Introduction

Willard Francis Mallalieu (1828-1911), was born December 11 in Sutton, Massachusetts of Puritan and Huguenot ancestry. At age twelve he was converted and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church. In 1858 he entered the New England Conference and served there as pastor and Presiding Elder until his election into the bishopric in 1884.

His writings include *Christian Perfection as Taught by John Wesley, Sermon: The People's Church Pulpit, The Why, When, and How of Revivals, Comfort*, and a chapter entitled, "Mr. Moody's Ministry to Men" in *Life and Labors of Dwight L. Moody* by Rev. Henry Davenport Northrop. In addition, he wrote the introduction to George W. Wilson's attack on intellectuals, *Methodist Theology vs. Methodist Theologians*.

Bishop Mallalieu died in Auburndale, Massachusetts, August 1, and was buried in Bay View, Sandwich, Massachusetts.

The W. F. Mallalieu collection contains a manuscript travel book containing a record of his 1888 trip to Europe and a manuscript journal of his travels in 1874, 1875, and 1892 to Europe, the "Orient," and Southern United States, with news clippings of related articles, pictures, and correspondence. In addition to the volumes is a copy of *The People's Church* which contains an address delivered by Mallalieu at The People's Church in Boston on the occasion of the "laying of the corner stone." Also, included is correspondence to his mother while he was in Europe in 1888, correspondence to his wife while he was in the "Orient" in 1892-and finally-a poem by Mallalieu entitled "Golden Wedding."

The collection was received in September 1983, in poor condition. No further additions are anticipated, but would be welcome.
