## PEMBROKESHIRE.

PUBLICANS AND REVIVAL.-The religious revival is very strong in Rhos, and a num-ber of publicans have been interviewed with a view to ascertaining to what extent the revival has affected their trade. Five declared that they had felt nothing at all, three that they had suffered a little, which might be attributed as much to the general depression in trade as to the revival; three said their business had fallen off to the extent of between twenty-five and thirty per cent. while another declared that where he used to sell four barrels of beer weekly, he was not now selling two. The three who said they had suffered nothing at all, added that they did a better business on Boxing that they did a better business on Boxing Day than on any previous holiday. At a revival meeting at Swansea, the Rev. J. Clarke Gibson, of Yoxford, and the East Suffolk Mission, asked those present to pray for the "flame" to spread to Suffolk, and the Rev. J. W. Ewing, of Ryelane Baptist Chapel, London, and the Rev. T.
