a trip thru the New England states together on bicycles, at the time of their graduation. He then went to Montana, where he taught two years in Montana University and served pastorates in Butte City and Anaconda, Mont. It was there he married Carrie Muse and to them were given three children. While serving his pastorate at Helena, Mont, his wife became ill and shortly after, passed away. Feeling her loss and the need of further preparation for his life's work, he then went back to Chicago University for further study

and while there helped organize the Methodist Church at Melrose Park, just out from Chicago, Ill. While there he met his present wife and widow, Dellah Bratton, who was then teaching in the public schools of Melrose Park. He was then called to teach in the Methodist College at Winfield, Kansas, where he taught several years. Later he served pastorates at Meade, Kansas; Dennison, Texas; Norwich, Kansas; Kirwin, Kansas; Logan, Kansas; Goodland, Kansas; Wagoner, Okla.; Vilonia, Ark.; Jasper, Ark.; Harrison, Ark., and his last pastorate was Sulphur Springs, Ark., where he resided the last fifteen years of his life.

Though he served many pastorates in his lifetime, his true love was teaching and doing Evangelistic work. He held many meetings in Tents as well as churches. He was at his best when in a meeting.

Other places that remember him as a teacher where he served as Superintendent of schools are Kirwin, Kansas; Logan, Kansas, Goodland, Kansas, and Wagoner, Okla. Then he taught in Kentucky schools; Union at Barbourville, Ky., and Asbury College at Wilmore, Ky.

Where ever he went, he left a deep impression on the young people as well as the older ones, with his teaching and preaching. He was truly a profound student and teacher, of deep spiritual and religious knowledge and beliefs and lived his beliefs day by day. Truly it seemed that everyone he came in contact with loved him and took away something of his goodness with them.

Dr. Ryder moved to Oklahoma City, Jan 20, 1951, to be near a married daughter, married son, and their families. His last illness came with an unexpected suddenness and he passed away February 9, 1951, in Wesley Hospital, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma and he was laid to rest in Memorial Park of that city.

Many will regret to hear of his going. He leaves his Widow, Mrs. George M. Ryder, 3517 North Indiana Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma; four sons, Raymond M. Ryder, 3500 Northwest 35th. St Oklahoma, City, Okla.; Warren B. Ryder, of Joplin, Mo., Wendell M. Ryder of Colby, Kansas, Rev. George E. Ryder of Adrain, Mo., and two daughters, Mrs. Harry L. Brother Wall was converted and united with the church in 1934 and was later called to preach. He attended school at Asbury College, Wilmore, Ky., God's Bible School, in Cincinnati, Ohio. He served the Brodhead-Wallaceton and East Bernstadt Charges and was pastoring the Grassland Circuit at the time of his death on October 26, 1950.

Words fail to convey the depth of his love and devotion to God and man. He was a good daddy, a loving husband, a friend to all, and a true servant of God; loved and respected by all who knew him. Truly, it can be said that earth's loss is Heaven's gain.

Funeral services were conducted by the writer, assisted by Reverends T. P. Roberts and Morton Coffee, Jr., in the Doyleville Methodist Church. More than 350 people were in attendance. Burial was in the family cemetery in Doyleville.

GEORGE ALLEN YOUNG

Rev. George Allen Young was born in Laurel County, Kentucky, the 14th day of January, 1875, the son of Joseph R. and Amanda Young. He was married to Jannie Hibbard who later proceeded him in death on January 28th, 1930. To this union was born four children, each of whom are living. Later he was joined in wedlock to Margaret Hammons who survives his passing.

He was licensed as a local preacher in Richmond, Kentucky in 1910. In 1918 he was ordained as Local Deacon at Cynthania, Kentucky. He was a member of the Methodist Church for 55 years and an accepted supply pastor for 42 years. He pastored at East Bernstadt four different times, twice at Meadow Creek and Preachersville and once at each of the following; Straight Creek, East Pulaski Circuit, Clay County Mission, Bell County Mission, Sergeant, and London Circuit. He retired in 1947 at the same place that granted to him his first license to preach.

He was a great soldier of the Cross, with firm convictions and a fine Christian spirit. He will be long in the memories of multitudes for many reasons and one of those most certainly being as a great friend of children. He was a tender comforter in the time of sorrow as evidenced by the innumerable funerals he was called upon to conduct in many denominations. He was devout, sincere and a faithful minister of the Gospel of Jesus Christ of whom it could well be said, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept faith; henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness . . ." As a minister to the rural area of Kentucky he knew the hardships of riding hundreds of miles on horseback and often even swam swollen streams to reach his appointed preaching place on time. There are many living witnesses of the transforming grace of God because of his soul-saving ministry.

His closing days were spent in his quiet country home among the hills of his childhood where he had a multitude of friends. Following 6 weeks of illness he came to his closing day of this life. These closing hours in some measure tell of the strength of his character and faith for he spent them in his living room sitting in his favorite chair singing his favorite hymns as "Amazing Graice", preaching and exhorting his many responsive neighbors and lifting his heart to The Almighty in sincere prayer. Thus he finished his earthly journey with the smile of victory on his face.

Brother Young died March 20, 1951. Funeral services were held at Wyatts Chapel with Rev. A. R. Perkins and the writer officiating. His burial was in the cemetery on the hill above his home Church.
