In this issue of the Journal of ASCG we are beginning a new feature titled "My Pilgrimage in Church Growth." Leaders in the Church Growth movement will be sharing their stories, explaining how they became involved in church growth and evangelism. Our first installment in this series is by Elmer Towns.

A new contributor to our Journal is Paul Kim. Dr. Kim is a keen observer of the Church Growth movement, particularly church growth among Korean churches. Throughout the second half of the twentieth century, the Korean church was a worldwide model of rapid church growth. However, as Dr. Kim explains, many churches in Korea are now struggling.
