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
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

Standing Rules of the Kentucky Conference

I. Rules of Order

1. The Rules of the preceding General Conference, in so far as they may apply, otherwise, Robert's Rules of Order, revised, shall govern the procedure in the Annual Conference, except (1) that those present and voting shall be a quorum for the conference, and (2) in meetings of the boards, commissions and committees, or any other subordinate bodies of the annual conference, a quorum shall be those present and voting, and (3) where the Discipline provides otherwise.

II. Annual Conference

2. The pastors shall mail their Annual Conference reports to their respective District Superintendents on the second Monday preceding the meeting of the Annual Conference and shall mail any remaining World Service and Conference Benevolences to the Conference Treasurer at the same time.

3. The pastors and official boards of local churches shall co-operate with the Bishop and District Superintendents in holding quarterly checkup meetings as soon as possible after the end of each quarter for the purpose of checking on the payments to World Service and Conference Benevolences, the Episcopal Fund, the Conference Claimants Fund, the Minimum Salary Fund, and the Administration Funds by having all monies for these funds in the hands of the Conference Treasurer by the time of adjournment of the check-up meeting in order to be listed on the Quarterly Honor Roll. The Conference Treasurer and the Conference Missionary Secretary shall be charged with the responsibility of preparing the Honor Roll each quarter and sending it to The Kentucky Methodist for publication.

4. The Conference Roll shall be checked by members of the Annual Conference registering their names on enrollment cards furnished by the Secretary.

5. The Executive Officers of any Board of the Conference or of any Institution owned by the Conference shall have the privilege of the floor without vote, if he is not a regular member of the Conference for the purpose of discussing any matter involving the work of his Board or Institution.

6. The Kentucky Annual Conference will receive for admission on trial into the Annual Conference, only those who hold the B.D. Degree; except in the case of citizens within the bounds of the

Kentucky Annual Conference, before the beginning of their College studies; and, except those who hold the A.B. Degree from an accredited college, and who have the unanimous recommendation of the Cabinet and $\frac{3}{4}$ th vote of the Annual Conference.

III. Reports of Boards

7. All reports of Boards, Commissions, and Committees presented to the Conference shall be in triplicate.

8. All matters relating to Temperance and Public Morals shall be referred to the Board of Temperance.

9. The Secretary and Treasurer of each Board, Commission, or Committee shall combine their reports so that there shall be only one report.

10. The first Annual Conference in each quadrennium, the existing quadrennial Boards, Commissions and Committees shall function throughout the session of the Annual Conference.

IV. Ministerial Character

11. The Committee on Conference Relations shall inquire of each District Superintendent concerning the character of each Minister and make a report to the Annual Conference.

V. Districts

12. There shall be seven districts.

VI. Committee on Nominations

13. The District Superintendents shall constitute a committee to nominate from time to time the members of the Boards, Commissions, and Standing Committees of the Conference, and determine the number of members thereof, unless such nominations and members are otherwise provided for in the Discipline.

VII. Important Committees

14. There shall be a Committee on Journal which shall examine and correct the Journal and report to the Annual Conference. There shall also be a Committee on Courtesies which shall attend to all matters of Conference Courtesies.

15. There shall be a Quadrennial Committee on Entertainment. The committee shall study all proposals for Conference entertainment and make recommendations to the Annual Conference.

VIII. Lay Members

16. The Lay Members of the Annual Conference shall be elected annually.

17. The Lay Members of the Conference Boards, Commissions, and Committees, who are not members of the Conference shall have the privilege of the floor without vote, to discuss the report of their respective Board, Commission, or Committee.

IX. Pension Rules

18. The Board of Conference Claimants shall be constituted as the Committee on Proportional Payment on ministerial support, under Paragraph 1613, Section 8, 1952 Discipline.

19. (1) Membership in the Conference and membership in the Ministers' Retirement Brotherhood shall be made co-extensive. That all who shall henceforth unite with the Annual Conference thereby becomes members of the brotherhood and shall pay the dues of membership. Furthermore, that all present members of the Conference be granted membership at once upon the cash payment of the full amount of their dues from the date of their Admission, and that the membership benefits become retroactive to the day of the Admittance.

20. (2) Before an Approved Supply can share in the retirement fund of the Kentucky Annual Conference, he must complete the Conference Course of Study in accordance with the regulations of the Discipline; except in the cases of men who have served for at least 15 years as full time pastors prior to the 1947 annual conference.

An Approved Supply Pastor may count only four years for retirement claims prior to his completion of the conference studies, unless additional years are recommended by the Board of Ministerial Training and approved by $\frac{2}{3}$ vote of the Annual Conference.

21. (3) The rate of or assessment (for pension purposes) payable annually by each active member and for Approved Supplies of the Conference shall be as follows:

On a graduating scale, against the established minimum salary 1%, from this up to \$3,000 on a 2% rate and on \$3,000 and over 3%. The entire proceeds from this assessment shall be paid by the men to the Claimants Office to be set aside for the Stabilization Fund, beginning with this Conference and carrying through the next Quadrennium.

In calculating this assessment against the District Superintendents there shall first be an expense deduction of \$1,500 and each Pastor shall be allowed 10% deduction on his salary.

22. Failure to pay these assessments Annually or to adjust back

payments promptly, will relieve the Conference of such Pension Responsibility covering the unpaid years.

23. This Percentage Assessment does not apply against men listed under Special Appointments who are assessed twelve times the Annuite Rate by the Board of Conference Claimants. (See Special List).

X. Secretary, Treasurer

24. The Secretary of the Annual Conference shall be charged with editing and publishing the Conference Journal. He is hereby authorized to contract for the printing of the Conference Journal and to draw upon the proper Treasurer for the expense of the same, as the Conference may direct from year to year.

25. All materials to be published in the Conference Journal shall be in the hands of the Secretary within ten days after the adjournment of the Conference.

26. The Treasurer of the Annual Conference shall make final settlement and disburse all funds to the treasurers of the Annual Conference Boards, Commissions, and Committees as early in the Conference session as possible and before the adjournment of the Annual Conference.

XI. Standing Rules

27. The District Superintendents shall be the Committee on Standing Rules. Any member of the Conference desiring to amend the standing rules shall present in writing the proposed amendment to the committee for consideration and recommendation to the Conference.

XII. World Service

28. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall furnish each District Superintendent, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, and the Conference Missionary Secretary before adjournment of Conference, a written statement of the apportionments to the several districts.

29. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall provide a contingent fund to meet any expense incurred in carrying out the necessary work of the Annual Conference. The Conference Treasurer shall be authorized to disburse this fund, subject to the joint action of the Commission on World Service and Finance and the Cabinet.

(Fourteenth Session of the United Church)

FIRST DAY, WEDNESDAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Opening Session: The Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Church met in its One Hundred Thirty-second Session in the Auditorium of the Morehead State College, Morehead, Kentucky, Wednesday, August 27, 1952, at 2:00 p.m. Bishop Wm. T. Watkins, resident Bishop of the Louisville Area, presided.

Devotions: Mrs. Keith Huffman, Conference Organist, opened with an organ prelude. Bishop Wm. T. Watkins announced the traditional hymn, "A Charge to Keep I Have". Prayer by Floyd D. Rose.

Organization: The Secretary of the previous session, Homer L. Moore, was called to the platform for the purpose of taking the roll. He announced it would be by the card system.

Secretary: Homer L. Moore was elected secretary for the quadrennium, on motion of M. P. McClure, seconded by H. W. Dorsey. L. F. Moody moved that he be elected by acclamation. It was done. He named as his assistants the following: Journal—Howard E. Trent; Roll Call and Service Records—John L. Tilton; Credentials and Chronological Roll—Earl T. Curry.

Statistician: H. K. Carl was elected for the quadrennium with power to name his assistants.

Standing Rules: On motion the 1951 Standing Rules were adopted as the Rules governing this session.

Z. T. Johnson moved that Rule 11 referring to setting the salaries of the District Superintendents be deleted and that the matter of District Superintendents' salaries be referred to the World Service Commission according to Paragraph 788 of the Discipline. Carried.

Nominations: A. R. Perkins, Secretary of the Cabinet, read the nominations of the Cabinet.

The Bishop declared the Conference properly organized.

Memorial Service: Dr. J. E. Moss presided. The violin prelude was by Keith M. Huffman. Hymn, "Near My God to Thee", was sung. W. P. Fryman offered prayer. Dr. Moss quoted selections from appropriate hymns and poems.

The Conference stood while the names of the deceased were called.

Ministers: R. P. Crumpler, T. W. B. Demaree, R. W. Huntsman, F. H. Larabee, W. D. Welburn.

Accepted Supply Pastors: Charles F. Chestnut.

Widows: Mrs. C. C. Fisher, Mrs. E. A. McClure, Mrs. James T. Martin, Mrs. Jesse L. Murrell, Mrs. E. K. Pike, Mrs. John Reeves.

The Memorial Sermon was delivered by Rev. W. S. Peters from a manuscript prepared by W. C. Stewart, who was prevented by illness from attending the Conference.

J. E. Moss led the congregation in prayer for the health of Brother Stewart.

Hymn, "God be with you till we meet again," was sung. The Memorial Service closed with the benediction by J. E. Moss.

Privileged Matter: Paul C. Gillespie, Host District Superintendent, presented W. W. Garriott, pastor of the Morehead Methodist Church, who in turn presented Dr. Chas. R. Spain, president of Morehead State College. Dr. Spain spoke generous words of welcome to the campus of the College and to Morehead. Bishop Watkins responded on the part of the Conference emphasizing that the ideals of the church and school with respect to Higher Education were indeed similar.

Annuity: J. G. Carr made a motion that the Board of Conference Claimants bring in a recommendation to the Conference sufficient to pay \$32.00 annuity rate per service year, to be effective in 1954. The motion was carried.

S. E. Ragland, retired, appealed to the Conference for a larger support for the retired men.

Standing Rules Amendments: Further recommendations were read by A. R. Perkins and they were adopted.

Special amendment of Rule No. 9 regarding pensions was adopted. See rules.

Bar of the Conference: On motion of S. C. Rice the bar of the Conference was fixed 'as the first eighteen rows of the auditorium.

Pension Annuity Rate: M. P. McClure, president of the Board of Conference Claimants, discussed our pension needs and responsibilities. He challenged the Annual Conference to fix a higher rate to conform with General Conference action and to set up a Stabilization Fund.

Referred to Committee on Conference Relation.

Ashland District: E. M. Fossett moved that W. C. Stewart be referred to the Committee for the retired relation.

Danville District: A. R. Perkins moved that O. H. Callis be referred to the Committee for the purpose of having his relation changed from Retired to Supernumerary.

C. Elliott Means was referred for the granting of a Sabbatical year.

Frankfort District: C. E. Vogel asked that the name of W. B. Campbell be referred for the retired relation and that E. R. Overley, Jr., be recorded as having withdrawn.

Lexington District: Floyd D. Rose moved that Alexander Kenner be referred for the granting of the retired relation.

The secretary, Homer L. Moore, reported communications from J. H. Rayburn, George Prentiss and L. D. Rounds, carrying greetings

to the Conference and asking that they be excused. The above were excused by vote of the Conference.

Order of the Day: Floyd D. Rose moved that Friday, 9:30 a.m. be fixed as the order of the day for the discussion of the establishment of a Central Office.

Appeal Concerning Abandoned Property: On motion of Floyd D. Rose, a Committee of Five was to be appointed by the Bishop to hear the appeal of a decision concerning parsonage property on the Grassy Lick and Camargo Charge.

Official Program: W. W. Garriott moved that the printed program be made official program of the Conference. W. W. Garriott then made announcements as to local arrangements.

Order of the Day: On motion of R. R. Patton, "Higher Education" was made the Order of the Day for Thursday, following the address of Dr. J. E. Moreland.

Adjournment: On motion of S. C. Rice, the Conference adjourned. The benediction was pronounced by G. R. Tomlin.

Committee on Courtesies: C. D. Goodwin introduced the following: C. C. Calvert, Conway Boatman, Oscar W. Lever, Victor P. Henry.

Methodist Publishing House: George B. Robertson, representative of the Methodist Publishing House, called attention of the ministers

to the new Discipline soon to be published and also the new Revised Version of the Bible. He then presented a check to Bishop Watkins for \$4,303.47, representing Kentucky Conference's share of the profits.

Board of Ministerial Training: A. R. Perkins, Secretary of the Cabinet, read the appointments of Bishop Wm. T. Watkins to the above Board. They were elected.

Board of Conference Claimants: A. R. Perkins read the names of nominations for members of this Board. They were elected.

Disciplinary Question No. 21: "Who are received on Trial " The names of nineteen men were called. They each addressed the Conference after which by vote they were received on trial. The were: Eugene Parker Barbour, Jr., Henry Temple Barnett, Jr., Lawrence Rodney Buskirk, James Richard Couchman, Jack Jones Early, Thomas Charles Fornash, Leon Mervin Gold (father), Jack Melvin Gold (son), Frank Gulley, J., Donald Ray Herren, received on special motion by H. W. Dorsey, Charles Richard Kuhn, James Duane Landreth, Ralph Leonard, Welby Otis Patton, James Wirth Rose, David Campbell Ross, Albert Carter Savage, Jr., Thurston Christopher Taylor, Donald James Welch.

Disciplinary Question No. 24: "Who are received into Full Connection?" Harold Franklin Gardner, Robert Walton Fathergill Gardner, Raymond Jennings Hahn, James Adolphus Norsworthy, Robert Clifford Pugh.

Bishop Watkins called the Class to the platform and asked them the customary questions. They were answered in the affirmative. On motion the Conference admitted them into full membership.

Publishing House Check: Bishop Watkins delivered the check \$4,303.47, properly endorsed, to a representative of the Board of Conference Claimants.

Committee for Appeal: Bishop Watkins named the following Committee to hear the appeal of the Grassy Lick-Camargo parsonage property settlement: M. P. McClure, S. C. Rice, E. L. Tullis, J. L. Patton, Woodson May.

Committee on Courtesies: Carl W. Haggard, Conference Lay Leader, presented Dr. J. Wilson Critchlow who spoke concerning Kentucky's Retired Ministers' Pension Program.

Junaluska Commsision: Marcus C. Redwine reported pertaining the Kentucky Conference Guest House. (See Report).

Order of the Day: Adolphus Gilliam, Chairman of the Board of Hospitals and Homes, called the Heads of Institutions to the platform, C. A. Sweazy for the Children's Home, Thomas B. Ashley for

the Pikeville Hospital, Walter B. Phelps, Good Samaritan Hospital. They made reports of their respective institutions.

C. L. Cooper, Secretary, read the formal report of the Board of Hospitals and Homes. (See Paper 7).

Point of Order: (1) Marcus C. Redwine raised a point of order concerning organization of the Board. (2) He also as point of order questioned the power of the Board's Debt Limit. (Paper 8).

C. L. Cooper called attention to the fact that the matter referred to by Marcus C. Redwine had not been presented officially. The position of Cooper was sustained by the Chair.

Dr. John O. Gross stated that any question should be based on a particular paragraph of the Discipline (1948), and that this matter was provided for in paragraph 1528, section 5.

The Bishop called Mr. Redwine's point of order as stated in paper 8, (1) based upon a hypothetical question upon which he could not be expected to rule.

Adolphus Gilliam offered his resignation from the Board of Hospitals and Homes. On motion of C. E. Vogel, seconded by Floyd D. Rose, it was accepted.

C. L. Cooper moved that the persons nominated in the report of membership vacancies, be elected by the Conference. This was done. C. L. Cooper then moved the adoption of the report, including all items except the request of maximum indebtedness of 25% of the evaluation of property. It was adopted.

Good Samaritan Hospital Indebtedness. (Request 4) A request of Good Samaritan Hospital for authority to borrow up to twenty-five per cent of the value of the land and property for their proposed expansion program was presented by C. L. Cooper.

Mr. Marcus C. Redwine got recognition on a Point of Order, and read a question which now came officially before the body which was filed with the secretary. (See 2, Paper 8).

Floyd D. Rose raised the Point of Order that the request does not call for the authority to assume unlimited liabilities. Z. T. Johnson moved that the request of the Good Samaritan Hospital be granted. This was seconded by Adolphus Gilliam. W. L. Clark recalled that there was a "gentlemen's agreement" that the Hospital should not ask the Conference for funds. C. H. Greer rose to explain that the Good Samaritan Hospital has never asked for assistance from the Conference. Dr. Johnson's motion carried.

The Bishop said he would need at least a day to file his answer with the secretary, dealing with debt limit of Good Samaritan Hospital. (Paper 8, (2)). See Episcopal Decision 2.

Order of the Day: Report of the Board of Education. Frank C.

King, chairman, presented Dr. J. Earl Moreland who spoke on the general church program of education.

Order of the Day: R. R. Patton moved that the report of the Commission on Higher Education scheduled for this morning be postponed until Friday morning.

Candler School of Theology: Dean H. B. Trimble of the Candler School of Theology represented his school.

General Board of Education: John O. Gross of the General Board of Education spoke of the "New Responsibilities of the General Board of Education".

Kentucky Council of Churches: D. V. Sapp introduced Dr Alexander Warren, Executive Secretary of the Kentucky Council of Churches, from Lexington, who gave a picture of the work of the denominations in Kentucky.

Announcements: Announcements were made by the Secretary, Homer L. Moore and by the Conference Host Pastor, W. W. Garriott.

Excused: John O. Gross asked to be excused from attendance upon the Conference. S. W. Funk and H. W. Whitaker were excused to conduct funerals.

Conference Relations: P. C. Gillespie presented the name of Howard E. Trent to the Committee on Conference Relations for the purpose of retirement on account of health. He was referred to the Committee.

Adjournment: On motion of G. R. Tomlin, the Conference adjourned. Dr. Alexander Warren pronounced the benediction.

SECOND DAY, THURSDAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Preaching Service: 4:00 p. m., with C. D. Goodwin, presiding. Hymn, "O God Our Help in Ages Past", was sung. Prayer was given by W. F. Potts. A duet was sung by Rev. and Mrs. Blanchard Amstutz of Ohio.

Dr. Joseph King Vivion, the Conference Guest Minister, spoke on the subject, "The First Annual Conference of Methodism". Following the message, Dr. Vivion pronounced the benediction.

SECOND DAY, THURSDAY, NIGHT SESSION

Youth Night: Annual Youth Night observance was held on Thursday, August 28, with David Welch, president of the Kentucky Conference M. Y. F., presiding. Hymn, "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus" was sung followed by the singing of several popular choruses

led by David Welch. Prayer was offered by Bobby E. Jones.

The officers of the Conference Methodist Youth Organization were introduced to the Conference.

Wm. D. Swift, Director of the Methodist Student Movement, spoke regarding his work.

The speaker of the evening, Klaus Androwsky of East Berlin, Germany, was introduced by Bobby G. Jones, president of the Methodist Student Movement. Mr. Androwsky spoke on the subject, "The Responsibility of Christian Youth". The meeting was dismissed with the Methodist Youth Fellowship benediction.

THIRD DAY, FRIDAY, MORNING SESSION

Devotions: G. M. Haggard, presiding, quoted selections from the Psalms. Hymn, "O God Our Help in Ages Past", was sung. E. K. Meyers offered the prayer.

Dr. Joseph King Vivion, Conference Guest Minister, delivered the morning devotional message, "The First Christmas Conference in Lovely Lane Chapel, Baltimore." Hymn, "The Church's One Foundation", was sung by congregation.

CONFERENCE BUSINESS.

Journal: D. V. Sapp reported that the minutes had been examined and found correct.

Excused: On motion of G. M. Haggard, W. H. Smith was excused from attendance on account of a funeral.

Pension Rules: A. R. Perkins presented a paper clarifying Pension Rules for the men in special appointments. W. E. Hisle offered an amendment to the above asking that all the men who are in service and in the Chaplaincy who are not receiving a pension from the government be permitted to enjoy pension rights from the Conference. John L. Tilton, Conference Secretary of Pensions, gave information concerning men in the chaplaincy. M. P. McClure read Paragraph 1618, Section H, from the new Discipline regarding pensions for chaplains. W. E. Hisle's amendment was defeated. The report as a whole was adopted.

Committee Corrections: A. R. Perkins offered further corrections in the Boards, Commissions and Committees.

District Superintendents' Salaries: A. R. Perkins offered a recommendation by the Cabinet as to the matter of setting Superintendents' salaries

Z. T. Johnson offered as a substitute that the report of the World Service Commission be given at this session. The substitute

prevailed. Z. T. Johnson's substitute motion was ordered referred back to the World Service Commission.

Standing Rules: Attention was called to the fact that Section V contains only the following: "There shall be seven districts."

Admission on Trial: Joshua Tien, admitted last year, is an alien. Authority was voted by the Conference for the Bishop and Secretary to prepare and sign a guarantee that he would not become a public charge as long as he was in their employment. On motion of Adolphus Gilliam, properly seconded, the motion carried.

Episcopal Decision No. 1: The decision of the point was raised by M. C. Redwine concerning a man's right to be a member of a Board and be permitted to sit in on the nomination of himself as a trustee under the direction of that Board (Good Samaritan Hospital) was read by the Bishop. (See Paper 12).

Formal Answer to Marcus Redwine: The answer to the second question raised by M. C. Redwine was answered by stating that Adolphus Gilliam had resigned from the Board of Hospitals and Homes and that the Conference had accepted his resignation, and therefore, there is no actual case to be decided only a hypothetical one.

Episcopal Decision No. 2: Decision asked by M. C. Redwine as to whether the Conference could authorize an institution to assume indebtedness against the assets of the Conference was answered by the Bishop. (See Paper 13).

Bishop's Ruling: A communication from Meade Memorial Church, Russell, was read concerning a quorum necessary for a Quarterly Conference session, was answered by the Bishop as follows: "No quorum is necessary." (See Paper 14).

Ruling No. 2: In the case of the above church, question was raised as to the right of District Superintendent Fossett conducting a quarterly conference with a limited number present raising the question of a quorum. District Superintendent Fossett's action was affirmed. (See Paper 15).

Order of the Day: E. M. Fossett read a resolution from the Commission on Higher Education concerning a proposed campaign. It was adopted. (See Paper 16).

Carl W. Haggard moved that the Commission be continued for another year. Granted.

Privileged Matter: Bishop Watkins called attention to a small volume, "History of the Methodist Church in Kentucky", written by Dr. and Mrs. J. T. Dorris.

Conference Relations: On motion of Floyd D. Rose, District Superintendent, G. W. Kelley was referred to the Conference Relations Committee for retirement.

Pensions: M. P. McClure, president of the Board of Conference Claimants, having been asked to bring in a report concerning future annuities, outlined on the blackboard the amounts necessary to provide for a \$30.00, \$31.00 or a \$32.00 annuity rate for pensions.

Church Assessment: Delegate from First Church, Lexington, Carl W. Haggard, also Conference Lay Leader, moved that an amount equal to 18% of the pastor's salaries be set as the amount to be raised by the churches for Conference Claimants.

A. R. Perkins asked whether the \$6,000 in this year's Roll Call Fund could be distributed now as voted last year. He then made a motion asking that this be done.

W. S. Peters asked for information concerning when the 18% assessment would begin. The answer was given as 1952-1953.

A. R. Perkins asked that his motion above be withdrawn.

S. C. Rice spoke to the question.

Adolphus Gilliam offered a substitute motion that an 18% assessment be made against the churches for the quadrennium.

I. S. Pineur with Valis Hill as second moved to substitute for Mr. Haggard's motion. Before it could be considered the Bishop reversed his decision and ruled that Adolphus Gilliam's motion was in order in asking 18% against the churches beginning with this quadrennium.

Previous Question: W. L. Clark called the previous question. It was sustained.

Adolphus Gilliam's substitute motion carried and became the original motion and was adopted. (See Report).

Annuity for 1953-1954: On motion of J. L. Clark, the annuity rate for 1953-1954 was fixed at \$32.00.

Order of the Day: (Pension Interests Continued) Retirement Brotherhood. A legal session of the Minister's Retirement Brotherhood was called by the chairman, W. B. Garriott. He spoke concerning this year's accomplishments. W. W. Garriott, secretary, gave the annual report of the Brotherhood. (See Paper 18).

W. W. Ball read the Treasurer's report. (See Financial Exhibit).

C. D. Harsh presented nominations for vacancies on the Board of Managers. The following were elected by the Conference: C. N. White, C. W. Krebs, John L. Tilton, L. M. Ackman, each for a term of four years.

Constitution for the Brotherhood: John L. Tilton discussed the Constitution for the Retirement Brotherhood and read proposed changes. They were adopted. Copies of the papers adopted were filed with the Secretary.

Report of Board of Conference Claimants was read by John L. Tilton and ordered received. (See Financial Exhibits).

Coleman Bonny: Motion was carried substantiating the annuity claim of Coleman Bonny.

Student Religious Work. W. H. Poore reported concerning Inter-Conference Commission on Student Religious Work and filed paper with Secretary.

Public Relations Director: Wm. A. Hearn gave a report of his activities in the field of Public Relations and made recommendations, for the coming year. (See Report).

Attendance of Delegates: Bishop Watkins called for a count of delegates, lay and ministerial, present at 12:00 o'clock. The count was taken by the Secretary and 96 were present.

Approved Supplies: C. D. Goodwin presented the list and asked that it be accepted without reading. (See Report).

Kavanaugh Camp: C. D. Goodwin read the report. The trustees named in the report were elected by the Conference. (See Report).

Board of Temperance: The report was filed with the Secretary for printing. (See Financial Exhibits).

O. M. Simmerman offered a resolution commending Dr. Crockett on his articles in *The Kentucky Methodist* on "What Methodists Believe" and asked that they be published in book form. (See Resolution).

Excused: On motion of R. R. Patton, C. G. Dearing was excused.

Motion to adjourn prevailed and benediction was pronounced by R. R. Patton.

THIRD DAY, FRIDAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

4:00 p. m.—Preaching Service. K. O. Potts, presiding. Mr. Keith Huffman led the Conference in singing, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name". Jesse L. Murrell led the Conference in prayer.

Rev. and Mrs. Larry Buskirk, Richmond, sang a duet, "It's Real, It's Real".

Dr. Joseph King Vivion, Conference Guest Minister, was presented and used as his theme, "The Gospel".

"Blessed Assurance" was sung and the benediction was pronounced by Z. T. Johnson.

THIRD DAY, FRIDAY, EVENING SESSION

Board of Missions and Church Extension, Leslie M. Rogers, presiding. "The Church's One Foundation", was sung. Dr. Harry M. King, superintendent of the Wheeling District of the West Virginia Conference, led in prayer.

R. L. Anderson made the report of the Town and Country Commission and then Mrs. R. T. Brown reported on the Woman's Society of Christian Service.

T. O. Harrison, Conference Missionary Secretary, read report of the Board of Missions and Church Extension, No. 1.

Mrs. Keith Huffman accompanied Mr. Keith Huffman on the violin as he played "Ave Maria".

Robert L. Anderson introduced Dr. Robert Thomas of Pittman Center in the Heart of the Smokies, Sevierville, Tennessee, who spoke to the Conference.

The hymn, "Lead on, O King Eternal" was sung after which L. M. Rogers pronounced the benediction.

FOURTH DAY, SATURDAY, MORNING SESSION

Devotions: J. H. Igleheart presided. Following the organ prelude, hymn, "O Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing", was sung. C. N. White asked God for divine grace. Dr. Joseph King Vivion was presented for another of his inspirational messages as guest minister speaking on "The Methodist Conference of 1952". Hymn, "O for a Thousand Tongues to Sing", was sung.

Conference Business: JOURNAL. D. V. Snapp reported the minutes correct.

Courtesies: Robert Thomas of Pittman Center and Dr. Harry King, superintendent of the Wheeling District, West Virginia, were introduced.

The Making of Appointments: Bishop Watkins addressed the Conference stressing the difficulties of making appointments. He contrasted the Episcopal and the Congregational methods and urged letting the Cabinet work out the stationing of preachers.

Nominating Ballot for District Superintendents: The Bishop announced that he would take an informational ballot from the lay and clergy delegates as to whom they would like to have as their district superintendents in the future, each to vote for four.

O. W. Robinson: S. C. Rice reported that O. W. Robinson was in the hospital and asked that the Secretary send him a note of greetings.

Adjournment: A. R. Perkins moved that when we adjourn we adjourn to meet this afternoon at 2:30.

Board of Conference Claimants: W. S. Peters read the organization of the new Board as follows: president, M. P. McClure; vice president, C. W. Haggard; secretary, W. S. Peters; treasurer, W. W. Ball. His report was adopted. (See Reports).

Central Office: L. M. Rogers read the action of last year concerning the establishment of a Central Office. A written report based on the deliberations of the year was read by L. M. Rogers. (See Report).

G. R. Tomlin moved and his motion was seconded that the report be laid on the table. It was laid on the table.

World Service and Finance: The report of this Commission was read by Lloyd Moody. (See Report). It was considered section by section. Section 1 was adopted. Section 2 was adopted. Section 3 was adopted. G. W. Haggard made the motion that when we vote we vote separately on the manner of setting district superintendents' salaries. A. R. Perkins moved that the Episcopal Fund asking be based on pastors' salaries for 1952-53. Carried.

H. W. Dorsey moved that the district superintendents' salaries for the ensuing year be as recommended by the report of the Commission. G. W. Haggard spoke against the motion. C. N. White inquired concerning the plan of the Louisville and Tennessee Conferences. Donald Durham spoke in favor of the motion. Floyd D. Rose spoke to the motion. O. B. Crockett defended his record as a former district superintendent answering criticism by a foregoing speaker. W. E. Cissna offered as a substitute motion that the uniform salaries of the district superintendents be fixed at \$6,000. Valis V. Hill and J. I. Meyer spoke to the motion. W. L. Clark called for the previous question. It was sustained. W. E. Cissna's substitute motion was defeated. On motion, properly seconded, the plan recommended in the World Service Commission's report was adopted.

Items No. 5 and No. 6 were adopted. Item 7, that we allow each church to pay the pastor an expense account not to exceed 10% of pastor's salary. carried.

M. P. McClure moved that the World Service Commission confer with the Cabinet so as to harmonize new legislation relative to expense accounts. C. D. Goodwin moved that M. P. McClure's motion be tabled. It was not tabled.

Item 8 was adopted.

A. R. Perkins moved that the District Parsonage Fund assess-

ment be included in the above report. It was carried. The report as a whole was then adopted.

Privileged Matter: J. G. Carr commended O. B. Crockett and Lloyd Moody for their services on the Commission.

World Service and Finance Commission officers for the new year were approved. (See Report).

Treasurer's Report: The Secretary of the World Service Commission asked that E. K. Arnold's report be accepted without reading, and referred for printing. (See Financial Exhibits).

At the request of the Bishop the Conference stood while S. C. Rice led the Conference in singing, "A Charge to Keep I Have."

Evangelism: W. E. Garriott read the annual report. (See Report)

Dr. Eugene Golay of the General Board of Evangelism and Director of the coming United Evangelistic Campaign outlined plans for the October Crusade in the Kentucky Conference and the Louisville area. The Committee on Evangelism's report was adopted.

Lay Activities: C. W. Haggard, Conference Lay Leader, gave his report. A. R. Perkins read the communication from the Secretary of the Board, who was absent, stating that at a regularly called meeting of the Board, it had unanimously nominated C. W. Haggard as the Lay Leader for the year. (See Report)

A copy of the Treasurer's report of the Lay Board was handed to the Conference Secretary. The audit was to be completed in a few days.

Committee on Appeals: The Committee to consider the question raised in connection with the property on the Grassy Lick-Camargo Charge had been heard. E. L. Tullis reported that the decision of the Lexington District Committee was sustained. (See Report).

Divinity School: Dean Jas. Cannon, Duke Divinity School, represented the school.

Temperance: Walter C. House, Executive Secretary, Temperance League of Kentucky, spoke regarding his work.

Following announcements made by the Secretary of the Conference, Homer L. Moore, and pastor-host, W. W. Garriot, the session was adjourned with prayer.

FOURTH DAY, SATURDAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Board of Ministerial Training: Report concerning advancement of Classes, recommendations for Ordinations, and so forth, were read by the Registrar, H. W. Dorsey. (See Journal).

Marshall H. Ervin, not being present when the Class was asked the Disciplinary Questions, was called to the platform and gave satisfactory answers. Following which he was welcomed into Full Connection.

Ordination Recognized: The Orders of H. C. Church from the Freewill Baptist Church were recognized by vote of the Conference.

Junaluska: A. R. Perkins read nominations for Junaluska Trustees. They were elected.

Conference Relations: The following were recommended by the Committee for retirement having reached the age of 65: W. C. Stewart, W. B. Campbell, Alexander Kenner, Henry G. Murrell, J. B. Kendall, G. W. Kelley, J. E. Savage (retro-active to November 18, 1951). Retired by medical certificate: Howard E. Trent, W. P. Hopkins. Continued for health reasons: A. G. Cox, L. C. Godbey, L. D. Rounds, E. T. Ashley.

Granted Sabbatical year: C. Elliott Means.

Supernumerary: O. H. Callis.

Recorded as withdrawn to join another church, E. R. Overley, Jr.

The name of W. J. Doran was recommended for readmission and retirement. M. P. McClure, chairman of the Board of Conference Claimants, questioned the propriety of this action and on his motion the name of W. J. Doran was voted deleted from the list.

Passing of Character: The characters of the members of the Conference were passed and it was reported "nothing against them. (See Report).

Privileged Matter: R. R. Patton moved that the name of Donald Roetger be added to the list of approved supplies.

Disciplinary Question No. 47: "Where will the next session of the Annual Conference be held?" Invitations were extended by Eastern State College, Morehead State College and Asbury College. Warner P. Davis moved that the Conference be allowed to indicate their choice by vote. The vote was in favor of meeting next year at Eastern State College. On motion of Z. T. Johnson the vote was made unanimous.

W. H. Poore spoke words of welcome about coming to Richmond.

Mountain Missions: John Lewis, director of Mountain Methodist Missions, gave his annual report, which was adopted without reading. It was filed with the Secretary.

Reports

BISHOP'S DECISIONS

Mr. Marcus C. Redwine, layman from the First Methodist Church, at Winchester, Kentucky, requested two decisions at the 1952 session of the Kentucky Annual Conference at Morehead, Kentucky.

FIRST: Is it legal and proper according to the law of the church, as interpreted and practiced, for a member to serve on both the Conference Board, which nominates, and also an institutional board, under its Jurisdiction an oversight? Is this not against the well recognized rule of self perpetuation, in that a man who helps make up the personnel of a hospital board should not be himself a member on the same board. In its practical application the query is, should Rev. Gilliam, a member and chairman of the Annual Conference Board on Hospitals, and a newly appointed member of same for the next four years be permitted to nominate himself to serve as a trustee of Good Samaritan Hospital for the next three years?

FORMAL ANSWER TO MARCUS C. REDWINE: The answer to the question raised by M. C. Redwine was answered by stating that Adolphus Gilliam had resigned from membership on the Board of Hospitals and Homes in order to serve on the Board of Trustees of the Good Samaritan Hospital and this legal question thereby becomes hypothetical and not subject to adjudication.

SECOND: In the request submitted by the Board of Trustees of the Good Samaritan Hospital, owned by the Conference, is there not implied, if not expressly stated, a surrender of the sovereign power and discretion, vested in the supreme body to the Board of Trustees, the subordinate body. Can this Conference legally authorize said Board to provide its own means and power to incur unlimited indebtedness against the assets of this Conference? In the final analysis, does not the Conference have to say, "What is the highest debt limit that may be legally placed against the hospital?" *

EPISCOPAL DECISION No. 2—The Kentucky Annual Conference is within its rights to grant the Good Samaritan Hospital the right to incur indebtedness up to twenty-five per cent of its assets. No request was before the Conference for unlimited indebtedness.

Mr. D. F. Hendricks, a member of Mead Memorial Church, Russell, appeals certain decisions of the District Superintendent. *

Statement—"I am appealing the legality of the First Quarterly Conference held on October 31, 1951."

Statement—"A quorum was not present and therefore no action taken was legal. (Roberts Rules of Order, Revised, page 258).

Answer—Only two Conferences of the Methodist Church, the General and Jurisdictional, require a quorum to transact business. In all other Conferences (as, for example, the Quarterly Conference) whoever is present constitute a quorum. Therefore, the session of October 31, 1951, was a legal session.

Statement—"The By-Laws of the Church were assumed to be amended by changing the number of Trustees from nine to three."

"By-Laws can be amended, only by an affirmative vote of a majority of all registered members; or, if the Amendment was submitted in writing at the previous regular business meeting, then it may be adopted by a two-thirds vote of those voting, a quorum being present (Roberts Rules of Order, Revised, page 269.)."

"So the session itself was illegal and was powerless to take any action; and even had the session been legal, each of its acts was illegal in itself."

Answer—It is an accepted axiom in Methodist legislative and judicial procedure that in cases where ecclesiastical law and civil law conflict, the civil law must prevail. The civil law in Kentucky provides for three trustees, only. The law is quoted as follows: "Any religious society may before or after the creation of the charity by a majority vote, appoint one to three trustees in whom legal or equitable title to the society's property shall be vested to the use of the society.

Those appointments shall be entered upon the record book of the society. It may fill vacancies in the same manner." (Kentucky Revised Statutes, 1948, 273,100).

Neither the local church nor the quarterly conference has any "By-Laws"; therefore no By-Law could be amended; and the reference to Robert's Rules of Order, is irrelevant and without force. Robert's Rules of Order is never binding, unless formally adopted by the body as governing their action; and this has never been done, by this body.

EPISCOPAL RULING No. 3—In case of the above church, question was raised as to the right of the District Superintendent, Fossett, conduction the Quarterly Conference, that the limited number present raising the question of a quorum. District Superintendent Fossett action was affirmed.

RULING No. 2—The ruling of the District Superintendent that a

quorum is not required for a Quarterly Conference is hereby sustained. Indeed, the Judicial Council has held that the Annual Conference, a much larger and more responsible body, has no quorum. Therefore, the session of the Mead Memorial Church Quarterly Conference of October 31, 1951, was a legal session of the Quarterly Conference.

The second ruling of the District Superintendent, E. M. Rossett, really involves two questions. The first question involves the Civil Law of the Commonwealth of Kentucky. In the sphere of Civil Law I am neither required nor expected to have authoritative knowledge. I have, however, consulted able, legal counsel. I am informed by this counsel that Section 273.100 of the of the KENTUCKY REVISED STATUTE, 1948 Edition, does prohibit an unincorporated church from having more than three Trustees. The District Superintendent is correct in his statement, "It is an accepted axiom in Methodist legislative and judicial procedure that in cases where ecclesiastical law and civil law conflict, the civil law must prevail." See paragraph 721. The Quarterly Conference of the Mead Memorial Methodist Church was, therefore, within its rights when it chose to reduce the number of Trustees to the legal number required by the law of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

The remaining question has to do with the method of amending By-Laws as set forth in ROBERTS RULES OF ORDER, Revised. Reference in this Appeal to "the By-Laws of the church" is obscure. Neither the local church nor the Quarterly Conference has By-Laws, but it is governed by the law of the Church as enacted by the General Conference. The quotation from ROBERTS RULES OF ORDER, Revised, is irrelevant. Moreover, ROBERTS RULES OF ORDER is not binding except where it has been specifically adopted. The ruling of the District Superintendent is, therefore, sustained.

REPORT BOARD OF CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS

With this report your Board comes to the close of another year and the beginning of a new quadrennium. Thus this becomes the final report for this working group. We desire here, to thank those responsible for the opportunity given us, and for the cooperation we have been accorded. Especially do we thank our Bishop and his cabinet for the help of their good offices, also the personnel of the St. Louis Office. With these presents we give place to those chosen to continue the work for the new quadrennium.

Each year has evidenced a growing interest in the matter of pensions, on the part of the Church. We now find it easier to secure the needed support, because of the widespread interest in pensions by all our people. This new interest inspires within us high hope for the day when pension support will be equal to the just needs for all claimants.

Most of our work is made available for all of you in the printed reports and records required of us, and found printed in the Conference Journal. Plans and procedure are a part of the record filed each year and we do not ask you to listen to a lengthy report.

We present copies of our Audits for printing, together with a record of the Annual Distribution to Claimants. The plan adopted last year to enable the building of our Stabilization Fund has met with approval, as is evidenced in payments received. We are printing the total list of payments made and due for the current year, covering the record of Members and Supplies. By the action of the 1951 Conference we are included in the Current 11 in 1 budget for \$6,500. This provides additional funds for distribution and at the same time makes proper opportunity for the observance or recognition of Retired Ministers Day, as provided in the Discipline.

We list the following as Institutions approved for Annuity: Union College, Asbury College, The Methodist Hospital of Kentucky, The Methodist Home of Kentucky and Kentucky Wesleyan College.

Under Paragraph 1621, Section 2, of Pension Legislation we here recommend that Coleman Bonny, son of the late Rev. H. T. Bonny, have his claim approved by this body, under the two-thirds rule as therein required, for payment on the basis of 17½ years.

We ask that the World Service Commission and this Conference to approve 18 percent apportionment against the churches for the year. Thus we shall be enabled to pay \$30.00 as voted earlier by your action.

Finally, this Board has taken action asking that the 1953-54 Clearinghouse Rate be set at \$32.00.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Local Church Section

In a world where the Church of Jesus Christ confronts the perplexity and confusion of a rapidly changing situation, where its very mission and message is being challenged from without and from within, the significance of the role of the forces of Christian Education becomes even more evident. The need for imparting a more adequate knowledge of the saving grace of Jesus Christ our Lord, and planning a program to implement this purpose is almost beyond comprehension.

When compared with the full task to be done, your Board of Education well realizes the inadequacies of its program, but continues to promote with diligence those things, which in the bounds of our own Conference, will lead us on toward the ultimate goal. Some of the accomplishments of the year should be briefly outlined.

In preparation for the Vacation School program, which continues to grow as a means of effective service to Children and Youth, eight Vacation Church School Institutes were held during the month of March. A total of 105 Vacation Schools have been reported thus far in the Conference for this year.

The importance of the Laboratory Schools is beginning to be realized, and the two schools held this year at Epworth Church, Lexington, and First Church, Ashland, were highly useful and effective.

Our summer camp program this year reached 228 Intermediate age campers from 55 churches. One Epworth Training Conference enrolled 47 of our young people.

Our Youth Fellowship Assembly this year was one of the largest and very best ever held, with an enrollment of 239 representing 82 charges. Work with our College young people on the campuses of our various colleges in the State is growing. The Methodist Student Conference had 117 registered delegates representing 10 colleges.

Our Adult Fellowship Assembly was held with small attendance. Next year your Board hopes to promote a different type of Adult Conference, emphasizing general church school work, with special groups covering the various types of responsibility and interest in the total Church School program.

In the field of Leadership Education there were 13 training enterprises sponsored by your Board, including Christian Workers Schools, and individual classes in co-operation with a Church and College, and the annual School of Missions. A total of 537 credits were given in the Conference this year in Leadership Education.

Due to several factors, the enrollment at Pastors' School took a sharp decline this year, but plans are now well underway which we feel will result in a stronger program with larger attendance for the new year.

Our Executive Secretary has continued to do an effective piece of work, and, after consultation with the Cabinet, as the new legislation requires, we have elected D. V. Snapp, Executive Secretary, for another year. Mrs. Wm. Edwards has been elected Conference Director of Children's Work; Miss Sally Adams Robinson will continue as Conference Director of Youth Work, and a Conference Director of Adult Work will be chosen at a later date. Mrs. D. V. Snapp will continue as the office secretary.

We recommend that the Fifth Sunday be observed as Methodist Home Sunday. We recommend that funds received from the Roll Call for Race Relations Day be directed to Paine College, Augusta, Georgia. We urge our churches to observe the Fourth Sunday as World Service and Conference Benevolences Sunday, and that even though offerings for other special days be included in the Roll Call Day, that special attention be given to the proper observance of Methodist Student Day, Race Relations Day and Church School Rally Day.

We have attached to this report a complete financial statement of the Kentucky Conference Board of Education submitted by our treasurer, Mr. Basil Hayden.

College Section

This coming year should be one of the most significant periods in the development of our Colleges. The College Campaign for \$450,000 will make possible much needed advances in capital improvements in all three of our schools. We urge enthusiastic support of this movement which is being sponsored by our Conference through its Commission on Higher Education.

Our Colleges face difficult days and severe problems with reference to operating costs. The call of the Armed Services for our young men has seriously effected enrollments, thus sharply decreasing student fees. The continued increase in operating costs, in salaries and upkeep has almost made it impossible for our schools to operate without a deficit in current expenses. If it were not for the diligent and earnest efforts of our College Presidents at this time in raising large funds for current expenses this problem could not be solved. We feel that the time has come for our Conference to do more for our schools in this respect. The General Conference has set a specific goal for each Annual Conference to consider in this matter. We urge that this Conference set as its goal during this quadrennium the suggested 50 cents per member for our Colleges and 15 cents per member for Wesley Foundations and that we strive earnestly to reach this goal by the end of the quadrennium. We are already well on our way to reaching this goal. A continuous effort at an adequate

increase each year in our support of the Colleges for current operating costs should not make it difficult to reach the General Conference goal by the end of the quadrennium.

For the year 1951-52 Union College reports the following:

Teachers and officers, 30; Total enrollment in full time student equivalent, 499; Value of buildings and grounds, \$1,116,000; Endowment, \$693,000; Indebtedness, \$94,333.

For the same year Kentucky Wesleyan College reports:

Enrollment, 416; Faculty and staff, 24; Value of buildings and grounds, \$830,000; Indebtedness, none; Endowment, \$420,000.

Lindsey Wilson College reports:

Faculty and staff, 14; Students, 272; Property value, \$427,203; Endowment, \$37,500; Indebtedness, \$108,500.

During the year Lindsey Wilson, under the fine leadership of President V. P. Henry, achieved accreditation from the Southern Association, which now makes all of our schools fully and properly accredited.

For membership on the Joint Board of Education we nominate for the Class of 1956, L. F. Moody, A. B. Phister and P. H. Best. To succeed J. Marvin Glenn, in the Class of 1954, we nominate Jack Ott.

We nominate for election to the Board of Trustees of Kentucky Wesleyan College for the Class of 1956, W. H. Poore, J. T. Slaton and J. W. Snyder (at large).

For election to the Board of Trustees of Union College, Class of 1958, we nominate C. B. Cawood, Paul Muncy, S. L. Renfro.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

August 30, 1952

Your Conference Board of Evangelism has sought to promote a most aggressive program of Evangelism on the levels of the local church, district, and Annual Conference respectively.

Your Conference Director, together with the District Directors, held a Planning Conference in the early part of the Conference year, and outlined the program that would be undertaken. According to reports of the District Secretaries, a most effective program has been carried out in the local churches in their respective Districts.

The Annual Conference-wide Convention on Evangelism was held on November 7th, with excellent attendance and high interest. We recommend that this Convention continue to be held annually.

According to reports made by the Pastors to this Annual Conference, there have been a total of 2,172 additions by profession of faith, 1,912 by transfer, making a total of 4,084 accessions for the year.

Reports from our evangelists show that they have conducted 154 revival meetings, with 4,734 professions of faith, and 1,238 united with The Methodist Church. We commend these, our brethren in the full-time evangelistic field, for their faithful and fruitful labors, and earnestly suggest that our Pastors use their services whenever possible.

We recommend as Conference Evangelists Joseph Brookshire, Dee W. Cobb, James Gibson, Joseph Lewis, Eddie Moran, Paul Pappas, J. R. Parker and Ford Phil-

pot. We recommend G. C. Gaunce, and Roscoe Jenkins, Local Preachers, to be recognized as Local Preacher Evangelists with our endorsement.

We again express our sincere gratitude to the Board of Directors of the Ruggles Camp Ground for the most effective and progressive program which they have carried forward there. Constant repairs and improvements have been made during this past quadrennium. The property is in better condition today than it has been for many years. An excellent religious program, with splendid results, has been carried forward, including Christian Adventure Camps, and a great Camp Meeting. We are especially indebted to Rev. W. B. Garriott and Mr. Chas. E. Rankin, President and Treasurer, respectively. We recommend the election of Rev. W. B. Garriott, Rev. O. S. Crain, Mrs. J. B. O'Bannon, and Mr. Chas. E. Rankin as Trustees to serve for a term of three years.

We recommend the following as District Secretaries: Ashland, J. H. Finch; Barbourville, W. E. Garriott; Carlisle, H. L. Moore; Covington, Frank D. Swanson; Danville, Kenneth A. Clay; Frankfort, Gwinn Bierley; Lexington, I. J. Scudder.

We look forward with high hopes to our Area United Evangelistic Mission, Oct. 24th-Nov. 2nd. Already there is a rising tide of enthusiasm and deep concern on the part of both pastors and laymen for the success of this mammoth undertaking. Never has the Kentucky Conference faced such a golden opportunity, and been given such a fascinating challenge in the reaching of the lost, and the rebuilding of the moral and spiritual fibre of the people called Methodists. We rejoice that our own beloved Bishop Wm. T. Watkins is bringing to the leadership of this great undertaking, his many abilities expressed by his own personal consecration and concern. We further rejoice in the representative from our General Board of Evangelism, in the person of Dr. Eugene Golay, who likewise will play a major part in this great crusade. We pledge our whole-hearted and enthusiastic support to Bishop Watkins and Dr. Golay as District Superintendents, Pastors, and Laymen in this our greatest evangelistic adventure. We welcome Dr. Golay as the speaker for this hour, and also at our Anniversary Program tonight.

We earnestly request that we pray daily for the success of our United Evangelistic Mission in the Louisville Area, and for the whole of our great Church to the fields that are now white unto harvest.

ANNUAL REPORT TO 1952 KENTUCKY ANNUAL CONFERENCE

This past year has been one of our most successful years since my coming to the Good Samaritan Hospital. The service of the hospital to the people of Kentucky is exemplified by the increase in admissions, especially from the out-state counties. Patients were admitted from 87 counties and, of the total 12,217 patients admitted for the year, 6,200 patients were from counties other than Fayette County. In other words, 50.8 per cent of our patients came from counties through the Kentucky Conference and 49.2 per cent from Lexington and Fayette County.

We have had a successful year financially, with our net earnings amounting to \$30,583.07 for the year. This amount was used to purchase needed equipment and to improve the hospital facilities.

We have added to our hospital a Radioisotopes Laboratory, the first in Kentucky. The services for this laboratory have been in increasing demand not only in Kentucky but from neighboring states. We feel this is a most progressive step in keeping the Good Samaritan Hospital foremost among the hospitals of the South in new and scientific treatment of the ill.

Following are some interesting statistics of the past year's program:

1952 REPORT TO HOSPITAL AND HOME COMMITTEES LOUISVILLE AND KENTUCKY CONFERENCES

BRETHREN:

We have much to be thankful for in the care of orphan children in the Kentucky and Louisville Conferences. The Homes located at Franklin and Versailles have had another year without the dreaded disease of polio. However, we had many ill at one time with severe virus infection but with constant care they came through without any after effects.

There has been 107 children care for during the year, 82 at Versailles and 25 at Franklin. There has been an increase in the cost of child care because of high priced food and extensive repairs that were much needed. The cost per child per day was \$2.37, but this includes all expenses for repairs and workers.

The new Downing Memorial Dormitory was completed last fall and we were able to occupy it in November with a capacity of 24 beds for small boys. This building with all equipment cost \$54,000.00. The response from the churches and individuals for beds and equipment was gratifying.

Our Fifth Sunday Offerings have shown an increase which was greatly needed. The total offering for the year was \$46,011.22. Our operating expenses were \$2,754.82 over our income this year but this was the finishing of the building and other repairs. Our farms have shown a nice income and again proves a good investment. Special gifts and bequests have been very good.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

Bishop William T. Watkins, Districts Superintendents, Members of the Conference, Brethren and Friends:

Another Conference year has come to a close. Soon it will be history. This is the fourth report of the work of the Board of Lay Activities which it has been my privilege to make to this Conference. The record that has been made is ours. It is now too late to remake it. The opportunities to improve it, once affordable, have moved into the vicissitudinous past. The record has been made and we are responsible more to God than man for our efforts or lack of efforts as the case may be.

The past year has been one of progress in many respects. Let it be said at the beginning that any and all achievements which have been made are the result of the labors of the Ministers and Laymen who have worked together in harmony and God has blessed their efforts.

Our Kentucky Conference area is made up of a body of approximately 76,000 Methodists and if my statistics run true, at least 19,000 of these members are Lay men. I want to express my appreciation for these men who make up this large part of our constituency. They represent a part of God's only resource for building His Kingdom here on earth.

The work among laymen in the Kentucky Conference this past year has been one of the outstanding marks of development and maturity of our program of Lay Activities which I have witnessed over the past few years.

There has been more creative effort on the part of our District Lay Leaders and their associates together with the Charge Lay Leaders than I have ever seen before. Words of appreciation cannot match the achievements reported by them.

Much could be said about the continuous team work of both Ministers and Laymen which is always evident where the results are best.

There has been an increase in the number of reports of Lay Activities work in the local Church. These reports show that Laymen's Day was observed in the larger number of Churches this past year.

District organization meetings held in the various districts of the Conference were effective in orienting our Laymen on the year's Lay Activities program.

Methodist Men organizations reached a total of 68 as reported at the end of the last quadrennium. The Kentucky Conference was on the Honor Roll with 130% of its goal attained. Here is the record:

The organization of chartered groups continues to be slower in some districts than in others but the Board of Lay Activities is justifiably proud of the overall record. A renewed interest in the Church has been found where there is a chartered group of Methodist Men.

Many special projects have been reported by the District Lay Leaders. These indicate quite clearly that our Laymen are active and willingly contributing their services—giving generously of their time, talent and money to strengthen their own Churches and doing many things for the advancement of the Kingdom here and now.

Time and space do not permit the listing of all the projects which Laymen have helped to complete this year by contributing a personal service to their Church.

Perhaps the highlight of our work was the opportunity afforded by the Area Christian Stewardship Conference held in Louisville, Kentucky on March 4-5. This activity was sponsored by the General Board of Lay Activities under the direction of Dr. E. Lamont Geissinger, Associate Secretary. Our men were thrilled at the challenging messages. They received much information and inspiration from this meeting which they shared with others in their districts at one-day Sub-District Conferences under the guidance and earnest support of the Ministerial participants.

I am deeply grateful for having had an opportunity to represent our Conference, with my fellow delegates, at the 1952 General Conference in San Francisco. Also the Jurisdictional Conference at Roanoke, Virginia. I am sure that I will be able to serve my Church much better because of the knowledge and inspiration gained from this experience.

As Conference Lay Leader it has been my privilege during the past year to speak before many of our Laymen in several different groups. It has been an enriching experience for me. I thank God for the opportunity of this service in His name.

Again, I can say in all sincerity that it has been a great joy to work with this body of Christian Laymen and Ministers during the past year. I am confident our number of active workers will continue to grow, thus enabling us to do a larger and more effective work for Christ and His Church.

May God's blessing be upon each of us as we plan and work toward greater achievements through the Lay Activities program in the future.

REPORT No. 1**BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION**

Your Conference Board of Missions comes to the close of the quadrennium with deep gratitude to God for the opportunity to work for the advancement of Conference, National and World-wide missions. We have rejoiced in seeing from 35 to 40 charges each year assisted in their local programs with financial aid; in many instances this has been the means by which the charges have been able to maintain themselves as growing congregations.

Through the funds provided by the churches for the minimum salary program, we have seen the standard reach that which was suggested by the Conference at the beginning of the quadrennium.

A high type of missionary education and cultivation has been carried out through the plans suggested by the Superintendents for the District Missionary Institutes.

The Larger Parish Plan had grown rapidly and, under its impetus, many rural churches have been given competent leadership and new life.

The Church Extension of our Board has been able, with limited funds, to assist in the building of numerous parsonages and churches throughout the Conference. The Woman's Society of Christian Service under the leadership of Mrs. J. S. Van-Winkle and Mrs. R. T. Brown has made remarkable progress in missionary giving, in consecrated service and in building missionary vision among the women of our local churches.

The Advance Specials have played a prominent part in our missionary program the last four years. These Specials have given our churches a personal contact with the various mission fields such as they have never had before and have given vast material support to many struggling mission stations. We urge that mission specials started and maintained during the last four years be continued in the present quadrennium since some mission programs are depending on this aid for their very life. We cannot afford to suddenly desert the people who are leaning on us for aid. In addition, we cannot overemphasize the fact that new mission specials should be adopted by the churches, especially in the African and South American fields, for, in many cases, this is the only way that we can conquer new fields for the gospel.

The Mission Study Book

The new study book on Africa will soon be available. "Along the African Path" is Dorothy McConnell's vivid account of what she saw and learned of our missionary

achievements and outlook on a recent journey through that land. This will prove a fascinating book to read and a valuable one to study.

Now is the time to plan for the presentation of this book at every suitable meeting and to get church-wide School of Missions placed high on the priority list of things to be done in every local church this fall. Orders will be taken for the book at 50 cents per copy at the District Missionary Institutes.

Missionary Literature and Cultivation

THE WORLD OUTLOOK, free missionary pamphlets from the Board of Missions in New York and other such literature should be made available to our people on literature racks, in School classes and elsewhere. An increasing amount of good filmstrips and 16mm. sound motion pictures are being produced and are available at nominal cost. Workers from the field tell us that many of these pictures give a story that cannot be told in words. We should use them often.

District Missionary Institutes

Our missionary speaker for the District Missionary Institutes this year will be the Rev. Charles William Chappell, a member of the mission staff at Wembo Nyama in the Belgian Congo, Africa. Mr. Chappell is both an evangelist and educational missionary and we are greatly privileged to hear him this year.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

Within our church we reckon our history not by decades but by quadrenniums. This year marks the close of four busy, anxious, achieving years in the Kentucky Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service. The record of progress is something for which we can be very thankful. It is the result of prayer, sacrifice of self, and hard work on the part of 12,500 women.

A few of the accomplishments are: Last year these women gave \$76,000.00 to maintain missionary work overseas and in this country; for the quadrennium they gave \$273,000.00 and for local work almost twice that amount was given. The total gain in income on appropriations for the quadrennium is 55 per cent. It was thrilling to learn that the total gifts to missions from the Woman's Division for the quadrennium amounted to \$31,016,504.00.

The net gain in membership in the Kentucky Conference for the quadrennium was 2,346. A net gain of forty-eight new organizations is reported.

We are grateful for the six young women from our Conference who have been accepted for full time Christian Service during the quadrennium, four of whom are leaving this month for their fields of service. Mary Elizabeth Eads of Georgetown will serve in Japan. Virginia Curtis of the Dunaway Church near Winchester goes to Puerto Rico. Charlotte Taylor of Erlanger has gone to Africa to serve as Bishop Booth's secretary. June Manley of Sharpsburg will be a rural worker in Alabama. There is in line a fine group of young women whom we will guide in their training for full time Christian Service.

Many of our college campuses were visited last fall by Miss Ruth Smith, field worker from the Missionary Personnel Office, and this spring by Miss Marguerite

Twinem, one of the secretaries of Missionary Personnel of the Woman's Division. Students were interviewed, counseled, and encouraged in a very fine way.

One of our basic emphases across the years has been our School of Missions and Christian Service. More than 200 women of our Conference attended the schools at Lake Junaluska, Sue Bennett College in London, and Lincoln Leadership School at Kentucky State College in Frankfort.

The women are working in Evangelism. Prayer groups are meeting regularly. They are making surveys, visiting in the homes of prospective members and holding prayer vigils. They are vitally aware of the area wide Evangelism Mission. The local Spiritual Life Secretary as a member of the church committee on Evangelism is in a strategic position to help promote the Evangelistic plans of the local church.

The fall meeting of the Conference Executive Committee was held at First Church, Corbin, and the Annual Meeting of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service was held at First Church, Ashland on June 18-20. The work was carefully reviewed and plans were made for the new quadrennium.

Through the Supply Department three rooms (the parlor and two bed rooms) were furnished in the new Grace Bragg Dormitory at Scarritt College.

In January the Conference sent the President to the meeting of the Woman's Division at Buck Hill Falls, Pennsylvania.

The Board of Missions has cooperated splendidly with the Woman's Society of Christian Service. It has been a joy to serve with this Board and our grateful appreciation goes to the members of the Board, the District Superintendents, the Pastors and the Pastors' wives for their assistance and support in every endeavor.

We look to the past gratefully as we start now on this first year of a new quadrennium. In almost every society plans for advance are already under way.

The theme, "That The Kingdom of God May be Realized," points the way to new dedication of ourselves. We are committed to the six major objectives:

1. Seek to grow as Christians.
2. Seek to bring others into the Christian fellowship.
3. Seek with Christians everywhere the sustaining fellowship of a world Christian church.
4. Use all available resources to work for the things that belong unto peace.
5. Proclaim the world mission of the church.
6. Accept the price of Christian discipleship.

These emphases will be the personal responsibilities of each member in every Woman's Society and Wesleyan Service Guild in the Kentucky Conference.

JUNALUSKA COMMISSION

REPORT TO 1952 ANNUAL CONFERENCE

As your Commission, as stated in the heading, started to function after the August Annual Conference of 1947, (See page 89, 1947 Conference Journal), it is practical to make a report at this time for the full period of operations, covering five Seasons, including the current summer, since construction, which was completed in the spring of 1948. We refer for details, not necessary to repeat here, to our first Report, on page 88 of the 1948 Journal.

It is carefully estimated that our lot and house, and the furnishings, cost \$11,-358.88 and all of this has been paid except \$2,650.00. We refer to the Treasurer's report and Audit, appended hereto as part hereof.

At the present time we conservatively estimate our property to be worth \$20,-000.00, and reference is made to our last Report, page 117, 1951 Conference Journal, giving the economic reasons for the growth and steady increase of our capital assets.

During the fifth Season, just closing, we have had the largest number of guests, from all sections of our Conference and Kentucky, and enjoyed the most profitable season financially. The income for the 1952 period will be more than \$700.00.

While living costs at the Lake have risen substantially we have continued to house our own Methodist folks at \$1.00 per day, if they furnish own linens, and we feel this has been a helpful favor to all Kentucky Methodists who go to Junaluska, for costs at all other lodging places have increased materially, when accommodations can be found at all. We have uniformly encouraged our people to take all the family, as we have cots for the children.

We refer to the note about the Center in the August 21st issue of The Kentucky Methodist, as being typical of nearly any week during the 1952 Season, as follows:

Miss Leona Hurst, Hostess at Kentucky Conference Center at Lake Junaluska, writes that during the week of August 2d the following were guests at the Center: Dr. and Mrs. J. T. Dorris, Richmond, Kentucky; M. C. Redwine, Winchester, Kentucky; Mrs. James Crain, Miss Mary Louise Crain, Miss Pauline Crain and Miss Nancy Watts, all of Flemingsburg, Kentucky; Mrs. D. M. Spears, Louisville, Kentucky; Dr. and Mrs. H. J. Daily and children, Lexington, Kentucky; Mrs. Elizabeth Helm and Mrs. Earl Ritchie, Danville, Kentucky; Mrs. R. A. Carnine and Miss Helen Carnine, Miami, Florida, former Kentuckians.

It is also noted Rev. W. H. Poore and family of Richmond and Rev. E. T. Curry and family of Winchester spent a week at the Center in August.

Miss Hurst reports that the 1952 Season has been the best, largest

number of guests by far. Our Kentucky church people are learning we have the best and cheapest accommodations at the Lake.

As already stated, it now clearly appears we will be able to make payments on the principal of the mortgage debt to reduce it to a figure below \$2,000.00. This will make it possible to retire fully the debt in the first two years of the coming quadrennium.

The members of the Commission consider it a helpful privilege and satisfying opportunity to have thus served our Church in this field during the past four years.

TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION

During the Conference year 1951-1952, the vice-chairman, Rev. H. M. Wiley has been in charge. Rev. Robert L. Anderson resigned the active chairmanship at the last session of the Annual Conference on account of illness.

Several contacts have been made with the office of Research and Survey in New York with reference to a Conference wide survey. The office is under the leadership of Dr. Roy Sturm, who because of previous commitments could not direct such a survey during this past conference year.

The Commission was represented at the Annual Conference on Evangelism in Lexington last fall. Rural evangelism has been and is the most significant part of the program of Methodism in rural areas.

Some of the problems which confront our Kentucky Conference lie in the area of leadership. Our main problem is there. Many small churches wanting full-time leadership diminish the number of pastors available for the rural church. Shall we try to consolidate the leaderless rural churches with larger churches nearby? Many think that will not work because of transportation difficulties and because the smaller group would not feel at home with the larger one. Could county-seat pastors and larger church pastors in rural centers give supervision to local preachers that would serve the small churches. Some feel there are possibilities here. The Larger Parish Plan is an excellent answer if leadership and funds were available to support enough of them. How can we secure this leadership? How can we secure the funds to carry out such a program? County-seat churches have given generously in some cases to strengthen the rural church program and leadership. Could enough such churches be enlisted to solve our problem. But if we had the money, where would the leadership come from? Would enough of our trained ministers offer themselves for leadership in rural areas?

At the center of this problem are the colleges and seminaries training young ministers for the church today. Unless their program is inclusive of special training and emphasis on this vast rural section of the church, it is doubtful if our problem can ever be solved.

Our Town and Country Commission, our Boards of Ministerial Training, our administrative leadership of the church must unite in this task and on this emphasis of need and be patient in well-doing until our rural churches are served by a leadership that can develop their vast potentialities. Whatever we can do to encourage our Colleges and Seminaries to continue the fine work many are already doing and extend their programs even more fully will be a step in the right direction.

This Commission should develop itself to this task for the coming Quadrennium.

COMMITTEE ON APPEALS

The Committee on Appeals appointed Bishop William T. Watkins at the request of the Annual Conference met, after proper notice, August 29, 1952, at Morehead State College, Morehead, Kentucky. The Committee was appointed to hear an appeal of the Camargo Church, Lexington District, concerning the decision of a duly appointed Lexington District Committee concerning a disputed equity in the parsonage owned by the Grassy Lick and Camargo Charge.

The Committee met and elected M. P. McClure, Chairman, and E. L. Tullis, Secretary. After organization the Committee met with representatives of the two churches involved in the dispute. S. C. Rice led in prayer. M. P. McClure explained

the function and purpose of the Committee as outlined in Paragraph 252 of the 1948 Discipline. The Chairman read to the group the decision of the Lexington District Committee which was being appealed.

Since the Camargo Church made the appeal, they first presented their case through their chosen representative, Mr. Will Ricketts, after which Rev. C. F. Allen presented the case for the Grassy Lick Church. Mr. Ricketts was given the privilege of a final presentation of the Camargo contention. Following this, the representatives of the churches withdrew.

After careful consideration of the facts and figures presented by the representatives mentioned above, the deliberation on the evidence at hand on the investment equity of each church in the Grassy Lick and Camargo Charge parsonage, it was the unanimous decision of the Committee on Appeals to sustain the decision of the Lexington District Committee in his situation, a copy of which is attached for record.

We, the undersigned Committee, appointed by Rev. F. D. Rose, District Superintendent, of Lexington District, of Kentucky Conference, to arbitrate the Division of the parsonage owned by the Grassy Lick-Camargo Charge of the Lexington District, have heard evidence from both Churches as to payments made in the purchase of said Parsonage and insurance and repairs, etc. After personal examination of the property in question and consultation with local real estate men, we agree to fix the value of the property at present at \$6,000.00. We recommend that the division be on the basis of 37½ to Camargo and 62½ to Grassy Lick. The same percentage basis would be carried out in case the property is sold.

Our decision is based on the testimony of both Churches and the figures submitted by them.

COMMITTEE TO STUDY FOR A PLAN FOR A CENTRAL OFFICE

We., your Committee authorized at the last session of the Annual Conference to study the ways and means of establishing a Central Office for the Conference, and to bring back a report at this session, desire to make the following report and recommendations:

Your Committee held two meetings during the year: At the first meeting we organized, discussed the proposal, and appointed sub-committees to study various

angles of the matter and to report at a later meeting. At the second meeting, we received the reports of the sub-committees, and after having studied these reports at some length, reached the following conclusions as hereafter indicated:

FIRST: In the event the Conference establishes a Central Office with an Executive Director, this worker shall be charged with the following responsibilities:

- a. The work of the Conference Treasurer;
- b. The Director of Pensions;
- c. Collector of unpaid pledges to the Retirement Endowment Fund;
- d. Serve as Public Relations Officer for the Conference;
- e. Become Treasurer of the Board of Missions;
- f. And to direct the program of any other Board of Commission that may desire to share in this program.

SECOND: The Board of Commissions that should join in this Central Office are as follows:

- a. The World Service Commission;
- b. The Board of Missions;
- c. The Board of Conference Claimants (as regards b and c in above paragraph);
- d. The Cabinet (as regards Public Relations).

THIRD: In order to support this program financially, we recommend that the Conference levy an apportionment of 2% of the Pastor's Salary on each charge which would produce approximately \$11,000 on the basis of last year's salaries. We do not believe that this office can be established, personnel secured, and the work done for any less than the above-mentioned amount.

FOURTH: We further recommend that the Commission on World Service so adjust the apportionments as that this 2% shall include the money now allotted for the following purposes:

a. Conference Treasurer's Office	\$1,600.00
b. Public Relations Office	2,900.00
c. Promotional expense of Roll Call Sunday	300.00

FIFTH: We recommend that a Board of Control to direct the work of the Central Office shall be set up composed of one minister and one layman from each of the participating groups:

The World Service Commission
 The Board of Conference Claimants
 The Board of Missions
 Any other participating Boards

and two members of the Cabinet as might affect the work of Public Relations.

We further recommend that each participating Board shall name its own representative on this Board of Control and that the Cabinet shall designate two of its members to serve in similar capacity.

SIXTH: We also recommend that if this Board is established, the Cabinet shall designate one of its representatives to call the first meeting of this Board of Control and that he shall see that the Board is properly organized in order to begin its work.

REPORT OF KAVANAUGH CAMP GROUNDS

To Bishop Wm. T. Watkins
and
Members of the Kentucky Annual Conference

Brethren:—

It was our good pleasure to have Dr. and Mrs. E. C. Chastain, of Clay City, Indiana, to lead us in the 77th Annual Camp Meeting at Kavanaugh Camp Grounds, Crestwood, Kentucky, August 9-17, 1952. They brought to us in music and preaching the old, yet ever new story of Christ and His power to save. They make a strong combination for God and Righteousness and are very effective in winning folk to Christ and in bringing the back-slidden and indifferent Church members to a renewal of their faith in and dedication to God and His Kingdom program. Dr. Chastain is a member of the Louisville Conference and is an approved general Evangelist of the Methodist Church.

During the past summer months many boys and girls and young people, under Christian leadership were encamped on the Kavanaugh grounds and the results for Christ and life service to Him were amazing. In one camp period alone the leaders reported that 58 young people gave themselves to Christ and to full time Christian service

Another group tried out a new experiment, that of having boys and girls from the so called "slum" area of Louisville, camping with boys and girls from lovely Christian homes. There was a wide difference in background, training, culture, clothes, cleanliness and appearance at the beginning, but at the end a miracle had been wrought. The underprivileged boys and girls were clean and neat and had under splendid guidance, become as mannerly and lovely as those from the better homes and communities and almost every boy and girl made a full commitment to Christ.

Such experiences as these make Kavanaugh Camp Grounds one of the most valuable assets in the hands of our Kentucky and Louisville Conferences and deserve their full support.

Other denominations beg for the privilege of using this camp and are using it twice as much as the Methodists. We had to turn down five groups from other denominations because there was no more time available. More than 1,200 boys and girls and young people attended camping periods at Kavanaugh this summer. Four new cabins were built on the grounds last spring, adding greatly to the facilities.

At the 1951 Kentucky and Louisville Annual Conferences we asked for a joint committee to study the camp and its possible future use and make recommendations to the 1952 Conferences. We do not know the personnel of the joint committee and have heard nothing about a study having been made. May we, therefore, again request that such a committee be appointed and that it be composed of three members of each of the Conferences and that it be activated at once so that it can meet with the Board of Trustees at its regular meeting in October at Crestwood.

We further recommend that the joint committee visit the camp several times during its active season in the summer of 1953 in order to make a full and comprehensive report and recommendation to the 1953 sessions of both Conferences.

We recommend the following persons for re-election to the Kavanaugh Board of Trustees for terms expiring in 1955: L. F. Gerlin and W. F. Potts, and E. H. Waits, in place of R. Wilson, for a term expiring in 1955

PUBLIC RELATIONS DIRECTOR

Of The Louisville Area of the Methodist Church

This is a 'public relations' office, and public relations of course, has many phases. However, Bishop William T. Watkins once stated concisely that the main reason this office exists is to get the word "Methodist" in the news as much as possible. Consequently, we concentrate on that phase of public relations and expect to continue doing so.

Some Objectives (1952-1953)

1. A public relations council for each district. The purpose of the council would be to seek ways and means of building goodwill and creating understanding for Methodism in the district.
2. A workshop on public relations at the pastors' school. Dr. Ralph Stoodly, of New York City, will lead the workshops.
3. A comprehensive Area publicity file.

Some of the Responsibilities That Have Been Carried Out

1. During the year the office has sent news releases, at one time or another, to all the 222 papers and 47 radio stations in the Louisville Area, which includes the Kentucky, Memphis, and Louisville Conferences.
2. The office has been responsible for the monthly Louisville Area supplement to The Christian Advocate.
3. Articles and pictures have been sent to several regional and national church publications.

4. To make for better placement of publicity, the director has visited many newspapers and radio offices.
5. The director accepted the chairmanship of the Louisville Methodist Radio Commission and does a weekly broadcast.
6. He has been present at the Annual Conferences and several other Conferences and Area meetings to assist with newspaper and radio coverage.
7. He has worked with Methodist Information at national meetings in Grand Rapids, Cleveland, and other places. (His expenses were paid by Methodist Information.)
8. He has spoken to various groups about public relations and publicity.
9. The office was responsible for preparing a handbook and other literature for the forthcoming Louisville Area United Evangelistic Mission.
10. As any public relations office will, we have done our share of this-that-and-the-other during the year. But, first and foremost, we sent out the news.

RICHARD PERRY CRUMPLER

After an illness of four years, the Rev. Richard Perry Crumpler succumbed on November 29, 1951, at his home in Princeton, W. Va. The funeral service, held at First Methodist Church in Princeton, was in charge of the Rev. L. D. Roe, Beckley, West Virginia, with Rev. B. W. John, Princeton, assisting. Burial was in Rest Haven Cemetery of that city.

Brother Crumpler was born on October 12, 1880, at Goldsboro, N. C., a son of Mr. and Mrs. James Thomas Crumpler. He was graduated as a minister from Elow College, N. C., in 1909, receiving his A. B. degree there. On Sept. 13, 1911, he was married to Miss Florence Seymour at Cascade, Virginia. He served as high school principal for twelve years before entering the active ministry.

Survivors include the widow, three sons, R. P., Jr., Seymour and Robert, and one daughter, Miss Lucille, and two grandchildren.

Among the pastorates which he held were Edom, Leaksville and Linville, Virginia, Ripley, Reedy, Poca, Paden City, West Virginia, and Wayland, Kentucky.

It was while he was pastor at Wayland that the writer came to know and love him. I found him one of the most faithful and zealous preachers in the Ashland District and always received a warm welcome in their hospitable home. From the standpoint of good deeds rendered unselfishly, he was a model for the people in every community where he lived and labored as a minister of the Gospel. Indeed, to all who knew him best and loved him most, he is yet alive, and will ever live in those hearts. For all of us he will ever live in the great store of memories, in that world of lasting impressions which make him so real. He moved among us quietly and without pride. Of him it may be said:

"Devout yet cheerful; pious, not austere;
To others lenient; to himself sincere."

May this brief renewal of memory with one we knew so well serve as a timely reminder that we who leave behind us friends, never die.

The Reverend Huntsman had already started into the Christian Ministry sometime before his marriage. He served for many years as a "Supply Minister" in the old Methodist Episcopal Church. By much study, as he ministered to various churches in the Old Kentucky Conference, he finally completed the required course of study and was ordained an Elder in 1919. Some of the charges he served in the more than thirty-five years of service are: Tompkinsville, Bethel Beavor Dam, Earlington, Hardinsburg, Middleburg, Paintlick and his home church at Scottsville, Kentucky.

There are four children that survive the Reverend and Mrs. Huntsman, Mrs. W. K. Shugars, Jr., of Liberty, Kentucky; O. J. and Claude Huntsman of Maysville, Kentucky, and Miss Morea Huntsman of Miami, Florida.

Because of failing health, The Reverend Huntsman was given a retired relation with the Conference in 1928. Immediately afterwards they moved to Maysville, Kentucky, where they made their home with their two sons. Reverend Huntsman's quarterly Conference relation was transferred to the Old Third Street Methodist Episcopal Church, which with unifications and merging with The First Methodist Church became The Trinity Methodist Church.

In July 1947 Mrs. Hunstman was called home and from that time on The Reverend Huntsman made his home with his son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Claude Huntsman, 829 East Second Street, Maysville, Kentucky.

The clutches of pain never daunted his great spirit but after many years of intense suffering, on the morning of January 8, 1952, God called him home. The family lost a good father, the church lost a great friend.

DR. FRED HALSEY LARABEE

Dr. Fred Halsey Larabee, Dean Emeritus of Asbury Theological Seminary, received his heavenly summons at 3:00 p. m., Tuesday, May 27, 1952, at Lakeland, Florida, in his eightieth year. Previous arrangements had been made for his arrival by plane in Wilmore, accompanied by Mrs. Larabee, on this date. However, in the kindly providence of God, his destination proved to be the Heavenly City. He suffered a paralytic stroke early in the morning and passed away peacefully at a hospital in the afternoon. Dr. Larabee had been in failing health for some time.

The funeral service was held in the Wilmore Methodist Church on Saturday, May 31, with President J. C. McPheeters in charge, assisted by Dr. J. O. Van Meter, Rev. J. T. Harmon, Dr. Lela McConnell, Dr. John Paul, Dean W. D. Turkington, Dr. Roland V. Hudson, and Professor William M. Arnett '43. Burial was in the Wilmore Cemetery. He is survived by his beloved wife, who plans to remain in Wilmore; a daughter, Mrs. Miriam Larabee Wolfe of Greensburg, Pennsylvania; and a son, Norman Cutler Larabee, of Elizabeth City, North Carolina.

After spending several years in the pastorate in New Jersey and Michigan, Dr. Larabee devoted himself to educational work, during which time he served the Asbury institutions for thirty-two years. He served the Seminary as dean for a term of twenty-one years, during which time he signed the diplomas of almost three hundred young men and women, most of whom are now actively engaged in the Christian ministry in many parts of the world.

Words are inadequate to pay fitting tribute to Dean Larabee. The lofty dimensions of his life were at once a blessing and a challenge to all who knew him. The marks of true saintliness were evident in his Christian character. His untiring labor in behalf of the Seminary places every Asbury Seminarian in his debt. The Alumni Association expresses to the bereaved family the deepest sympathy.

WILLIAM DRUMMOND WELBURN

Reverend William Drummond Welburn, son of Rev. Drummond Welburn and Mary Schwing Welburn, was born in Jeffersonville, Indiana, October 16, 1866. Both parents were of sturdy pioneer stock who made a valuable contribution toward the material, cultural and spiritual development of Louisville and other sections of Kentucky during the last century. His father Rev. Drummond Welburn served as presiding elder on four districts and filled certain leading pulpits in Louisville. He was a great student and acquired a wide fund of information making him an authority on church history and current literature. The mother was of a large family from which sprang a number of stalwart men and women, the influence of whose characters yet abides.

The parents lived happily together for fifty-four years. The subject of this memoir was the youngest of ten children born to this union. The official duties of the father called him from home much of the time but the mother met in a fine way her heavier responsibility for training the family in industry, frugality, honesty, religion and consequent morality. Within this family circle Brother Welburn acquired his appreciation for good music which he retained to the end of his days.

His early schooling was in the proficient system of Jeffersonville, Indiana. He later took a course in the Bryant and Stratton Business College at Louisville, then spending two and a half years in business with his brother-in-law. The Welburn family belonged to the M. E. Church, South, in Jeffersonville, Indiana, and young William became a regular, attentive and reverent attendant.

From childhood he had held a vague idea of becoming a preacher. As a child he felt a consciousness of sin and need of salvation. After a period of some struggle he came into the exercise of a saving faith and realization of the joy of salvation. He became a member of the church when about fifteen years of age.

When about eighteen, after a suggestion by his father as to importance of choosing a life work, he confided to him that all his life he had felt that he might be a preacher. The wise father told him what was involved in the way of education and otherwise

Brother Welburn was licensed to preach in Jeffersonville, Indiana, by Dr. H. C. Settle, Presiding Elder and John M. Crowe, Preacher in Charge, January 5, 1885. Soon thereafter he entered Vanderbilt University where he spent five years, part of the time in the Academic and part in the Theological Department. In addition he took advantage of opportunities for study of music. He lived in Wesley Hall and often referred to the pleasant associations of those years. He was ordained deacon at McKendree Church in Nashville by Bishop R. K. Hargrove by authority of the Tennessee Conference, November 17, 1889. He entered the Kentucky Conference in 1890, his father having joined in 1840. He was received into full connection by Bishop John C. Keener at Middeboro in 1892 and was ordained elder in Frankfort, Kentucky, September 16, 1894 by Bishop W. W. Duncan.

His first appointment was Irvine and Beattyville. The others in the order in which he served Lawrenceburg Circuit, Moreland, Salt River, Owingsville, Germantown, Tilton, Burgin, Newcastle, LaGrange, Warsaw, Stanford, Maysville; Millersburg, Pleasureville, Bloomfield and Burnside. During his pastorate at Stanford the present Harris Memorial Church was erected. After forty-two years of continuous service he was retired in 1932 but kept in intimate touch with the work of the church until his death.

He was married November 12, 1895 to Miss Emma Dunn Pruitt of Moreland, Kentucky. She was of a family with a long line of devotion and loyalty to the Church in Central Kentucky. She was ever a loving helpmate in his various charges. Their golden wedding anniversary was celebrated at the home of Mr. and Mrs. C. O. Wilson, at Bradfordsville, in November, 1945. Many friends and relatives from the various sections of the state visited them on this occasion. Mrs. Welburn departed this life November 1, 1946.

Not only was there a beautiful and affectionate regard between husband and wife in this family, but their three children shared and returned that tender appreciation which makes a lovely family circle. These three children survive them: Mrs. C. O. Wilson, his daughter, living at Bradfordsville is a music teacher, house-keeper and a faithful and efficient worker in the village church where for a hundred years her ancestors have served. Her husband and children have shared with her in her devotion to her father during his declining years. It was Brother Welburn's habit to visit annually each of the boys to whom he was tenderly devoted and who gave him in return their utmost respect and careful attention. Mr. Edwin Welburn, a business man, is a resident of Hartford, Conn., while the younger son, William Jr., is in business in Fort Worth, Texas.

Brother Welburn was highly regarded by the people of Bradfordsville, his last earthly place of residence. He was a regular, sympathetic and generous attendant upon the services of the village church. As a member of the Men's Class of which the writer is the unworthy teacher he was ever a helpful co-worker. Even after passing his four score mile stone he was still erect, agile and interested in his church, his children and their children, his neighbors and large circle of friends. It was his joy to live over the yesterdays, having fulfilled his gifts of love and service.

With the glow of sunset on his face he was living as if just around the corner there was the great adventure for which he longed.

For the last few months there seemed to be a dismantling of his powers making ready for the passing of his soul from life's winter to an eternal Spring. Quietly on the evening of November 16, 1951, he made the greatest adventure in stepping over the threshold of the mortal into the "House not made with Hands eternal in the Heavens".

The funeral services were held in the Methodist Church at Bradfordsville under direction of Rev. M. V. Tucker, his pastor, who was assisted by Reverend T. A. Conley, pastor of the local Christian Church and the writer. His body was buried beside that of his companion in the Pruitt family burying ground near Moreland, Ky.

The choir sang her favorite anthem, "My God and I," and one of the soloists sang "Going Home", by Dvorak. She lay in state in the sanctuary of the church from 2:00 to 7:45 p.m., and more than 500 persons passed by her bier. A very large audience was present for her funeral.

Following the message by Dr. Patton, Dr. Murrell arose, and spoke eloquently and movingly of the comfort and strength of his Christian Faith, in his hour of bereavement. He assured the people that the comfort of the Gospel he had tried to bring them in their hour of sorrow, brought abiding strength to his own heart.

Sometime ago Mrs. Murrell started a fund in First Church which would be used as a memorial window for her husband. Just prior to her death she requested that the money which might be used for flowers for her, be brought to the church and placed in the memorial window fund.
